OWLS FLY PAST EAGLES

Homecoming held here

The 1988 queen has been a member of band for four years at EHS and was a junior high cheerleader for two years.

The queen candidates and court were presented following the introduction of the parents of this year's Eagle football team, manager and cheerleaders. Each student presented his mother with a rose.

Skeeter Roubison was second in saddle bronc and third in team roping, while Cy Griffin was second in calf roping and ninth in

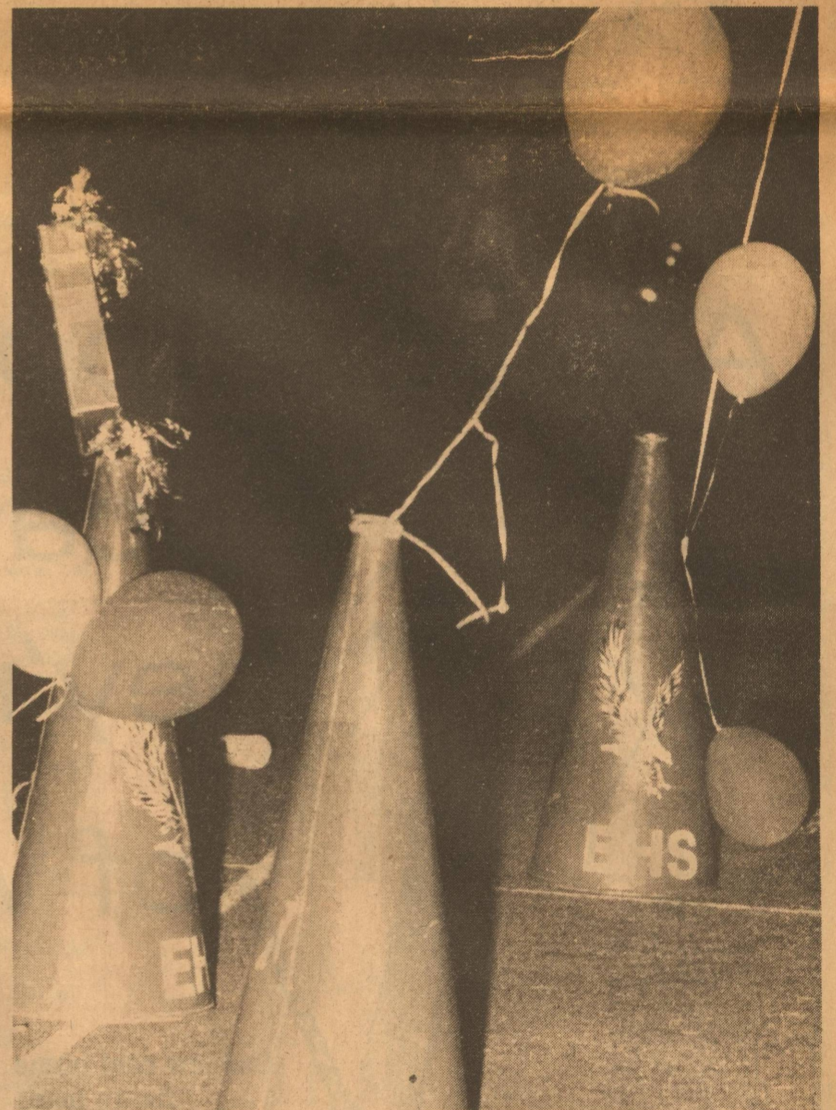
team roping.

But look people these are the guys who hire these liars and cheats. Some of these liars and cheats will have fairly high ranking jobs if their boy wins in November. Do we want these guy holding high public office for the next four years?

I am fully aware that a good many of you, I dare say most of you, lean, if you lean at all, toward the right. This is a conservative area and many of the people here are not inclined toward "Big Government", especially one all the way over in the east somewhere. But for all the supposed dismantling of bureaucracy we were supposed to see in the last eight years I, for one, have not seen any reduction in costs. If any of our taxes have gone down it was only accomplished by borrowing the money.

Some day we'll have to pay it back, don't you think?

We cannot keep our heads in the sand and merely listen only when the speaker tells us what we want to hear. (In fact, if our heads are in the sand, we probably can't here much of anything). If nothing else we have got to demand that the people who want so badly to be President tell us exactly, and I do mean exactly, how they are going to pay off the national debt. As for me, I don't want any of those phony calculations based on some mythical rise in GNP that will supposedly produce all the revenue we need. Those days are past. Our debt is so large now that the interest payments alone take up about one quarter of the Federal Budget.

I just hope that you vote, and then I hope you vote for the guy who will tell the truth even if that truth is not what you or I want to hear. Of course that guy isn't running. He isn't even in sight!

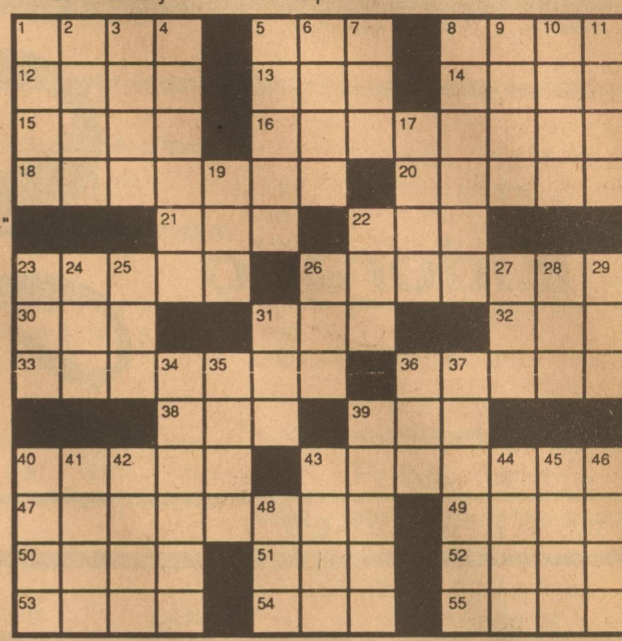

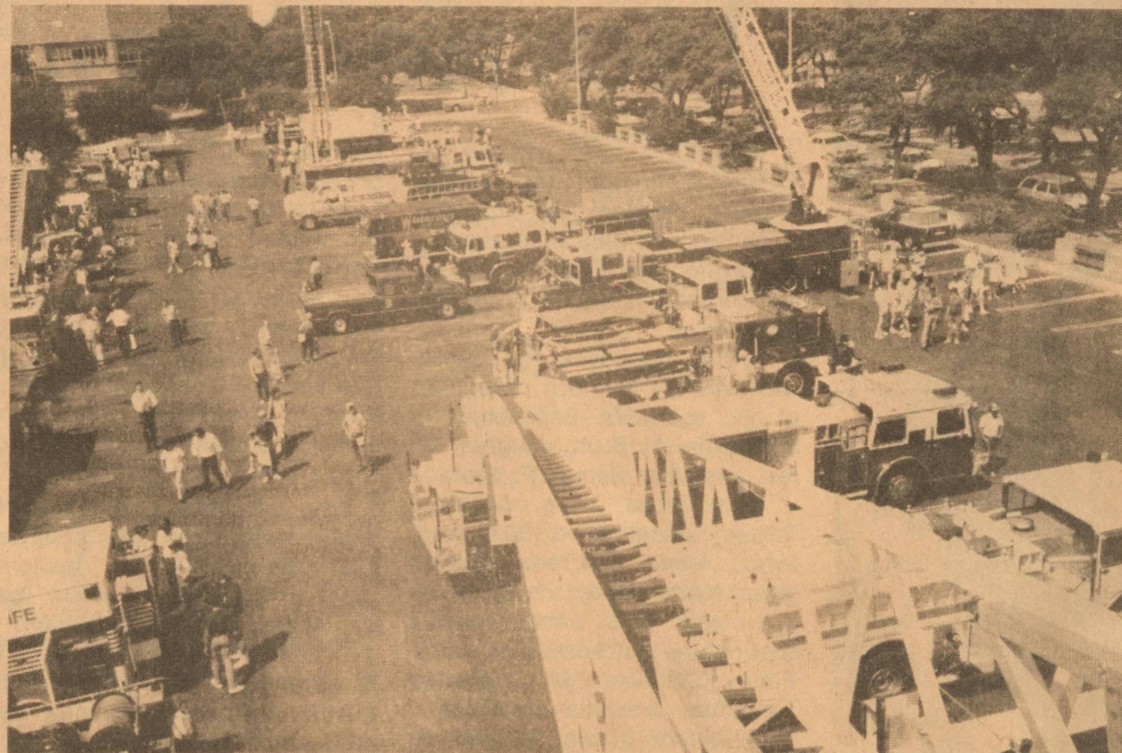

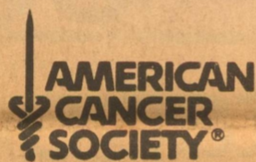

"Though quality assurance is the main stay for making sure good care is given, our hospital stands out as an example to other rural hospitals in this area," Ms. Nixon said.

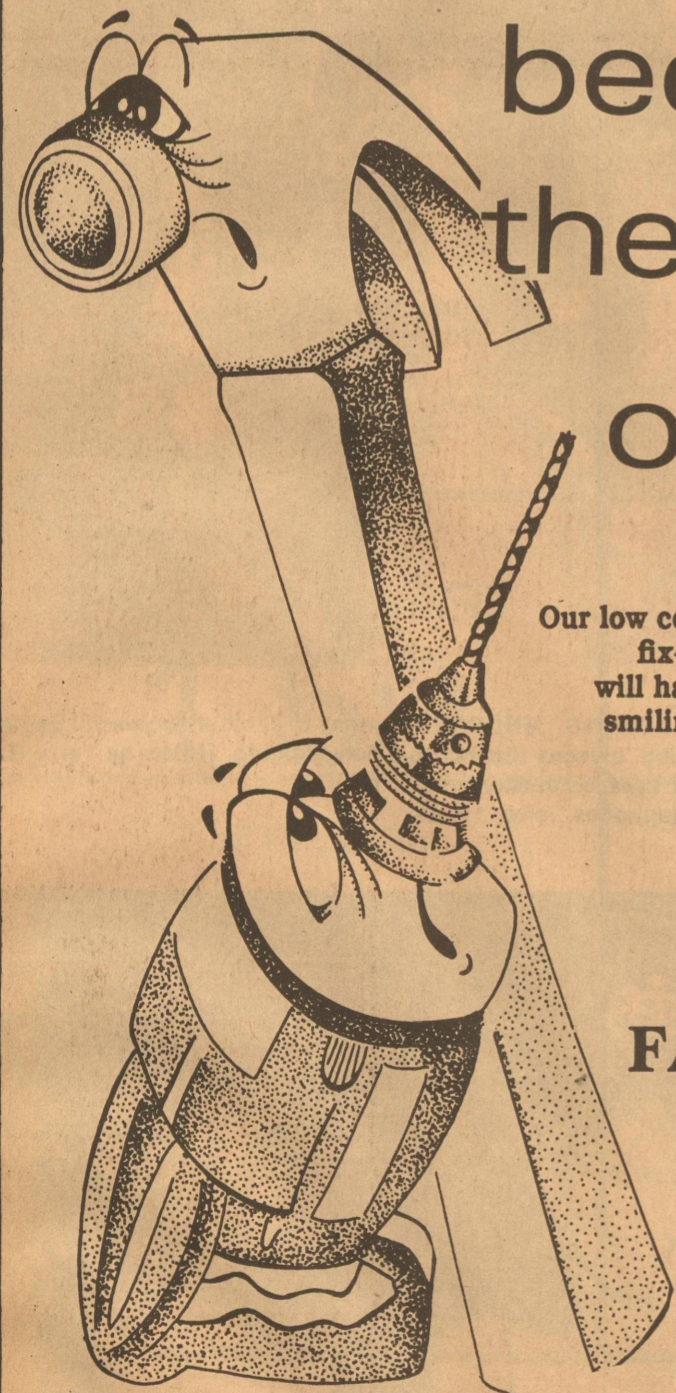
All three local representatives were impressed by discussions about regulatory agency updates which were offered by experts from the Texas Department of Health and the Health Care Financing Administration.



Currie is endorsed

The Health Fair

Plans are being finalized for this year's Schleicher County Hospital District Health Fair. The date and time will be Wednesday, October 19 from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m. at the Memorial Building.

For those who recall last year's event, we had a huge turnout and the entire project was a resounding success. Services offered a year ago included blood pressure and weight measurement, diabetes screening, anemia screening, cholesterol screening, colon cancer screening, urinalysis and hearing tests. Also available was a great deal of free literature concerning a wide variety of health matters and the influenza vaccination at a normal cost.

Over 200 Schleicher County residents took part in the fair last year and we picked up more than just a few cases of previously undiagnosed high blood pressure, diabetes, anemia and many, many persons with dangerously high levels of cholesterol. These persons are all now under active treatment and stand a much greater chance of living long and healthy lives.

This year's health fair promises to be even bigger and better. In addition to everything offered last year we have several more services available this year.

Blood services from San Angelo will be on hand from 2 until 4 p.m. to accept blood donations. A mobile mammo-

graphy unit will be available for breast cancer screening--recommended for all women age 40 or older. There will be a fee associated with this service.

Dr. Anderson, an ear, nose and throat specialist, will be on hand for allergy screening and cosmetic surgery consultations.

We plan on having representatives from the women, infant, and children (WIC) program (A prenatal and infant nutrition assistance program) and representatives from the Texas War On Drugs.

Also in the planning stages but unconfirmed at this time is a "Project I.D." for fingerprinting children for purposes of identification should they ever become victims of kidnapping.

So, as you can see, this year's event has great promise. The members of the Schleicher County Hospital District Board of Directors, the physicians, administration and employees at the hospital are all very excited about this year's fair.

We especially encourage young men in the 25 to 55 year age range to come in and take advantage of our free services. In reviewing last year's results, we noticed that very few men in this age group came in for testing. This is the group that could most benefit from our services--to detect and treat chronic illnesses before they result in premature disability and death.

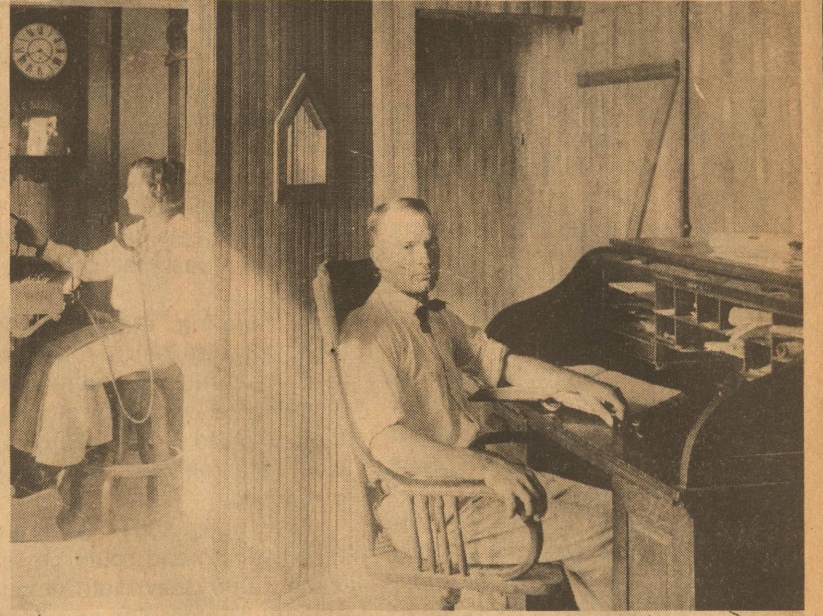

TELEPHONES CAME IN 1906

First lines on fence posts

Schleicher County residents probably give little thought to the first telephone in Eldorado as they carry their cordless phones to the back yard, or with a touch dial out of state or overseas.

There were no telephone poles in the early days, however, lines were strung along the tops of fence posts. These posts were the fences of the farmers and ranchers. Small white insulators, were nailed to the top of the posts, and attached to the insulators were the wire lines.

B.E. Earl owned and operated the first telephone system in Eldorado. The switchboard was set up on the second floor of the Masonic Lodge building over the Hoover Drug Store. This was in 1906. Jud and Ed Jones later bought the company.

Telephone operators in the early days were a real source of information. Citizens called to get the time of day, report fires, and get news of the sick. Most residents did not know local numbers, they just picked up the phone and asked the operator to ring the grocery store, Mr. Jones, etc.

The operator always knew if Jane was still out of town, if Mary was still ill or where the doctor was. The local operator

was very helpful to the entire community.

Some of the early operators in Schleicher County were Chris Enochs, Mildred Jones, and Vashti Foley. The first one to operate the switchboard was Steve Wright.

In 1923 a severe ice storm hit the county and ice formed on the lines. The telephone system was severely damaged. Lines had to be pulled up and never repaired.

The telephone system was bought by San Angelo Telephone Co. in 1915, who built a new rock building to house the company in. The building included living quarters and was located at the intersection of Gillis and Cottonwood Streets.

General Telephone bought the San Angelo Company in August of 1953.
