Producer And Distributor Pull Together

We have been thinking that it would be interesting to have Schleicher County food merchants cooperate with producers of this community in an extensive week-long campaign to stimulate demand for home-grown foodstuff. This special drive would be in line with our belief that the best form of farm relief lies in waging aggressive campaigns on behalf of agriculture.

The system has performed a great service to apple growers and to citrus fruit dealers. Stores in the East and in California advertised and featured apples when apple growers were confronted with an exceptionally large crop that was difficult to dispose of.

It would be an excellent idea if grocery stores, in Schleicher County, follow similar plans. It would cost the retailer a little—and both he and the producer would reap substantial benefits. Good display methods, plus good advertising, can attract public interest to all manner of worth-while products grown right at home, and create a much larger demand than would exist if no sales efforts were employed.

The food purchaser and the food distributor have a great deal in common—and the interest of each can be greatly advanced by coopera-

A little lesson in cooperating together will do more good than all the trade-at-home stuff we have heard for the past 10 years. Let's try the plan.

Work For The Fire Department

An up-to-date department has three duties. First, it should strive to prevent fire, through property inspections and by publicizing ways and means of removing the unnecessary and dangerous common hazards that are responsible for a great majority of blazes.

Second, it must fight fire once it has broken out—and to do this successfully it must be equipped with fire aparatus, it must have a trained personnel.

If Eldorado is to have a well organized fire department we must have the equipment in order to train the men. We have enough volunteer firemen to have an up-to-date organization. All of you who are interested in this allimportant problem begin to do a little constructive thinking. Don't sit back and "Let George do it." We've talked enough—let's do something.

Third, the fire department should carry on salvage work as a matter of regular routine, in order to save as much property as possible after the fire has struck.

The consequences of fire are always badbut a good fire department well equipped can mitigate them. A fire department is essential and fullfills a need to any community.

Texas Exposition Gathers Speed In **Exhibitors' Rush**

Building Program Takes Form As 5,000 Workmen Labor 24 Hours a Day

DALLAS, Texas .- Three shifts of workmen-close to 5,000 men working 24 hours a day-are rushing the Texas Centennial Exposition's buildings toward completion by the opening date.

The Exposition's own \$15,000,000 construction program is well under way. The City of Dallas has broken ground on its \$3,500,000 program, constituting seven permanent buildings which will form a vast civic cultural center when the Exposition is over. The State of Texas is racing work on the \$1,200,000 Hall of State, one of the show pieces of the fair. The Federal Government has its two buildings-the Federal Building and the Hall of Negro Life and Cultureready to leave the drafting room stage and become realities.



The Eldorado Seventh Grade ranked 29th in competition with a total of 260 other schools in the State as measured by a series of tests issued by the State Deparment of Education last May. An examination was given in each of the subjects in the 7th grade. The seventh grade subjects were taught by H. D. Irby, present Grammar School Principal, and Miss Ruth Howell, now a teacher in the Sanderson

In reading, the Eldorado average of the 28 students taking the test was 24.44. The average for the 260 schools taking the test was 22.29. Eldorado ranked 71st in the state in this subject.

In English, the Eldorado score was 30.30, the average for the state 26.06. Eldorado ranked! 33rd in the state in English.

In spelling, the state average score was 29.54, the Eldorado score 32.35, which gave Eldorado a rank of 38th in the state.

In United States History, Eldorado made a score of 30.03, while the state average score was only 26.28, giving Eldorado a rank in the state of 57.

In Geography, the state average was 28.60, while the Eldorado score was 32.35, giving our school a rank in the state of 37.

In Citizenship, the Eldorado score was 24.85, the state score 23.63, giving Eldorado a rank of

In health, the Eldorado score was 34.14, the state score 30.73, giving Eldorado a rank of 51. In Arithmetic, the Eldorado score was 28,28, the state score only 22.56, giving Eldorado a rank in the state of 30.

Miss Howell and Mr. Irby are to be commended for their splendid work in teaching as shown by the state-wide tests. Mr. R. D. Holt was superintendent of schools at the time these tests were taken.
