### BANGS DISEASE TESTING

A relatively new method of re-certifying counties that have been tested for Bangs has been put into effect the last two years. This method is meeting with the overwhelming approval of most cattlemen. Before this new method went into effect, it was necessary for testing crews to go back into counties once every three years and test 20 per cent of all the herds and re-test all herds that previously had showed suspects or reactors. The new method being used is in cooperation with packing houses. As cull cows go to these packing houses they are tested as they are slaughtered. A record is kept by the Texas Animal Health Commission on each county. These cumulative totals are kept monthly. If a county has a total of 20 per cent of their breeding cattle tested by means of the packing house method, then a full-fledged testing will not be necessary at the end of the three-year period. It is my understanding that ranch testing will still be done in herds that had previous reactors during the immediately preceding test. According to Dr. C. M. Patterson, our extension veterinarian, we have been credited in Gray County with a total of 1,257 tested cows this year. It appears the much dreaded ranch testing will be pretty well eliminated when our three year test is next due. This will be good news to all ranchers. This would really be good news to faithful lineup men such as Charlie Webb and W. W. Boyd.

### CATTLE PRICES

Forgive me for writing on this subject again. I met two McLean ranchers last Sunday that wanted to sell me some stocker calves at 30 cents. On second thought . . . How much does a choice 400 pound stocker steer lack being worth 30 cents on today's market? With June futures hitting \$28.65, August \$28.75, and October \$28.95 last Monday, I say your steer calves are too cheap at the 30-cent mark. If you have a home for some stocker steers where you can put on a cheap gain from now to a date 130 days prior to one of the above delivery dates, it is possible to show a substantial profit on some of these 30 cent steers by executing a hedge on the futures market. The local finished market has not been more than about \$1.25 per cwt under the market as established by the Chicago board of trade at the time of delivery. The cost of selling a contract and buying it back costs only eight cents per cwt on a 1,000 pound steer. This means in effect, when you sell a futures contract for June at \$28.65 you are contracting to take \$27.22 per cwt on a 1,000 pound finished steer. Feeding cost from a 600 pound steer to 1,000 pounds shouldn't exceed 22 cents. Some feeders have been getting gains for 21 cents. The rest of this problem is just 7th grade arithmetic.

How much will it cost you to make the 400 pound calf into a 600 pound yearling? You should be able to do this well below the 22 cent feed lot cost. In visiting with Blair Hankins last week at Merrill Lynch, Pierce Fenner, and Smith Stock Brokers, he said they have several thousand such hedging contracts. Before you go into this, look before you leap, but I'll assure you it will work.

## Deferred Grazing Of Value to Rancher

Many ranchers think of deferred grazing as a loss of grazing. Research and experience show that deferred grazing increases the amount of grass produced. One experiment carried out on the blue grama and buffalo grass showed that the ungrazed range produced 1,800 pounds of dry grass per acre. Grass clipped every three weeks produced 1,100 pounds of grass per acre. Grass clipped every four weeks produced 1,300 pounds of grass per acre, and grass clipped every two weeks produced 575 pounds of grass per acre.

The reason that ungrazed grass produces more is that 95% of the weight of grass plants comes from the carbon, hydrogen, oxygen and water taken by the plant from the air. These elements are taken in through the leaves. The more leaves you have the more elements are taken in. Minerals from the soil make up about 5% of the weight of the plant. Deferred grazing allows the low vigor plants to increase in size and build a strong root system. This is especially true following brush control and where you have stunted grasses in low vigor.

Experience and research show that if you have two pastures that will safely carry 20 head per pasture the year round, the 40 head can be put in one pasture during the growing season and the other pasture can be deferred during the growing season. After the growing season, the 40 head can be put on the deferred pasture during the winter months.

## Questionnaires for Veterans Due Dec. 1

Annual income questionnaires and dependency questionnaires for veterans and their dependents will be included this year with November checks received on Dec. 1. Jack Coker, manager of the Veterans Administration regional office in Waco, said today. Approximately 80,000 questionnaires will be mailed to beneficiaries residing within the Waco regional office area.

Questionnaires will be sent to all veterans and widows on the VA pension rolls and parents of deceased veterans who are receiving dependency and indemnity compensation as of October, 1966. Dependency questionnaires will also be dispatched this year to parents of deceased veterans receiving death compensation and to veterans in receipt of additional disability compensation by reason of a dependent parent.

Completed questionnaire cards should be returned promptly to the VA but in any event before Jan. 31, 1967, so that pension payments may be continued. The envelope enclosed with the questionnaire should be used for mailing.

Veterans and beneficiaries may obtain assistance in completing the questionnaire card by visiting a contact office of the Veterans Administration or by contacting a local representative of any approved service organization or county service office.

## Water Study to Be Held in Spearman

Water rights will be under study in Spearman Saturday, Dec. 3, at an institute for lawyers of 16 area counties.

## TIGERS LOSE BI-DISTRICT TILT FRIDAY

McLean's 1966 football season ended officially last Friday when the Tigers lost the bi-district game to the White Deer Bucks, 37-8, before 3,000 fans.

McLean fullback, Raymond Baker, went over the one-yard mark early in the second period for the Tigers' first and only touchdown. Baker ran across the conversion and the Tigers led temporarily 8-7.

Baker paced the Tigers in rushing, as he has done all season, carrying the ball 31 times for 108 yards, an average of 3.4 yards per carry. After the Tigers' touchdown, the Bucks took over and made another touchdown, leaving the Bucks leading 21-8 at halftime.

White Deer picked up a touchdown and a safety in the third period to run them to a lead of 29-8.

The winners picked up their final touchdown in the fourth quarter when their tailback, Veron Marlar, bucked for 37 yards in a 50-yard march, scoring from 9 yards out for the third time.

Marlar ran over the conversion to end the scoring with 9:25 left in the game, making it 37-8.

Bands from both the high schools put on a good performance during the halftime intermission. The Tiger Band has done a good job performing at halftime this year.

## MEREDITH GETS CATFISH

An additional 8,000 blue catfish fingerlings from the Sheldon State Fish Hatchery have been released in the new Meredith Reservoir on the Canadian River, according to fishery biologist Jack Crabtree of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department staff.

Fishery workers also released 146,000 channel catfish.

Blue catfish, the largest of all freshwater catfish, can exceed 150 pounds. Channel catfish may reach 30 pounds, but a 20-pounder is considered a very large channel cat said Crabtree.

## Filing Deadline Near For Cotton Transfers

Farm operators in Gray County are reminded that applications for the transfer of cotton allotments for the 1967 crop should be filed with the county office no later than Jan. 3, 1967.

Evelyn Mason, county office manager Gray County ASCS, explained that notices of the cotton allotment and the projected yield for individual farms have already been mailed to county farmers, so farm operators now are in a position to make their production plans for next season.

In Gray County, growers voting in a special referendum earlier in the year failed to approve transfer of acreage allotments—by sale or lease—out of the county, so the transfer of allotment locally may be made from one farm to another within the county. In no case may allotments be transferred to another farm outside the state.

Transfer of allotments from one farm to another within the county and the transfer of allotments between farms (within the state) which are owned or controlled by the same owner are both authorized by law and not subject to approval in a referendum. However, it is necessary that such transfers of allotments be filed with the ASCS county office before the deadline.

The Jan. 3, 1967, deadline, therefore, applies to all transfers of 1967 cotton allotments for Gray County farms—whether by sale, lease or the owner. Producers may buy, sell or lease cotton for any price agreement to both parties involved and only need to report the transfer to the county office by Jan. 3.

**NEWS OF CONSERVATION**

By VAN C. MILLS  
 Lee Roy McCracken has installed 1,500 feet of 1-inch plastic pipe to furnish water for livestock. Lee Roy is using this pipe to carry water from one of his mills to another pasture. In many cases it is much more feasible to pipe water than to put in a mill or pond. McCracken is receiving cost-share assistance through the Great Plains Conservation Program on this project.

Since the Great Plains Conservation Program started in 1958 there have been 139 Great Plains Conservation plans developed. These plans cover about 227,000 acres. During the 1966 fiscal year, 20 Great Plains plans were developed covering 30,900 acres.

Meadow Management Important  
 Meadow management is very important if we are to maintain a high yield of good quality forage. Continuous close mowing and grazing year after year will kill out or stunt the vigor of the important meadow grasses such as eastern grama grass, Indiangrass, switchgrass and bluestems. Under poor management the better grasses will be replaced by short inferior grasses such as drop seeds, salt grass and grama grasses.

Meadows should have regular periods of summer deferment every three or four years to maintain and increase the vigor of the better grasses.


