Hospital Board Approves New Tax Rate

A special meeting of the Schleicher County Hospital District was held Monday night, September 11, with all seven board members present along with the hospital administrator, secretary and approximately 40 to 50 interested citizens. Also present were Doctors Pat Johnson, Debra Peaslee and Jim Brame.

William Edmiston spoke to the group and explained the basic reason for the tax increase is to catch up on past debts. The interest at the bank is too much each year.

It was reported that most citizens present agreed by the end of the meeting that there is a need to go through with the proposed tax increase and try another few years to keep the hospital open. Nation-wide, the expense of operating a hospital has increased almost 11 percent per year for the last two years for a total of 22

percent. Over the past two years taxes here went down a net of 5.2 percent. Now the hospital needs to catch up. Also, the budget includes about \$70,000 for debt reduction, over what we need to pay interest and stay even; therefore, progress will be made, barring unforeseen catastrophes.

The new rate of \$0.4650 per \$100 evaluation will yield a tax levy of 21.6 percent greater than last year and the hospital board voted to approve it.

Hospital Administrator, Steve Goode, provided information sheets which included stating that he will continue to seek out and investigate other options and will report periodically when he feels he has something worth reporting. At this time, no attractive options to raising the taxes to keep the facility open have been identified.

It appears that the basic

problem of rural hospitals today is a smaller base of patients that can be admitted. They are expecting this trend to continue, projecting that by 1992, admissions will be down by five percent. The bottom line is that if this county wants to have a hospital, or even an emergency room, the taxpayers are going to have to pay for it.

The possibility of buying supplies from a San Angelo hospital and getting away from the wholesalers altogether was discussed. The local hospital does not need case lots and on many items the big hospitals can sell it cheaper than can be bought from the wholesaler. Denny Oreb of St. John's Hospital said he would be glad to work with this hospital on this idea and he will have Jan Ferdon, St. John's Director of Materials Management, get back in touch.

SCISD Trustees Set Tax Rate

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Schleicher County Independent School District was held Monday, September 11, in the administration building.

Dr. Blair reported on several items of information to the board, including the fact that on Saturday, October 16, at 10 a.m., an auction will be held at the bus barn for the purpose of selling excess property and equipment. The public will be able to view the merchandise between 8 and 10 a.m. on that day.

Also, the board was told that Schleicher County ISD ranked well above the state and regional averages on the TEAMS test, but below the state and national averages on the ACT test.

Blair told the board that the present district enrollment is 715 students, with the greatest change being in the seventh grade where there are now 81 students as compared to 71 students last year.

Elementary principal Glen Nix informed the board about the current status of the campus improvement plan for his campus.

In action items, the board voted not to refund the 1985 bond issue. The tax rate was set at a total rate of \$1,200 per \$100 valuation, and it was decided to take bids as necessary on items needed to improve the school district's programs.

In further action, a bid was accepted from Glasscock Chevrolet for a suburban for school use, and

the financial report for the month of August was approved.

September 25, 1989 to January 5, 1990, was set as the teacher appraisal period for the first semester; January 15, 1990 to May 18, 1990, was set for the second semester. Scott Barton, Judy Blair, Larry Blair, Ken Newman and Glen Nix were approved as "other appraisers" for the district.

The board discussed the effects of new legislation on policies concerning student attendance; however, no action was taken.

After accepting Dixie Bible's resignation as high school librarian, the board's final action was to employ Debbie M. Griffin to replace Mrs. Bible.

An Apple A Day

Sorry Gary, but it's something we have to talk about. At one time, I remember, they wouldn't even talk about it on TV.

There's a sundry of other terms that sound better, but they don't eliminate the harsh reality that diarrhea imposes.

Diarrhea has quite a few causes. They range from viruses and/or bacteria to a person's own psychological and physical (metabolic) profile.

Eliminate the specific cause whenever possible.

A. Correct physiologic changes induced by diarrhea: In addition to the necessity for control of the cramping and increased movement of the intestines, it is essential that the following secondary or complicating features be treated.

- 1. Fluid imbalance (dehydration). 2. Mineral imbalance (a person with diarrhea can have decreased levels of calcium, potassium, sodium and magnesium in the blood). 3. Nutritional disturbances (a person can have a deficiency of protein in the blood along with other nutritional deficiencies). 4. Psychogenic disturbances (fixation on the problems of the

GI tract and the subsequent anxiety can worsen the condition).

B. Diet: 1. Acute diarrhea - most clinicians feel that food should be withheld for the first 24 hours or restricted to clear liquids.

2. Convalescent - food should be incorporated into the diets of patients recovering from bouts of diarrhea as tolerated. Nutritious food, preferably all cooked, in small frequent meals, is usually well tolerated.

C. Antidiarrheal Agents: There are several good products that can control and alleviate the problem of diarrhea. Some of these medicines contain salicylates and have been linked to Reye's syndrome, so be sure to contact a health professional before giving them to teenagers or children.

There's one thing I want to mention before closing. The human body develops diarrhea for a reason. That reason may be due to the fact that viruses or bacteria have given off toxins in the GI tract.

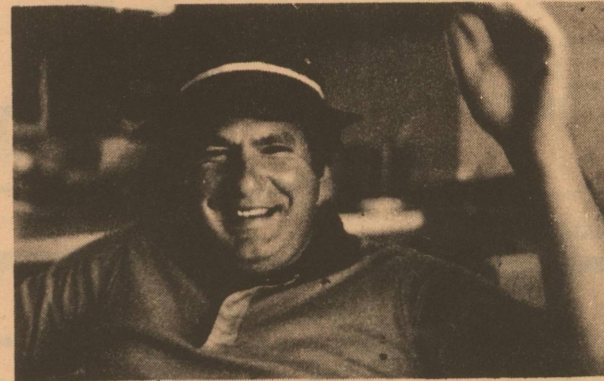

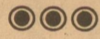
It's Not Too Late -- To Join The 4-H Club

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Texas Hunter Education Program To Educate Hunters

The "voluntary" Texas Hunter Education program started in 1972 and is coordinated by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. The goal of the program is to educate hunters to be safe, knowledgeable, responsible and involved.

The course is extremely valuable to younger hunters, but it is intended for people of all ages and interests. The ultimate benefits of the program are reduced firearm accidents and wildlife violations; promotion of sportsmanship and outdoor awareness; continuance of the sport; and conservation of the resource.

On June 1, 1988, Texas implemented a mandatory program requiring persons of a specific age group to complete the course before they can legally hunt in Texas. Generally, those born on or after September 2, 1971, have to complete the training, but the program is set up to be phased in over a five-year period (1989-1993).

Who must attend: Hunters whose date of birth is on or after September 2, 1971 must attend this program. Any individual may take the course on a voluntary

basis and is encouraged to attend regardless of requirements.

Who is exempt:

--Hunters whose date of birth is on or before September 1, 1971.

--Hunters who have been certified in the voluntary Texas Hunter Safety (Education) Program.

--Hunters who have been certified through another state's resource agency. Check with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Hunter Education Section at 512-389-4999 to determine whether a comparable course is acceptable or not.

--Hunters under 17 years of age whose date of birth is on or after September 2, 1971 when accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older. Hunters under 12 years of age must be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older.

Proof of certification is a department-prescribed card or temporary receipt which must be carried at all times while hunting with all firearms and archery equipment. The cost of the course is \$5. Failure to carry proper certification while hunting constitutes a Class C, Parks and Wildlife Code misdemeanor which

is punishable by a fine not less than \$25 nor more than \$500.

Hunting season for Schleicher County is as follows:

Deer -- Archery, October 7 - November 5; general, November 4 - January 7; four deer, limit two bucks.

Turkey -- Archery, October 7 - November 5; general, November 4 - January 7; two turkeys, either sex; spring season, April 7 - May 6; two gobblers. (Limit three turkeys per year.)
