### GET RID OF THE "IFS"

The President's budget adlress provides considerable food for thought. It is unfortunate that its technicalities and statisical detail—inescapable in any lessage of this kind-will preent it from being widely read.

Briefly the President said that e budget will be balanced for he year beginning July 1, 1931, i statutory payments toward reduction of the debt are not considered, and if relief and other emergency appropriations to no. exceed \$1,537,000,000.

There are other "ifs" in the message, but these are the most important. And it is now the duty of Congress to see to it that emergency spending is held to the lowest possible point, that every conceivable cut be made in the overhead cost of our multititudinous bureaus-some of which have outlived their purose and have no excuse for extence—and that a scientifically anned program of economy ermeate the entire Federal structure.

The President is also said to be working on a plan whereby various governmental departments will be consolidated in the interest of efficiency? and economy. This has long been a vital need, and it is unquestionably true that wise consol.dations would save the taxpayers untold millions without eliminating or reducing government services. Congress should give every aid to the Executive in attaining this

In brief, the people must demand that the budget be balanced, and that no "ifs" be allowed to stand in the way.



The Schoch process, tested for several months at Austin in 500tons-a-day model plant operation, produces sulphate of poiash (most costly form of potash) magnesium carbonate (desirable for insulating), and a "very superior" hard plaster with "not a pound" of the mined material wasted.

Operation of this plant has shown that the polyhalite can b mined, shipped to tidewater and refined into these commodities at a cost which, when aligned with market prices for them as produced elsewhere, indicates olyhalite could become one of Texas' most important contributions to the nation's agriculture and industry.

Chief factors affecting deve opment of this, as one of many other prospective and existent South Development Council of freight rates, and assurance So far as is known, polyhalite that enterprises will not be penalized by too-restrictive legislation and punitive taxation. A more definite state policy in place of the traditional and constant threat of increased levies, said Horace Loomis, executive secretary of the Council, would be a prime factor in encouraging new industries.




### REVENUE SOURCES

Social workers employed by local agencies certify to the need of applicants for food and clothing. Most of the recipients are unemployables or have not been absorbed on WPA projects.

Primary purpose of the project is to utilize price-depressing agricultural surpluses for distribution to families with subnormai consumption. The system of distribution through non-commercial channels has not interfered with retail business but has served to stimulate and increase the consumption of a number of commodities, Montgomery declared. While the main concern is the proper distribution of surplus agricultural commoditi-
