





Then along came Fannie Mac-the Federal National Mortgage Association-the prime buyer of VA and FHA home loans. Fannie Mae said it was backing off on accepting the low-interest VA and FHA loans in Texas because some lenders might be violating the usury law by charging "points." Just be-fore Fannie Mae's announcement, the Department of Housing and Urban Development said it was hiking the interest rate on VA and FHA loans to 10 percent. That meant lenders in Texas that had been charging points on VA and FHA loans to get the interest rates up to present money market levels might be in violation of the usury law.

Clements had said he would re-evaluate his position on legislation raising the interest rate ceiling if developments warranted such a move on his part. Fannie Mae's announcement meaning a tight money market would probably be getting tighter - moved Clements to reverse himself, and when the governor did. he called in Sen. Bill Meier and Rep. Jerry Donaldson to discuss their bills raising the legal interest rate allowed by law.

The House this week passed Donaldson's bill with provisions that Clements said he could accept. Meanwhile, there was still some question whether or not VA and FHA loans are exempted from the state usury laws. "Vagueness" over the law had been one of Fannie Mae's prime reasons for backing away from taking VA and FHA loans in Texas. And an investigation into whether there had been "collusion" between Fannie Mae and lenders was also underway. Sen. Bill Patman and Texas AFL-CIO Presi-



They propound theories to explain why the cost of living will go up, only to watch it go down. They build intricate econometric models to trace the downward curve of unemployment, only to have it go up. Their problem is that we laymen often don't understand their theories or their econometric models, but we fully comprehend the re-

sult when one of them goes sour. More often than not, though, the proposals of modern-day economists-stilted and com

plex as they may be-are on the right track. As Chairman of the Joint Economic Committee, I made use of one such proposal recently, in persuading the Senate

to approve an amendment I had proposed to the authorization bill for the Council on Wage and Price Stability. In essence, it said that more is less.

It said that, in certain cases, the best way to hold down the cost of living would be to allow wage increases to exceed the Administration's wage/price guidelines.

It said that a wage increase, no matter how big, will not add one whit to inflation if that increase is matched by a rise in productivity.

Productivity is one of those economic terms. It means output per manhour.

Let's take an example. John Doe, say, makes widgets. He makes 10 widgets an hour. Let us assume that John increases his productivity from 10 to 15 widgets an hour and is rewarded with a pay raise of from \$3 an hour to \$4.

The 33 percent wage increase that John Doe receives far outstrips the 7 percent allowed under the wage/price guideines. But it would in no way fan the flames of inflation since he labor cost per widget, thanks to John's incr ased producwity, would actually go down from 30 cer s a widget to ess than 27 cents.

We are never going to get our economy straightened out in is country until we do something about the sagging rate of roductivity. From 1972 through '77 productivity in West ermany, Italy and France grew at least 21/2 times faster than did here at home. In England it grew three times faster. Japan, astoundingly, more than eight times faster.

U.S. productivity grew at a rate of 2.4 percent a year from 1950-67, but by only .6 percent from 1972 through last year. By all accounts the prospects are no better for 1979.

I believe the federal government has the responsibility to attack the causes of our poor productivity performance. But, with one or two very notable exceptions, it is doing nothing.

As a matter of fact, the federal government has actually raised barriers to productivity increases.

My amendment, approved unanimously by the Senate, is intended to help lower one of those government barriers. It calls on the Council on Wage and Price Stability to not apply the President's voluntary guidelines in a matter which discrimintes against productivity increases.

The way things now stand, the council-known as COWPS on the bureaucratic circuit-allows wage hikes to exceed the guidelines in only two narrow instances, even if they are justifiel by productivity gains. They allow it when the wage in crease is based on a documentable increase in physical output such as piece-work or sales volume. And, they allow it when labor and management agree to higher wages in ex-change for work-rules that lead to productivity gains.

My bill will permit wage increases to enceed the guidelines in all cases where a hike in productivity is "demon linked to increased effort or diligence on the part of individu workers."

Productivity is one of those economic proposals that has far more fact than fancy. It is one case in which the economists have the list lough.

Grain Stocks Have Dropped

AUSTIN-A 17 percent decline in Texas stocks of feed grains, including corn, oats, barley and sorghum, has been reported by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA). Stocks of other grains

showed even further declines. **TDA** officials said. The April I estimate, made by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, showed wheat stocks down 48 percent from the previous year, to \$1.7 million bushels. Disappearance during the January-April quarter alone was estimated at 22.6 million

bushels. Only grain sorghum showed no change from the previous year, with stocks totaling 62.6 million hundredweight.

Corn dropped 38 percent, to the 50.4-million-bushel level, while oats were down 60 percent to 2.7 million bushels. Barley and soybean stocks were cut in half, the report showed, with barley down to 211,000 bushels and soybean stocks to 4 million bushels. "Poor grain production

conditions in the state last year cut sharply into our crops," commented Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown, "and compliance with federal setaside programs dropped production even more. Another factor was the devaluation of the dollar. which made the grain export market look extremely good to foreign buyers. "With further reduction of

almost all of these grains see our supply-demand situation reach a balance which will strengthen grain prices," he continued.
