## DR. JOHN ROACH STRATON DENOUNCES AL SMITH

Dr. John Roach Straton, Baptist Minister of New York home state of the Governor Alfred E. Smith, is now touring Texas and other Southern States, speaking against the candidacy of the New York Governor. Dr. Straton is a life long Democrat and an able speaker. He says that Governor Smith's record is vile and entirely in favor of the liquor traffic. He sat on the platform at the Smith speaking in Oklahoma and heard the Democratic nominee speak. Straton spoke from the same platform the following night. He offered to divide time with the Governor but he refused to accept.

If you failed to hear Dr. Straton you missed a very good speech. All of his talks were broadcast by radio and he is of the opinion that several of the Southern States will go in the Republican columns this fall. He has spoken in most of them and many are very strong against the New York Governor.

## AL SMITH POLITICIANS DENOUNCE GOOD WOMEN OF TEXAS

The two greatest proofs of moral legislation the last hundred years are, First—The Eighteenth Amendment putting the saloon out of the social life of the American people, and Second—The Nineteenth Amendment which conferred upon the women the right to vote, thereby making them the guardians of the home against the liquor traffic.

The papers are full of the account of the unseating of the regularly elected delegates to the state convention held in Dallas last week—delegates from Tarrant, Dallas and other counties were unseated in the most illegal and unpustifiable way.

In Tarrant county not a single precinct could be carried by the Smith crowd and yet the Anti-Smith Delegates were unseated in a body and the Tammany Hall representative, Judge I. W. Stephens, the Al Smith supporter from Tarrant County, before the Executive Committee made an attack on the good women, an expressed his fear of what they are most certain to do with Al Smith, and he made this statement before the Executive Committee:

"We talk loud about the danger to the Democratic party of the Eighteenth Amendment but I say the greater danger to the Democratic party is the Nineteenth Amendment."

Following this unjust, un-American, un-Democratic charge against the good women, the Tarrant County Democratic Anti-Smith women's organization passed the following resolution:

"WHEREAS, it has dependably come to our organization of Tarrant County Democratic Anti-Smith women that on September 10, 1928, at Dallas, when he was presenting the Democratic State Executive Committee the claim of the Tarrant County rump convention delegation to unseat the duly and regularly elected delegation to the Democratic State Convention, held in Dallas, September 11th, 1928, that Judge I. W. Stephens, representing and speaking for the contesting delegation said:

"We talk loud about the danger to the Democratic party of the Eighteenth Amendment, but I say the greater danger to the Democratic party is the Nineteenth Amendment."

"Therefore, be it resolved by the Anti-Smith women gathered at the Democratic Headquarters in Fort Worth, September 14th, that we unanimously express great surprise and sincere regret that Democratic women should be so unjustly characterized and criticised by Judge Stephens, who is the Tarrant County Smith for President Chairman.

"We are making an earnest effort to be good citizens and loyal Democrats, who scorn Tammany leadership and we denounce the chairman of the Smith forces for his outrageous and untrue statement that the women voters in effect are a menace to the Democratic party, and we call upon every woman in Tarrant County to repudiate and resent his saudacious statement and Al Smith, his dripping wet candidate for President, and to leave no stone unturned to the end that we shall demonstrate our fidelity to the Democratic party and to our country by using the franchise conferred upon us by the Nineteenth Amendment in bringing about, in Tarrant County, the greatest possible majority against Al Smith and for Herbert Hoover.—The Fundamentalist.

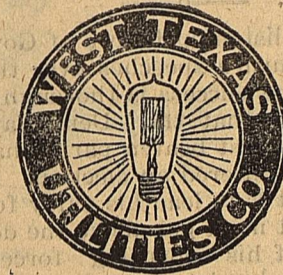

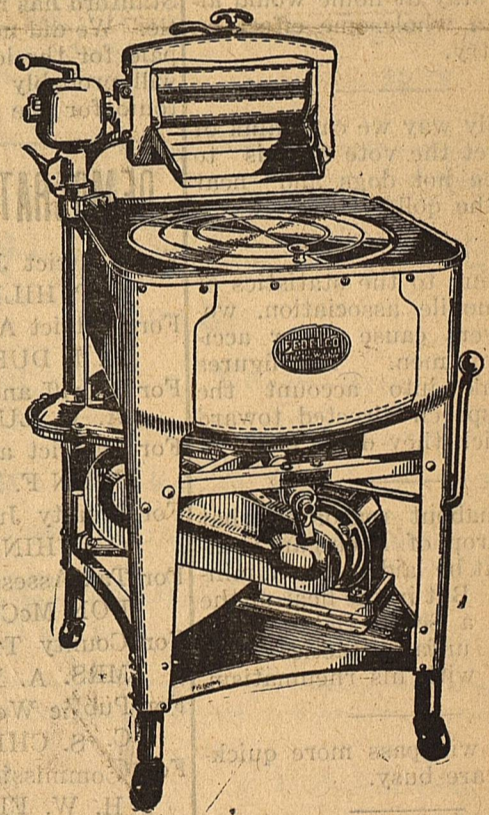

### Eldorado Defeats Menard

12 to 0

Friday, September 21, 1928, the Eldorado Eagles met the Menard Yellow Jackets at the Eldorado Fair Association Park. Although both teams went upon the field with a great determination to win, the Eldorado boys won 12 to 0.

The line up for Eldorado was:  
Ends: Graves and Swift  
Tackles: Sharp and Ballew  
Guards: Johnson and Elder  
Center: W. Murphy  
Backfield: Ratliff, McClatchey, P. Murphy and Parker.

L. T. Barber was selected to referee. He called the game about 4 o'clock with the Yellow Jackets receiving. They made a line drive for 4 yards next for about two yards and then fumbled, the Eagles covered ball. Eagles made 2 yards again 1 yard, Yellow Jackets held on 3rd down. Eagles completed pass from Ratliff to P. Murphy who went over for touchdown. This was the first score of the season made by a pass from Ratliff to Murphy. They failed to make the extra point.

Eagles again kicked to Yellow Jackets who made line drive for 2 yards and then another, failed to complete pass on third down and were forced to punt, W. Murphy receiving ball, returned ten yards. Eagles hit line for no gain. McClatchey carried ball for 5 yards, then for 7 and again for 1. On the next play the Menard team threw the Eldorado boys for a one yard loss. Eagles pass incomplete, another pass failed and ball went over to Yellow Jackets on their own 16 yard line. Jackets make two yards on line play and first quarter ends. Score Eldorado 6 Menard 0.

Second quarter begins: Yellow Jackets receive McClatchey's kick off. Gained 5 yards on first play, then 6 yards and 4 yards and again 5 yards. A line drive for 1 yard. They completed pass for no gain. Next pass incomplete. Then they attempted to punt, Swift blocking and Ratliff covering the ball. Jackets begin to cry. Sharp replaced by Nix at tackle. Failed to report and Eagles drew a 15 yard penalty. Pass fails and ball goes to Menard.

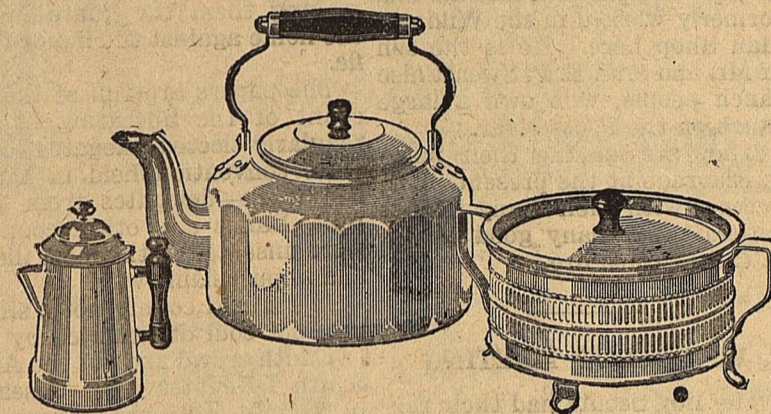
They made one yard, then another, pass incomplete. Jackets punted for 35 yards, W. Murphy received it. Eagles off side, penalized 5 yards. McClatchey made 5 yards thru line, another line plunge for 4 yards then another for one yard. 4th down and 5 yards to go. Eagles punted. End of first half, score Eldorado 6 Menard 0.

During the ten minutes between halves the Pep Squad sang and yelled showing the boys they were still backing them.

Third quarter called. Yellow Jackets receiving and McClatchey kicking. Menard made line drive for two yards. Pass incomplete. Ball fumbled but recovered by Menard losing 2 yards. Fourth down ten yards to go forced them to punt, they punted 35 yards out of bounds. Ratliff made 5 yards, then another yard. Eagles gained 4 yards. McClatchey hit line for no gain. He then made 5 yards, then broke loose for a touchdown. Eagles failed to make point. Score Eldorado 12, Menard 0.

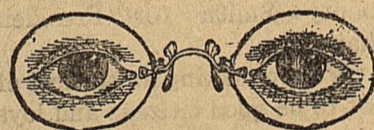

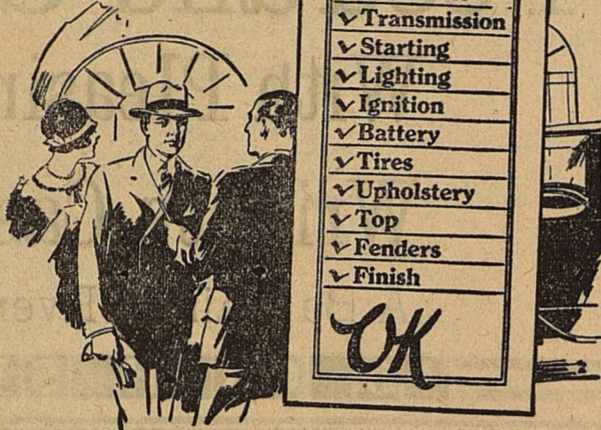

## Cotton Prices Advance. Demand Is Fair To Good

The cotton market during the week of September 15th to 21st was steady and higher, with final quotations up about 5/8 cts. per pound compared with September 14th. Reports indicate a somewhat better demand for spot cotton during the week but however with no decided improvement. From some sections came a report of a higher basis, particularly for cottons of the shorter staple lengths.

The prices paid in ten designated markets, for middling cotton 7-8 inch staple, on September 21st were as follows: Norfolk 17.75 Augusta 17.94, Savannah 17.35, New Orleans 17.76, Memphis 17.25 Montgomery 17.15 Little Rock 17.35, Dallas 17. Houston 17.60 and Galveston 17.70. The average price paid in these ten markets was 17.00 on September 21st., compared with 16.88 on September 14th and 20.18 on the corresponding day last season. Total sales of were 323,865 bales compared with 284,968 bales the corresponding week last year. Southern Mill Centers.

Reports indicate a fair to good demand for middling cottons, 7/8 inch staple, for prompt shipment and better inquiry for these cottons for deferred shipments. Southern Spinners takings to September 21st were 091 bales compared with 62,000 bales in the same period last year.

### Foreign Markets.

Reports for the week indicate a continued improved demand in Manchester, with the market supplied with the better grades but as total stocks are rather limited, buyers are more in evidence than sellers. Offerings of American cottons reported at a higher basis than the previous week. Reports from Liverpool indicate improvement in both spot and forward demand, with Texas and Atlantic States stiff. More callings by the trade also, was reported. Havre, France, reported the demand was rather poor, with spinners out of the market, with sales of spot cotton light and offerings on an easier basis. Stocks of American cotton in Manchester on September 14th. were 30,000 bales against 83,000 bales a year ago. Havre had 125,000 bales this year against 142,000 bales last year to the same date. Bremen had 259,000 bales compared with 302,000 bales a year ago.

### General.

According to the United States Weather Bureau, picking and ginning made good progress during the past week, with the exception of certain areas in the Atlantic States, where the progress was only fair, account of the unfavorable weather.

According to the Bureau of Census there were operated some time during the month of August, 28,243,508 cotton spinning spindles compared with 28,228,024 for July, and 32,292,404 for August, 1927.

The world's visible supply of American cotton on September 21st. was 2,236,902 bales compared with 3,764,404 bales last

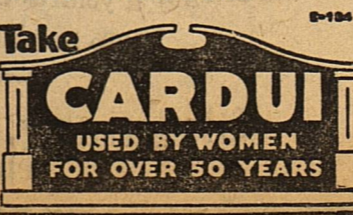

he soon found that the two registered cows gave as much milk and butter as the four grades. Two of the grades were sold later and now with poor crop prospects, feed exhausted and money scarce Mr. Russell says, "I don't know what we would do if it were not for old Rose and Edna."

### ANTI AL SMITH DEMOCRATS

Mrs. Jessie Daniel Ames of Georgetown, who has become widely known in Texas as the result of her connection with various women's activities, with interracial matters, and in the shaping of political affairs, has made known her intention of taking the stump for Herbert Hoover for president.

In a letter to Alvin Moody, chairman for Texas of the Anti-Smith Democrats, Mrs. Ames said, "The issue is made." A vote for Smith is a vote for endorsing his stand on prohibition. Self-respect demands we respect the sincerity of Governor Smith, but our self-respect and respect for our American citizenship and our democratic faith, irrespective of party organization, compels sincere action from us.

"For my part, and I know I voice the intention of thousands and thousands of women of Texas, I shall cast my vote in this prohibition referendum against Governor Smith and for Mr. Hoover. With my vote, as always in the past, go my labor and whatever influence I may have."

A departure from the usual reasons given by the democrats for the support of Herbert Hoover for president is seen in the declaration of Lewis Cagle, Houston attorney and one of the organizers of the Houston Forum, an institution for fastening free and open discussion of the big issues of the day.

"I do not regard the prohibition as all important. The foreign policy of this country during the next four or eight years," he declared, "will be the great factor in the welfare of this and other countries. This will be on account of opportunities for shaping world affairs that will present themselves to the United States. Mr. Hoover already has demonstrated his capacity for world leadership in a cooperative way, and I feel that no more than anyone else, could set up machinery for cooperative effort among nations. I regard prohibition as a transient question, upon which mistakes can be made and corrected without serious inconvenience to the country as a whole."

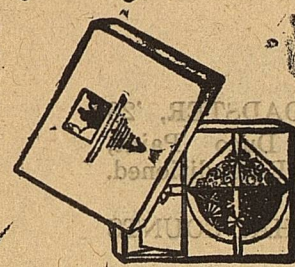

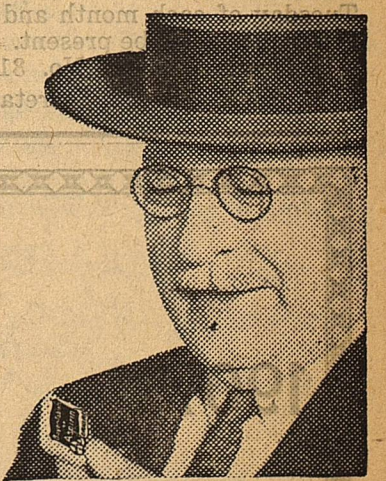
