Schleicher County ranchers are smiling this week following a summer rain last Sunday that totaled six inches in some parts of the county.

Lynn Griffin, who lives seven miles north of Eldorado, reported that his rain guage ran over, meaning more than six inches was received and other reports ranged from four to six inches.

The deluge started about 1 p.m. Sunday and included a substantial lightening and thunder display. No lightening damage was reported, according to Schleicher County Sheriff Orval Edmiston, but a grass fire on the Ed Meador Ranch was extinguished by the rain before the Volunteer Fire Department could get there.

The Reynolds Community, west of Eldorado, apparently got the least amount of moisture, reporting 1.20 inches, while northeast of Eldorado in the Rudd Road area a whopping six inches was seen.


South of the city, ranchers reported about four inches, and Sam A. Whitten got two and one-half inches east of Eldorado.
