Flu Hits Schools, Classes Dismissed

McLean schools were dismissed at 1:30 Tuesday afternoon, due to excessive absences in the elementary school, according to superintendent Jim Rutherford.

Classes are scheduled to resume at the regular time Monday morning.

Officially, 34 of the 191 elementary students enrolled were absent Friday, 37 were gone

Monday, and 46 were out of school Tuesday.

A teacher's in-service day, which had originally been scheduled for March 19 was rescheduled for March 7.

The spring break, which had been set for March 12 and 13, will be taken March 8 and 9.

"We hope that rescheduling the holidays will give these students a

chance to recover and get well before school starts up again," said Rutherford.

"We plan to take this one day at a time. If, when we meet for school again Monday, and we still have 25% absent, we may have to close for a while longer."

Most of the students absent are sick with the flu.

Aldermen Appoint Industrial Revenue Board

Homer Tucker of Memphis met with city council members and local citizens Feb. 28 to explain the procedures of setting up an Industrial Revenue Board for McLean.

Mr. Tucker, who has served on the state Industrial Revenue Board, told the council to appoint a board, have them make up a charter, and apply to the Secretary of State for approval of the charter.

The board, made up of local citizens, would be a non-profit organization whose only purpose would be to issue industrial revenue bonds.

"Many people have a great misunderstanding about the industrial revenue bonds,"

explained Mr. Tucker. "The city of McLean would not be liable for any of the money issued through these bonds. The land, building and equipment bonds are sold and marketed strictly on the ability of the user, and are sold at an average of two to two and a half points below prime rate," said Tucker.

"That, and the fact that the bonds are currently tax-free make them extremely appealing to prospective businesses," stated Tucker. "You have great potential for new businesses on the new interstate, and the issuance of these bonds would certainly help smooth things along," said Tucker.

Attending the Feb. 28 meeting were Homer Tucker; mayor George Terry; councilmen June Suggs, and Lloyd Bybee, and Sharon Haynes, Letta Mae Hess, Clydean Johnson, Lush Rodgers, Paul Middleton, F. Jake Hess, Don Crockett, Jane Herndon, Miro Pakan, and Jamie Johnson.

The city council met again March 5 to appoint an Industrial Revenue Board.

Named to the board were Jim Barker, Roger E. McCracken, Jim McDonald, Gerald Tate, Ida Hess, David Woods, Johnnie Haynes, Kenneth Hambricht, Clarence Pierce, Pat Durham, and Jan Johnson.

American National Bank To Sell To Ron Grubb Of Clinton, Okla.

Ron Grubb of Clinton, Oklahoma is making application to the federal regulatory authorities to purchase controlling interest in the American National Bank in McLean. He has been with that bank for 14 years.

"McLean has been wonderful during this transition period," Irwin said Saturday. "We've appreciated the confidence that has been placed in us, but I feel that this new ownership can bring a great service to this community."

Grubb will be purchasing Irwin's shares in the bank, along with other shares to obtain a controlling interest. He now has controlling interest in 13 other banks in Oklahoma and Texas. Those include in Texas, First National Bank of Childress, First National Bank of Memphis, and Bank

Central of Amarillo (formerly North State Bank).

In Oklahoma, he has controlling interest in Bank of Northwest in Woodward, First State Bank in Moreland, State

Bank of Rocky, Security State Bank of Weatherford, Bank of Hydro,

First Oklahoma Bank and Trust of Edmund, and Union National Bank of Tulsa. Three banks are now being organized and should open soon. Those

include First National Bank of Tuttle, Leadership N.A. of Oklahoma City, and Broadway

National Bank of Oklahoma City.

"Most of the banks we own are in agriculture areas. We know how to

work with cattlemen and farmers, and with small businessmen. We hope to bring some expertise to

this area to help the community," Grubb said.

Kurtz plans to begin work at the bank between

March 20 and March 30. "There will be no change of employees,

and no major change in policy," Grubb said.

"I have found this management company to

be outstanding," Irwin said. "I believe that they

will do a great deal to help McLean."

Ken Baker and Robert

Proctor, also part of Grubb's management company, were in

McLean Saturday discussing the transfer.

And Heavy weight - 1. Donnie Smith, Bryan Smitherman, 3. Darla McAnear, and 4. Shane Coleman.

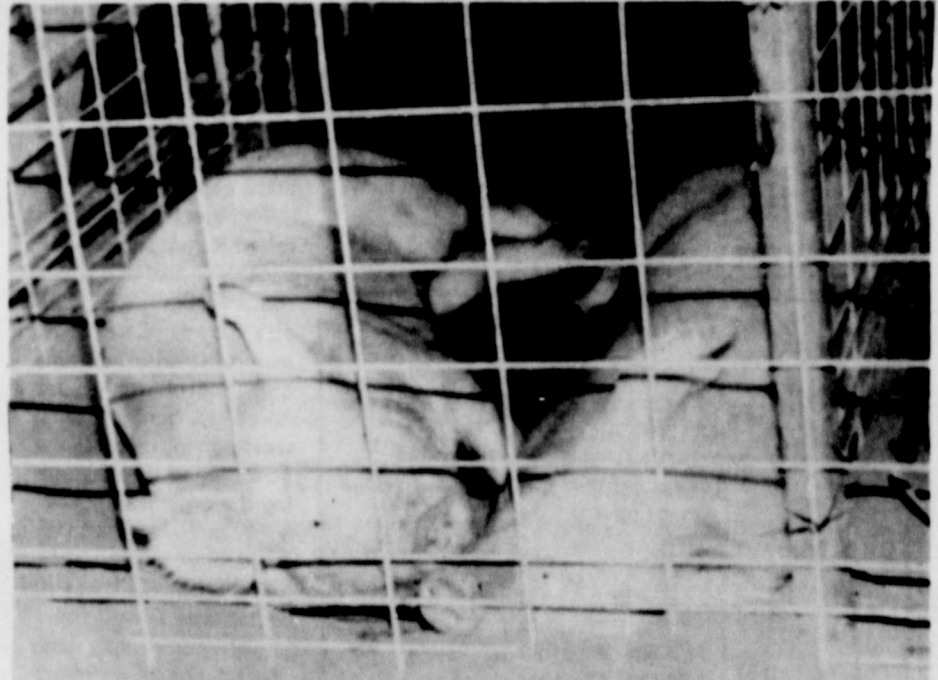
Donnie Smith won Grand Champion, Bryan Smitherman won Reserve Champion, and Bryan Smitherman won the Showmanship trophy.

I will not be at all surprised that if before the games begin, we will be apprised as to the official cigarette, the official snuff, the official beer, the official under-

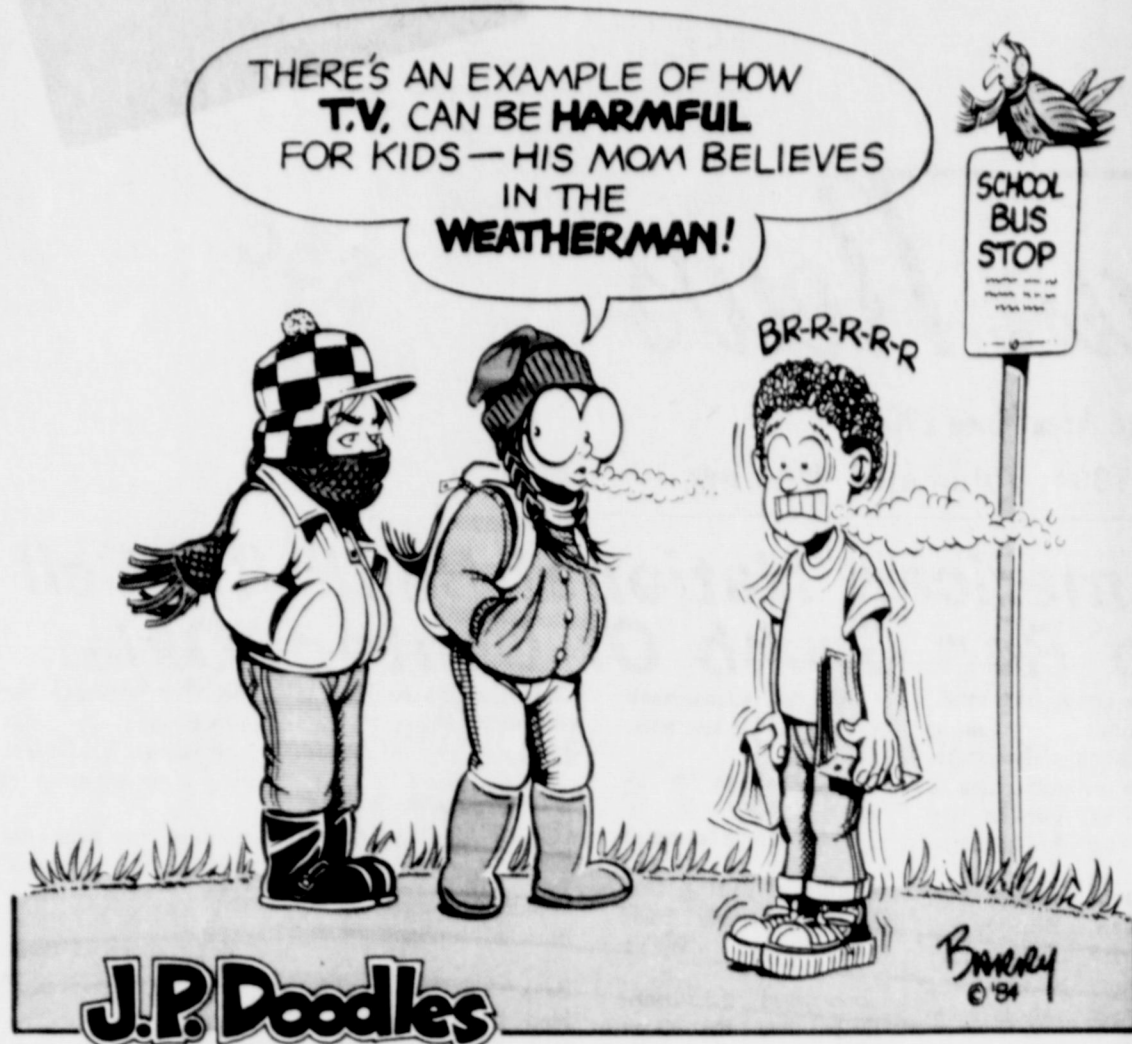
wear, the official vaulting pole, the official shampoo, the official athletes foot powder, the official nose spray, and perhaps even the official toilet tissue.

Hallums Participate In Program

More than 140 Texas Panhandle public school students are completing the spring session of the Gifted and Talented Institute at West Texas State University and plans are being made for a week-long summer session.

The spring session attracted 146 students from Amarillo, Alanreed, Borger, Dawn, Dimmitt, Floydada, Friona, Hereford, Paducah, Pampa, Silverton, Spearman, Tulia and Wildorado.

Although several of the classes end before March, said Mary Jane Reeves, coordinator of the Gifted and Talented Institute in the WTSU College of Education.

Participating students in first through twelfth grades each semester exhibit their work and talents during a "showcase" for parents and other persons.

Courses which have attracted the greatest response, said Reeves, are Spanish, art, archeology and biology. Sessions which end in March include "Let's Be Friends," which features WTSU international students; "Adventures in Theatre," with reading, pantomime and puppetry; and archeology.

Reeves said a summer session has been set for June 17-23 and additional information will be available before the WTSU spring semester ends in May.

Students and parents have participated in the spring Gifted and Talented Institute session each Saturday on campus.

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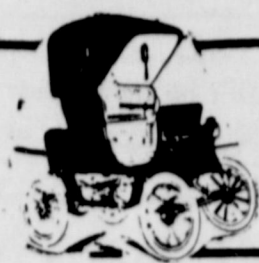
