





**STATE FAIR PREMIUM LIST READY IN JULY**

The premium list of the State Fair of Texas will be ready for distribution after July 1, it has been announced here by Roy Rupard, secretary of the exposition, and will be mailed to exhibitors, county agents, vocational agricultural directors, poultry breeders and artists throughout the entire country. A total of 15,000 premium list will be distributed between now and the opening of the State Fair, Mr. Rupard announced. All agricultural awards, livestock premiums, poultry prizes and awards in all departments of the State Fair of Texas are shown in the premium list.

**TOMATO GROWERS MAY GET GOOD PRICE FOR CROP, CANON SAYS**

AUSTIN, Texas, June 20.—East Texas tomato growers probably will get a profitable price for the bulk of this season's crop, W. A. Canon, chief of the markets division of the Department of Agriculture, forecasts. The late March freeze, while seriously curtailing production, also had the effect of delaying the crop. Because of the delay, the peak of tomato movement from Texas will not be reached until after large movements from Florida and Mississippi are completed, he said.

Last year Texas' crop began moving the peak of Florida's shipment and concurrently with that of Mississippi. This year, so far, virtually all of Florida's crop and the bulk of Mississippi's has moved while the Texas crop is just starting to the markets. Daily shipment records show that very few cars are moving from other states. Under those conditions, with the supply diminishing as the bulk of Texas' crop reaches the market, Texas growers are due to get better prices than had their crop moved with the others, Canon said. The bulk of Texas' crop goes to Kansas City, St. Louis, Chicago, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, New York and Boston. Present prices for first grade tomatoes range from \$1 to \$2.25 per lug.

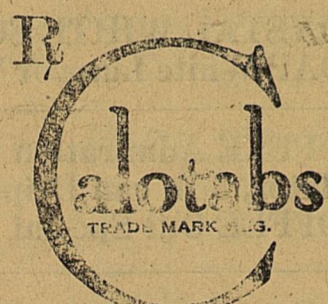

It is taken from one of a series of advertisements being used by Texas Railroad to "educate" the people of Texas as to why the railroads should have more business than the trucks—or something. It's a sort of advance notice to legislators to hope for the best and prepare for the worst. In other words, it's to warn the lawmakers that there is going to be more railroadinf done in the next legislature than is usually the case.

The reason I know this is because a fellow who hangs around the capital quite a bit and writes for a number of Texas newspapers has just issued a list of "prospective grist" for legislative hopper, in which the following list of bills—with a locomotive smell—appear:

"Repeal or amendment of cotton truck law; regulate interstate motor truck and bus transportation; regulate motor trains adjust transportation rates; abolish railroad commission; permit abandonment of rail lines; limit length of freight and passenger trains; protect railways from 'unfair competition' of truck lines, travel bureaus, waterways, pipelines or airways."

Whether the prospective bills have any merit, I do not know. I have never owned a railroad, nor a truck line. I have never asied the Reconstruction Finance Corporation for a dime—and have yet to feel any beneficial effects from the loans they made to the railroads or any other corporation. I believe everyone else feels the same way about that, including the railroads.

Not that it makes any difference to President Hoover, but I believe that unless Wall Street stops making the railroads borrow money from the government to pay to the bankers for interest on bonds Uncle Sam is going to have a lot of "frozen" engines and freight cars on his hands.

**GOOD ADVICE FOR A SAFE FOURTH OF JULY**

This year most of the nation will celebrate the Fourth of July with a three-day holiday. Such a long period for recreation is awaited eagerly by us all. Yet its unusual length doubles the hazards and danger to which we will be exposed.

Independence Day is known as the worst accident day of the year. This year may break the tragic record unless everyone guards himself closely and observes all safety rules. A list of "don'ts," all excellent advice, has been prepared by the National Bureau of Casualty and Surety Underwriters and follows:

- If you drive your car—Drive Safely:
1. Don't drive recklessly—it's a long holiday and there's plenty of time.
  2. Don't take out your car unless it is in first class condition.
  3. Don't drive on the wrong side of the road—keep to the right.
  4. Don't drive too long without resting—mental lapses due to fatigue cause accidents.
  5. Don't pass other cars unless you have a clear view ahead; don't cut in and out of traffic lines; don't pass or fail to slow down at intersections.
- If you go swimming—Swim Safely:
1. Don't attempt marathon races by swimming too long or too far.
  2. Don't venture out into too deep water if you're not a strong swimmer.
  3. Don't swim away from the crowd—"In unity there is strength."

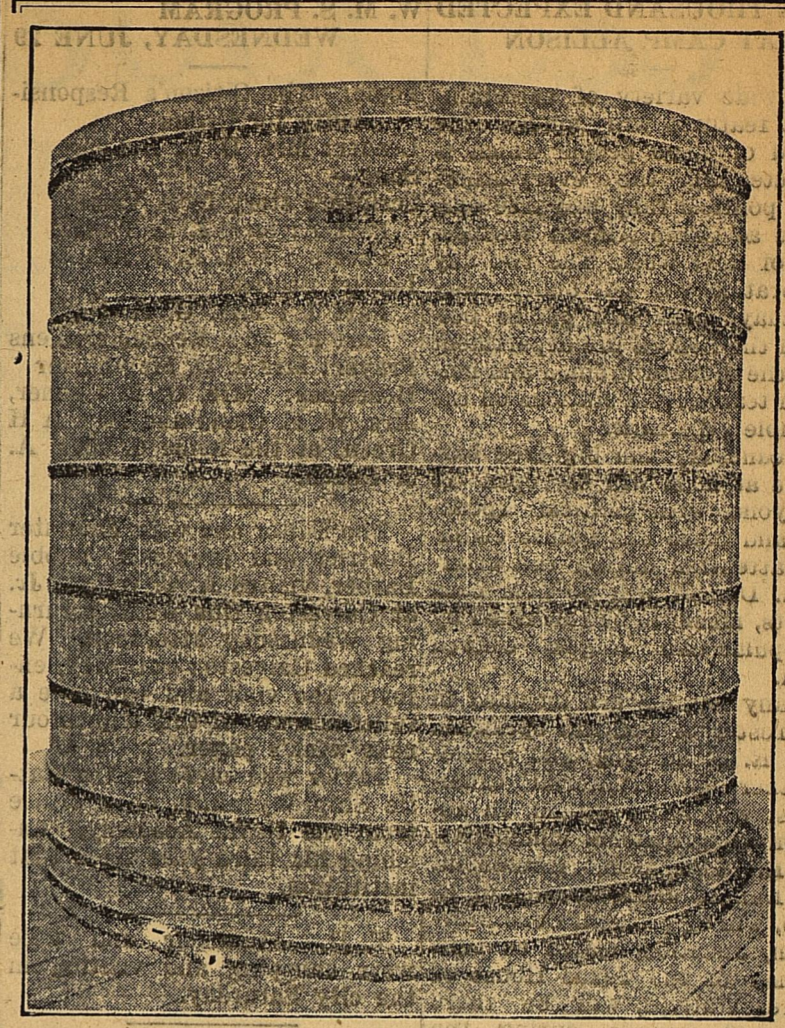
**SPONSORS CHOSEN FOR TEXAS COWBOY REUNION**

**EAST TEXANS BECOME SELF-PROVIDING BY LIVE AT HOME PLAN**

AUSTIN, Tex. June 21.—East Texas farmers are "really living at home this year," and will be even more self-providing next year, says E. T. Crozier, in charge of sweet potato certification for the Department of Agriculture, who spends much of his time in that area. In contrast to former years, the East Texans are producing their own milk, meat, butter and eggs; feedstuffs for their livestock; and are canning and preserving surplus vegetables and fruit, Crozier relates.

While the freeze considerably thinned out the peach crop, tending to make the peaches larger because of fewer per tree, the growers are not anticipating high prices and are not making plans for the marketing of many but are preparing to consume them at home, canning the surplus for winter use, Crozier said. The same is true of the strawberry crops.
