
This poor man cried, and the Lord neard him, and saved him out of all his troubles.—Psalm

"The highway department of a state should be free of executive interference, and this administration has maintained a hands-1910 to 1920 which represents off policy," said Gov. Allred. "The highway department should and every person connected with it should be free to think, speak and vote as he pleases.

"When we get good highways into every rural section, then will be the time to talk about reduction or cessation of taxes for high way purposes. I was opposed to diverting highway revenues for purposes other than highway building two years ago, and I still stand on that statement. The use of gasoline taxes to retire bonds voted to pay for roads now not offer Ethiopia as an example in the state system has brought untold relief to taxpayers. I have no patience, however, with any scheme to divert any further funds for any purpose from the revenues now collected from motorists to pay for highways; nor with taking any random chances to substitute other forms of tax revenue for what we have."

Allred's Answer

The governer's speech was interpreted by observers as an answer both to one candidate for governor who would summarily wreck the present well-tested method of financing road-building in Texas, and to certain wealthy bond brokers who bought up millions of county road bonds at depression prices, and now seek to make the state use its availa-The Bureau of Printing En- ble road-building money to pay graving will be required to print off these "dead horses" at an 38,000,000 "baby bonds" to pay enormous profit to the holders of such bonds.

It takes the special knowledge which a physician has acquired to discover and remove any physical or mental handicap which threatens a child's well-being. A fall checkup is made of these same children with the result that the child entering school for the first time may be as free from physical and menal handicaps as possible.

It is a most essential factor in the life of each child that he be free from all physical defects in order that he may do his best work when in school. The child has allowed to play most of his time until he comes of school, age, so it is most important that all handicaps be removed when he is asked to take up that part of his career which has to do with his mental training. The child who does not hear or see well would be able to get the same benefits from his school work as



In the demonstration of cooking strongly flavored vegetables, Miss Farnsworth explained that cabbage, spinach, brussels sprouts cauliflower, brocolli and mustard contain sulphur compound, and when cooked give off hydrogen sulphide which makes the odor Slow cooking in a small amount of water brings this on; so in order to prevent the development of bad taste and odor they should be cooked in a large amount of water in an uncovered vessel for the shortest possible time. They should not be cooked in a steam er or in a pressure cooker.
