# Agricultural Agent Texas A. & M. Corrège Extension Service

The alfalfa weevil is a pest of alfalfa that becomes active in early spring after having overwintered as adults in the crown of alfalfa plants and in trash left in the field, or, as eggs in the old alfalfa stem.

The adult weevil is a snout beetle about 1/4 inch long, light brown with a dark stripe running about halfway down the back from the head. Older weevils may be much darker in coloration. Eggs are bright lemon yellow when first laid and are deposited in masses in stems.

The newly hatched larvae are approximately 1/20 of an inch long and are cream colored with a shiny black head. Mature larvae are about 3/8 inch long, dark green, and possess a white to yellowish - white stripe down the middle of the back paralleled by two faint white stripes on each side. Pupae areusually attached to the dead leaves of the lower third of the plant and adults emerge from the pupae in one to two weeks.

Generally only one generation of alfalfa weevils are produced each growing season. As the overwintered weevils become active in early spring, females lay eggs in clusters in the stems of the alfalfa, These eggs hatch in one to two weeks in warm weather. The newly hatched larvae feed within the plant tips of opening upper leaves and then the lower foliage, skeletonizing the leaves. They are most

insecticides should be mum applied. An insecticide treatment is usually necessary when 25 to 30% of the terminals show damage or if 25 or more larvae per square foot are found.

The application rate should be from 15-20 gallons of spray per acre where ground equipment is used and at least two gallons per acre when application is made by airplane.

For details on recommended insecticides and harvest intervals after application, you can call the county extension office, 669-7479.

One way of making nutrients available to plants gradually is to apply time release fertilizers.

Time-release fertilizers are plastic coated pills, tablets or other special packages containing essential soil nutrints that dissolve into the soil gradually when moisture penetrates the plastic coating. The warmer and more moist the soil is, the faster the pill disintegrates and releases nutrients.

One advantage timerelease fertilizers have over other types of fertilizer is that they are easier to apply to the soil. Since these ferti-80 yard hurdles, third in lizers become available over a period of months or even years, fewer applications are required.

Range seedings, like pasture plantings, also protect the land from erosion while increasing its carrying capacity.

lity forage. Although, pasture plantings greatly increase forage production, it is essential that intensive management practices be applied for the stand to survive and continue optimum production. Such practices includefertilizer application, weed control, grazing management, fencing, and in some cases irrigation. Pasture plantings generally require a greater investment per acre as opposed to range seedings, although gross receipts are also generally greater with pasture plantings.

Range seedings basically strive to restore the land to its optimum natural cover. Generally a mixture of grasses native to the particular site are planted and establishment of the stand as a rule is slower than pasture plantings. The advantage of a range seeding over a pasture planting is that it generally does not require intensive management practices to maintain a good stand. Range seedings will generally maintain a strong stand with proper grazing management.

Range seedings and pasture plantings both establish quicker and last longer if planted into a well prepared seedbed. anchers often plant a sorghum or small grain crop on acres to be seeded to help prepare the s edbed, eliminate brush and weeds, and build up a moisture supply in the soil. When a cover crop is planted prior to seeding, it should be close spaced, on the contour, and the stubble should stay on
