ing industry, the mine workers contend that the only result of a reduction in the amount of the tax would be to reduce the price of copper and to reduce wages and employment in domestic coopper mines, wages being geared to the price of copper.

It is charged that zinc, cattle, lumber and petroleum have been "traded", and that copper and other domestic items which are competitive against foreign production are threatended.

As one recent writer puts it: "Charity begins at home-and here we have millions of unemployed and millions in need. Opening our trade gates to foreign dumping will not make jobs for American labor."

#### MINE STORY DOUBTED

American military experts are inclined to scoff at the story which has been going about to the effect that Germany has a magical "magnetic" sea mine which is attracted to its target by the steel hull of a ship.

It is pointed out that the "pull" of a magnet decreases very rapidly as distance from the attracted object increases; also that magnetic impulses are not readily transmitted through water.

They recall that during the World War a government board of experts, headed by the late Thomas A. Edison, to study ideas for new weapons, explored the magnetic mine theory and pronounced it impracticable.

Even if some such mine could be made to work, it would almost certainly endanger a vessel that attempted to plant it, as well as those which might come along

Most navies do have types of electric mine, however, which are equipped with long "feelers" or attennae attached, so that the bottom of a vessel brushing against them will automatically set off the explosive. The Germans may have an improved type of this sort of mine.

The greatest barrage of sea mines ever planted consisted of 70,000 laid in the North Sea by the British and American navies during the World War. Less than one-half of them were recoverd after the war.

#### Allred Conviction

Repercussions from the action of Federal Judge James C. Wilson, who dismissed seven counts in the hot oil indictments against Rennie Allred, Jr., brother of the ex-governor, and Neal Powers, and found them guilty on three counts, imposing a fine of \$1000 each, may have an effect upon the continuous campaign which has been carried on by Interior Secretary Harold Ickes, to bring about Federal control of oil uro duction. Ickes issued a statement, bitterly criticising Judge Wilson's action, charging that it was improper to halt evidence in the case while Government prosecutors still had many witnesses to present, and without any agreement by the prosecutors to the court's action. The court dismissed the indictment alleging conspiracy, which is punishable as a felony by imprisonment, while the conviction was on misdemeanor courts, carrying fines as the penalty.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE SHOOTING OF

FIREWORKS

An Ordinance Regulating The Use And Shooting Of Fireworks Within The City Of Eldorado, Texas: Prohibiting The Shooting Of Fireworks Within The Fire Limits; Defining Fireworks And Providing A Penalty For Violation Of This Ordinance.

Be It Ordained By The City Council Of The City Of Eldorado,

Section 1. Defination. The term "fireworks" referred to in this ordinance shall include toy pistol, toy cannons, detonating canes, roman candles, sky-rockets, blank cartridges, firecrackers of any size or kind, or any substance of an explosive nature and devices for discharging same.

Section 2. The shooting of fireworks prohibited. It shall be hereafter unlawful for any person or persons to set off or shoot any fireworks within the fire limits of the City of Eldorado as the same is now defined or may hereafter be defined.

Section 3. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person or persons to set off or shoot any fireworks within the City Limits of the City of Eldorado between midnight and 6 A. M. any day of the year.

Section 4. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person or persons to set off or shoot any fire-




