Groom District Fairs Better Than Others

Groom Independent School District received unofficial tax roll figures Tuesday from the Carson County Appraisal District. "It looks like Groom will take better than area districts in losses on mineral values," says Superintendent Rex Peebles.

According to the Appraisal District's figures, Real Property values have been set at \$28,774,390 and Mineral values at \$35,774,100 with the total tax roll set at \$63,648,490. This means Groom Schools will lose only about \$100,000 in revenues.

Taxpayers should receive 20-day notice forms in May,

around the 14-17, according to a spokesman in the Appraisal District office. The statements are issued to taxpayers with changes in property values or upon written request by the taxpayer.

The Appraisal District did not re-appraise each property in the county as they had planned earlier. They did update many properties with improvements since the last mass appraisal and values on some lots have been changed. The re-appraisal will be conducted in time for tax statements in 1987.

Groom Searching For Head Coach

School Board members met in special session Monday night to formally accept the resignation of Head Coach Jim Duncan who will assume spring training drills at Perryton High School on Thursday. Duncan came to Groom last year on May 1. Jerry Crowell was hired to replace Duncan in the classroom portion of his contract.

Coaching assignments were then discussed briefly before the board elected to go into executive session. Mr. Peebles explained to the Board that electing not to replace Coach Duncan will leave Groom with only three coaches on staff, a condition found to be unsatisfactory last year. Duncan was the fourth coach to be hired in the system.

He also stated that he had received a number of applications since word of Duncan's acceptance of the Perryton job. Some he says are quite impressive for either a head coaching position or for an assistant should a coach within the system be selected to serve as head coach. Several alternatives were discussed by the board.

After an hour in executive session, the Board tabled the See Coach. Page 14

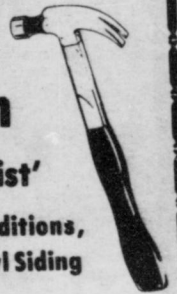

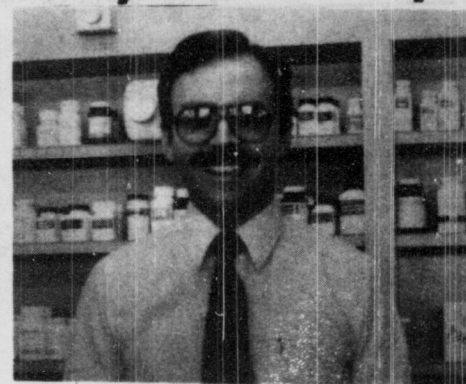

Vote Saturday In Party Primary Elections

Voters have a chance to make decisions on key state figures when they go to the polls Saturday in Primary Elections. The race drawing the most interest will no doubt be that in the Republican Party with three candidates vying for the chance to meet Democrat Mark White in November. Kent Hance will be a local favorite but opinion polls taken from across the state indicate that former Gov. Bill Clements will receive his party's nomination. Tom Loeffler is the third challenger.

Democratic Gov. Mark White has five challengers listed but Amarillo resident Ron Slover, listed on the ballot, has withdrawn from the race. The most widely known challenger to White is Andrew C. Briscoe III.

Locally, a new Precinct 6 Democratic Chairman will be elected. Nila Burgin is named to fill the vacancy left by her father Art Britten who has served a number of years as the chairman.

Local uncontested races are those held by democratic incumbents. The list includes County Judge, Jay Bob Roselius; District and County Clerk, Sue Persons; County Treasurer, Peggy Butler and Justice of the Peace Max Wade. Betty Rhynehart will remain the Democratic chairman.

Buck Buchanan is also unchallenged on the Democratic ballot for his seat in the state legislature. Dick Waterfield seeks the same post on the Republican primary.

Republican State Rep. Beau Bolter will hold his position and seeking the

same post in the Democratic Primary are Doug Stribling and Doug Seal.

Polls will open at 7:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m. You must be a registered voter to cast a ballot but you may vote in the primary of your choice. You do not designate your party affiliation until you vote in a primary election. After choosing a party in Primary elections you are bound to vote the same in any run-off elections. In the November General Election, winners of both primaries are listed on the ballot allowing voters to select the candidate they chose regardless of party affiliation.

Ballots will be cast in the Democratic Primary at St. Mary's Church Hall and the Republican Primary election will be conducted by Chairman Kenneth Payton at the Ag room of Groom Schools.
