## AN EDITORIAL

### Chamber needed

One of the most important meetings in the history of Eldorado and Schleicher County is scheduled for next Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. at the Memorial Building. At that session a chamber of commerce for our community should become a reality.

A chamber of commerce is desperately needed here. You can't find a single growing, thriving community in Texas that does not have an active, effective chamber of commerce.

Given the state of today's economy, a chamber is even more important. True, it is harder for merchants to find the money to support such an organization during tough times, but one thing should be remembered: a chamber should be open to and supported by the entire community.

We favor a sliding scale for dues, with the

bigger businesses paying more per year to belong and the smaller firms paying less. We also think there should be special memberships for farms, ranches and individuals.

The chamber's board of directors should come from a wide cross-section of the community and contain men and women alike who are not afraid of lots of hard work.

We've been involved with several chambers and industrial foundations and know for a fact that they work. Each and every person in Eldorado should be on hand for the meeting—your help is needed.

In any community progress takes place because a group of dedicated people are making things happen. The chamber of commerce is the logical organization to motivate, organize and direct this effort.

### Eagles to entertain Buffalos

After completing a tough non-district slate last week in a losing effort at Junction the Eldorado Eagles' task will not get much easier this week when Stanton's Buffalos come to town.

Coach Armando San Miguel's Eagles will open District 6-AA play against the perennially-tough Buffalos in Eagle Stadium. Kickoff will be at 8 p.m.

Eldorado punched it out with Junction but lost, 16-6. Russ Dacy put EHS's only points of the night on the board with a 10-yard touchdown run in the first half.

"We really looked like a football team on that drive. We took it 75 yards and Russ carried it into the endzone," San Miguel commented.

Eldorado led Junction, 6-2, at halftime, but the hosts, spurred on by a homecoming crowd, put two scores on the board in the final half to take the victory.

The coaching staff cited Tony Lopez, Mitchell Bradley, Jason Stensby, Russ Dacy and Troy Daniels for outstanding work on offense against Junction.

Chad Jackson, Ernesto and Martine Espinoza, Bradley and Charles Wright were complimented for their defensive efforts. "Chad Jackson had a particularly outstanding game on offense," San Miguel added.

Stanton will run out of the wishbone offense and have the perfect dominating fullback for it in Derek Sorley, a hard-hitting 170-pounder.

"They run just about anything on defense. It seems like last year they were in the perfect defense all night for whatever we tried to do," San Miguel lamented.

## '86 TOTALS NEAR RECORD Rain, more rain

Rainfall....that precious commodity that makes ranchers smile and farmers sometimes cry, has been plentiful in Schleicher County this year.

Following this week's four-day deluge which totaled almost seven inches in some parts of the county, Eldorado has registered 27.50 inches.

Susie Faught, who lives on Bailey Road about eight miles from the city limits, produced those figures. "It's been one of the wettest years already that I can remember and I've lived here 50 years. If we have a wet October it could break all the records," Ms. Faught reported.

**MAXIMIZE HOME ENERGY EFFICIENCY**

To maximize home energy efficiency, Texas Agricultural Extension Service housing specialist Dr. Susan Quiring suggests the following:

Dear Editor,

In 1974 the Club of Rome meet with the idea of depopulation, deindustrialism plus cutting food production of the world. The Genocide Molthusians Oligarchy, "a form of government which the ruling power belongs to only a few," of the Trust that put Bolshevism Communism and Nazis Fascist in power to destroy, "The Western Augustinian Civilization of Filioque," for, Holy Spirit, Father, wants us to lay down and let the "Third Rome" of Holy Moscow kill Judeo-Christian tradition as based upon the premise that all human life is sacred.

Under provisions of International Monetary Fund and World Bank policy that U.S. Grain Milk and meat should not be shipped to Africa to fight starvation and disease because it would hamper some mythical African "free market" activity in agriculture.

Gephardt and Harkin bill would conduct former referenda to canvass farm opinion on how much to reduce grain, soy beans and milk output.

The concept of mandatory production controls was defeated in last year's congressional session but Harkins points to a wheat former referendum taken this summer as showing that farmers want production controls. In this

U.S.D.A. monitored mail vote, a small fraction of wheat growers voted in favor of mandatory quotas.

Of these farmers eligible to vote, only 22 percent participated in the election, and of those only 54 percent voted for the controls.

Gephardt and Harkin refuse to address the impact forced downside of agriculture. It will cause the trimmed of 71 billions and nearly 2.2 million jobs would be lost.

There maybe alternative of supply and demand which calls for cut in loan prices to serve the interests of the cartels exporting firms of Cargill Continental, Bunge, Andre Garnac, Louis Dreyfus, ADM and the others.

The Reagan administration is nominally opposed to both these legislation maneuvers, but has no program to deal with the collapse of agriculture the food supply now taking place.

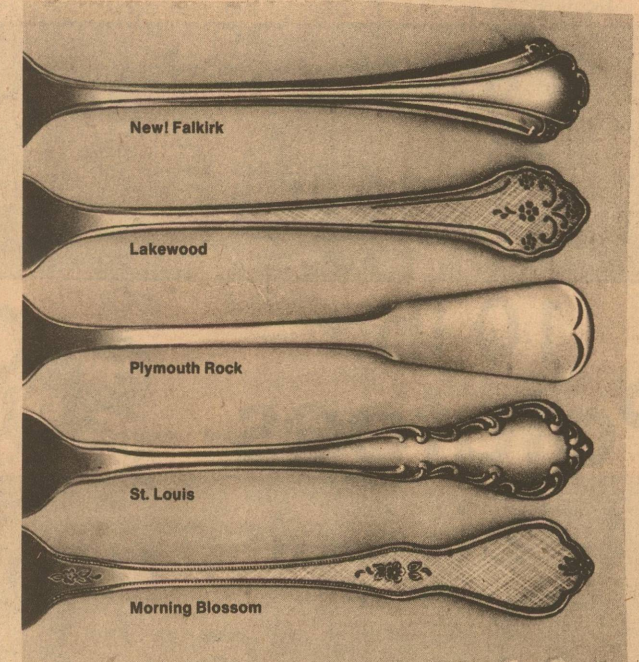
