Janice Weinheimer Tallies Top Vote To Gain School Seat

A total of 273 Groom voters went to the polls Saturday to elect members to the school board, city govern-ment officials and decide the fate of the half cent sales tax. Election Judge Flora Glenn Hammers was pleased with voter turnout for the area.

Janice Weinheimer gathered the top vote in the School Board race with 138 votes. She and incumbent Bud Fields, receiving 114 votes, were sworn in at the April meeting of the School Board on Tuesday night. Also receiving votes in the School Board election were Joe Homer, 76, Bobby Pool, 74 and Phillis Jackson, 51.

In the City election, 117

votes were cast for incumbent Mayor Al Homer. Council members Ronny Fields received 131 votes with incumbent Jerry Thornton receiving 133.

The tax question was defeated with 79 persons voting against establishing the new tax and 55 voting for.

Kiley Lambert Wins Top Honor

The Youth Tour Washington, D.C. contest, which is sponsored by Greenbelt Electric Cooperative, was held at the Bura Handley Community Building Wellington, on March 31. Eight contestants from the service area of Greenbelt Electric spoke on the sub-ject of "Cooperatives, Good for Rural Texans." The winners of the contest were awarded a two week, all expense trip to Washington, D.C. The two winners will join 70 other winners from Texas, which also have been awarded trips to Washington for winning their local contest sponsored by the Rural Electric Cooperative in their area. These students will then join approximately 1,000 other winners across the nation for a tour of Washington, D.C.

Besides the chance to view many of our national shrines, such as the Lincoln Memorial, Mount Vernon and the Smithsonian Institution, winners will have the opportunity to spend one day with their senator or representative to discuss issues that concern today's young adults.

School Board Members Sworn Into Office Monday Night

James Hefley and Jake Hess II were sworn in for new three year terms Monday night at the monthly meeting of the Mclean School Board. In Saturday's election, Hefley was the top vote-getter with 267 votes while Hess got 254. Write-in votes were as follows: Bill Pitts-1; Buster Day-1; George Eck-2; Steve Brass-4: Melba Harkins-2: and there were two unmarked ballots.

After the order of election was approved, new board officers were elected. Darryel Herndon was named President, James Hefley was elected Vice-president and Gwen Henley was named Secretary.

The main item on the agenda was the purchase of new uniforms for the band. Music Director Roger Myers was on hand with samples and bids from several companies.

Myers said that the old uniforms are 13 years old grown in size it has become increasingly difficult to fit everyone properly. He estimated that there will probably be 45-50 students in

the band next year and requested the purchase of 60 new uniforms. He said that extras are needed in case some are damaged and also to allow for fitting of band members who wear odd-

sized uniforms. Of the four samples he demonstrated, Mr. Myers recommended one that would cost about \$10,000 for 60 uniforms.

He said that the band and its booster club had already raised \$3500 through its various fund-raising activities and requested that the board allocate the remaining \$6500 to purchase the uniforms.

Several board members

pressed their support for the band and mentioned the excellent ratings that the band has received in competitions during the last several years. They said they felt it was unfair for the band to have to raise money for its own uniforms when others, such as the football and basketball teams, have their uniforms provided by the school.

After extensive discussion, the board agreed that the band's performance had

polls on Saturday and decided on George Green as their new mayor. A salesman for a chemical company, Green served one term on the city council prior to running for mayor. In a close race, he defeated McLean Care Center Administrator Bill Thomas by a vote of 152 to

In the races for City Council, incumbent Jerry Cook beat challenger Jake Bible 205 to 69. In the race to fill the seats vacated by George Green and Miro Pakan, Dale Glass was the top vote-getter with 195, while Mike Harkins was second with 136. Those two gentlemen will serve in three year terms while Cook's term has two years left.

The other candidates running for the council were Louise Turner, who got 106 votes and Jerald Reynolds

In the referendum on the golf course, in which the county would contract with the City of Pampa to assist in the construction of the course, the county-wide vote was 2064 to 1728 in favor while in McLean the vote was 264 to 26 against and in Alanreed the vote was 17 to 2 against.

According to County Judge Carl Kennedy, the vote now makes it "legally binding on the County Commission to assist in the construction of the course, assuming that the City of Pampa goes ahead with the project. If Pampa doesn't do anything about it, then we won't." However, Kennedy added, "Pampa officials haven't indicated that they won't go ahead with the construction."
