Congressman R. E. Thomason Opposed Removal Of Fort

WASHINGTON, May 16.—The War Department's attitude in proposing to abandon a million dollar military establishment in order to create a similar one elsewhere was sharply criticized in the House of Representatives by Congressman R. E. Thomason of the sixteenth Texas district in a recent speech. Congressman Thomason offered an amendment to the War Department appropriation bill which would have prevented the removal of Fort D. A. Russell at Marfa before the end of another fiscal year, but the amendment was ruled not germane to the bill.

"This amendment seeks to prevent the abandonment of this post at a cost of a million dollars during this fiscal year," Congressman Thomason said. "It is a matter of both economy and protection. All through this bill are items for the transportation of soldiers, and I hold in my hand a letter from General Moseley, the deputy chief of staff, written last week to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, in which he said that on the first day of next January they are going to move the soldiers from Fort Russell to Camp Knox, Ky."

"It strikes me that the Congress ought to have something to say about that when the taxpayers are the ones paying for it. For the time being I will lay aside the question of the protection of my people along that far-flung Mexican border, but I will say that the War Department is not dealing in good faith with those people. Fort Russell is a permanent post, and the record so shows. They spent more than a million dollars there, and now, without consulting Congressmen, and without good reason, the department, through General Moseley, writes to the Speaker of this House and says, 'On the first day of January we are going to abandon Fort Russell and ship those soldiers to Camp Knox, Ky,' which is nothing more than an old cantonment, with a plot of temporary buildings."

"That is where your money goes. When that is done you will be asked to appropriate a million dollars to improve Camp Knox."

"The amendment looks to the saving of untold thousands of dollars in the transportation of 600 soldiers and their horses and equipment, as well as the abandonment of more than a million dollars worth of property along the Mexican border; and if soldiers are needed anywhere it is there."

Slim Hendershot, proprietor of the establishment was arrested and charged with possession of the intoxicants for the purpose of sale. He was released under bond of \$1,000.00 for the action of the grand jury.

Officers first visited the place early in the evening and found the whiskey, they later returned, found the beer and proceeded to break more than 600 bottles of the liquid. They also poured out the barrel of beer mash.

Beer For Revenue Rejected In House By 228-169 Vote

(Dallas News) WASHINGTON, May 23.—The House rejected beer-for-revenue Monday, but in so doing rounded out for the 1932 campaign the most complete prohibition record of any Congress since the Volstead act.

The vote was 228 to 169 against a motion to bring up the O'Conner-Hull bill to tax 2.75 per cent beer at 3c a pint. Party lines were obliterated, just as when submission of the prohibition issue in a proposed new amendment to the Constitution was defeated last March, 227 to 187.

Joining with eighty-five Democrats for the bill were eighty-three Republicans and one Farmer-Laborite. The March vote on submission brought together ninety Democrats and ninety-seven Republicans.

Galleries Crowded
Floor and galleries were crowded during the balloting, but there was a noticeable lack of the tension that marked the submission roll call Monday, as then, the vote was forced thru with a discharge petition signed by 145 members.

Debate was limited to twenty minutes, but even before discussion began, Representative Blanton (Dem.), Texas, a prohibitionist, sought to block the vote with a parliamentary objection. He contended a second vote relating to the Eighteenth Amendment was not in order.

Four Month Infant Undergoes Operation

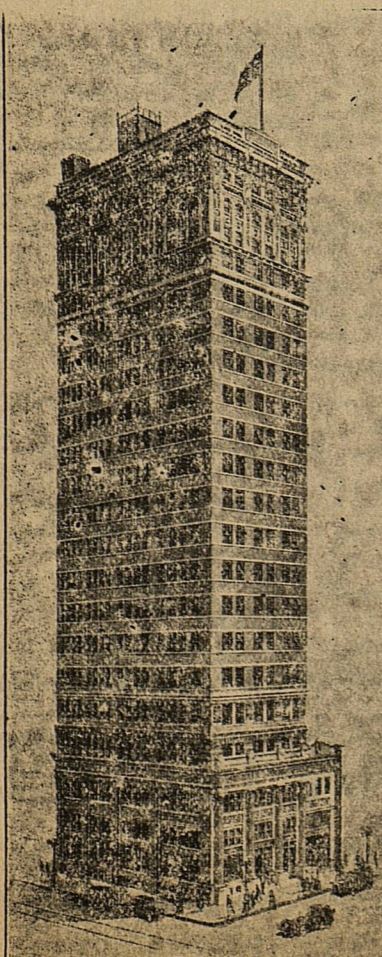

A life time of observation has taught me that all human institutions tend to deteriorate. They begin well and then gradually graduate downward. Governments begin by embodying high ideals in their constitution and laws and under them every one is comparatively happy and prosperous. But the longer they live the farther they depart from their original ideals. This declining condition is seldom the deliberate planning of some sinister individual or group of persons, but is due to some fundamental error embodied in the original draft. This error is so small at first that it escapes notice. But its an amazing power of growth, and it keeps on developing from within, until, like a cancer it consumes or appropriates to itself all the life forces of the body it inhabits. And like a cancer, it is very difficult to cure. The institution must eradicate the disease or die. Always many remedies are suggested. Our South American neighbors as well as many in Europe try revolution, only to discover that the remedy is worse than the disease.

Others, again pass law of laws, until the citizenary are confused by the multitude. This also fails.

I have heard talk of revolution in this country, as a way out of our difficulties. But of course it won't work here any better than it works in countries which have tried it. If we could turn back the pages of our national history until we come upon the first appearance of the evil and ruthlessly eradicate it there, we might start from there with a prospect of healthy growth. What we need is to return to simplicity of the Jeffersonian period. In his day the government cost the tax payers 20 cents per head. Now it is costing more than a hundred dollars per capita to run the nation. Some change for the worse, eh?

There is this encouragement. No institution can enlist the interests of mankind unless it shows real merit. If a body of statesmen should present a government, such as the U. S. is today, for adoption, the people would reject it at once. This indicates that our people are sound at bottom and will eventually right the abuses. But in the meantime millions will for the folly of the immediate past. Oh for a Moses to lead us out of the wilderness, or a Messiah to appear in the political world as Jesus did in the religious world and solve our problems for us. But I suppose he would find it just as difficult to get followers as in days of old.

TEXAS INDUSTRIAL ACTIVITIES

Newton veener plants recently received orders for fifty carloads of tub bushel baskets, chiefly for delivery at Pacific Coast points. Full time operation for at least two months is insured by orders on hand.

What industrial development does is proved by a comparison between New England and Texas, approximately of the same size. Texas has 131,503 industrial workers with an annual payroll of \$147,888,052. New England has 1,100,043 industrial workers with an annual payroll of \$1,345,092,011. Texas income taxes for 1930 totaled \$31,064,743; New England's \$102,367,974. Is not the industrialization of Texas worthy of a real effort?

Bolivar Point, across the bay from Galveston, is the site of a new fertilizer plant which is making use of refuse shrimp heads and marl. Experiments have developed two mixtures, one for the sandy land and one for the heavy black land. The plant not only is supplying a useful article, but is keeping off the beach a lot of waste materials that would be unsightly.

Texas furnishes both the warp and the wool for "Palm Beach" cloth, the warp being West Texas cotton and the wool being mohair, 80 per cent of the United States production of which comes from Texas. The president of the company is a

native Texan.

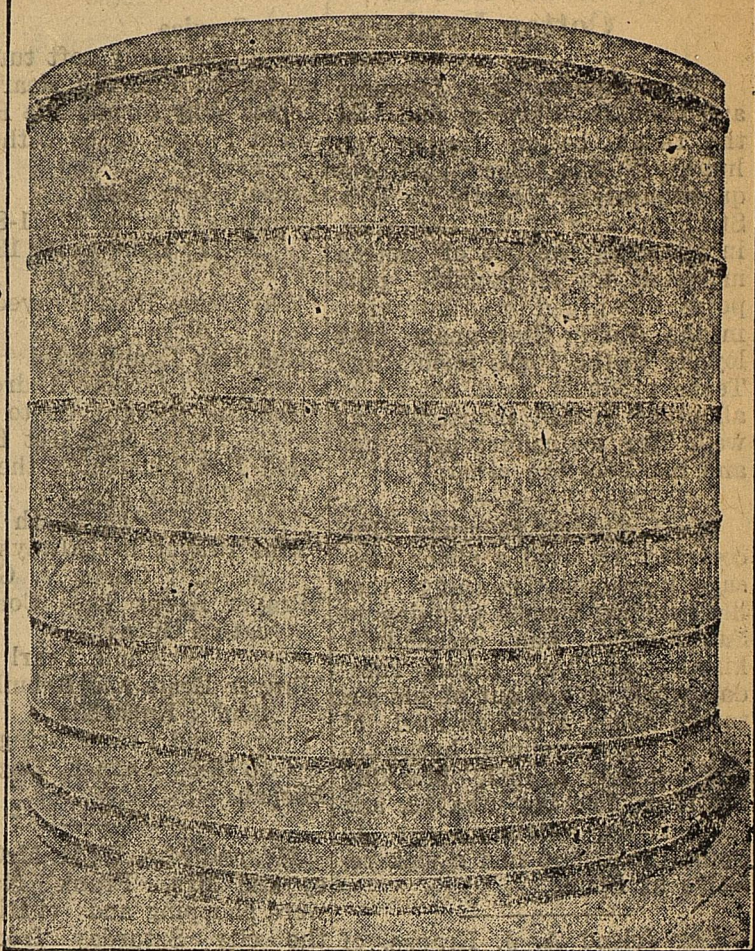

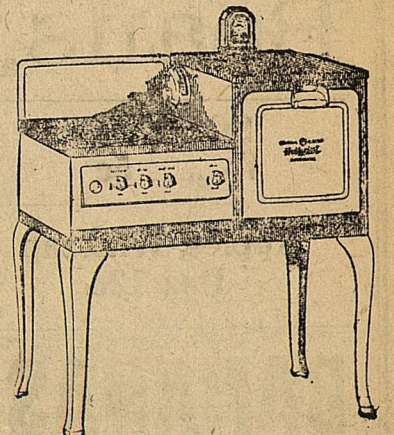

The frog, of course, was a bull frog. But this is a true story.



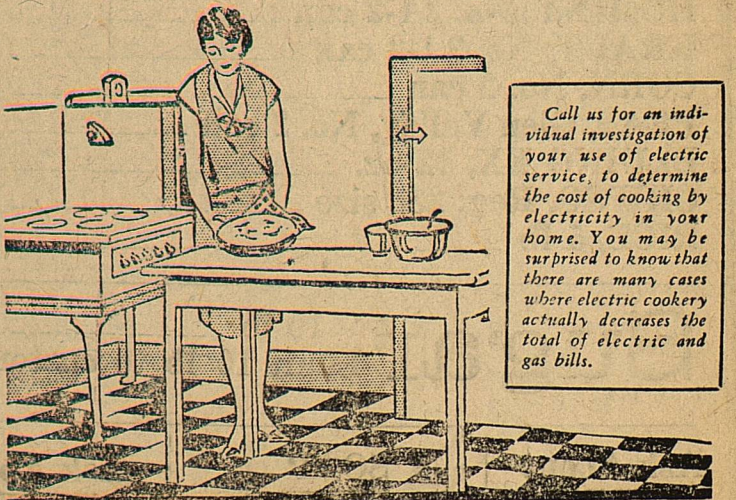

ETHICS OF BANKING

We must not take unfair advantage of our competitors. It is entirely proper for us by legitimate means to obtain all the business that we can, but in doing so we ought to do nothing that will injure our competitors and that will destroy the confidence which the banks must repose in each other and which the community at large must repose in the banks as a whole if we are going to thrive, and remember always we cannot thrive separately. We shall either all thrive together or all suffer disaster.

Sentiment in Banking

No sentiment in banking? Will you recall just one day's activity at your desk—what were the problems you considered? Did they apply solely to the cold-blooded conduct of the affairs of your bank, weighing, measuring, analyzing, valuing securities, extending credit, driving the best bargains possible, having in mind only the material return from your day's labor? Certainly such is not the case. I recall many days—happy days, too—in my experience in a very small country bank, in which I am sure not one-tenth of my time was given to the real consideration of the financial returns to my institution.

Open Markets

I believe in an open market for the actual purchase and sale both of commodities and securities. But so long as the actual rate for credit in this country swings up and down according to the demand for funds for speculative purposes, little influenced by central or other banking policy, then something is wrong somewhere. Moreover, if business is influenced—as is almost universally charged—by the state of public mind; and if the state of public mind is influenced, as in recent years it most certainly has been, to run the scale from extreme optimism to extreme pessimism according to the characters on a ticker tape, then something is wrong with the public mind, or the conduct of the forces back of the tape. Those responsible must provide the answer.

ON TEXAS FARMS

A Wood county farmer who has been in the habit of borrowing \$80 to \$100 at the bank every spring applied for only \$15 this year. Asked the reason he said he had lots of feed, and the "canning woman" had taught his wife how to can and saved him lots of money.

Mrs. J. B. Morrison, a Kent county garden demonstrator has solved the problem of rats in her vegetable hot bed. She dissolves a few strychnine crystals in fruit jar lids placed at each end of the bed. The rats die before leaving.

Small strawberry patches pay according to Mrs. C. C. Burrows, Wichita county home demonstration club woman, who sold 60 gallons of berries in April at 60 cents per gallon from a plot 13 by 35 feet started with 275 plants three years ago.

Eighteen Gaudalupe county families have been helped to can 1070 containers of meat by Mrs. Alvin Schulz of the Cibolo Home Demonstration Club. This is in line with state plans which encourage those benefited by Extension work to extend the benefits to others.

Sugar beet production to supplement heavy grain rations of cows and other livestock is planned by farmers and 4-H club boys in Hale county this year, the county agent reports.

Interest in pecan improvement has increased more rapidly in Gillespie county since budded trees now bearing have produced nuts that sell for 20 cents per pound compared to 3 or 4 cents per pound for natives, says the county agent. County Judge Usener who has prepared budding cloth for demonstrators every year for six years has exhausted his year's supply of 30,000 cloths.
