## Who's Hurt Most?

Medicare benefits are reduced, and medical insurance costs increased, in subtle but significant ways for America's elderly.

And this is being done while President Reagan proclaims to the nation regularly the sanctity of the Social Security program and its attendant benefits.

Effective January 1 for all Medicare recipients, the annual deductible (the share of medical costs which the patient must pay before Medicare takes over) is being increased again... from \$260 to \$304.

That's not a lot, perhaps, for citizens who have \$44 a year to spare, and probably a majority of Americans do have. But it is a great deal for the marginally poor... those millions of elderly whose incomes are fixed but whose expenses continue to rise.

There are other small changes in benefits and costs involved in the latest alterations of medical insurance mandated by the United State Department of Health and Human Services... such as increases in the patient's co insurance responsibility (from \$65 per day to \$76 per day for the 61st day through the 90th day of hospital care) and an increase in the patient's coinsurance responsibility for the 60 lifetime reserve days from \$130 to \$152 per day.

Those "small change" revisions add up to not-so-small change for many elderly persons who must make up the difference not only in reduced benefits but in increased rates for supplementary insurance.

This is as inflationary for the elderly needy as an increase in the price of food or medicines at the retail counter.

So when the President points with pride to fractional percentage drops in the consumer price index as proof that inflation has been stopped and "Reaganomics is working," it is working selectively... and people in the lower economic scale are not among the "select."



## from the distaff side

A friend loaned me a set of "self-improvement" tapes, and I have spent the last two weeks listening to this benign propaganda. According to the instructions, the listener is to set aside a few minutes every day. He listens to each tape every day for a week, taking about five weeks to finish the program.

I recognize the steps in brain-washing, but in this instance I am happy to oblige. In fact I have listened to the tapes so much that I practically have them memorized. At Sunday dinner, Dollie asked if I had loaned the preacher "those silly tapes" because he used some of the same terms she had been overhearing as I was doing my daily listening.

Although I had not loaned the tapes to our minister, he used the term "positive expectancy." The tapes refer to the quality as "positive self-expectancy", but whatever it is called, it is apparently one of the most necessary ingredients for a happy, fulfilled life. "Positive self-expectancy" simply means that what a person expects to happen in his life usually does. If he expects, consciously or subconsciously, to have a dull evening, he probably will. If he expects to have a headache, or to quarrel with his wife, or to fail at any given task, he probably will. To have positive self-expectancy, a person must maintain an optimistic attitude, and try to always expect the best. I realize that this is difficult, and sometimes impossible, but you might be surprised how easy it is to do when you try.

After listening to the tapes, I have discovered that I have allowed myself to get into the bad habit of negative self-expectancy... kind of the old idea that if you always expect the worst, you are never disappointed. But I realize that that negative attitude has caused me a great deal of unhappiness. So I am practicing being positive. The principle of positive self-expectancy simply means that it is your attitude toward problems that determines whether you will be miserable or happy. Everyone has problems and trials in life. Some men simply fold and give up, while others seem to thrive and grow. The difference is not in the seriousness of the problems, but in the person's reactions to them.

Dennis Waitley, the lecturer on the tapes, says that we move "toward our currently dominant thought." Jesus said "As a man thinketh, so he is." It is one and the same idea. Try thinking positive for a few days. You might be surprised how much difference it makes in your life.

## Senator Bill Sarpalius Reports



### SUNSET HEATS UP



AUSTIN — The Texas Sunset Commission, on which we are proud to serve, recently met for three consecutive days of hearings. The testimony taken concerned two of this state's largest and most controversial organizations: the Railroad Commission and the Public Utility Commission. The Sunset Commission consists of ten members who sit in review of 30 to 33 state organizations every two years. In this way, every state organization must come up for review every 12 years. It is at this time that the Commission determines if the organization is unneeded or inadequate. If so, they suggest changes or, in some cases, abolishment. The Legislature then takes these suggestions and acts on the organizations individually. If no action is taken to reinstate a particular organization, it is automatically ended.

During the three days of meetings, the Commission heard from well over 100 testifiers. The number of people wishing to testify was so large that the second day's meeting took 16 hours of straight testimony; forcing it to last until well past midnight. Although this seems unorthodox, the Commission felt it was necessary to adequately hear and question every witness.

The majority of testimony dealing with the Railroad Commission concerned trucking regulations. There has been a growing movement in this country to deregulate the motor carrier industry. Texas is no different. Most of the witnesses felt that the trucking industry should function in the open market like most other industries.

There was also discussion on changing the name of the Railroad Commission. Railroad regulation is now only a small part of that organization's functions. It is felt that changing the name to something more representative would help break down some of the barriers between citizens and government.

The major concern regarding the Public Utility Commission was the lack of representation that the residential rate payer has. Many Texans feel that this

has caused unnecessarily high utility rates. To voice their opinions, they request a seat on the PUC or the addition of legal counsel that would specifically represent the public interest. We feel that the Sunset process is vital for maintaining responsible and efficient state government and are very proud to serve on it. It is our hope that you too feel that this is an important

process. It is never too late for you to speak out on any issue, so we would like to hear of your opinions on the Railroad Commission, the PUC, or any other state organization under Sunset review. These will be essential for making our decisions next month on these organizations. Please write Senator Bill Sarpalius, P. O. Box 12068, Austin, Texas, 78711.

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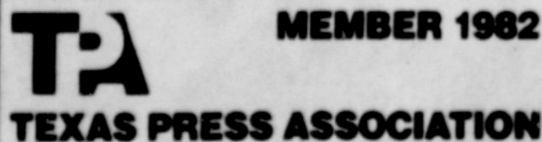

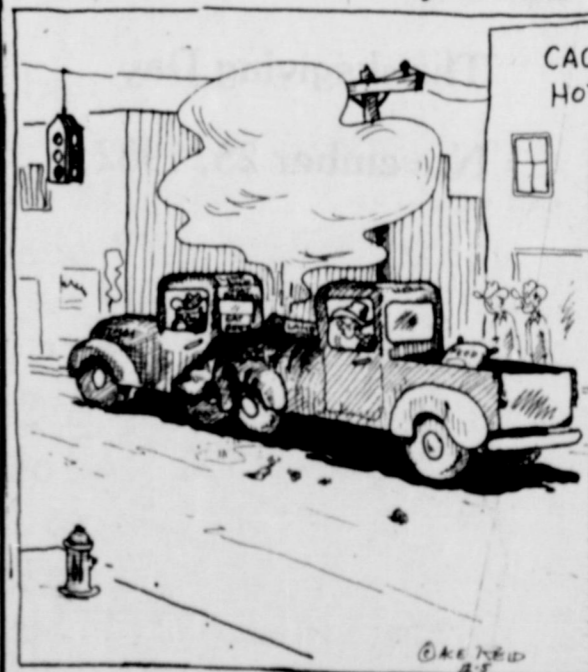

# Newly Established Services Offer Aid To Area Residents

The House of Representatives has designated the week of Nov. 28 as National Home Care Week, and McLean has two organizations, recently established, to provide this service to the community and the surrounding area. According to congressional officials, home care provides medical, nursing and other supportive services to the aged and the infirm in their homes.

In McLean, the Panhandle Home Health Agency and the Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation both provide home nursing care. The Panhandle Home Health Agency serves 20 counties and has offices in Pampa, Amarillo, and Dumas. The aim of the organization is to provide registered, licensed vocational nurses and home health aides to give nursing care under the supervision of

a physician in the patient's own home. Mary McCrary, LVN, of McLean provides the service to the residents of McLean and helps with service in Pampa.

Dorothy Wilson, a McLean resident, works primarily in the Pampa area. Supervisor in Gray County is Kay Nations, RN. Two other registered nurses and a home health aid also work from the organization's headquarters in Pampa in room 430 of the Hughes Building.

Some of the nursing services available on an intermittent basis are changing surgical dressings, ostomy care and instruction, catheterization, catheter irrigations, injections, intravenouses, blood pressure, enemas, exercises, ambulation, inhalation treatment, nutritional counseling, and care of cardiac patients.

In charge of the program for the area are Irene Leuette, RN, and Juanell Brooks, administrator, who are headquartered in Dumas.

The newest organization in the field is the Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation (TPCAC) Home Health Division. This organization provides both health care and family care services for the area. Mary Dwyer is in charge of the family care services for four counties (Hall, Donley, Wheeler, and Collingsworth), but is headquartered in McLean. Juanita Gonzalez provides the service for Gray County. She works out of Pampa.

This part of the Home Health care program provides the elderly and the disabled with help with household tasks. The service helps the patients maintain their self-sufficiency. Mrs. Dwyer

supervises about 100 clients in the area, and has 60 "providers" who work from two to 20 hours a week for each client. The provider might clean the client's room, run errands, take the client to the doctor, etc.

and provides health services as ordered by the physician. Mrs. Bailey began her job Nov. 1. Supervisor for the project is Jane Blackburn, RN, of Amarillo.

Both organizations are non-profit, funded by the federal government. Patients may receive services under the Medicare program, private insurance, or other applicable government programs. Services may also be arranged on a private pay basis.

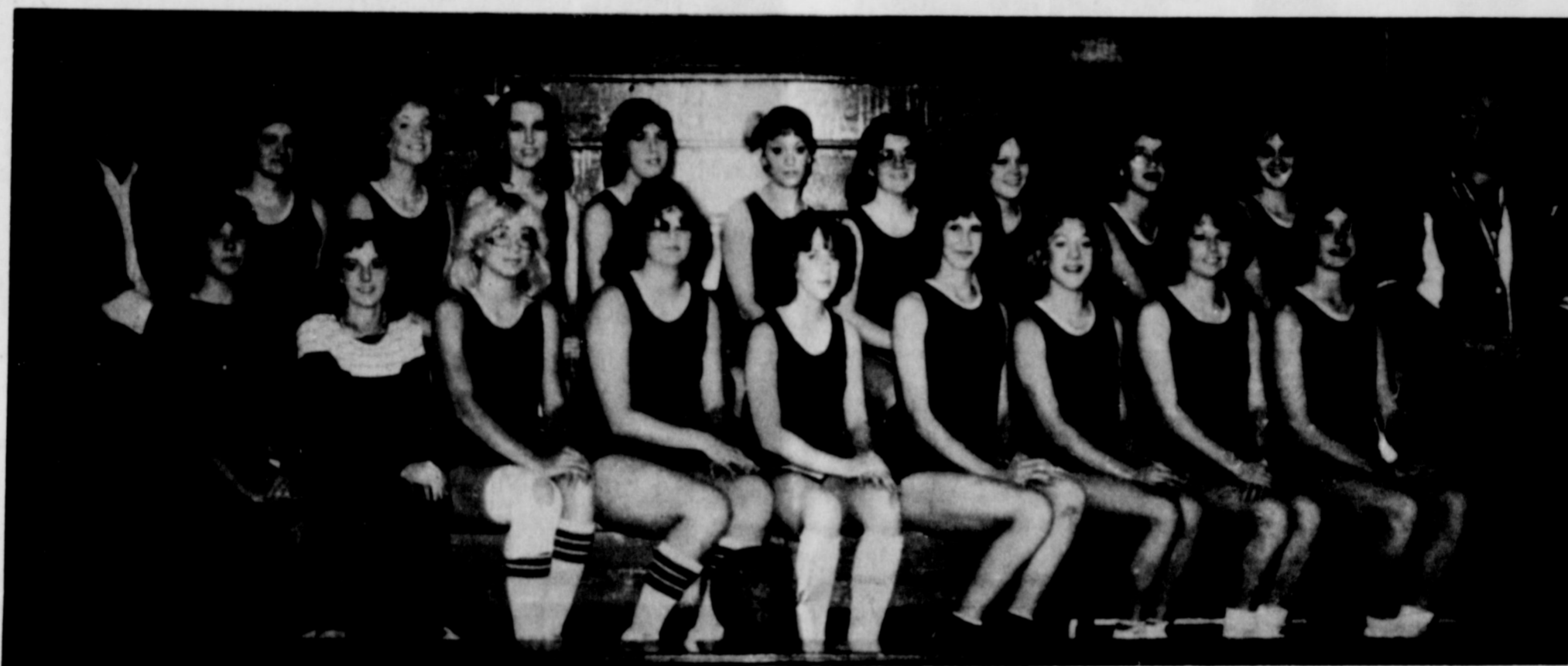

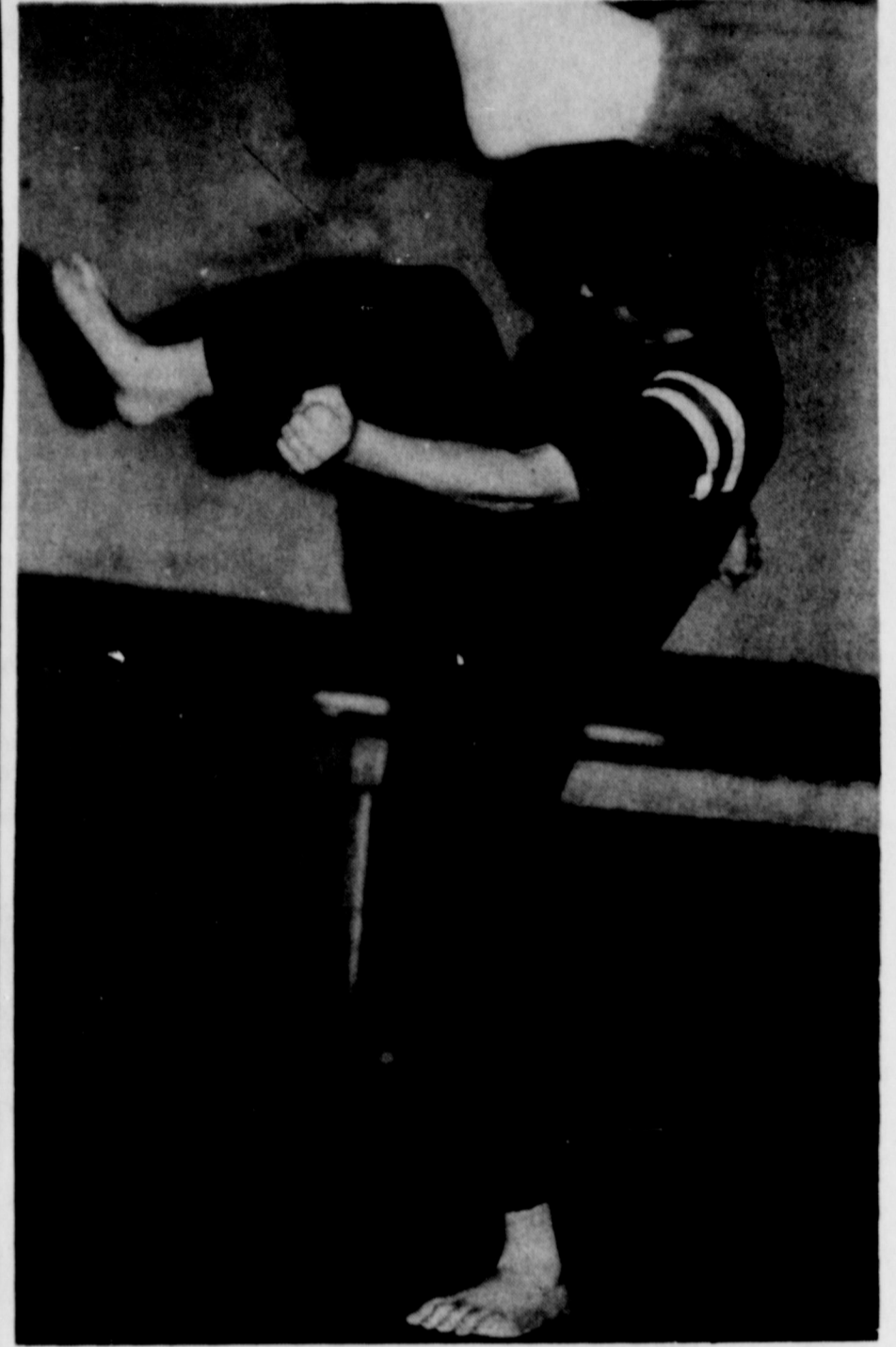

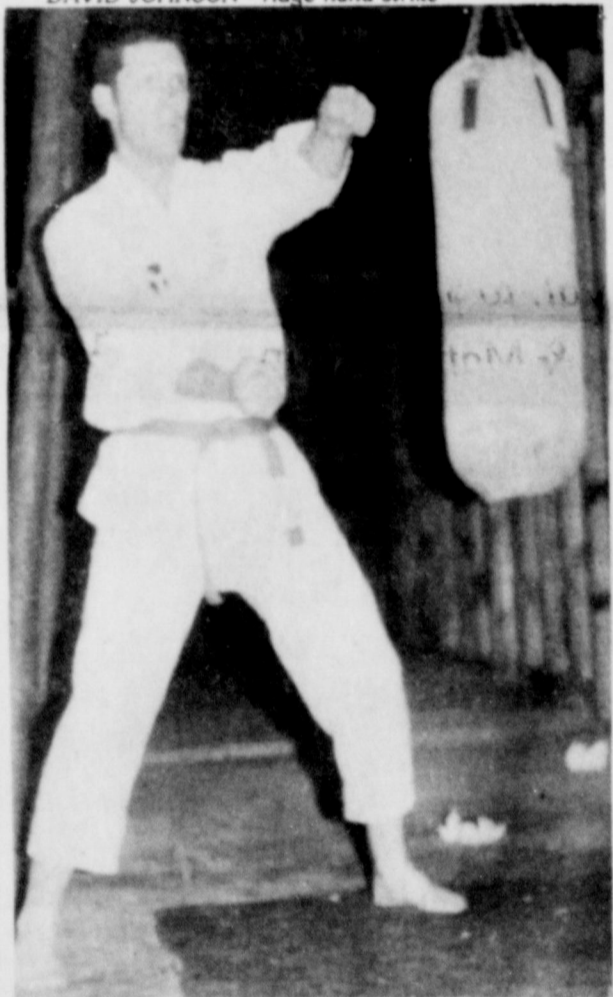

## Residents Practice Art Of Self Defense

A group of McLean residents are rapidly becoming skilled in the ancient art of karate.

Fifteen students of all ages meet three times a week with instructor George Green to practice the positions and moves of the self-defense skill.

George and his wife Sam became interested in karate when they lived in Saudi Arabia where he worked for Champion Chemicals Inc. In October, 1979, the couple began studying under an instructor who was a fourth band black belt.

Both of the Greens advanced to earn the brown belt. In karate, skill is measured by the awarding of belts, beginning with the white belt. The order of the belts is white, yellow, green, brown, black (there are

10 bands to the black belt) and a 10th band black belt or red belt.

The holder of the red belt is called a master. Green said that very few people in the world ever reach the status of red belt, which would require study for 20 or 25 years.

Green studied Okinawa Karate or *Shorin Ryu*. He said that with practice his students will be able to advance to the brown belt level, but if they wish to advance further, they will have to have instruction from someone else. The belts are awarded after the student has successfully demonstrated a prescribed set of exercises and routines.

Green said that karate is excellent exercise. "By the time we finish our two-hour sessions,

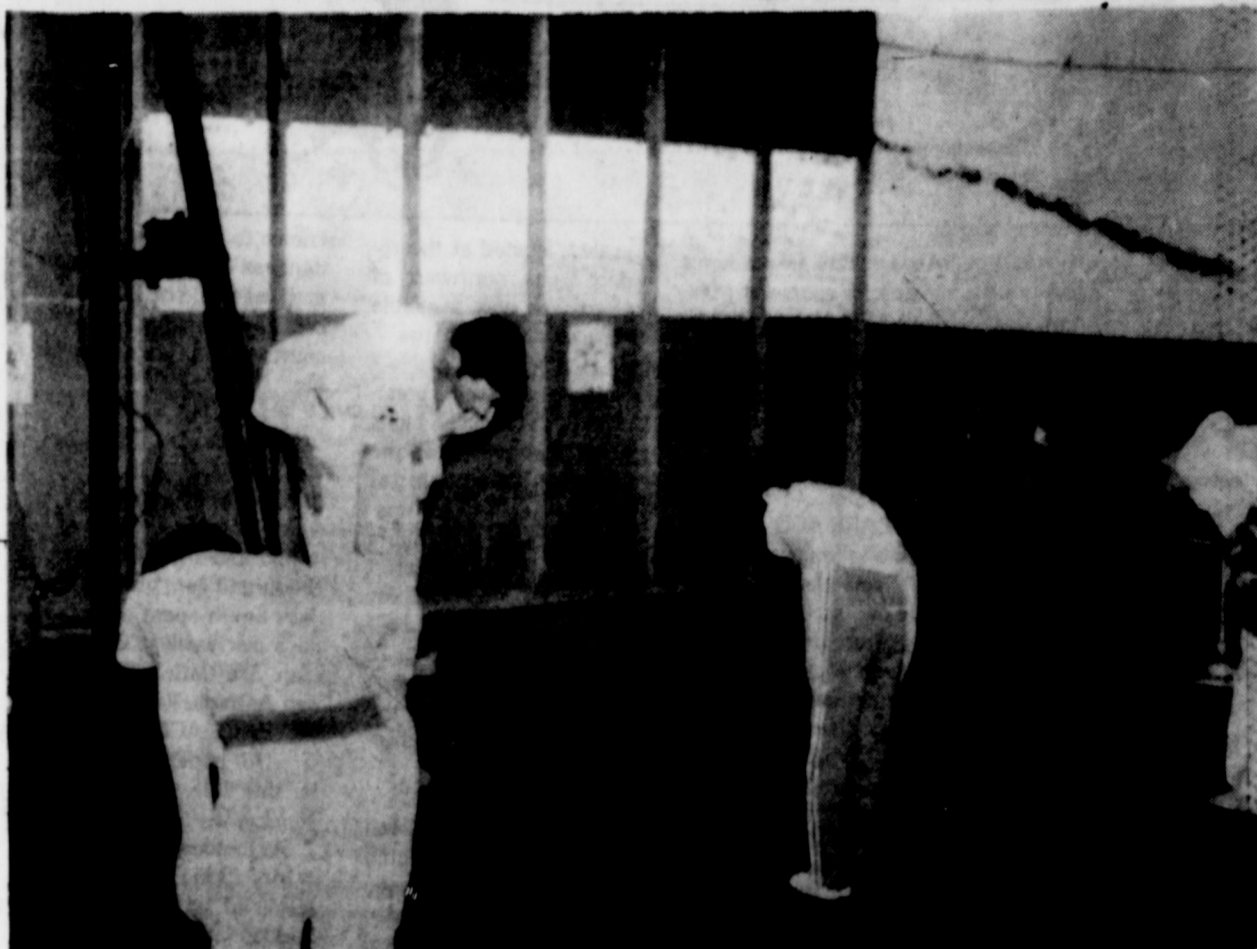
the students really feel that they have had a workout," he said.

The classes started in McLean Sept. 20. Students meet Tuesday from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m., and Saturday from 1 to 3 p.m. and 6 to 8 p.m. Green said he will continue the instruction as long as there are enough students to pay the utilities

and the rent on the downtown building where the classes are held.

Green is a 1966 graduate of McLean High School, and a 1970 graduate of West Texas State University. He is the son of Bob and Marguerite Green who worked in the McLean Schools for many years.

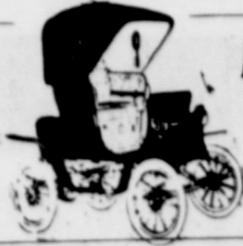

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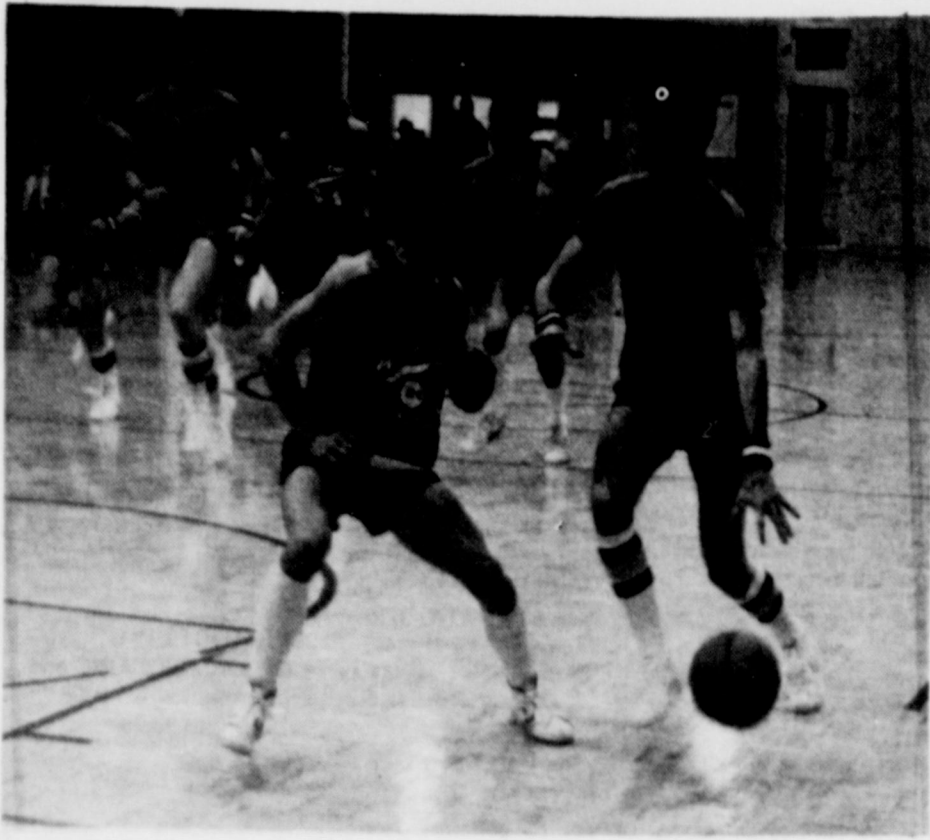
