COUNCIL GREETES NEW MEMBER

Water, drainage problems told

Eldorado Mayor Bob Lester administered the oath of office to new city councilwoman Barbara Jackson last Tuesday at the council's regularly scheduled monthly session at city hall.

Recent rains which have compounded drainage problems within the city limits were popular agenda topics for the meeting.

Winona Isaacs met with the city leaders to request reimbursement from the city for damages incurred at her residence when a city water meter apparently dropped down and split two water lines this month.

The council voted to reimburse Ms. Isaacs

\$97.05 to cover labor and parts needed to repair the water line and also adjusted her water bill to minimum charge for water for the October 15 billing.

Kerry Joy, Schleicher County Commissioner Precinct Two, and Clay Burleson, county road superintendent, talked to the council about the possibility of lowering water and gas lines in a portion of Orient Heights to assist the county in constructing a new drainage ditch there.

Joy said he would obtain permission from the various property owners to enable the county to build the ditch and asked the city to

prepare a damage estimate for the requested work. Representatives of the city will meet with the commissioners court at its next session to further discuss the idea.

The two governmental entities also discussed the possibility of bidding out rock crushing at the sewer plant to obtain base material for the city and county.

Bill Hodges, a property owner in Glendale Addition, met with the council concerning drainage problems in his neighborhood, asking that the council build curbing in the area.

Recent heavy rains and a runoff problem

WAR BIRDS LOOKING FOR ANOTHER WIN

'Contending' Eagles fired up

Friday night "the wheels stayed on the wagon" as the Eldorado Eagles parlayed an outstanding effort on defense and an adequate offense to a 7-0 upset over Ozona.

With the Rankin Red Devils looming ahead on the schedule this Friday night the Eagles of Coach Armando San Miguel are suddenly resembling contenders in the District 6-AA race.

A victory over Rankin would give the War Birds a 2-1 district record going into showdowns with Forsan at home and then to Big Lake. Forsan and Big Lake are currently tied for the loop's top spot with perfect 3-0 records.

Eldorado had been on the verge of victory for the past three weeks at halftime and was so

again last Friday night when San Miguel brought back up the line he used to sum up the team's loss to Stanton: "The wheels just fell off the wagon in the third period."

That line became the team's rallying cry in the final half against Ozona and the fired up and victory-starved Eagles continued to hit hard and play superb defense.

EHS tallied its lone score on a 47-yard bomb from Bradley Bass to Craig Gutierrez, then notched the PAT for the only points it would need.

"We've got to score more. We got down to the goal-line four times Friday night and couldn't get it in. I don't know if the kids get more conservative down there or the coaches or both. Of course the opposition tends to toughen

up down there too," San Miguel commented.

"We were extremely pleased with the way the defense played. Chad Jackson, Mitchell Bradley, Troy Daniels, Ray Carrol, and our entire secondary, especially Russ Dacy. Charles Wright and Ernie Espinoza were also excellent," San Miguel reported.

The first-year head coach had high praise for Dacy's performance at tailback. "He had 181 yards rushing on 25 carries and that's a heckuva job. The offensive line did a good job," San Miguel added.

Sophomore quarterback Bradley Bass, who won the starting job the second week of the season, is hampered by illness and muscle spasms this week and will probably miss the

of brick left over. Rather than carry the bricks down by hand, I decided to lower them in a barrel by using a pulley which fortunately was attached to the side of the building at the sixth floor.

Securing the rope at ground level, I went up to the roof, swung the barrel out, and loaded the brick into it. Then I went back to the ground and untied the rope, holding it tightly to insure a slow descent of the 500 pounds of bricks. You will note in block number 11 of the accident reporting form the I weigh 135 pounds.

Due to my surprise at being jerked off the ground so suddenly, I lost my presence of mind and forgot to let go of the rope. Needless to say, I proceeded at a rather rapid rate up the side of the building. In the vicinity of the third floor, I met the barrel coming down. This explains the fractured skull and broken collarbone.

Slowed only slightly, I continued my rapid ascent, not stopping until the fingers of my right hand were two-knuckles deep into the pulley.

Fortunately, by this time I had regained my presence of mind and was sure to hold tightly to

the rope in spite of my pain.

At approximately the same time, however, the barrel of bricks hit the ground -- and the bottom fell out of the barrel. Devoid of the weight of the bricks, the barrel now weighed approximately fifty pounds.

I refer you again to my weight in block number 11. As you might imagine, I began a rapid descent down the side of the building.

In the vicinity of the third floor, I met the barrel coming up. This accounts for the two fractured ankles and the lacerations of my legs and lower body.

The encounter with the barrel slowed me enough to lessen my injuries when I fell into the pile of bricks and, fortunately, only three vertabras were cracked.

I am sorry to report, however, that I lay there on the bricks, in pain, unable to stand, and watching the empty barrel six stories above me, I again lost my presence of mind----I LET GO OF THE ROPE!

New building completed

A dream has become a reality for members of the First Baptist Church of Eldorado in the completion of a new building which will serve as an educational wing and Fellowship Hall.

Several years ago some of the members began to see a need as the membership grew. Sunday School classes were over crowded and there was not adequate space in the basement for the many activities which were needing a place for dinners, for funerals, etc.

Also it was so noisy. About a year ago a Building Extension Committee was appointed to look at the feasibility of a new building.

The committee was composed of three men and three women - Guy Whitaker, chairman; Jimmy Belk, Rick Sterling, Pat Sykes, Sharon Mittel and Becky Moore along with the pastor, Chris Graham.

An architect, Gary Donaldson, was hired to draw up plans. A specific amount of money was designated to be on hand before the building would be started.

A builder-contractor, O.D. Hight of Eola, was hired. He and his workers worked diligently together until Hight had a heart attack and was unable to finish the building himself. But his son-in-law, Steve, took over and the building was completed about October 6.

The building is 60' X 100' with the upper part of the outside constructed of sheet metal, and the lower part of brick to match the church

building.

The inside has paneled walls in the large Fellowship Hall. Six Sunday School classrooms are around walls inside with accordion sliding doors. There is a large Youth Room and a huge kitchen.

The kitchen has cabinets along walls both upper and lower with a slate-blue counter top. An island in the center of the kitchen has drawers and storage space on each side.

A counter top stove is in this unit. There are two large built-in ovens on the wall side, a dishwasher and microwave oven.

County gets \$14,592

State Treasurer Ann Richards has sent checks totaling \$7.3 million to Texas' 254 counties for road construction and maintenance. Schleicher County coffers received \$14,549.21.

The Treasurer each year disburses money appropriated by the Legislature for the Lateral Road Program. The grants may be used by counties for the purchase of right-of-way and for construction and maintenance of lateral roads, farm-to-market roads or state highways.

The money is allocated to each county under a formula based on the county's area, rural population and lateral road mileage, Treasurer Richards said.

Other area counties receiving funds included Sutton, \$17,362.21; San Saba, \$22,217.30; Reagan, \$12,709.99; Menard, \$9,263.66; Mason, \$13,530.94; Llano, \$21,583.25; Tom Green, \$28,806.92; and Crockett, \$27,033.91.
