Sheriffs Encourage Public Support

"Public support and involvement is one of the most important crime-fighting tools of today's law enforcement," Schleicher County Sheriff Ronnie Norris said in a recent interview. "In Schleicher and Irion Counties and throughout our State, the public must be on our side in the fight for effective law enforcement."

According to the Sheriff, his department must work in an extremely complex environment and deal with a growing, highly sophisticated criminal element in the war against drugs, organized crime and commercial vice.

There are many things which the concerned citizen can do to help. For instance, simple precautions can help protect you and your property, such as:

- Burglar proof your home;
- Know where your children are at all times;
- Stay alert and report all crimes to the law enforcement agency serving you.

Citizens are also encouraged to get involved. "The Sheriffs' Association of Texas works to upgrade law enforcement and ensure public safety throughout the state," Irion County Sheriff Jimmy Martin added.

"Our goal is to professionalize Sheriffs' Departments statewide through better training and to increase public awareness of the problems which we face in our everyday work," he added.

World Runner Visits Eldorado

Framed by a typical West Texas postcard sunset on a typically unpredictably cold wintry West Texas evening, 25 year old Djamel Balhi, from Paris (the BIG Paris) finished his day's run at the steps of the Gary Smith residence in Eldorado Monday.

This was the 55th day of running since Balhi began the trans-American portion of his RUN AROUND THE WORLD by running across San Francisco's Golden Gate bridge. He has completed 1867 miles since Jackie Joyner-Kerse wished him well in San Francisco on January 10 on the eve of the American leg.

This adventure began on May 23, 1987 when Djamel ran from Notre Dame in Paris towards Shanghai for a "cup of tea with my friend." 20 countries, 20 months, and 9800 miles later he landed in San Francisco by plane. From Eldorado he will run approximately 42 miles a day to be hosted by Covert Buick in Austin this Saturday where he will be presented with a plaque from Governor Clements making him an honorary citizen of Texas. "This makes me very proud, I have always wanted to see cowboys and the land where John Wayne and Gary Cooper

Measles Confirmed In Eldorado

As of Monday, March 6, there has been one confirmed case of red measles in Eldorado, a five year old girl. This was confirmed through laboratory tests.

"This is not a school-age outbreak," stated Dr. Pat Johnson, local physician. A list was obtained from the girl's mother of all those who came in contact with the little girl and they have been re-immunized.

"We do not plan any mass re-

immunization at this time," added Dr. Johnson. Re-immunization is being limited to the child's close contacts at the present time because of limited amounts of the vaccine.

Measles is a normal childhood illness and is very rarely life-threatening.

Should there be a school-related outbreak, re-immunization will then take place for that school.

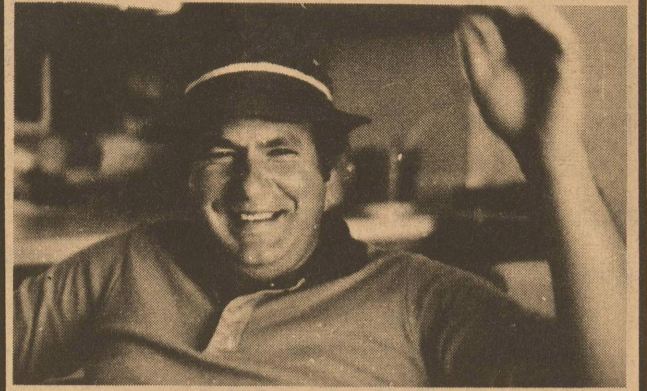

I am sure that there are some very important people in the world. I am also sure that there are at least a few people who are not quite as important as they think they are.

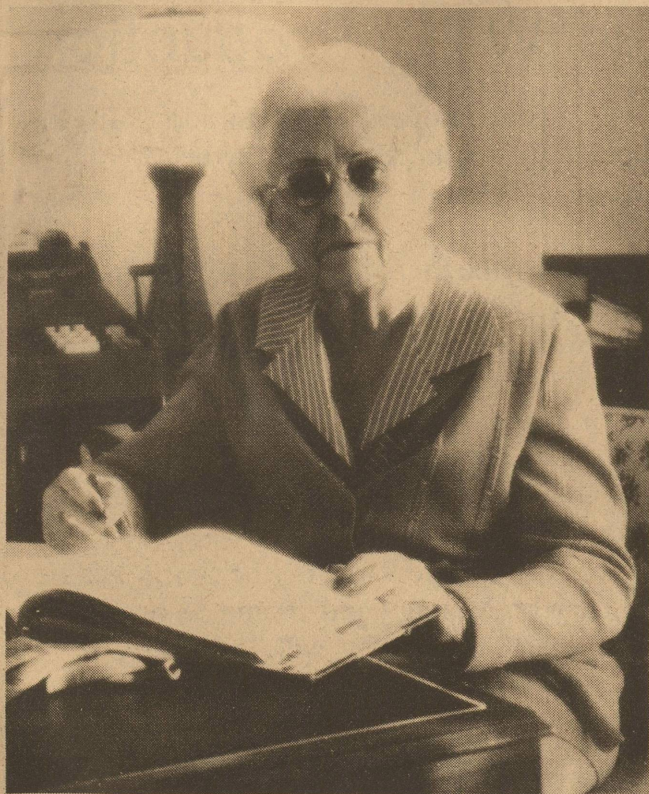
Once, I heard my dad say about a fellow, "If you could buy him for what he's worth and sell him for what he thinks he's worth, you'd have enough money to retire."

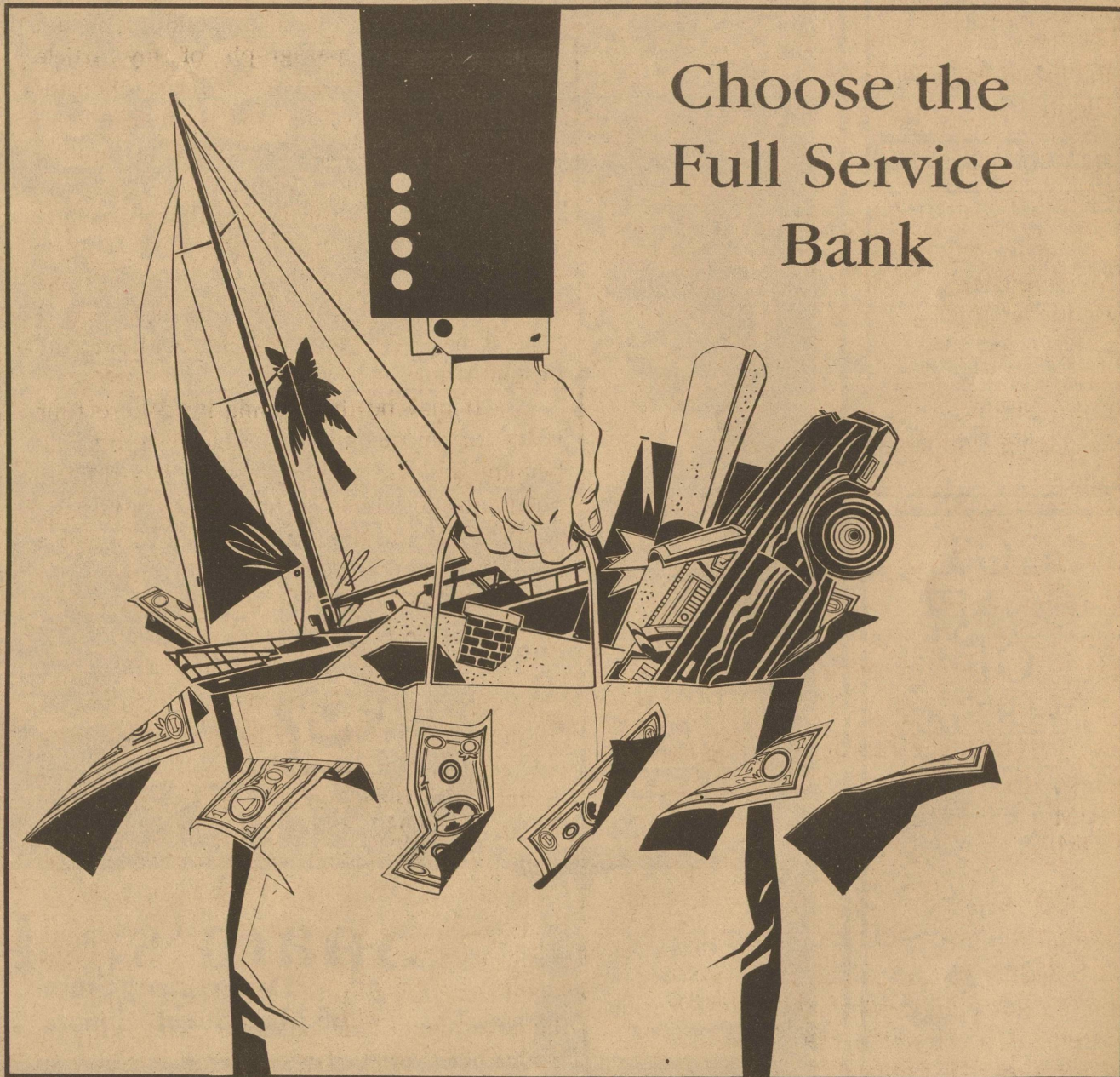

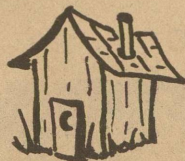

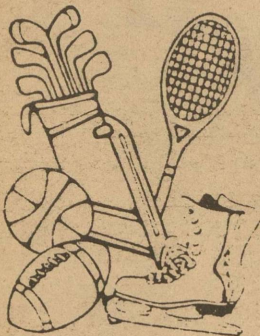

A Touch Of History

The railroad was a long time coming to Schleicher County. Years prior to the first steel laid for the railroad track in January, 1930, the need for rail facilities was realized.

Continuous effort on the part of some citizens to bring a railroad to Eldorado began when the town was newly established. W.B. Gilliman, founder of Eldorado, was especially active in this effort. He wrote numerous letters in regard to this subject.

In 1903, there were prospects of Kansas City, Mexico, and Orient Railroad building a line through Schleicher County. This did not materialize, but citizens did not give up hope, continuing to work and plan.

In 1909, citizens raised \$50,000 in subscriptions to negotiate with the Orient. A contract was signed and an agreement was made to subscribe for \$100,000 worth of four percent first mortgage bonds of Kansas City, Mexico and Orient Railroad Company. The railroad was to be in operation July, 1911, in Eldorado.

Work began, but due to the company changing hands the railroad was only built three miles out of San Angelo.

In 1928, the Santa Fe Railroad Company took over the management of the Old Orient Company. A contract was made and Eldorado was finally getting a railroad.

The "Western Weekly Magazine" published an article, written by R.D. Holt, in December, 1929, titled "Dreams of Oldest Schleicher Man Near Fulfillment." He wrote, "Finis Bates, 97, Predicted 32 years ago he would see railroad come to Eldorado." It stated, "Finis Bates expected to live to see the day when a railroad would serve the county seat. And now steel rails of the Santa Fe near the county line."

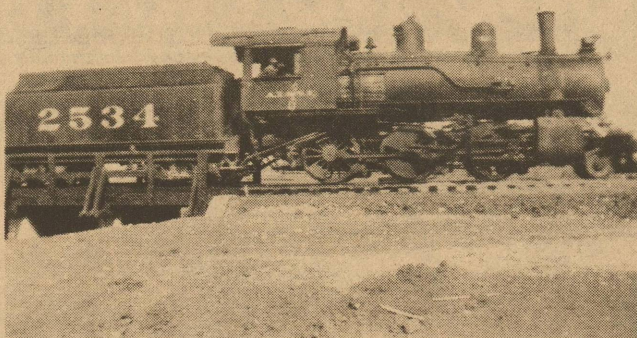

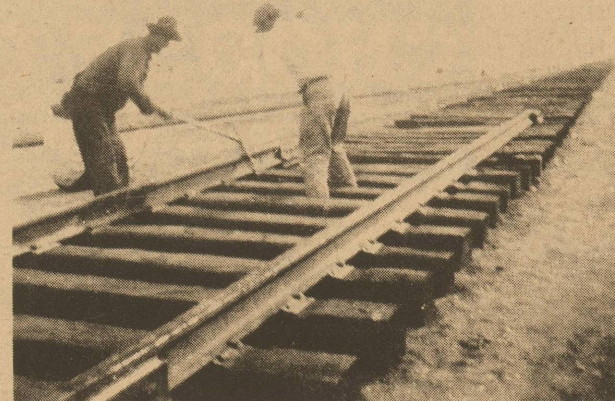

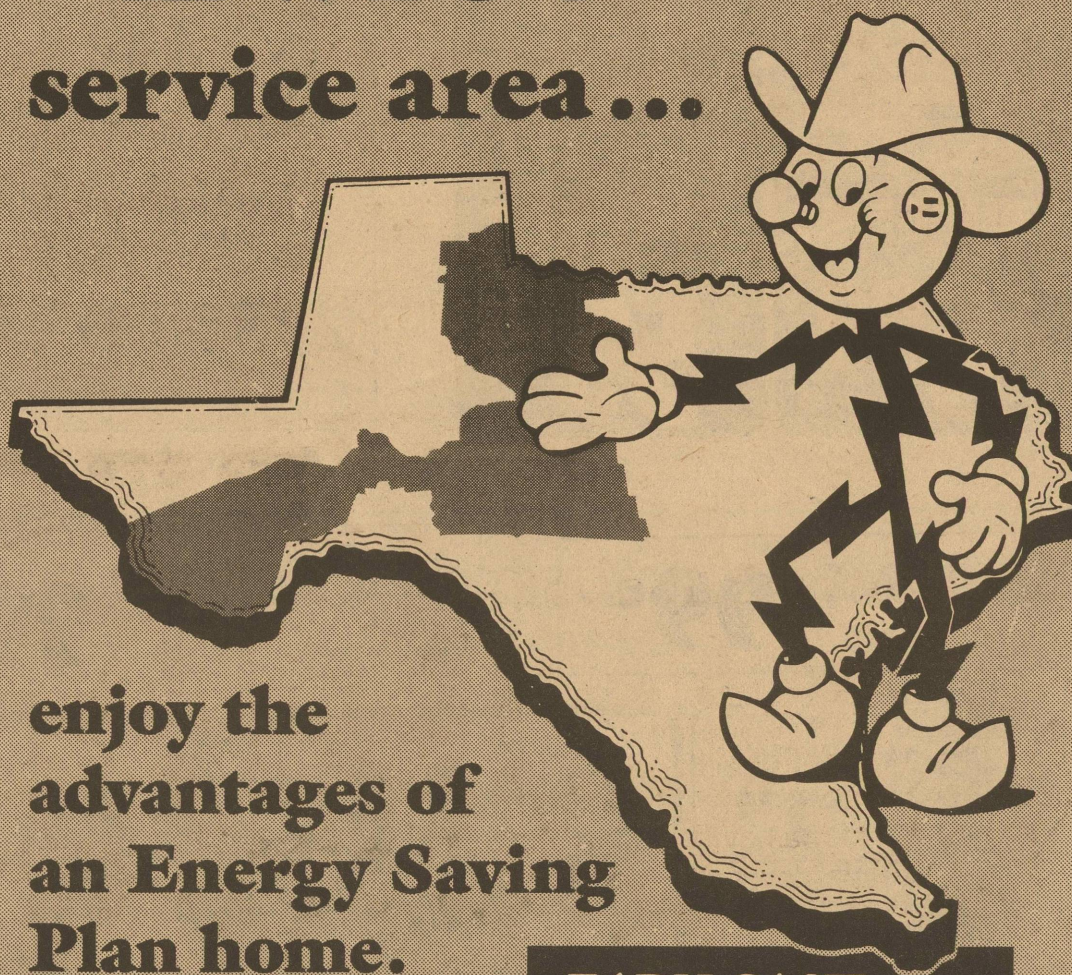


Pictured here is the first train to come to Eldorado. The date was March 10, 1930.

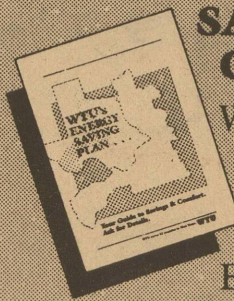

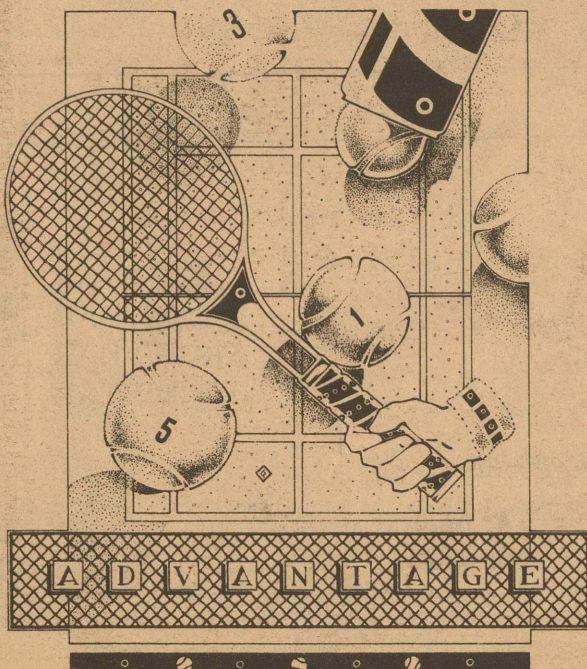

rode their horses...I have stayed in cowboy bunk houses sometimes and even tried chewing tobacco...I liked the cowboys but not the tobacco." From Austin he will run to Houston on the way up the east coast to deliver a letter to Mayor Koch of New York City that he is carrying from Mayor Bradley of Los Angeles

His travels have included countries that most people cannot even get into like Iraq, Saudi Arabia, and China (through the Tibetan border). With his second French passport--his first one is filled--some newspaper clippings, and his bright friendly smile he attains visas at the borders. "Most people get visas at the consulates in their own capitols, but I get them at the border crossings...it is much more interesting this way," explained Djamel, "when they say 'no' I just come back every day until I get a 'yes'. Otherwise I would not have gotten this far."

When asked about the most dangerous part of his journey he says, "it was not the wars (although he encountered three conflicts), it was running through many kilometers of bee hives in China where I was stung many times even though I tried to cover myself for protection."

The young marathoner ran through Iraq where there was nightly bombing in the south. "Every night they announced where the bombs were aimed, but they always missed the targets hitting schools and apartments instead of factories and military buildings...one night many children were killed only a few kilometers from where I was staying."

His purpose is simply "to see the world", and he wants to "meet as many people as possible and experience their cultures".

To do this he only carries some essentials in an eight pound pack and meets friendly people along the way to find water, food and shelter. This method has enriched his spectrum of experiences. He has slept under the stars, in churches, monasteries, palaces, hotels (large and small), huts, homes, under bridges, in public stations and even two nights on the China wall.

In America he has the support of a companion, Billy Klein, from Pennsylvania who is helping Djamel and the Winning Club

of Brussels, Belgium, to facilitate the access of the press. Klein explained, "the Winning Club is the producer of the event to the extent that we help with the routing in America and Europe and support the event with distribution of mail from around the world to Djamel and help record it on film for the book Djamel will write after his finish in Paris in July.

There are no cash sponsors in the U.S., but just as citizens in villages would offer a place to sleep, American Youth Hostels has offered him beds, and just like some street vendors would offer fruit from time to time, Chart House restaurants has furnished some meals, and "the great American road belongs to Buick," but they are sharing it with Djamel Balhi by furnishing a Century Wagon and a Reatta for the support team in the U.S.

"Citizens of the planet can write to me at Winning Club in Allentown and I will get every card and letter. I get mail from all over the World from the new friends I meet and really look forward to this every week."

When asked about America, Balhi said with a grin, "I am my strongest in America because of my run at 16,000 foot elevation in the Himalayas, and the people are very, very friendly."

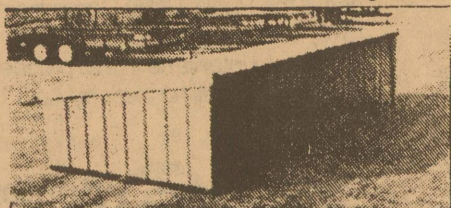

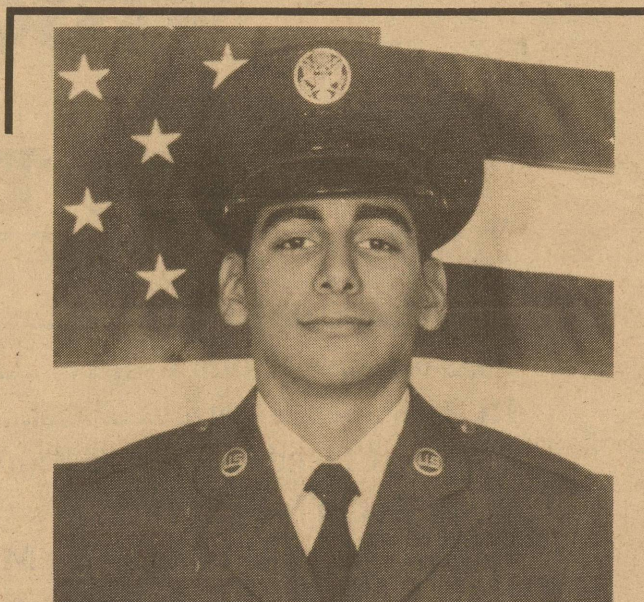

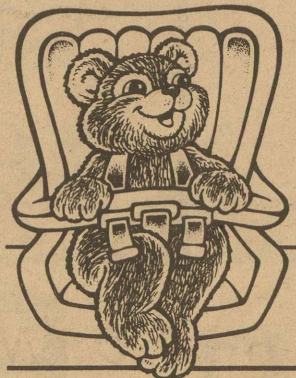

The public is invited and urged to attend this very important meeting.

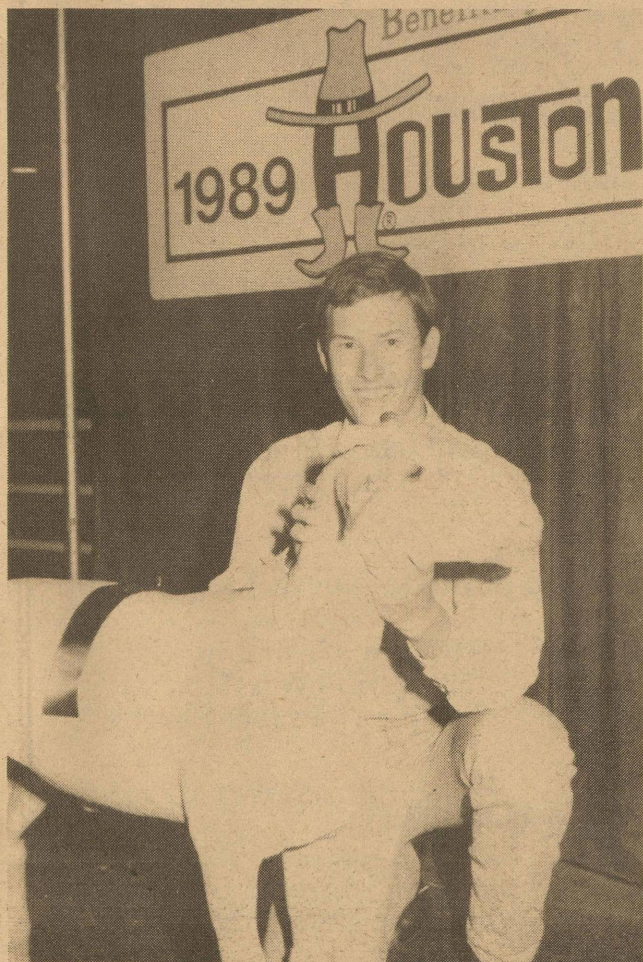
Schooley Places First At Houston

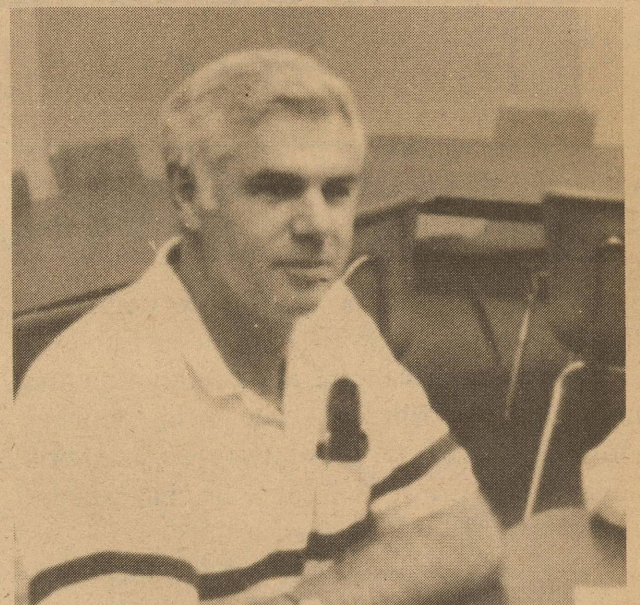

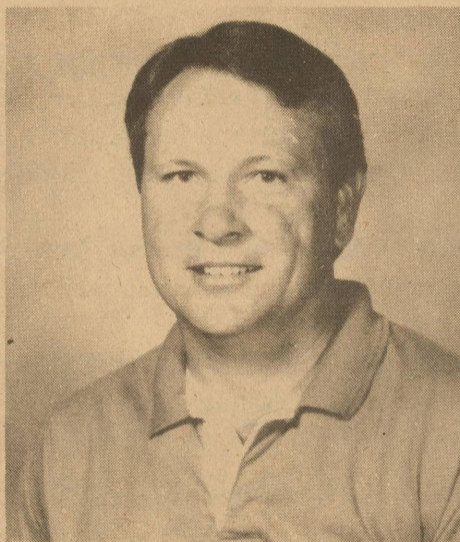

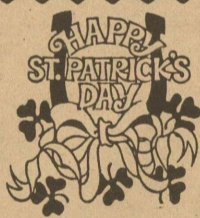

IC One-Act Play Schedule

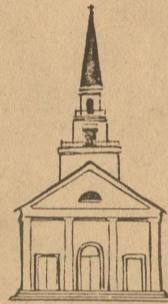

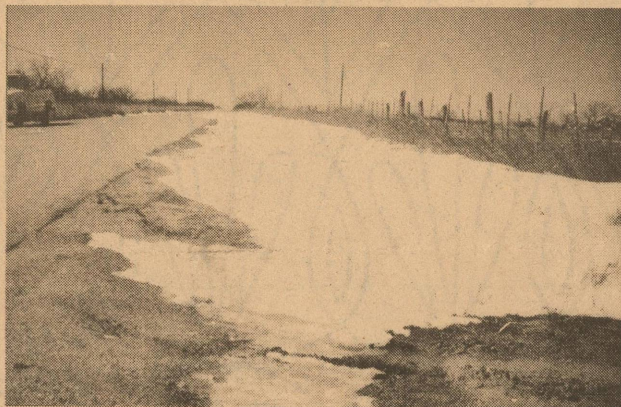

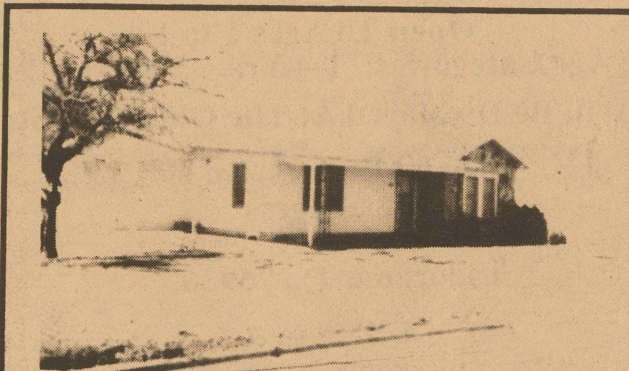
