Big Lake picked first

Top-O-Texas Football magazine is on the newsstands and Coach Armando San Miguel's Eldorado Eagles are given darkhorse consideration in 1986.

Most coaches would rather not be picked to win their districts before the season and San Miguel will not have to worry about it, with that monkey attached firmly to the back of the Big Lake grid mentor.

The Eagles checked out shoes Wednesday, and will commence two-a-day workouts next Monday. Workouts will be held at 8 a.m. and 6 p.m.

The War Birds should battle the remaining teams in District 6-AA for second place, according to the magazine. Top-O-Texas had the following to say about Eldorado's chances in '86:

"The Eldorado Eagles will have a new coach this fall in Armando San Miguel.

"Miguel comments on his new position, "I am very excited about the job! Taking over a system with rich and proud tradition to become a team that is proud and promising."

"Coach San Miguel and staff may have their work cut out for them. They will be starting a new system, lack size and experience, but there are some positive things in good team attitude,

above average speed, and experience at skilled positions.

"Three-fourths of the backfield is returning in wingback Felix Ramos (5-8, 140) senior, Russ Dacy (5-10, 160) senior, and quarterback Martin Espinosa (5-6, 140) senior.

"Troy Daniels (5-9, 160) senior will be the fullback. Daniels was a starter last season as a linebacker.

"A major rebuilding job will have to be done up front where only Mitchell Bradley (5-9, 170) senior guard-linebacker is returning. Bradley was selected to the all-district team last fall.

"The rest of the line will have to be built around Tommy Prendergast (6-4, 260) senior tackle who is a strong all-state candidate.

"Lack of size and experience will keep Eldorado from battling Big Lake for the district championship. They will battle Ozona, Forsan, Rankin and Stanton for the District Runner-up spot.

FUN KICKS OFF HERE FRIDAY

Rodeo, Schleicher County Days slated

There is something planned for everyone at this year's Sesquicentennial version of Schleicher County Days, planned here Saturday, August 9.

A parade, rodeo, melodrama, and lots of games and good food are on tap, as Schleicher County residents celebrate their Texas heritage.

Sponsored by the Schleicher County Rodeo Association, the 17th Annual Eldorado Open Rodeo will kickoff the events Friday night at 8 p.m.

Bareback bronc riding, team roping, bull riding, girls barrel racing, steer wrestling,

saddle bronc riding and calf roping will be held.

Books open at 9 a.m. Wednesday, August 6 and close at 2 p.m. on the same date. Skyline Trophy Buckles, valued at \$750, will be given for each event. Lester Meier of Fredricksburg will produce the rodeo.

A dance will follow performances of the rodeo on Friday and Saturday night, with music provided by Bob Blandford and the Rodeo Men.

Candidates for Rodeo Queen are also being sought. Interested young women should call Kirk Jones at 853-2497. Candidates must be between 14 and 17 years of age and residents of Schleicher County for at least one year.

They will be judged on appearance and horsemanship and will also sell rodeo tickets. Ticket sales will continue until the Saturday night performance of the rodeo, when the new queen will be introduced.

Horsemanship will be judged on Thursday night August 7 at the arena, beginning at 7 p.m.

Saturday will be the big day, with events starting at 8:30 a.m. with the "Fun Run". The run will begin from in front of First National Bank and take runners over a two mile course, ending up back at the courthouse.

At 9 a.m. the parade will be held and persons can start setting up their booths on the courthouse lawn. The local American Legion Post will lead the parade with the United States, Texas and Sesquicentennial flags.

Rodeo Association riders and floats entered by the Women's Club, Sewing Club, Historical Society, Schleicher County Library and local

sororities will follow. All parade participants should be at the tennis courts near the hospital by 8:30 a.m.

Parade trophies will be awarded to entries for the best overall float, best theme and most original, best decorated bicycle and most unusual antique car.

Floats, old cars, bicycles, boats, trucks, wagons or just about anything can be entered in the parade. People interested in entering should call Bill Hodges, 853-2408, or Bill Dakan, 853-2416. "We would love to have your participate," Dakan said.

Fay Reynolds, long-time lab technician, has decided to enter semi-retirement and will be working on a consultant and when needed on a part-time basis.

Angela Case has accepted the chief technician's post, working with Mrs. Reynolds, chief x-ray technician Carolyn Porter and

assistant technician Janett Armentrout.

Mrs. Case graduated from San Angelo Central High School and was employed at the A&M Research and Extension Center in San Angelo while she started classes at Angelo State University.

During her third year at ASU she worked in Central Supply at San Angelo Community Hospital and was accepted into Shannon West Texas Hospital's Medical Technology program. After a year in hospital internship training and working weekends in the pathology lab she graduated from ASU with a Bachelor of Science degree in Medical Technology.

She has been a Medical Technologist at Community Hospital and recently completed requirements for a teaching certificate for biology, chemistry and physical science. She did her student teaching at Eldorado High School and has substituted in the local schools often. She is married to Pete Case.

IN ELDORADO SCHOOLS

Per student cost hits \$4,375

In the two years since the legislature enacted HB 72, local school budgets have grown by \$2.7 billion. This higher spending level has been funded as much by local property taxes as by record-setting increase in state taxes. Over the past two years, an added \$1 billion in state aid was matched by a \$1 billion increase in local school property taxes.

Last year trustees in the 1,063 local school districts levied the largest school property tax increase in history--\$551 million--for a total tax bill of \$4.6 billion.

Locally, the Schleicher Countyn ISD's tax levy last year was increased by 28.8 percent for 1985-86 as compared to a 13.3 percent increase for the average school district in Texas.

The figures come from the latest issue of "Bench Marks for 1986-87 School District Budgets in Texas," an annual publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

School budgets adopted last year called for spending \$3,346 per student for current operations. Schleicher County ISD's budget provided for \$4,375.06 per student based on the 668 students in average daily attendance in 1984-85.

Four dollars in five were spent for salaries. Statewide, payroll expense averages \$2,705 per student, as compared to \$3,354.46 in Schleicher County ISD. Payroll expense is a combination of salary levels and staffing patterns.

The average salary for classroom teachers paid by the local district in 1984-85 was \$23,505. The average among all school districts in Texas was \$23,281 per classroom teacher. While the legislature and local school trustees focused discussion on classroom teachers' salaries, statewide only two-fifths of the 1985 budget increase was used for that purpose.

In Schleicher County ISD the average salary for administrators was \$41,862, and \$27,723 for other professional support employ-

ees (librarians, counselors, nurses, supervisors, etc.)

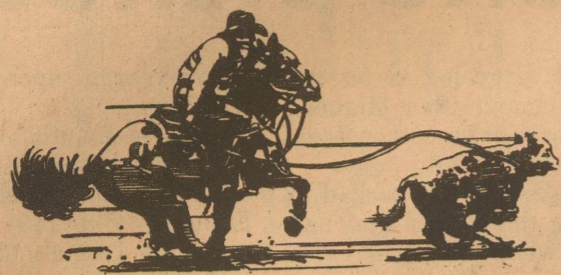
Taxpayers provided one teacher for 13.1 students in Schleicher County ISD compared to a statewide pupil-teacher ratio of 1 to 16.3. Because of small classes, especially at the high-school level, and abbreviated teaching schedules, many classes have more than the average number of students. HB 72 requires no more than 22 students in kindergarten, first, or second grade classes next year, but one-fourth of the districts obtained a waiver from that restriction last year.

The average school district imposed a property tax at the rate of 76.3 cents per \$100 of appraised value, which value averaged 89.2 percent of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was 68.1 cents (76.3 times 89.2 percent) statewide. Locally, the rate on market value in the district was \$.877. The tax on a house in this district that would sell for

probably several ways to give directions to anyone's house here depending on who you knew lived where.

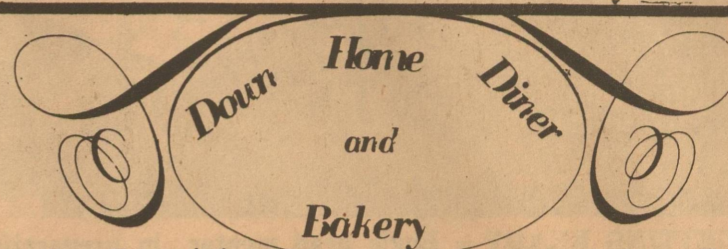
On the other hand I gave what I thought was very simple directions to my house here and my San Angelo friend got lost, here!!!

Mable Frietag gave the Treasurer's Report.

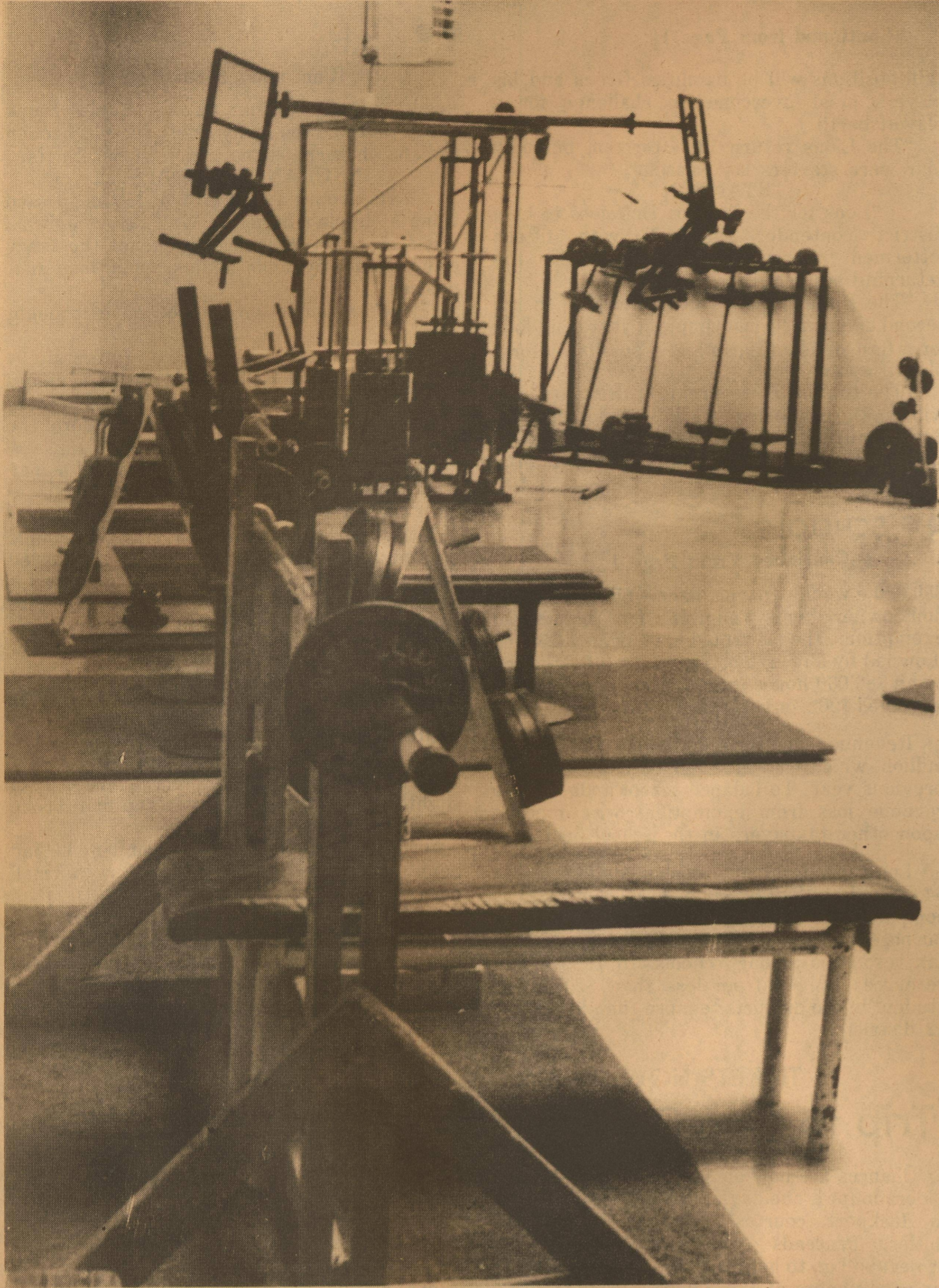
The society will keep the museum open for the Sesquicentennial Eldorado Day. The parade is at 9. Ruth Baker and Gene Edmiston will ride in the parade.

WHY EAT A "VARIETY" OF FOODS?

"Eat a variety of foods" is probably the most common nutrition advice given by physicians and nutritionists. "If the returning skill players perform at the same level they did in 1985 and the Owls can find a few good men to completely rebuild the interior line, Reagan County could again be a factor in the District 6-2A race.

"The Owls finished second in the league a year ago and won a pair of playoff games before ousted from the state championship derby. A repeat of last season's 9-4 showing is very possible if head coach Ronnie Reeger can locate a line that can create the running and passing lanes for a host of talented backs and receivers.

"Our skill people are our biggest strength, Reeger explained. "The loss of our interior line is our major concern heading into the season. Developing linemen is crucial to our success."

"Reagan County's four returning offensive starters comprise one half of the Owls' wing-T

backfield and two of the receiving slots."

OZONA

"The way Ozona mentor Jim Green looks at it, the Lions' biggest break this season was the bi-annual realignment by the University Interscholastic League.

"After two rough campaigns among the Class 3A ranks, the Lions have dropped back down to the 2A level. That and an improvement in quickness had Green looking forward to more pleasant Fridays this fall.

"We didn't have enough size or speed to compete in the 3A league," Green explained. "The kids gave a fine effort, but we just didn't have the manpower.

"This year, we will have more quickness and we will be aggressive. I think the kids are really excited about the upcoming season."

"While quickness seems to be the Lions biggest strength, size and experience at the

skill positions will be liabilities Green and his players must overcome to challenge for a playoff berth.

"The Lions return 14 lettermen, but only four were starters last season."

STANTON

"Look for the Stanton Buffaloes to be a district contender this fall with fifteen lettermen returning in which eight are returning starters.

"The Buffaloes have been finishing in the second division the last couple of years, but look for a first division finish and a possibility for a playoff spot.

"The top player returning in Buffalo Camp will be Derek Sorley (6-1,175) wide receiver. Sorley caught 24 passes last fall for 417 yards. He has been selected to the all-district team the past two seasons."

\$80,000 would have been \$510. If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$326, and if owned by a person 65 years or older, the tax on an \$80,000 house in this district would have averaged \$262, or less if subject to a tax freeze.

Revenue lost from exemptions totaled \$915 million, which was \$135 million more than the previous year. To balance school budgets, the revenue loss from exemptions was imposed upon other taxpayers in the school district.

Local property taxes plus state aid was \$4,862 per student in Schleicher County ISD as compared to \$3,299 statewide. The primary purpose of state aid is to equalize state and local tax resources among schools. In 1985-86 tax resources ranged from less than \$2,500 per student in ten districts to more than \$10,000 in 12 districts.

The winning couple and Butler will depart Eldorado at 8 a.m. on August 17, arriving at Rockport at 10 a.m. in his six-seat Cessna 210.

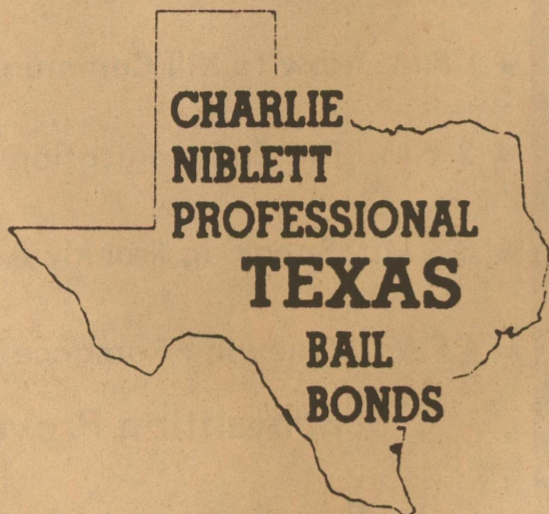

Despite a sluggish economy and depressed agricultural markets, CRCC officials are optimistic ranchers will agree that this cause deserves their donations of stock or cash.

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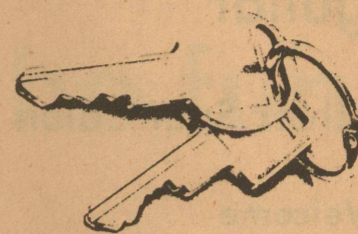

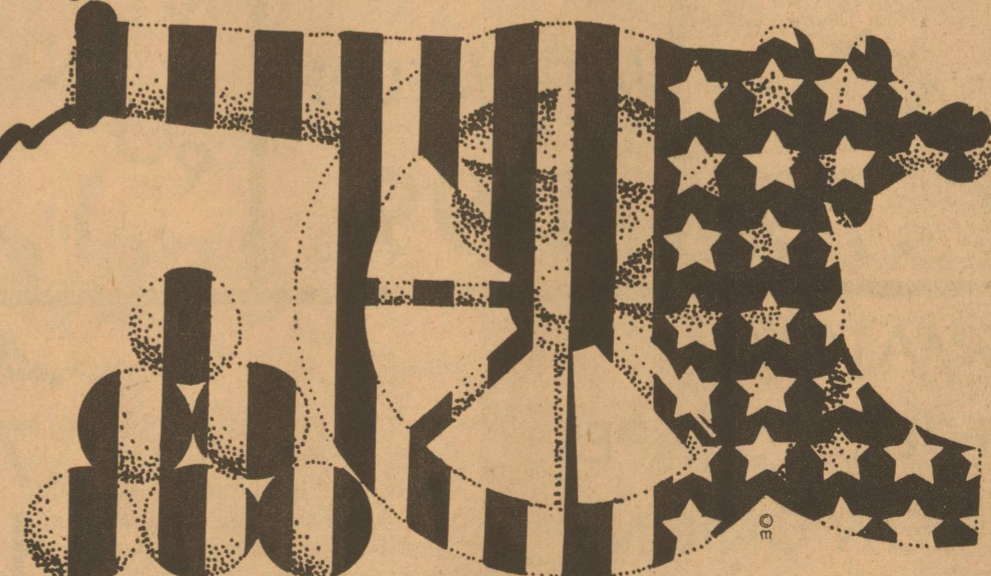
