BURNSIDE REPLIES

The following letter from John C. Burnside, district director of the WPA was received last week:

Hon. C. S. McKinney, Co. Judge Schleicher County Eldorado, Texas

Dear Sir:

After reading an editorial concerning the work of WPA in Schleicher county in your paper today, I feel that I lost a great opportunity Monday in not knowing about it while I was having my visit with you.

You know there is always at least two sides to every question, and in all fairness to all parties concerned, which of course means the people of Schleicher County, I am asking that you print this letter in the next issue of your paper giving it the same prominent place you gave your editorial.

It is most unfortunate for both Schleicher County and W. P. A. that the county not only did not have the relief workers available to do the work set up and approved for the county, but it did not have and made no attempt, until now, to get any equipment to work with which, of course, made any work attempted both slow and expensive—not to the county, but to W. P. A.

We will forget the past and consider the present. Quoting from your editorial: "They want results. Some two months have been spent on a two mile project out by Station A and the project is still far short of completion."

May I ask, have you visited that project and spent sufficient time there to really know why that job is moving so slowly?

Well, I have, and this is what I found: Two men with a worn out tractor, that had just about as much power as a yearling turkey gobbler, hitched to an old worn out road grader trying to dig up a caliche pit. A well built loading trap with a new Diesel tractor hitched to a two yard scraper that could not keep three trucks running. I personally timed these trucks when they would come in to the pit, and for two hours I saw each truck wait for eight to twelve minutes before there was enough caliche on the trap for them to drive under and load. Why should your equipment which is good and new be expected to only load the truck every fifteen to twenty minutes and credit W. P. A. with being slow on the job when we are doing the same work in other counties with almost the same equipment, loading—not three trucks but ten to twelve, and not in fifteen minutes, but in twelve to fifteen seconds to the truck.

Quoting again from your editorial: "What the County wants is something to show for the money expended in this work. Unless she can get this, the W. P. A. would do better by "pulling up stakes and moving." What you will understand from this letter is, that W. P. A. is just as much dissatisfied with the work in Schleicher County as the Eldorado Success and the Commissioners' Court, and feel that W. P. A. is entitled to and

Jim Dan Hill Is Author Of New Book, "The Texas Navy"

BOOK CONTAINS EVENTS OF TEXAS HISTORY NEVER TOLD BEFORE

Texas history that has never been told before is revealed in a book entitled "The Texas Navy" by Jim Dan Hill, just published by the University of Chicago Press. This is a full and stirring account of the thirteen men-of-war that constituted the Texas fleet during the years 1835-1845 when the Texas Republic was fighting to retain its sovereignty against the threatened invasions by Mexico.

Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., wrote the Foreword for the book and says:

"Doctor Hill has rescued the Texas Navy from the shadowy obscurity in which it has lurked. He has given to it the importance it deserves. The Navy was unquestionably largely responsible for the victory that Houston won at San Jacinto. It blocked reinforcements for Santa Anna. It forced him for lack of supplies to alter his plan of campaign at a crucial moment.

"While doing all this it was struggling under tremendous handicaps. It was makeshift. Its material was wretched. Its personnel was picked up haphazard. All this is vividly pictured by the author."

Dr. Hill is a native of Texas. His parents still live at Eldorado, Texas, where Dr. Hill was reared and attended public schools. He was graduated from Baylor University in 1922. Since 1931 he has been President of Super-

Schleicher county is receiving more attention toward road repairing and maintenance this week than at any time in the past several years. Three outfits are now at work on the county's roads.

"Polly" Whitworth got so anxious to have roads in his precinct placed in better condition that he "waylaid" the new maintainer last week and put it to work in his precinct. "Polly" forgot about having mumps for the time being, phoned to Eden and headed the maintainer off as it was being delivered to the county, and promptly put it into action in his precinct.

An old tractor and grader are at work in Pat Martin's precinct where, despite the condition of this machinery, considerable badly needed work is being done.

The new tractor and grader are at work on the road running north from the wool house. People living in that part of the county are complimenting the type of work being done on this road.

Jeff Enochs says he's going to get some road work in his precinct or bust a hame string. Jeff is anxious to get that Reynolds lane opened up, and says nothing would please him better than to get the W. P. A. on that project.

With all commissioners interested in improving the condition of their roads, and with the addition of this new machinery, this county is "going places" in road maintenance.

Funeral Services For Bob Chriseman Held On Monday

Robert L. (Bob) Chriseman, 29, former San Angelo policeman, and son of H. W. Chriseman, former Schleicher county citizen and prominent West Texas ranchman, was instantly killed at four o'clock Sunday morning when the car he was driving collided with a parked truck. The accident occurred 11 miles southeast of Fort Stockton, on the Sanderson highway. Chriseman was enroute to his father's ranch, where he had been residing for the past several months.

The body was taken to San Angelo by a Robert Massie casket coach, and funeral services were held at San Angelo Monday afternoon at 3:30, with the pastor of the Christian church conducting the services.

Survivors include his father, a sister, Mrs. Alva Dunagan of San Angelo; four brothers, Earl, San Angelo; Francis, Eldorado; Horace and Billie of Fort Stockton. A daughter, Jo Chriseman of San Angelo, also survives.

Francis Chriseman and family of Eldorado, attended the funeral services Monday.

Mrs C. L. Meador, Sr, Attends Funeral Of Father At Electra

Union Army Veteran Dies Thursday; Had Hoped To Reach Century Mark

Mrs. C. L. Meador, Sr., and Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Meador went to Electra on Thursday last week to attend the funeral of Mrs. C. L. Meador's father, Nathan Austin, a veteran of the Union Army.

Mr. Austin, who had hoped to reach the century mark, died just two years short of this goal. This 98-year-old Missouri veteran of the dwindling grand army of the republic, had just recovered from a major operation early in February. Complications which set up resulted in his death.

Mr. Austin was born in North Carolina Sept. 31, 1838, but moved as a boy to Missouri. He enlisted in the Union army from Buffalo, Mo., in the eighth Missouri volunteers and fought in many bloody guerilla battles between the forces in the border states. After the war he moved to Texas, settling in Bosque county.

Mrs. Meador, who has been quite ill, though not seriously ill, since her return is one of the nine children, four sons and five daughters, who survive.

86 APPLICATIONS FOR 1936 PAYMENTS SENT TO STATE OFFICE

Only 86 of the 125 applications for payment for those who participated in the 1936 soil conservation program have been sent to the state office for approval, County Agent Godwin stated Tuesday.

There remains about 40 applications which need the signatures of the farm operators or of the compliance supervisors who surveyed the land for compliance. Mr. Godwin urges all those who have not signed these papers to sign them at the earliest possible date so they can be forwarded to the state office and payment can be received.

Meeting Of Farmers To Be Held Here On Saturday Afternoon

TO DISCUSS NEW 1937 FARM PROGRAM AND ELECT A COTTON COMMITTEE

County Agent W. G. Godwin is calling a meeting of all farmers of Schleicher county for next Saturday afternoon. The meeting will be held at the county agents' office at two o'clock, and all who are interested in the new 1937 soil conservation program are urged to be present.

Mr. Godwin will explain briefly the new 1937 program as it will apply to local farmers, and will point out the advantages of entering this program this year.

A new cotton committee will also be elected at this meeting, to serve during the year 1937. After the election, this new committee will work out the work sheet forms for the coming 1937 program.

It is urgent that a good representation of farmers be present at this meeting, so that work on this county's part in the new soil conservation program be started as early as possible.

Joint Pre-Easter Services Scheduled By Local Churches

Plans have been made for holding a series of pre-Easter services at the Presbyterian Church in Eldorado, with all denominations co-operating. The services will be held during the week of March 22 to 27.

Only night services will be held, with the pastors of the Presbyterian, Baptist and Methodist churches each preaching two sermons. No one except the pastors will know which night the respective minister will have charge of the service.

Glenn Ratliff has agreed to lead the singing, with the pianist from the respective churches playing two nights each. All singers of Eldorado are urgently requested to attend the services and sing in the choir each night.

must have something to show for the money spent—meaning that unless such is the case, starting now, we will be pulling the stakes and we will not be long about it.

We are very sorry that Mr. Burnside's letter reached us too late for last week, but it was handed to us by Mr. McKinney after our paper was published. We are sorry, also, that Mr. Burnside directed his criticism of our editorial to our County Judge, rather than to The Success where it originated and where it was run independently of our County Judge or Com-

missioners Court.

We agree with Mr. Burnside that there are two sides to every question. This we decided as we sat in Commissioners' Court on the last meeting date and heard a representative of the W. P. A. as he pounded on the table with his fist and loudly criticised the county because W. P. A. was paying so much for truck hire and getting so little in return.

This representative blamed the county because the caliche pit was bad. He blamed the county, not so much because its machinery was in a worn out condition but because the county's tractor driver was afraid he would be "shaken around" too much if he "opened the tractor up." And after hearing his criticisms, we decided that the county's side of the question should be presented.

When Mr. Burnside visited the project, we don't doubt but that he found the machinery just as he described it. But we wonder if he found six of his W. P. A. workers on top of that trap, holding down a 2-men job. Schleicher county people have reported this situation to us. We also wonder if Mr. Burnside's records show that 4 W. P. A. workers, in preparing to dynamite, dug 4 holes in one day, whereas 5 of our county men dug 27 holes in just half that time—and at a time when it was too cold for the W. P. A. to work! This has also been re-

ported to us.

We wonder again if he noticed the condition of the caliche pit while out there. His W. P. A. representative spent some time in court in condemning the pit, offering to locate another one and the court agreed to open it up if he would locate it. This old pit was opened before our present Court took office. We don't know who opened it, but surely the W. P. A. cannot blame our present Court because the pit is no good.

Another report that comes to us is that this "well built" loading trap is one of the most convenient our county men have ever tried to work with. Yet, it is said, that this W. P. A. labor spent some three weeks in constructing this trap along.

We wonder if Mr. Burnside noticed that one boss and one timekeeper were out there, over some 15 Mexicans and the three trucks he mentioned. And we wonder what his Mexicans and the hundreds of pounds of dynamite were doing while he was timing the trucks and taking particular pains to notice that our machinery was having trouble in getting caliche to the trap.

We wonder if he noticed where this project is located and if he went to it from Schleicher county's or Sutton county's end of the line. His two-mile project is out there where it can't possibly be reached by our people in wet weather, at which time it's needed the most. This project, like much of our road work in the past, is located so people can get away from instead of into Eldorado.

When Mr. Burnside was out here on Monday of last week, we're informed that he was taken to a W. P. A. project which was completed last summer, and was shown that the county was doing their job over. Is that results? And while this is being done, our Commissioners Court is being criticised, and justly so, because road work in some precincts has been neglected. We see no reason why we should have our machinery all tied up in a caliche pit, work part of a week with the W. P. A. have the W. P. A. put in its required hours and lay off and we're unable to accomplish any road work anywhere else before the W. P. A. is ready for the machinery again. People at Reynolds are being forced to go to Mertzon because they have no roads. Some of them have had their mail changed to Mertzon

because there's much of the time that they can't get to Eldorado. Are they not justified in criticising our Court because they have no road work? Are not the people in the other precincts entitled to have roads repaired, lakes filled, so they can have an open road to Eldorado?

Mr. Burnside indicated when here last week that this W. P. A. labor can be used on filling our lakes—our major problem—and that arrangements would be made to that effect. If he's half as anxious to get something to show for the money spent as his letter indicated, a means will be worked out whereby the county and the W. P. A. can cooperate. We believe he'll find our Commissioners' Court reasonable, but we do not believe our citizens will stand for the county road crews stopping everything else just so a little two-mile project out there in the southwest corner of the county can be continued.

It's up to the Commissioners' Court and the W. P. A.—either the district, state, or the Washington office—to work out a means whereby this work can be done effectively. And if the W. P. A. is too little to take a little criticism, we'll be among those to gladly wave her "good-bye" when she does pull up stakes and crosses the boundaries of our county for the last time.

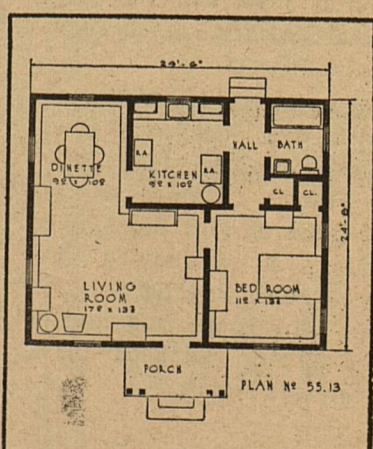
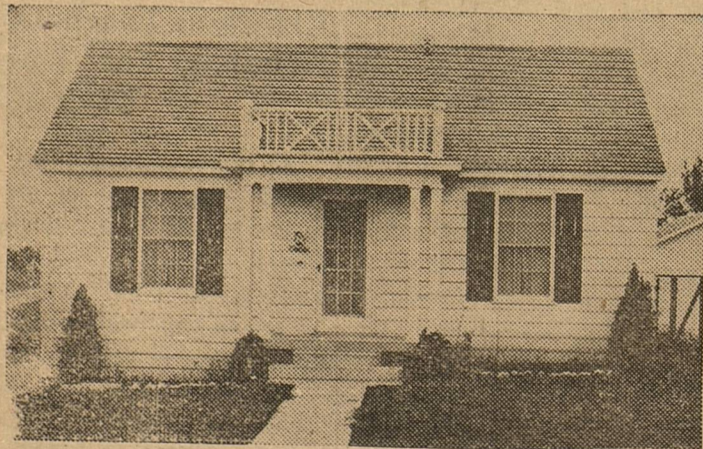

FIRST

Plaintiff says that he and those under whom he holds and derives title have had and held the actual, peaceable, adverse and exclusive possession of all the above described land for a period of ten consecutive years prior to February 22nd 1937, using, cultivating and enjoying the same, and during said period said lands were enclosed within a pasture containing less than 5000 acres, by virtue of which facts title has become vested and perfected in the plaintiff as against the claims of the defendant herein under the Ten Year's Statute of Limitation of this State, which Ten Year Limitation title plaintiff now pleads and relies upon as against the defendants herein.

FIFTH

Plaintiff further says that he and those under whom he derives title have had and held actual, peaceable, exclusive and adverse possession of all the above described lands, holding using, and enjoying the same under a claim of title and color of title derived from the sovereignty of the soil, for a period of more than three consecutive years prior to February 22nd 1937, and by virtue of which facts the title of this plaintiff has become vested in him under the Three Year's Statute of Limitation, which three years limitation title he now pleads and relies upon as against the defendants herein.

WHEREFORE, premises considered, plaintiff prays that citation issue to the defendants, commanding them to appear and answer herein, as required by law and that upon the trial hereof, plaintiff have judgement against the defendants for the title and possession of said land, and a decree removing the claim of the defendants as a cloud from the title of the plaintiff to said land, and for his damages, costs and such other further relief as he plaintiff may show himself

entitled to in law or in equity.

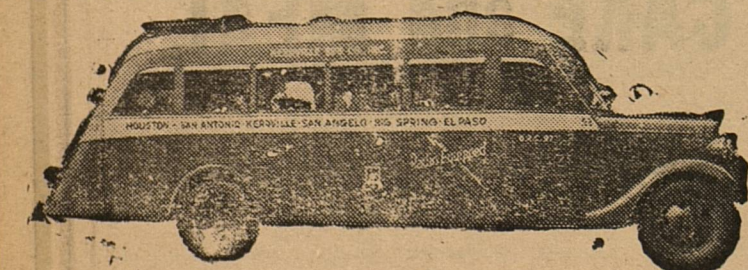

ELECTION ORDER

**THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF SCHLEICHER
CITY OF ELDORADO**

On this the 24th day of February, 1937, the City Council of Eldorado, Texas, convened in Special session at the regular meeting place in the city of Eldorado, with the following members present, to-wit:

- A. T. Wright, Mayor
- J. L. Ratliff, Alderman
- W. R. Jones, Alderman
- L. L. Baker, Alderman
- A. J. Roach, Alderman
- A. J. Atkins, City Secretary

Thereupon came on for consideration the question of an election to be held for the purpose of determining whether or not the City Council of the City of Eldorado, Texas, should be authorized and empowered to issue revenue bonds of the City of Eldorado, Texas, for the following named purpose to-wit:

"For the building and purchasing and improving, enlarging and extending, and repairing of a waterworks and sewer system in and for said City of Eldorado, Texas."

And it being considered to be to the best interest of said City of Eldorado, Texas, to issue said bonds, it was moved by Alderman J. L. Ratliff, seconded by W. R. Jones, and carried that said election aforesaid should be called for said purpose, in accordance with the following order:

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Eldorado, Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of said City for the purpose above set forth; therefore,

IT IS ORDERED BY THE CITY OF ELDORADO, TEXAS:

I. That an election be held on the 15 day of March A. D., 1937, at the Court House in the City of Eldorado, Texas, said date being not less than fifteen (15) days nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified voters of said City:

"Shall the City Council of the City of Eldorado, Texas, be authorized and empowered to issue bonds in the principal sum of One hundred twenty thousand, (\$120,000.00) dollars, to be payable serially over a period of not exceeding thirty (30) years from date, bearing interest at a rate of not exceeding four (4%) per cent per annum, and to mortgage, pledge and encumber the waterworks and sewer system in said City of Eldorado, Texas, and the franchise and income thereof for the payment of interest on said bonds and the creation of a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity, for the purpose of securing

funds for the building and purchasing and improving, enlarging, extending and repairing of a waterworks and sewer system in and for said City of Eldorado, Texas."

II. Said election shall be held at the Court House in said City of Eldorado, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of said election:

- F. M. Bradley, Presiding Judge,
- J. H. Rodgers, Clerk,
- W. N. Ramsay, Clerk.

III. Said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters who are property tax payers residing in the city limits of said City of Eldorado, Texas, and who have duly rendered their property for taxation shall be entitled to vote at said election.

IV. All voters desiring to vote in favor of the proposition to issue said bonds as above described shall have written or printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF WATERWORKS AND SEWER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS AND MORTGAGING AND ENCUMBERING SAID SYSTEM AND PLEDGING REVENUE THEREOF IN PAYMENT OF SAID BONDS."

And those opposed to the proposition of the issuance of said bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF WATERWORKS AND SEWER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS AND MORTGAGING AND ENCUMBERING SAID SYSTEM AND PLEDGING REVENUE THEREOF IN PAYMENT OF SAID BONDS."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State of Texas regulating general elections.

V. A copy of this order signed by the Mayor attested by the City Secretary of the City of Eldorado, Texas, shall be posted in each of the election precincts of said City and at the Court House and shall be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation, published within said City, the date of the first publication being not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election.

VI. The Mayor is hereby authorized and directed to cause said notices to be published as above set forth.

**Active Preparations
For 4-County League
Meet Announced**

Active preparation has begun in all literary events included in the Menard 4-County Meet, with the exception of extemporaneous speech. Practice for athletic events is beginning today.

Entries must be in the hands of Supt. T. A. Parker, director general, on or before March 17, according to the agreement made by the superintendents of the high schools of Schleicher, Sutton, Menard, and Kimble counties at the time of the organization of the 4-county meet.

The literary events to be included in the meet include a wide variety of events, and every Eldorado High School student should be able to find a suitable event to enter.

There are to be four divisions of declamation, Junior Boys and Girls, and Senior Boys and Girls. Declamation will count 7 points, 5 points, and 2 points for first, second and third places, respectively, toward the all-around literary championship. Mrs. Adrian is director.

Two divisions of debate will be held, Boys and Girls. Debate counts 20, 15, and 5 points toward the championship. Mr. Riddle is sponsor.

Boys and Girls extemporaneous speech will be held, and will count 15, 10, and 5 points. Why cannot we have students to enter this event?

One boy or girl from Eldorado High School may enter the Ready Writers, or Essay, contest. We have some good material for this contest. Miss Howell is directing this event, which counts 15, 10 and 5.

EHS may enter a team of two in spelling. Approximately twenty students are now working out under the leadership of Miss

Johnson. This event counts 15, 10, and 5 points toward all-around championship.

Eldorado will enter a team of three students in typewriting, which is coached by Miss Williams and which counts 20, 10 and 5 points. The typing team has already won one contest with Sonora.

Shorthand is a team event consisting of five students, the event counting 20, 10 and 5 points toward literary championship. About 10 students are now working out for this event under the direction of Mr. Smith.

According to the Menard officials, each first place winner in both literary and athletic events will be given a gold medal. The school winning all-around championship in literary events will be awarded an 18-inch bronze trophy, with the same prize to be given to the school winning high honors in track and field events. Sixty-six gold medals have been purchased for reward to first place winners. Each member of the winning teams in debate, spelling, and volley ball, and possibly in typewriting and shorthand, will be given a gold medal.

There are to be 13 events included in the High School track and field event. These events are 120 yards high hurdles, 100 yard dash, 880 yards run, 220 yards low hurdles, 440 yards dash, 220 yards dash, 1-mile run, 1-mile relay, pole vault, running broad jump, discus throw, running high jump, and 12-pound shot put. The first place winner in each of these events, and each member of the winning relay team, will receive a gold medal. Mr. Bynum will coach all high school track events.

In addition, there is to be a Junior High Track and Field Division. The events to be included are 50 yard dash, 100 yards dash, 440 yards relay, pull up, running high jump, and running broad jump.

Every student should try out for at least one event and do his or her part in representing Eldorado High School. There is no reason why EHS should not win a large number of the individual medals and even the all-around championship in either the literary or athletic division, or both.

In his preface, Dr. Hill gives credit to the research in Texas naval history of Dr. Alexander Dienst, of Temple, Texas, to Clarence R. Wharton, Houston attorney, to H. H. Fletcher, collector and rare book dealer of Houston, who informed him of the existence of contemporary drawings of Texas warships made by William Bollaert, now in the Newberry Library at Chicago, and reproduced in Dr. Hill's book, and to the staffs of the Texas State Library and the University of Texas archives.

A great deal of original material never before uncovered was obtained by Dr. Hill from Mexican sources, and from the private letters and newspaper and other contemporary collections of Texas families. Dr. Hill's interpretation of this new material has resulted in a different view of certain aspects of Texas history than that popularly held, contradicting early historians who contended that the colonization of Texas was a conspiracy of the Slavocracy, and showing how seaborne trade and the vagaries of the Mexican customs laws had much to do with the Texas revolt. In the foreground of the picture stands the dynamic, youthful Texan Commodore, Edwin Ward Moore, who hanged the mutineers from the yardarms of his flagship while he sailed to battle an overwhelmingly strong Mexican squadron that included steam frigates, skippered by high ranking English adventures on leave from the Royal Navy. The captains of his ships,—Jeremiah Brown, W. S. Brown, J. D. Boylan, Lieut. D. H. Crisp, Lieut. M. H. Dearborn, Commander A. C. Hinton, Captain W. A. Hurd, and other names who made Texas history, are vividly pictured as personalities and their part in battles and diplomacy related.

Dr. Hill had an adventurous personal history before he settled down to the classroom and college administration. During the World War he served on a destroyer. After graduation from Baylor in 1922, he went to sea again as a petty officer on merchant ships. In 1924 he took his Master's Degree at the University of Colorado, and in 1931 the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from the University of Minnesota, in the meantime teaching history, Spanish and economics in various colleges, including the Gulfcoast Military Academy and

the New Mexico School of Mines. Since the World War, and throughout his career as a college teacher and administrator, he has sustained what he calls an "extra-curricular" interest in national defense with service in the National Guards of New Mexico and Wisconsin. He is a Lieutenant Colonel, 120th Field Artillery of the Wisconsin National Guard. He is also the author of "Sea Dogs of the Sixties" published by the University of Minnesota Press last year, containing the biographies of four Northern and four Southern Naval Commanders during the Civil War.

Fat Stock Show At San Angelo To Open Saturday

SEVEN SPECIAL ACTS BOOKED FOR RODEO WITH WIDE RANGE EVENTS

SAN ANGELO, TEX.,—Seven special acts will be featured at the daily rodeo performances during the Fat Stock Show beginning next Saturday, Culbertson Deal, manager, has announced. There are two women trick riders, one male fancy rider, two trick and fancy ropers, one trained horse with his master and a clown with his trained mule.

Pauline Nesbitt and Reine Shelton are the women riders. Miss Nesbitt is new at the show here but has a "bag of riding tricks." Miss Shelton was here last year and was one of the performers.

Dick Griffith is back again with his trained riding horse.

Bob Calen and Chester Byers will twirl their lariats between events each afternoon. Both are tops in their line and have appeared here previously. Calen will be the announcer of the events while Byers will serve as one of the rodeo judges.

Murle Alexander, Vancouver youth, with his trained horse, "Smoky" has been signed for a seven-minute act during the rodeo program. Alexander's horse is two and a half years old and has been given training since 11-months old. The horse does about 35 tricks.

New to rodeo crowds this year will be Jimmy Nesbitt and his trained mule, "Billy Sunday." Nesbitt is from Denver and is one of the best rodeo clowns in the Southwest.

Emergency Crop And Feed Loans Are Being Taken Here

Applications for emergency crop and feed loans for 1937 are now being received at County Agents Office by L. S. R. Clarke, field supervisor of the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Section of the Farm Credit Administration.

These loans will be made only to farmers who cannot obtain credit from any other source, as provided by regulations issued by the Governor of the Farm Credit Administration. The money loaned will be limited to the farmer's immediate and actual cash needs for growing his 1937 crops or for the purchase of feed for livestock and in no instance may exceed \$400.

Farmers are not eligible for these loans if they can borrow from an individual, production credit association, bank, or other concern.

Emergency crop and feed loans will not be made by the Farm Credit Administration to standard rehabilitation clients of the Resettlement Administration

whose current needs are provided for by Resettlement.

As in the past, the security for these loans will consist of a first lien on the crop financed if the loan is for the production of crops, and if for the purchase of feed for livestock, then a first lien on the livestock to be fed. Landlords, or others having an interest in the crops or the livestock to be fed, will be required to waive their claims in favor of the lien to the Governor of the Farm Credit Administration until the loan is repaid.

Checks in payment of the approved loans will be issued by the Regional Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Office at Dallas.

The interest rate on these loans has been reduced from 5 1-2 percent to 4 percent. Applications in this county will be received by Joe Hearne Moore, who stated that a fee of \$1.00 will be charged for each application.

NOBODY'S BUSINESS

Safety Laws In Spotlight
Highway safety legislation took the spotlight in Austin again, as a house committee definitely turned down the plea of truck operators to double the present 7000-pound load limit on trucks. There were enough votes in committee to bring out a minority report, but observers here felt the chance of filling the highways with hugh trucks again was pretty slim, in view of the adverse committee recommendation.

Meanwhile a favorable report was brought out of a senate committee or a bill to permit merchants own products, but charging a delivery fee, to avoid regulation as common carriers. But Clint Small put on an amendment limiting the drivers of such trucks to 10 hours service daily

—which the safety folks claim would be a big factor in reducing the highway hazards created by drivers of such trucks who now work as high as 16 to 20 hours continuously, out of 24.

The house registered its strong approval of safety plans by passing to engrossment a greatly strengthened drivers' license bill, requiring license-holders to prove their ability to drive, and carrying other improvant provisions of the uniform national drivers' license law.
