Trustees Meet Monday; Do Not ReHire Principal

The MISD board of trustees met for their monthly session Monday night in the school business office. Present for the meeting were trustees Joe Magee, Thacker Haynes, John Holland, Jake Hess II, Lloyd Hunt, James Hefley, and Darryel Herndon; business manager Shirley Johnson; superintendent Jim Rutherford; principals Dorman Thomas and Ron Cummings; Jim Bob Webb, George Green, Cathy Spaulding, Billie Kingston, Jan Layfield, and Lisa Patman.

The board approved the February minutes, the February checks, the February financial statement, the February tax-assessor's report, and the February Cafeteria report.

Jim Bob Webb requested the school pay for expenses to the ag judging contest in Lubbock. The board agreed to pay for the rooms for the teams and for a female sponsor.

They approved the organizations classified as extra-curricular as approved by the interim commission of education, and approved the textbook committee.

They approved a request from Beta Sigma Phi to use the high school auditorium April 20 to sponsor a Little Miss and Master Pageant.

The board also approved the state mandated grading system as recommended.

Beginning September 1, 1985 grades from 90-100 will be "A", 80-89 will be "B", 75-79 will be "C", and 69-below will be failing.

The board then decided to allow the junior-senior banquet to be held in Pampa. Buses will be provided for students both to and from the banquet and the prom and any student not riding the bus must have a parental

waiver on file prior to the banquet relieving the school of responsibility.

Mr. Rutherford reported that the engineer and architect had inspected the elementary building but no report had been received from them.

Approval was also given to order 20 file cabinets for the teachers at an approximate cost of \$145 each.

The board then went into executive session at 6:42 p.m.

The meeting was re-opened into public session at 10:06 p.m.

All employment was subject to assignment and certification.

And all employees will be employed at state schedule salary. All supplements above state schedule are pending future action.

One of the things I've noticed while owning the paper is how differently we all react when depressed, angered, hurt, or embarrassed.

I know this is just human nature and that's what makes us all so special, but sometimes I'm amazed at the way people handle this often volatile emotions.

I know I don't do so well with them myself, and quite truthfully I've been trying to "smooth" my temperment lately.

Often when we're angry, we "fly off the handle" and yell, scream, and verbally abuse others, whether or not they're the cause for our feelings.

I know of people who love to make "nasty" telephone calls. I have been the recipient of several angry and abusive letters, and have seen the effects that snide, hateful remarks make.

All of these reactions to anger are childish, immature ways of expressing ourselves, and I'll admit, I'm right up there with the best of the offenders.

When we want to change a situation, name-calling, abusive language and threats certainly don't get us anywhere...they only make the situation worse and often delay and negate any positive action.

How nice it would be, when we do disagree and get angry, to step outside, take a few deep breaths and remove ourselves from the situation for a while.

Perhaps things aren't as bad as they seem...or maybe there's a different, better approach to achieve those things about which we feel so strongly.

Whatever the case, anything's better than the emotional, strung-out, bitter feelings that accompany angry words and feelings.

None of us benefit from irresponsible actions. They don't make us a better, bigger person for having "told someone off" or "letting them have it right between the eyes", or anything else.

It seems to me that while we hurt ourselves and our "victims" with our angry words and actions, our children are the biggest losers in the game if these are acceptable actions for adults, parents, Sunday School teachers, school teachers, and other civic, community, and church leaders, they are acceptable for our children.

My apologies to Dick Bode, O.J. Weldon, and Bill Adams in Alanreed. In last week's story concerning the filing in the Alanreed school election, I stated that O.J. Weldon's term was up. Such is not the case, much to my dismay. It was the seat of Dick Bode, and Bode has filed for re-election. Mr. Weldon is a member of the board, but his term is not up.

Texas Mileage Death Rate Decreases

The mileage death rate in Texas continued to fall in 1984 despite an increase in traffic fatalities, according to figures released by the Texas Department of Public Safety.
"The mileage death rate in 1984 declined by three per cent to 2.9 deaths per hundred million miles traveled," said Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director. "This is the lowest rate recorded in Texas history. However, we also had a 2.4 per cent increase in the actual number of persons killed in traffic crashes last year."
The statewide death toll from motor vehicle accidents in 1984 totaled 3,913 compared to 3,823 in 1983. The 1983 mileage death rate was three fatalities per hundred million miles traveled.
"The fact that we had six per cent increase in the number of miles driven coupled with a three per cent decrease in the mileage death rate indicates that we are still making progress in traffic safety," Adams said.
"Compared to the record death toll of 4,701 in 1981, we've had a saving of over 2,000 lives in the last three years," he pointed out. "However, the growth of our state in the coming years will lead to continued increases in the number of miles being driven, licensed drivers and vehicles on our roads. In light of this potential for additional fatalities, we must take all possible steps to reduce this staggering toll on our roadways."
DPS statistics indicate that at least 26.8 per cent (1,049) of the 1984 traffic fatalities involved drunken driving.
"We believe that DWI is a far greater contributor to fatalities than what is indicated by these figures," Adams pointed out. "We are working to improve the reporting system to get a more accurate measure."
Adams said the new DWI law is having an impact in the

Motorcycle operator and passenger fatalities totaled 360 last year, increasing three per cent compared to the previous year. More than three out of four motorcyclists killed were not wearing helmets when the acci-

dents occurred.
The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation estimated that motorists traveled 137.280 billion miles in Texas last year, an increase of six per cent compared to 1983.

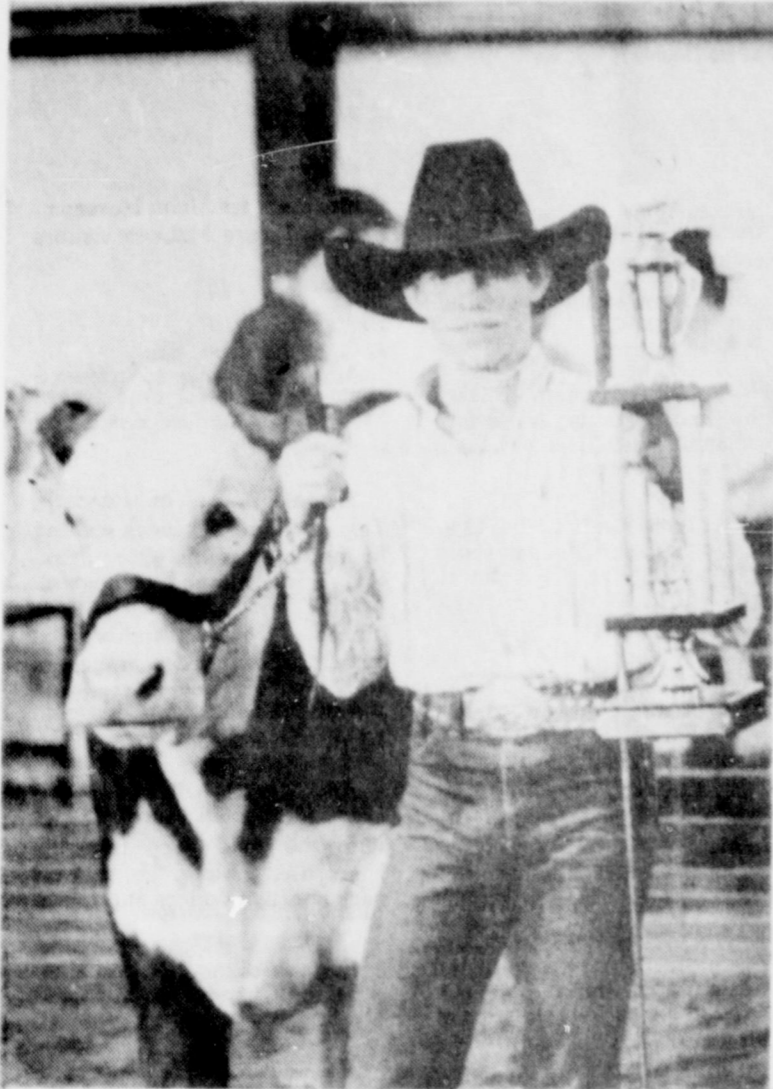

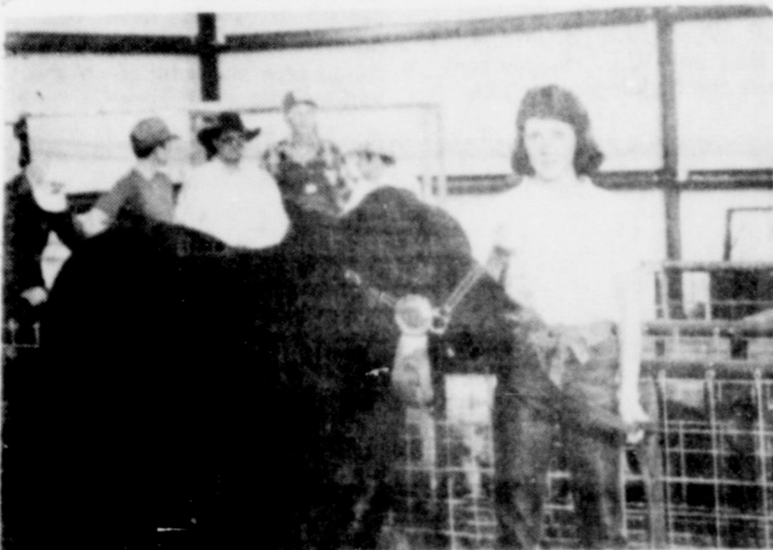

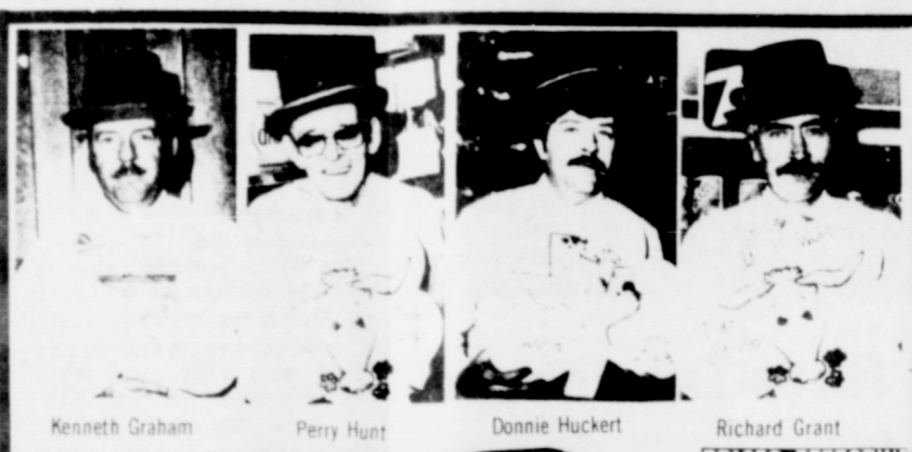
