



FmHA To Hire Temporary Staff

The Farmers Home Administration will hire additional temp-orary employees to help-process farm loan applications in Texas FmHA State Director J. Lynn Futch said today.

"We will begin hiring the extra staff immediately," Futch said. "The new employees will be tamporary. They will serve for four months to help with the seasonal loan peak and to process loans for hundreds of farmers who have requested a review of their debt situation to see of they qualify for the new debt reconstructuring program.

Under the new program, farmers who are having trouble meeting their FmHA payments, may have their loans reschedul-ed or have up to 25 percent of their loans, up to \$200,000, set aside for five years with no interest. Farm loans held by commercial banks and other lenders that are classified as "problem loans," can be reduced by ten percent in exchange for agn FmHA guar"We already know where qualified potential staff people are," Futch said, "and we hope

to put them to work as soon as possible. Most of them are familiar with our loan processing requirements, and a minimum of new training should be required.'

The additional personnel will be assigned to FmHA offices

where the work load is greatest, Futch said. "The temporary employees will include both loan specialists and clerical staff
