Friemel Is Featured Speaker At Gray Conservation Seminar

The fourth annual Gray County Conservation Seminar will be held April 10 in Pampa at the Clyde Carruth Livestock Pavillion on East Highway 60.

Roman Friemel of Groom will be a featured speaker, one of three area farmers on the program. Friemel will be discussing conservation tillage or no-till practices he has used to reduce fuel cost.

Robert Jacobson, Adrian and Carl Olson of Panhandle will also discuss conservation measures used on their farms.

A plant pathologist, weed scientist, banker and extension home economics agent are also included on the program.

Soil Conservation Service, Pampa said registration will start at 9:00 a.m. The program will start at 9:30 and conclude at 3:00. High Plains farmers and their wives from Texas and Oklahoma are invited to attend. A free lunch and displays of conservation tillage equipment will be provided by participating agricultural equipment and chemical companies.

Junior High girls placing first in the meet were Shelly White, shot put; Jolee Burger, discus; and Lesa Sweatt, 100 low hurdles. Finishing

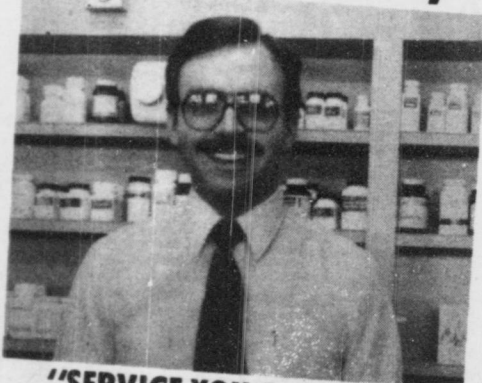
second was Heather Brown in the shot. She also finished third in discus. Lesa

The two following described parcels of real property will be offered separately and as a unit—**PARCEL ONE:** Legal Description: A tract of land containing 6.005 acres out of Section 93, Block B-3, H&GN Ry. Co. Survey, Carson County, Texas, and being more fully described by a metes and bounds description available from the auctioneers.

COMMON DESCRIPTION: A triangular shaped tract of land with approximately 1,034' of frontage on the North access road of Interstate 40 North of Groom, Texas. This property also has 393' of frontage along Farm to Market Road 2300. It is a property previously utilized as a truck stop and contains the following described improvements.

BUILDING: A 40' x 100' (4,000 square feet) metal clad wood framed quonset type building with a 31' x 44' (1,364 square feet) metal building addition to the West end. This makes the total square footage approximately 5,364 square feet. The main portion of this building is divided with approximately 2,400 square feet being devoted to the truck stop operation. It includes an office and checkout area near the entrance door with the balance of the area devoted to retail display. This area has a tile covered concrete slab floor while the walls and ceiling are exposed wood frame. Heating is by natural gas and cooling is by evaporative air conditioning assisted by ceiling fans. The remaining portion of the main building (approximately 1600 square feet) is devoted to restaurant seating. This area has paneled walls and a combination of tile and carpet over the slab floor. Again, natural gas forced air heating, evaporative air conditioning provide the customer comforts. The 1300 square foot metal addition to the main building contains the kitchen area for the restaurant. This area has a tile floor over a slab, a drop ceiling, recessed fluorescent lighting, and ceiling fans. The necessary plumbing and electrical wiring is in place. All lighting is fluorescent throughout this building, and the exterior of the quonset building is covered with an insulation and moisture proof membrane.

SERVICE BAYS: A 13' high awning covering approximately 3,000 square feet is attached on the South side of the above described building. The area beneath this awning is concrete and four gasoline pump islands are in place for fuel dispensing. Diesel is sold on the North side of the main building. However, the surface mounted diesel storage tank and diesel pumps are not included in the sale of the property which belong to the fuel distributor.

RESTROOM BUILDING: A 12' x 22' (264 square feet) x 9'6" high concrete block building provides restrooms for customers away from the main building.

ADDITIONAL SITE IMPROVEMENTS: Approximately 200' of 5' wide concrete sidewalks surround the main building. There is nearly 4,000 square feet of paving installed in different area. The remainder of the property is covered by gravel and rock. Seven Mercury Vapor lights illuminate the parking areas. Two 10,000 gallon steel underground tanks provide gasoline storage (New in 1981). Pump to tank plumbing is fiberglass pipe. Three lighted signs advertise various attractions of the enterprise.
