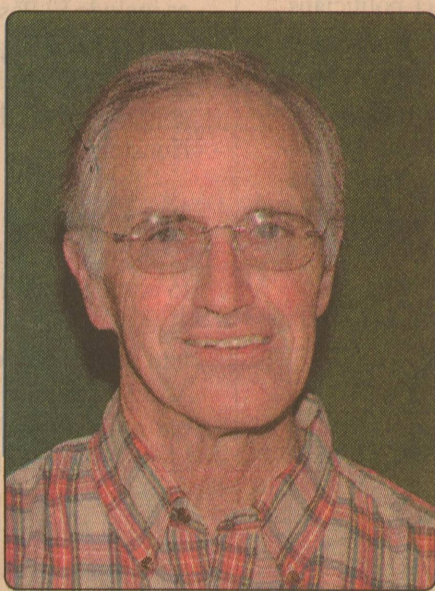

## Precinct 2 voters choose Meador as commissioner

Lynn Meador will represent Precinct 2 for the next four years on the Schleicher County Commissioners Court. The Republican challenger unseated incumbent Democratic commissioner Bill Clark by a 144-89 margin. The race was the only contest on the local level but the result mirrored statewide returns as Republicans swept every statewide seat on a night when Democrats surged to victory on the national stage.

"I am humbled and honored by the results of this election and the confidence that has been expressed by the voters," Meador commented on Wednesday. "I'll do my best to be worthy of that confidence. I want to emphasize the 'open door policy' for the needs of all constituents, and I look forward to working with the Commissioners Court in accomplishing great things for Schleicher County"

lenger Barbara Radnofsky. Meanwhile Congressman Mike Conaway (R) was unopposed in his bid to retain his District 11 seat in the House of Representatives.

Closer to home, State Representative Harvey Hilderbran (R) won easy reelection over his Libertarian challenger B.W. Hollik.

Current Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs (R) was elected to replace Carole Keeton Strayhorn as Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts. Todd Staples (R) will take Combs' place as Commissioner of Agriculture.

The election was the first county-wide balloting since the county purchased and put into service new voting machines and ballot scanning equipment. Hopes were that the new equipment would mean that election results would be made public earlier in the evening. However, a software glitch meant that it would be well after midnight before Schleicher County's votes were known.

Winning reelection on the local level were County Judge Johnny F. Griffin (D), Clerk Peggy Williams (D), Treasurer Karen Henderson (D), Justice of the Peace James C. Doyle (D) and County Commissioner Pct. 4 Matt Brown (R), all of whom were unopposed.

On the national level, Democrats swept the Republicans out of power in the House of Representatives and appear at press time to be on the verge of taking

Every contested race on Schleicher County ballots went to the Republican candidate, and in most cases by a wide margin.

On the statewide level, Governor Rick Perry (R) won reelection over a field of challengers, including former Democratic Congressman Chris Bell, as well as current State Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn and entertainer and author Richard 'Kinky' Friedman, both of whom ran as Independents.

At the top of the ballot, U.S. Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison (R) coasted to an easy victory over Democratic chal-

## City hears county's grant plans

City of Eldorado council met Monday, November 6 for their regular slated meeting.

Kay Howard with A&J HOWCO Services of Lubbock was present to answer questions about the Colonia Grant program and the upcoming grant application process the county is preparing. She noted that the city normally contributes \$10,000 toward matching funds for the county grant. Howard also explained that if the county is successful in obtaining the grant they plan to finish the water system in Orient Heights and the Three Sisters additions.

Howard went on to explain that septic systems in the Orient Heights addition will be pumped out and filled in to complete the most recent sewer system project.

Following the briefing the council voted to participate with the county as they pursue a new grant.

Randy Verner, an agent with the USDA Rural Development program from Ozona, then met with the council and provided them with an overview of financial assistance programs available through his agency.

## Last Chance for Latin America's Radical Left

Is Latin America at a turning point? Before the end of the year, voters in several countries will either show trust that market-oriented democracy is the only political system conceived by humans that has produced freedom and prosperity, or hand over power to demagogues who will produce tyranny and poverty.

The issue seemed to have been settled in the 1990s. After two decades of Marxist guerrillas and right-wing military dictatorships, every nation in the region except Cuba was an elected democracy.

But discontent with the failure of corrupt governments to provide economic opportunity for the millions of poor people made some voters question whether Western democracy was really the answer for Latin America.

One result was Hugo Chavez, first elected president of Venezuela in 1998, six years after staging a failed coup d'état allegedly aimed at ending corruption. He was re-elected in 2000, and in 2004 won a recall election that has been challenged as fraudulent. With his petrodollars and support for Castro's Cuba, Chavez has pushed an anti-American, anti-democracy agenda throughout the region and the world.

Things seemed to be breaking his way after the 2005 election of Evo Morales, a lost soul who dreams of bringing back a sort of Inca socialism, as president of Bolivia. It seemed Castro with his charisma and revolutionary experience, Morales with his connection to poverty-stricken indigenous people, and Chavez with his oil riches were set to steer Latin America in their direction.

But then candidates of the radical left started losing presidential elections.

In Peru, Alan Garcia defeated the Chavez-backed Ollanta Humala, in no small part because the latter was seen as too cozy with the Venezuelan strongman. More recently in Ecuador, businessman Alvaro Noboa beat another Chavez ally, Rafael Correa, and will go to a runoff. As in Peru, a leading theme in the campaign was Chavez's influence.

Then there was the election in Mexico, in which the right-of-center Felipe Calderon linked his opponent, Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador, with Chavez and won.

Further discrediting the radicals is Chavez's clownish speech at the U.N. calling President Bush the devil and saying the podium still smelled of sulfur. Nobody liked that -- not Charles Rangel, the New York Democrat who is as far on the left as anybody in Congress, and not diplomats who, even if they disagree with U.S. policy, like their United Nations a bit more decorous.

The ridiculous show Chavez put on is partly to blame for Venezuela's failure to win a seat on the Security Council. Chavez had predicted he would win the seat and deal a blow to "the empire" (yawn). He has lost 35 rounds to Guatemala, and even though the latter has not reached the two-thirds majority needed to win the seat, a Venezuelan victory is out of the realm of possibility.

Venezuelans have a chance to end the threat of radicalism to the region by voting Chavez out of office on Dec. 3.

Timing spoils this week's State Capital Highlights because it is mailed the day before election day. Next week's column will include election results.

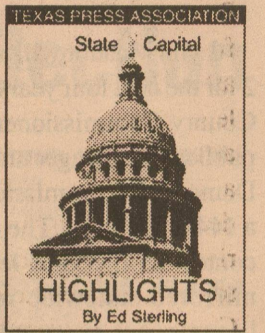
### Austin ranked 5th safest city

In an annual ranking of the 25 safest cities in America, Austin placed fifth among cities with a population of more than 500,000.

The ranking, compiled by Morgan Quitno, is based on FBI crime statistics.

Other high-ranked big cities in Texas include El Paso, third; San Antonio, seventh; and Fort Worth, ninth.

Two cities made the "most dangerous" list: Dallas placed sixth, and Houston, 10th.



### Toll roads open in capital area

A certain kind of Texan never wants to come to Austin.

Another kind loves the capital city and seizes any opportunity to come. And yet another kind will come here but only if absolutely necessary. The last two kinds will soon note changes if they ride here on two or more wheels.

New toll roads, started in 2002 as the Central Texas Turnpike Project, have opened to the north and east of the city. These toll roads, State Highways 45 and 130, and a section of Loop 1 (MoPac), are meant to relieve traffic on Interstate Highway 35. The part of IH-35 that goes through Austin is one of the busiest and most dangerous stretches of highway in America.

Until Dec. 31, to encourage use of the system, tolls will not be collected. On Jan. 1, tolls will be collected for drivers paying cash at toll booths. TX-TAG users will begin paying half the posted tolls in February. In March they will pay the regular toll of 10 percent less than the cash rate.

### Red light cameras to be tested

Another thing visitors might not notice but should know about is that the Austin City Council on Nov. 2 approved a two-month pilot program to test red-light cameras at intersections around the city.

The goal is to have cameras up and running in February. After the test period, the city will position cameras at more than a dozen intersections around town. Tickets will be sent to the permanent addresses recorded for the plates.

The American Civil Liberties Union has lodged a protest, arguing that such a surveillance system would constitute an invasion of drivers' privacy and a warrantless search.

It also might be a due-process issue, if a person ticketed for running a red light could not face a flesh-and-blood accuser in a court of law.

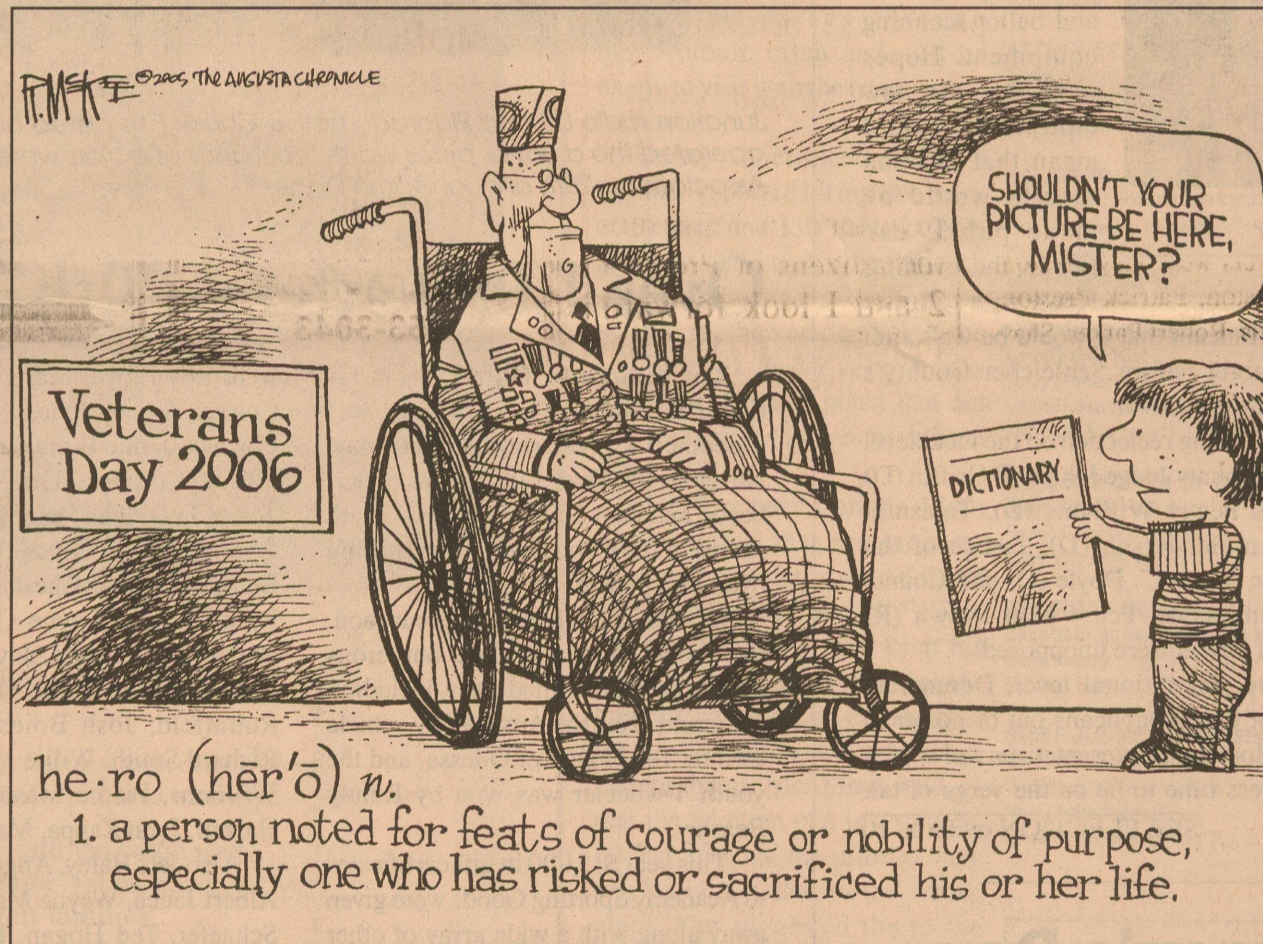
### Teachers to receive incentive pay

More than 1,100 Texas schools will share \$95.5 million in Texas Educator Excellence Grants under a program created by the Texas Legislature last spring to give incentive pay to teachers.

Each of the state's 1,119 qualified schools will receive \$40,000 to \$300,000 depending on the size of their student population on their campus.

To qualify, schools must have ranked in the top half of the state in the percentage of educationally disadvantaged students for their school type and have been rated exemplary or recognized or ranked in the top quarter.

## There's Dust on the Old Violin

Johnny Gidley's day job is in the computer room at the Stagecoach Inn in Salado. But he is passionate about music.

"My dad had bought a guitar from somebody for five dollars," says Johnny. "He wanted us boys to learn how to play it so we could accompany him while he played his fiddle. None of us had the interest or energy to do it until I saw The Beatles on the Ed Sullivan show in 1964. I went into the closet, got that guitar and started playing it. I haven't put it down since."

Johnny played with a rock and roll band in the sixties called The Buccaneers, one of the most popular bands in central Texas at the time. He later did solo acts in clubs, playing both the six and twelve string guitars. He has produced two albums. One of them is titled A LIFE OF ENDURANCE, about his growing up on the family farm near Salado. One song on the CD is called THERE'S DUST ON THE OLD VIOLIN.

"We'd come in from a hard

days work, eat supper, then my dad would grab the fiddle, go out on the front porch and fiddle a few old waltzes."

The opening lyrics of the song go like this:

*When nighttime would fall, he'd take it from the wall*

*Where it hung in its ragged old case.*

*He'd play a few strains from over the waves*

*With a quivering hand on the bow.*

*Now there's dust on the old violin and he'll never play it again.*

"I would second to him while he played the fiddle," says Johnny.

"With his shaky hand he wasn't a great fiddle player, but you could make out the tunes."

The song was written as a poem, but Johnny decided to make a song from it.

"I had a little hand-held recorder that I had taken out to his house one night when he wanted me to second him playing fiddle. My three-year-old son was listening to us play. I was recording all this. When I got the song ready for commercial release in 1991, I remembered the tape recording of us playing that night and I put it at the very end. If you listen closely, you can hear my little three-year-old son jabbering in the background."

Johnny records on tape, saying it produces a warmer sound than digital recordings. His CD, A LIFE OF ENDURANCE, contains contemporary Christian music. Johnny says the title comes from the Bible.

"That's what life is. You have a lot of troubles and you have to overcome them. Growing up on the farm was rough. I had thirteen brothers and sisters. We struggled, but there was a lot of joy there, too."

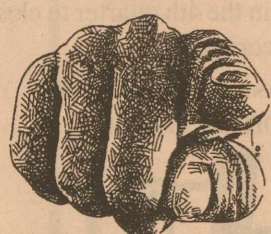

The game is slated for 7:30 p.m. in Miles Friday.

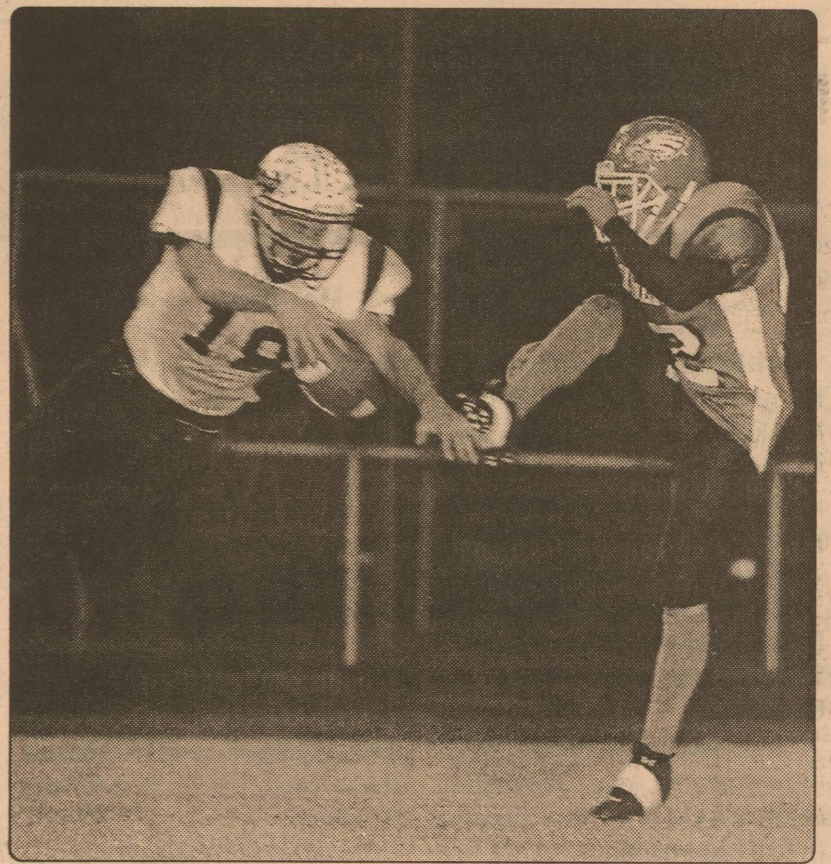

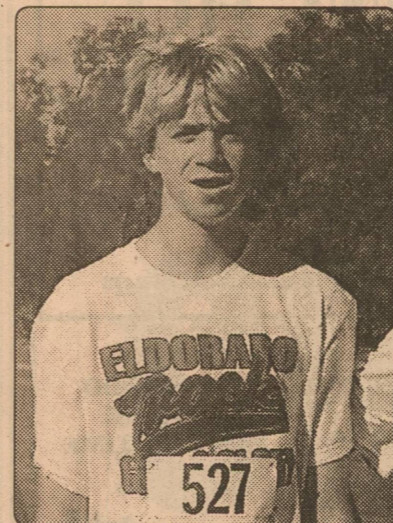
Garrett Lux found Ryan Castillo on a 23 yard touchdown pass in the third quarter.

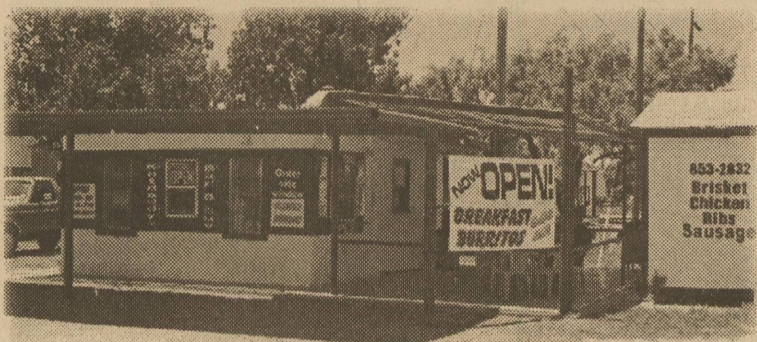

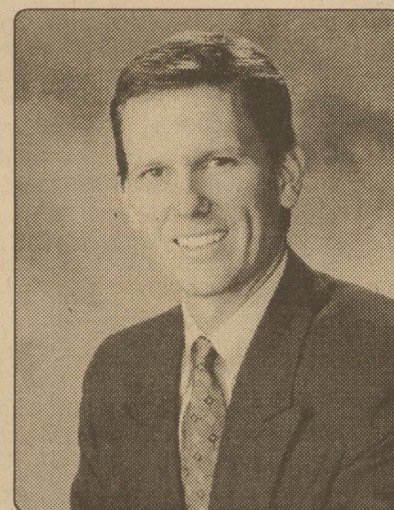
## Meador elected chairman of Texas Nature Tourism

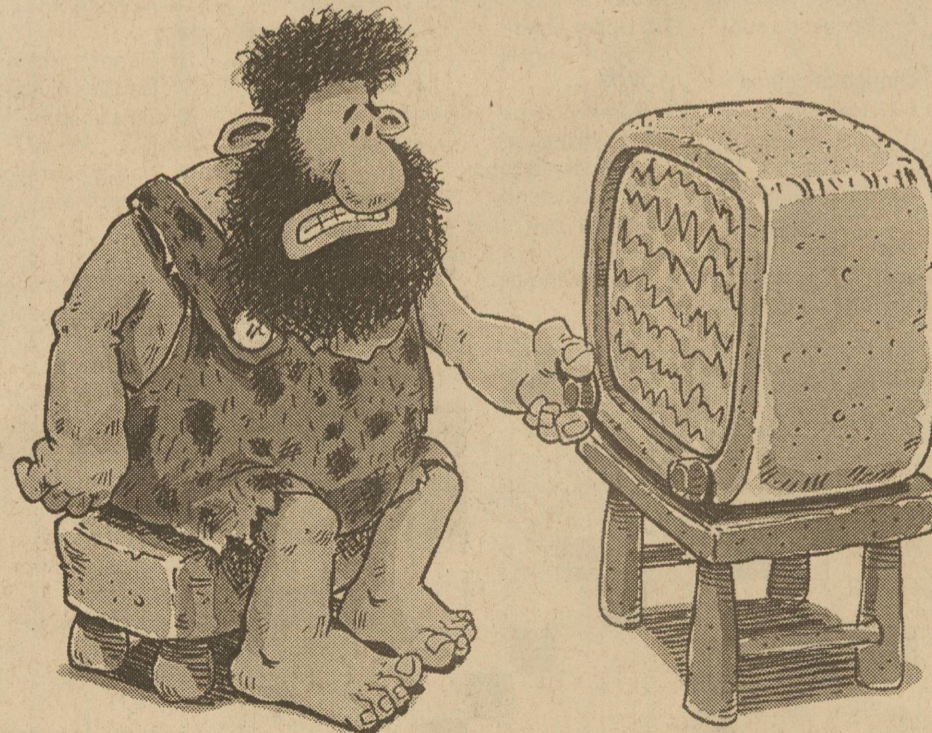

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) states: "Preventing the Flu: Get Vaccinated" The single best way to prevent the flu is to get a flu vaccination each year. About two weeks after vaccination, antibodies develop that protect against influenza virus infection. Flu vaccines will not protect against flu-like illnesses caused by non-influenza viruses.

### How Flu Spreads

Flu viruses spread mainly from person to person through coughing or sneezing of people with influenza. Sometimes people may become infected by touching something with flu viruses on it and then touching their mouth or nose. Most healthy adults may be able to infect others beginning 1 day before symptoms develop and up to 5 days after becoming sick. That means that you may be able to pass on the flu to someone else before you know you are sick, as well as while you are sick."

# Another man sentenced to Federal prison for transporting aliens near Ft. McKavett

Another man who transported illegal aliens near San Angelo, Texas, in March 2006, was sentenced Friday, Nov. 3 in federal court in Lubbock, Texas, announced United States Attorney Richard B. Roper. United States District Judge Sam R. Cummings sentenced Agustin Anorga to 71 months imprisonment. Anorga, along with co-defendants Jorge Luis Castro-Garcia and Jesse Cano each pled guilty in July to one count of transporting illegal aliens for private financial gain and aiding and abetting. Last month, Judge Cummings sentenced Castro-Garcia to 71 months imprisonment and Jesse Cano to 87 months imprisonment.

Jorge Luis Castro-Garcia, a citizen of Mexico lawfully residing in the United States, recruited Jesse Cano and Agustin Anorga, both U.S. citizens, to transport illegal aliens for money. The three met in Ciudad Acuna, Coahuila, Mexico, and finalized plans for transporting the aliens. They had been in contact with the aliens and had arranged to pick them up after the aliens were illegally crossed into the U.S. The aliens were to pay Castro-Garcia \$1,500 each to be smuggled into the United States and transported to Cleburne, Texas, and Castro-Garcia was to pay Cano and Anorga for their assistance when the aliens arrived safely in Cleburne.

On March 18, 2006, Castro-Carcia, Cano and Anorga picked up approximately 11 to 13 Mexican nationals, illegally in the United States, near Del Rio, Texas. They used three vehicles for this venture and were taking the aliens to the Cleburne, Texas, area to work. After picking up the aliens at the border, the three men had the aliens walk around the immigration checkpoint on U.S. Highway 277 near Del Rio, in order to avoid their detection. They then picked them up again after the checkpoint and put them in a red Ford Explorer, driven by Anorga, and a gray pickup truck, driven by Cano. Castro-Garcia led the way in a white Suburban, but in Sonora, Texas, the aliens in the gray pickup truck were transferred to the white Suburban. After the transfer, Cano took the lead in the gray pickup truck, followed by Anorga in the red Explorer, and Castro in the white Suburban.

At one point, Cano lost sight of Anorga and pulled over to wait for him. Cano turned around and discovered that Anorga's vehicle had crashed near Ft. McKavett. It was later determined that a worn tire on the vehicle blew out and caused the red Explorer to roll. Cano and Anorga tried to assist the injured aliens and went to a nearby ranch to summon help. Castro-Garcia eventually went back to the scene

of the accident, but left when law enforcement arrived. Cano and Anorga then left the scene as well.

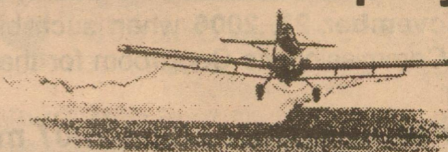
One of the illegal aliens was killed in the accident and one was seriously injured. The other aliens from the red Explorer ran into the brush after the accident, but some were eventually found.

Cano and Anorga caught up with Castro-Garcia about 80 miles down the highway in Brady, Texas. Castro-Garcia had dropped off four illegal aliens near the scene of the accident and wanted to return and pick them up. Cano and Castro-Garcia returned to the area in the white Suburban and found the four illegal aliens while Anorga traveled on to Cleburne in the gray pickup truck. Cano and Castro-Garcia were traveling on U.S. 190 toward Eldorado near the accident site in order to avoid detection when Schleicher County Sheriff

David Doran stopped them.

U.S. Attorney Roper praised the investigative efforts of the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, U.S. Border Patrol, the Texas Department of Public Safety and the Schleicher and Menard County Sheriff's Offices. The case was prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney Denise Williams of the Lubbock, Texas, U.S. Attorney's Office.

Mayor John Nikolauk next reported that there is no news on when the city will receive its new trash truck. The truck was ordered several months ago and was supposed to have been delivered by now.

Councilman Bill McCutcheon advised that he would be happy to check on the truck since it passes through San Antonio often and will be happy to visit with the truck manufacturer.

Utility Superintendent Floyd Fay then reported hiring two more employees and said that pot hole patching and brush chipping will soon resume.

Fay further advised that the landfill track loader keeps breaking down. He also noted that old and leaking gas meters have been replaced.

City Secretary Carolyn Mayo next reported that the property owner of the Sunrise Addition who recently enclosed city utility lines with a fence may keep his fence in place. She noted that the property has been surveyed and the fence was built in the right place. The problem, Ms. Mayo said, is that the addition plat is wrong by 20 feet and that the utilities were originally installed in the wrong place. She suggested the council that the whole addition be resurveyed so that the location of utility lines can be identified.

In other business, the council briefly discussed mobile home zoning but took no action. They also discussed the vacancy left in Ward 2 when Toni Sudduth resigned her post recently.

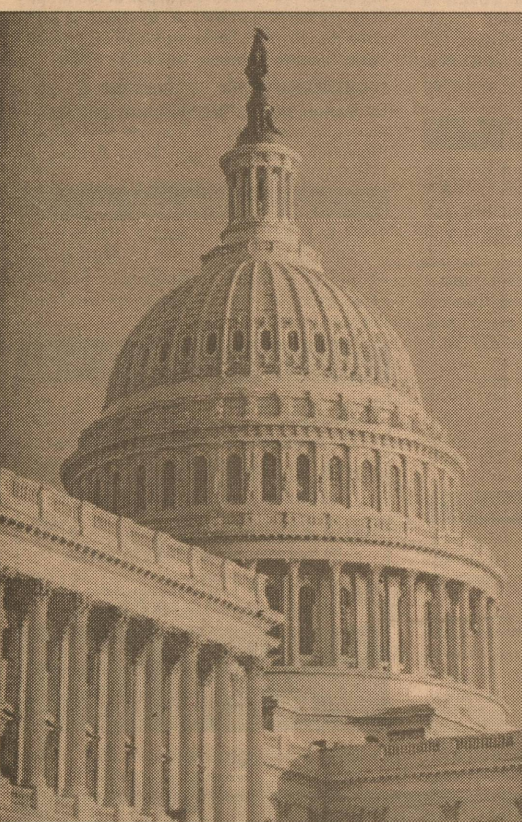
