The only time you should stop learning about yourself is when you die. In the last few weeks I've discovered another facet of my personality that I had not recognized before.

I am sharing this with you, because I wonder if others tend to react the way I do.

In the past month I have had two separate incidents when I was suddenly thrust into an emergency situation, and was in great fear of the life of someone I cared a great deal about. Now, when some people are frightened, they cry or they faint or a few lucky ones remain calm and handle the situation.

But I get angry!

If you read Loose Marbles last week, you were treated to a very humorous version of Lisa's "belly buster" dive off a 30-foot cliff into the Colorado River. What she neglected to tell you was that as she walked out to the edge of the cliff, I was on the ground screaming for her not to jump. Those of us watching, laughed, clucked our tongues and shook our heads at old crazy Lisa trying a stunt like that, but when she jumped (fell, plummeted, dived!) her head and neck hit the water first. I saw several who had a view of her jumping off the cliffs and rushing to her aid.

I was so terrified that I raced to the top of the cliff so I could see her (I think I pushed a few people out of the way). By the time I got there, she had regained consciousness, she was safe in her rescuer's arms, and I was sure she was going to live.

So what did I do? Did I speak comforting words, inquiring about her injuries? Did I thank the strangers who had dived in to rescue her? No... I stood on top of that cliff and screamed "Lisa Patman, you are the stu-u-u-pidist woman in the world!"

Not only was I angry with her then (and it was genuine anger, I assure you!), I was still mad at her the next day.

Each time I looked at her bruises, I got angry again.

Now, don't you think that is a strange reaction? After I finally calmed down, I decided that anger was not a normal reaction to a

Joe Riley Is Head Coach

Joe Ray Riley, a McLean native, is the new head coach of McLean High School, following action by the McLean School Board of Trustees Monday night at their regular session. The reassignment of Riley, who has served for the last four years as an assistant coach in the McLean schools, followed the resignation of Coach Jack Dorsett.

Dorsett, who came to McLean as an assistant to Bill Coward five years ago, has been head coach of the Tigers for the past three seasons. His future plans were not known by the board.

Riley, a 1974 graduate

of McLean High School and a 1978 graduate of West Texas State University, was an outstanding Tiger athlete during his own high school days, lettering in football and qualifying for regional in track in the 300 intermediate hurdles, 120 high hurdles, and the mile relay. His wife, Jacque, teaches English in McLean Junior High.

Riley will receive \$3750 above the state schedule. The board also assigned Frank Purcell at \$3000 above as the girls' basketball coach, and assigned Jerry Cook at \$3250 as a coach.

In addition to Dorsett's resignation, the board accepted the resignation

of Joe Lennon, high school social studies teacher.

In other action, the board discussed a ten percent increase in evaluation for the school insurance. The Jane Simpson Agency informed the board that their insurance company, Continental, had required the increase as a condition for renewal of the insurance. The school is now insured for \$1,357,500, with a premium of \$6,659 per year.

Superintendent Jim Rutherford told the board that the architects were completing specifications on the proposed new industrial arts/science building, and that the material should be ready to advertise for bids in about a week. The board decided to meet Aug. 19 to open bids on the work. Rutherford also said that he had located the desks and other equipment for the science department, and the cost would be about \$13,000, which was about \$8,000 less than was expected.

Attending the brief meeting were board members Lloyd Hunt, J.C. McAnear, Joe Magee, Darryll Herndon, James Hefley, Tony Smitherman, and Jim Allison; superintendent Jim Rutherford; principals Dorman Thomas and Ron Cummings; and business manager Shirley Johnson.

Baptists Plan Bible School

The McLean First Baptist Church is planning a Vacation Bible School from Aug. 2 through Aug. 6 at the church. All children age three through the sixth grade are invited to attend classes each morning from 9 a.m. until 11:30 a.m., according to Buell Wells, pastor. Youth in grades seven through 12 will attend classes each evening at 7 p.m.

Everyone is welcome to attend, Wells said.

Communication System For Ambulance Eludes Officials

No solution has yet been found for a communication system for the newly reorganized McLean Area Ambulance Association, according to the association's officers' report at McLean city council meeting July 13. Ambulance Association president Glen Curry told city leaders that although six pagers had been added to the inventory, the ambulance service was still without a telephone system. Estimates from Southwestern Bell Tele-

phone ranged from \$137 a month, with a \$500 installation charge for an initial 10 phone setup, to \$280 each month, \$160 installation, for a line to connect with the Shamrock emergency station. Curry noted that the fire department currently is charged on \$22.50 for monthly telephone service, but telephone representatives have told him that Bell telephone no longer offered that rate to new customers. Because of the rate differ-

ence, and the association's limited funds, ambulance officer's still are searching for a more feasible solution. Until one is found, members of the ambulance service will rely on the pager system. At this point, however, the association still does not have enough pagers to supply each member, so that a few are hand-passed to those on call. Curry and vice-president Jake Hess II asked city councilmen to help them find alternate solutions to the telephone problem.

The ever-present dog situation was again discussed by council members, after several had received complaints about roaming dogs, as well as one complaint about a dog which had a history of biting people. Aldermen decided to send a formal notice to the owner of the dog which recently bit a McLean girl. The letter will inform the owner the city ordinance concerning pets, the animal must be either confined or destroyed. A notice also will be sent to the owners of several dogs which reportedly are not confined, informing the owners, who are newcomers to the town, of the city ordinance.

After much discussion of the trash pick up problem, as well as the deterioration of the city streets, the council instructed city secretary Stella Lee to prepare a budget study to determine if funds were available for extra summer help or street work. Mayor Sam Haynes appointed councilman Charles Milam to compose a letter outlining the problems of the trash pick up, and asking McLean citizens to help the city by placing trash cans in only two locations per alley, mowing the weeds in the alley behind their own property, and spraying for mosquitos. "Any assistance can get from our citizens will certainly keep the city from being forced to raise rates," Haynes noted.

In other business, city officials voted to make payment on the street

paving loan, and appointed Haynes to a Lovett Memorial Library committee to study uses for the new library meeting room. Other

members of the committee are Martha Parker and Katherine Weaver.

Those attending the meeting were Haynes, Milam, Bill Thomas, Jim

Barker, George Terry, city secretary Stella Lee, city superintendent Bob Glenn, and ambulance officers Curry, Hess, and Lisa Patman, ambulance association secretary.

County Attorney Announces Misdemeanor Policy Change

Beginning Sept. 1, anyone convicted in Gray County court of a misdemeanor offense will be required to pay the fine in full the day the person is convicted, or the person will be committed to the Gray County jail, according to Robert

D. McPherson, county attorney. The change in policy also says that the person will remain in jail until the fine and all costs are fully paid.

In a news release sent by the attorney, McPherson said that anyone

accepting probation will be required to pay a minimum of \$100 the day he is placed on probation. This will be applied to the probationer's court cost, probation fee, fine, restitution, and other items required to be paid by the probationer.

McLean's Tax Rebate Down

McLean continues to be the only city in Gray County doing less business than last year, if the amount of tax rebate sent by the State Comptroller's office is any indication. McLean's share of the one percent sales tax rebated periodically to the cities in Texas is down 7 percent from last year, while Lefors tax is up 35 percent, and Pampa's tax is up 20 percent.

McLean's rebate has been lower than 1981

during every reporting period of 1982.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent checks totaling \$38.9 million to 967 Texas cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for July.

"These monthly rebates, and the retail sales they represent, continue to show increases over last year," Bullock said. The Comptroller pointed out that for the first seven months of 1982, sales tax collections are

running at 14.4 percent ahead of 1981.

McLean mayor Sam Haynes said that he was unable to explain the down turn in McLean's retail business. "The loss of Wilson's Grocery probably has affected the tax revenue," Haynes said. Linda McAnear, owner of McLean Variety, also thought the loss of the grocery store affected McLean business.

Those who completed the required reading to earn a certificate were eligible to compete in a contest sponsored by the Texas Panhandle Library System. The

youngsters designed a bookmark around a theme of "Libraries: Launch Pad to the Future."

The winning bookmarks will be reproduced to be given at the library booth at the Tri-State Fair in September.

McLean Needs A Pool

McLean lost a valuable asset last week when the swimming pool at the McLean Country Club was bulldozed in and filled with earth. The destruction of the pool ended the final chapter in a 10-year struggle to keep the pool open for McLean youngsters.

In a highly emotional situation like the destruction of the pool, it is easy to lose perspective of the problems involved, and to simply indulge in a blame-placing contest.

As a member of the McLean Country Club, I wanted the pool to stay open. I wanted it there when I wanted to use it, and I wanted it there for the benefit of all the kids in town, because I think swimming is one of the best forms of exercise around.

But I didn't want it badly enough to volunteer to keep it open. I didn't even want it badly enough to volunteer to serve on a committee for the pool, and I didn't want it badly enough to attend all the director's meetings, and voice my opinion.

When the Country Club was built, most of the original members were young married couples with small children. The club was designed to give those young families a place of recreation. The original planners had visions of family picnics, bridge nights, swimming parties, and a suitable room for school banquets, in addition to the twice-a-month dances.

From the beginning the pool was troublesome. It cost money to operate and maintain, and it took time and trouble each year to find a suitable person to supervise the pool. As long as the members of the board of directors were strongly interested in the pool, it was kept open.

But the membership of the country club has changed over the years. Many out-of-town people have joined the club because they learned that it was a good place to go to a clean, well-run dance twice a month. Most of the members are older, and no longer have small youngsters at home, nor do most of the directors have small children.

Those of us who were strongly interested in keeping the pool are just in the minority. And in this country the majority rules. The members of the club decided that the pool was a burden they no longer wished to assume... so it is gone.

Instead of wasting our energy railing at those who closed the pool, we must now decide if a pool really is important to the city of McLean, and if it is, we must figure a way to obtain one for our kids.

The first step is to learn from the City Council what city-owned land might be available for a pool, and to learn what steps we private citizens could take to help raise funds for a city-owned, and city-operated pool.

If you are interested in a place for our kids to swim, call The McLean News and give us your name, and we will all go to the City Council together, and get the ball rolling to build a pool in McLean.....where it should have been in the first place.

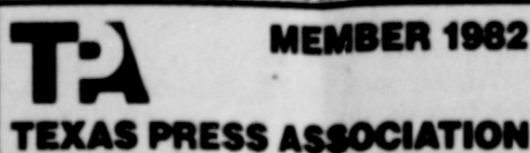

The first unit of Roy Tolk Station, Southwestern Public Service Company's new coal-fired generating plant near Muleshoe, Texas, will begin manufacturing electricity this month. The unit has the capacity to generate 561,000 kilowatts of electric power—it's Southwestern's largest. A second unit, the same size as the first, is being built next to the one which will be fired up this month. The units cost more than \$200 million apiece. They can each provide enough electricity to supply a city of 225,000 people.

Tolk Station will burn coal — ground as fine as talcum powder— to produce electricity. The coal SPS uses comes from mines near Gillette, Wyoming. It is a low-sulfur coal. Tolk Station Unit No. 1 will burn approximately 315 tons of coal per hour. That's about 7,560 tons per day. The coal is delivered by 110-car trains directly from the Wyoming mines. Coal-fired plants are significantly more economical to operate than natural gas-fired plants.

Morris Rantz, Fuel Administration Manager, Amarillo.

The "stack" at Tolk Station is 400 feet high. The "smoke" it emits, however, is "smokeless." Although burning coal naturally produces "smoke" (flue gas and fly ash), our state-of-the-art environmental protection equipment cleans up the emissions long before they get into the air. The protection system, called a baghouse, contains 13,000 fiberglass bags. They filter the boiler's emissions and remove the ash residues, making the coal "smokeless."
