CURRIE WINS HERE, LOSES RACE

Schleicher state's first to report

Schleicher County residents went to the polls in large numbers Tuesday, but local election officials were ready for them.

According to Schleicher County Clerk Helen Blakeway she phoned final election results to the state at 9 a.m. and was told that she was the first to record complete returns in Texas.

"Considering the number of people who voted, our election judges must have done an outstanding job getting the votes counted," Mrs. Blakeway report-

ed.

Some 1156 Schleicher residents marked ballots, 68 percent of all registered voters in the county. Schleicher County has a total of 1700 registered voters.

George Bush carried Schleicher County by a 653 to 494 count, while Lloyd Bentsen whipped Beau Boulter 702 to 398, and Lamar Smith outpolled Libertarian candidate James A. Robinson, 661 to 61.

The balloting for railroad commissioner Jim Nugent charged to a 753 vote total here and outdistanced Ed Emmett, 275.

Kent Hance defeated Clint Hackney, 616 to 448.

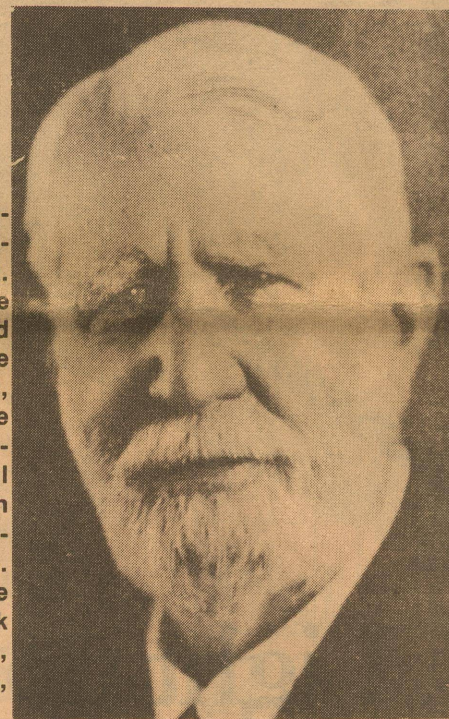
In the voting for State Representative, District 67, David Currie carried Schleicher County handily, winning over Harvey Hildebran from Uvalde, 697 to 352. However, Hildebran won the race, pulling off a 2,000 vote victory.

All three amendments passed in local voting, as they did statewide. Number One passed, 818 to 102, while Two was okayed, 494 to 382. Number Three passed on a 486 to 420 nod.

10 Cent land now valuable

"In 1876, I made a location of 30,000 acres of land at the head springs of the San Saba River in what is now Schleicher County. I only paid ten cents an acre for the land, and I was thought to be an escaped lunatic from a St. Louis insane asylum for buying the land. The land suited me, and I thought, with the splendid spring I got with my purchase, and three hundred acre pecan grove, it was reasonable cheap.

I sent a man named Shannon to take charge of the ranch where I planned to raise sheep and cattle. The sheep were one dollar a head and the cows were five dollars a head with calves. Mr. Shannon worked on a share profit basis.

In 1883, I made contact with another lunatic in St. Louis to sell him my brands of B.S. cattle for twenty dollars a head, counting all classes, including calves, except steers, over three years old, for which I was paid thirty dollars a head.

I took ten thousand sheep, bought at two dollars a head to the ranch in 1884. I took charge of the ranch, as it seemed to be a better paying business than

Game Dinner attracts 350

The Eldorado Game Association third annual game dinner was held November 5, 1988 and was declared a success by all concerned. About 350 persons were served barbecue, deer chili and all the trimmings. Dr. Steve Sessums gave a turkey calling demonstration and actually called a wild turkey in the door.

The Eldorado Divide Soil and Water Conservation District's Game Conservationist of the year award was presented to Kerry Joy. The rotating trophy and

plaque donated by First National Bank of Eldorado was awarded to Kerry in recognition of outstanding progress made in the quality of deer hunting on his ranch.

At the onset of the deer management program in 1984, the average buck was a 6 to 8 point with a 12 in.-16 in. spread and a buck to doe ratio of 8 to 1. At present the average buck is a 8 point with an 18 in.-22 in. spread with a buck to doe ratio of 2:1.

Kerry credited his hunters

with implementation of the plan by culling inferior buck such as spike and three points harvesting does and allowing the bucks present to mature and fully develop to their capabilities.

The Game Association will have a meeting November 14, 1988 at 7:30 p.m. to elect officers for and plan activities for the coming year. A discussion of game management and control of poaching will be held and all interested parties are urged to attend.

Gas production up in June

Railroad Commission Chairman James E. (Jim) Nugent announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 465,592,739 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in July, compared to the June gas production total of 446,550,233 Mcf. July production was up 5.38 percent compared to July 1987 production of 441,821,561 Mcf.

Marketed gas production in

July totaled 368,096,049 Mcf and reflected a 6.30 percent increase from the June volume. In July 1987, the state produced 353,599,810 Mcf of gas in this category.

Marketed gas production is the gas left after liquid hydrocarbons have been separated on the lease from the "wet" gas that is usually produced at the wellhead. It also does not include gas that is reinjected into the producing reservoir to maintain pressure, gas that is used to fuel production-related equipment on the lease site, or gas that is otherwise not marketed.

Exports of Texas-produced gas in July totaled 120,765,540 Mcf and reflected a 1.15 percent increase from June. July 1987 exports of Texas produced gas totaled 353,599,810 Mcf.

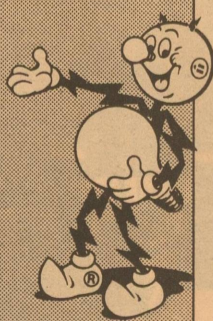

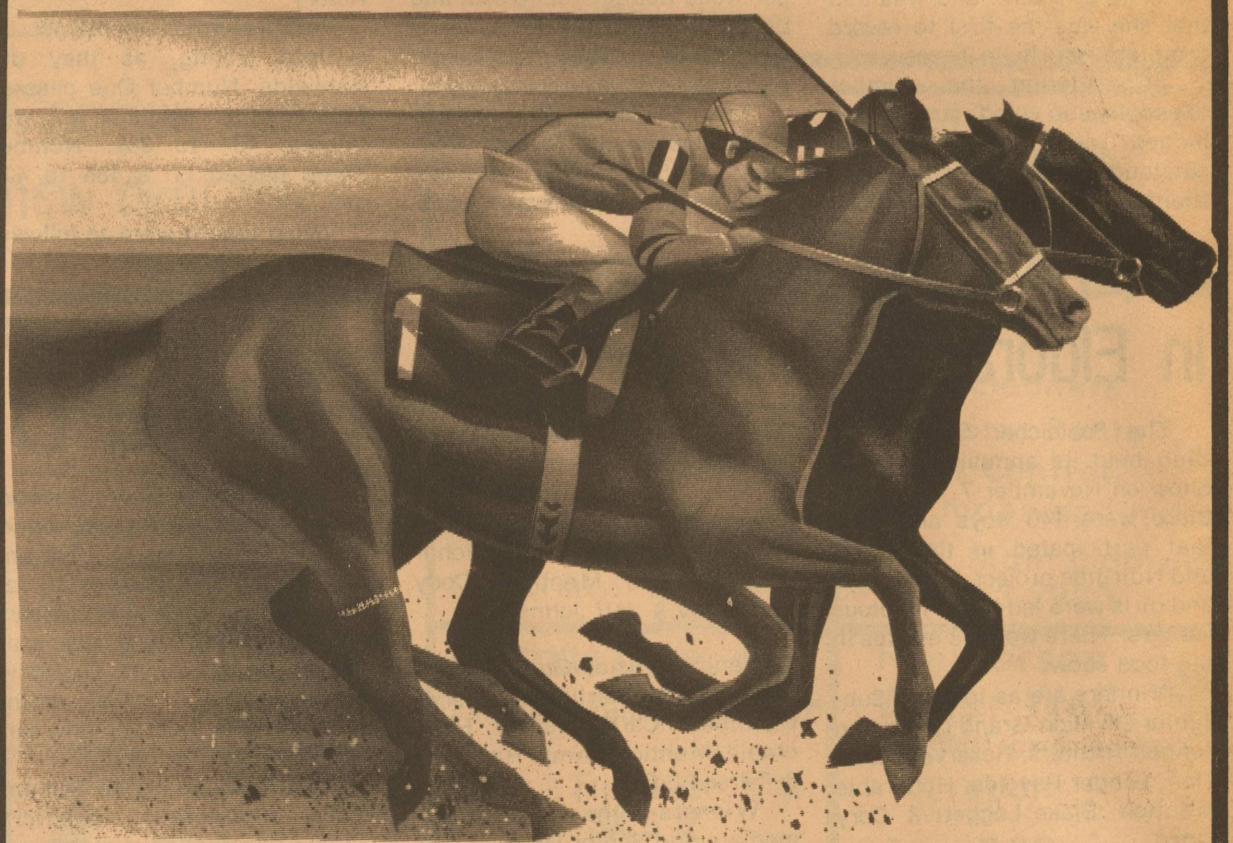

WTU says rates will drop here by 12 %

(November 7) Customers of West Texas Utilities Co. will see approximately a 12.5 percent drop in their rates beginning this month (November). The reduction is the result of using the lower winter rates, which will be in effect six months. Using higher summer and lower winter rates is part of the States' plan to encourage energy conservation during the summer when air conditioning creates the peak demand on electricity use.

According to WTU local manager Leroy Reeves' a residential customer using 476 kilowatt hours of electricity a month, the average for November 1987, will see his bill go from \$43.53 to \$38.02." Other customers group will see similar reductions Reeves said. Since mild fall weather has reduce many customers' cooling and heating use, the actual decrease in the electric bill from September when average use was 906 KWH to November will probably be around 50 percent. That decrease include the combined impact of lower winter rates and lower use resulting from mild weather. The actual size of a customers' bill is determined by their use.

According to the local manager, the electric company is still waiting for final approval from the Public Utility Commission regarding a request to change the fuel portion of the bill. Fuel is used at power plants to make electricity.

Although the average cost of fuel on the company's many fuel contracts has not changed significantly, WTU faces a December expiration of a very low cost 20-year gas contract at one of its nine power stations. That was for gas at pre-oil embargo prices of 22 cents per mmbtu and saved customers \$350 million. It must

be replaced with gas at today's prices which are almost \$2 per mmbtu.

Paying for this replacement gas will mean customers using 476 kilowatt hours of electricity will see an increase of approximately \$2.95 on the January bill if the PUC completes its review and approval process by then.

The local manager added that since 1985 WTU has lowered the fuel portion of the bill --called the fuel factor -- five times, and had six refunds totaling almost \$50 million as the result of other fuel contract changes.

Family Medical Clinic News and Views

THE PAPANICOLAOU TEST

Cervical cancer is almost 100 percent curable if detected and treated in its early stages. The pap smear is the most effective means of early diagnosis of this disease and has lowered the death rate from cervical cancer by over 70 percent.

The American Cancer Society adopted guidelines in November 1987 recommending that all women who are or have been sexually active, and have reached the age of 18, should have a pap test and pelvic examination. Frequency of testing is at the discretion of your physician, based upon previous pap tests, your current medical condition, and other factors which could indicate a need for testing every six months. Some of these factors include: sexual activity, family history of cancer, vaginal inflammation or infection, presence of genital warts, spotting or irregular menstruation, and the use of oral contraceptives or other hormone therapy.

The pap test was developed in the 1940's by Dr. George N. Papanicolaou and is named after him. The procedure takes only a few minutes, and while somewhat uncomfortable, it is not painful. Your doctor will take a sample of cells from the surface of the

cervix and vaginal area, smear them on a glass slide and place them in a preservative. At the lab, the slide is stained with a Special contrast dye that makes the cells visible under a microscope. The slide is then examined for abnormalities by a pathologist.

Although the pap test is the single best method for the identification and early detection of cervical cancer, it is not infallible. Test findings can be influenced by the human factor, quality of the smear and infections. Abnormal results should be verified by a follow-up test.

You can help ensure the best results possible by following these simple steps: 1) abstain from sexual intercourse 24 hours prior to your examination, 2) do not use a vaginal cream or other vaginal applications for at least 24 hours prior to your exam, 3) if you are having your menstrual period reschedule your appointment.

Because we care, we feel that your pap test is an important test that could save your life. It is truly preventive medicine. Preventing problems before they cause pain and suffering is our goal at the Family Medical Clinic.

VA very important to country's Veterans

With the 11th day of the 11th month approaching, it is time to look at three special developments our veterans can celebrate on this year's national holiday in their honor.

In its final days before adjournment, the 100th Congress handed a triple victory to America's 27.4 million veterans, more than 73,000 of whom live in communities I represent.

After enacting legislation to create a Cabinet department for veterans affairs, we give final passage to other measures that will improve benefits and set up a new federal court where veterans can appeal denials of those benefits.

The most symbolic of these measures is the one that will transform the Veterans Administration into the 14th Cabinet level agency next March, when it will be renamed the Department of Veterans Affairs and its director will become a Cabinet secretary.

"ALL of those who have served in America's uniform deserve the nation's thanks," President Reagan said as he signed the bill.

"This bill gives those who have borne America's battles, who defended the borders of freedom, who protected our nation's security in war and peace, it gives them what they have deserved for so long -- a seat at the table of our national affairs."

In addition to serving all veterans, the V.A. now serves 49

million dependents or survivors with a budget of \$30 billion. It will dispense \$14 billion in pensions and \$626 million for educational assistance this year.

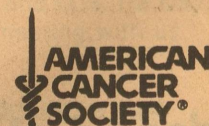

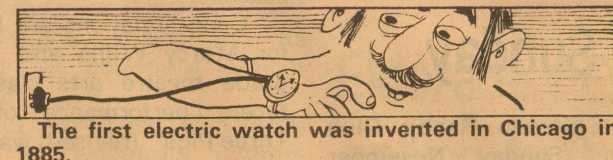

LAND

My first experience was in 1885 selling my first wool clip, in previous years sold for twenty cents a pound, sold for seven cents a pound. The low price was due to President Grover Cleveland trying to make the United States a free trade country which convinced me he must have also been in an insane asylum at some period in his life.

My next experience was renting 30,000 acres adjoining the sections I had purchased at the rate of three cents an acre by the year. I enclosed it with the first wire fence in Schleicher County.

In 1886, I restocked my ranch with a better grade of Texas cattle. The price was five dollars a head, with calves.

In 1889, I represented the State of Texas as a delegate to a convention of the National Wool Growers Association.

In 1890, I purchased eight thousand sheep from a ranch near Knickerbocker at seventy-five cents a head.

In 1893, I disposed of my entire lot of sheep, about twenty thousand. I also sold my cattle in 1893.

I still had about 8,000 angora goats on my ranch and I made an effort to sell Armour & Co. 1,000 fat wethers at their own price, if they would return me the hide. They told me that they would not undertake to sell so many goats because there was a prejudice against "goat meat". I was advised to slaughter the animals for their hides and tallow and put the meat in two-pound cans, labeled "Roast Mutton".

I decided to do this and employed an experienced canner in Chicago, who built a factory on my ranch in Schleicher County. I slaughtered all of my old ewes and wethers at once.

I was not able to sell my "Roast Mutton" to Fort Worth

and Dallas grocers. I contracted to sell it to one of the Chicago packers, provided he would take enough more to fill the balance of the two-pound cans I had on hand.

I published the first book ever written about angora goat industry. My opinion is that in time mohair will become a more important Texas product than wool.

H. Leslie Jones, grandson of William Black, owned the San Saba Ranch until his death. The building that housed the cannery still stands and much of the machinery is still in tact.

Moore Musings

It's hard to realize that half the first semester is gone. Each person will be given a short time for comment, so let me urge you to take advantage of this opportunity to state your feelings about our school.

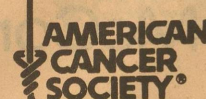
