Rebates Decline

Groom had the smallest decrease in sales tax this quarter of all the reporting entities in Carson County. The county fell 18 percent in the recent reporting with Groom showing an 8 percent loss, Panhandle a 17 percent loss, Skellytown 35 percent and White Deer had a loss of 14 percent.

Gray county entities reported losses across the board with McLean having a 10 percent decrease, Panpa 19 percent and Lefors 42 percent.

Claude receiving a rebate \$41.00 higher than in the previous year showed a 0.20 percent drop.

Statewide the figures are off 6.5 percent according to a report released by State Comptroller, Bob Bullock. All large cities in Texas also reported declines in their sales tax collections.

July checks represent taxes collected on sales made in May and reported to the Comptroller by June 20.

Plans for the 1987 Groom Day were finalized at the meeting held Friday evening at the State National Bank Hospitality Room. Chairman Johnny Brooks announced there would not be Bingo as the City of Groom has not yet had the opportunity to hold a local option election to license the committee.

Reports were made by the chairmen of each activity or by Mr. Brooks.

The tennis meet directed by Shirley Fields will be Wednesday, July 29 for children with an entry fee of \$1.00. The high school and adult meet is on Thursday, July 30 and the fee is \$2.00. This change will enable players to be free for Friday activities.

Groom DPS officers Greg Eatmon and Gary Davis were called Saturday evening to investigate a shooting incident along I-40 at the 114 Exit. Robert H. Tonkins was arrested for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon and was booked into

the Gray County jail. Tonkins became agitated while traveling down I-40 in a 1978 Ford Fiesta licensed out of California. A Weatherford, Okla. truck driver came too close to the Tonkins vehicle while passing, said DPS officer Greg Eatmon. Tonkin then did the same to Walters and pulled along side Walters writing down information from the truck on a small pad. While Tonkins pulled again in front of Walters, he slowed down and continued writing. Walters again passed the California man. Then Tonkins again pulled along side the truck and this time waved a pistol at Walters.

As the two vehicles approached the 114 Exit, Tonkins signaled he was taking the exit and Walters again pulled along side the vehicle in the right lane to pass, Tonkins pulled back into the lane on I-40, his vehicle striking the rear tandem of the trailer locking the two vehicles. Summer Arts Program July 31 In Panhandle

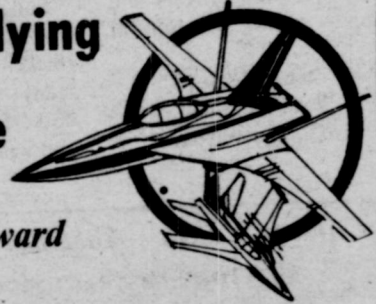

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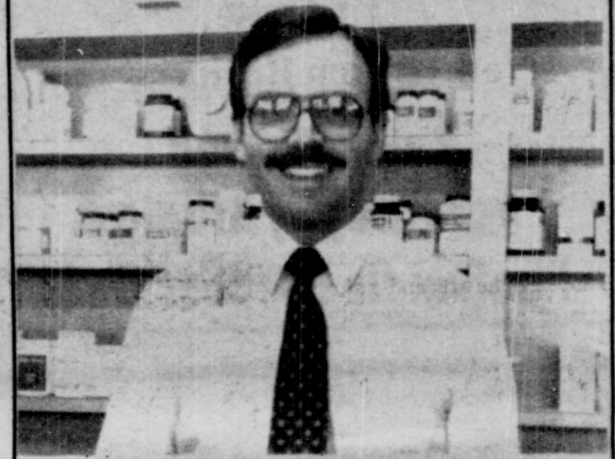

Groom School Board Has Option To Lower Tax Rate

In presenting factors affecting the 1987-88 budget and tax rate to the Board of Trustees, Joyce Hutsell, business manager for the Groom School District was able to recommend good news for the board of Trustees and to taxpayers. In spite of the decline in oil and gas properties submitted by the Appraisal District, the tax base as published in the Groom News July 17 is sufficient to fund the 1987-88 school year while offering the taxpayers a rate decrease.

The Carson County Appraisal District increased valuations on most Groom properties in an attempt to reach a value for tax purposes equal to a fair market value for the property

if sold. The State Property Tax Board in Austin monitors all sales of property and evaluates the sales price against the taxed price. Property sales in the Groom ISD have maintained a good price in spite of the generally depressed economy.

According to Mrs. Hutsell, the statistics are both good news and bad news in that we want to feel that Groom's

economy and future are viable and that property values are stable. On the other hand, this means that the State Property Tax Board will keep pressuring for a general raise in overall housing values until the "average sale" comes into line with the "average evaluation." For this reason, each taxpayer should assess his tax evaluation compared with

the fair market value of the tax statement and be prepared to attend the Appraisal District's Board of Review if he feels that the two are not fairly equitable.

Patrick Weinheimer, president of the Board pointed out that the school maintenance needs have decreased with the completion of the track program repair and with the entire building now under a recently completed roofing program. The school instructional staff has decreased by one faculty member at this time as has the maintenance staff.

"These two reductions in expected 1987-88 expense are a factor in the lowered budget which will offset the increased salary schedule approved by the Board."

"In addition," says Weinheimer, "our business manager, through judicious use of the computer and interest bearing accounts, has been able to increase the earnings on the school bonds accounts. The final payment on the school bonds will be effected in the 1987-88 school year, and with the previous earnings in the account, less money will be required for

this final payment.

"This is good news for the future, also," continues Weinheimer, "as we will no longer have bonded indebtedness until such time as growth of the school population requires an expansion program."

"In a time when so many school districts have been forced to raise taxes to maintain revenues, Groom School is in the fortunate position of having lowered taxes for the past three years."

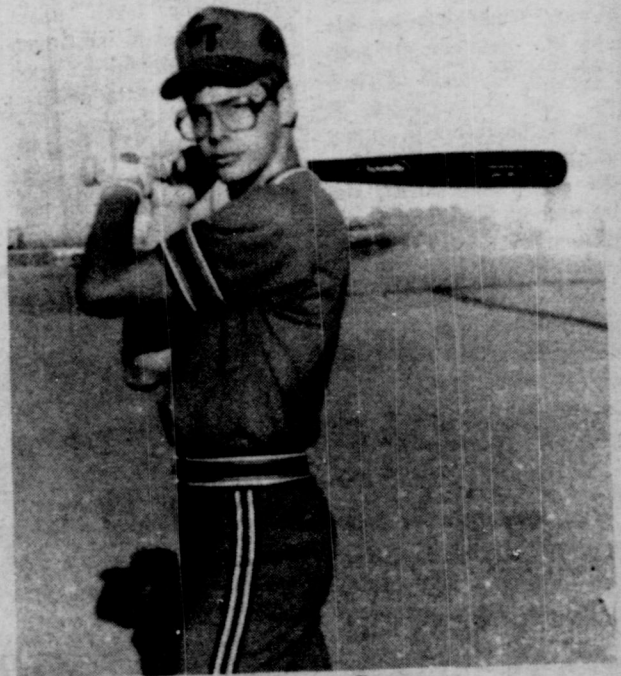

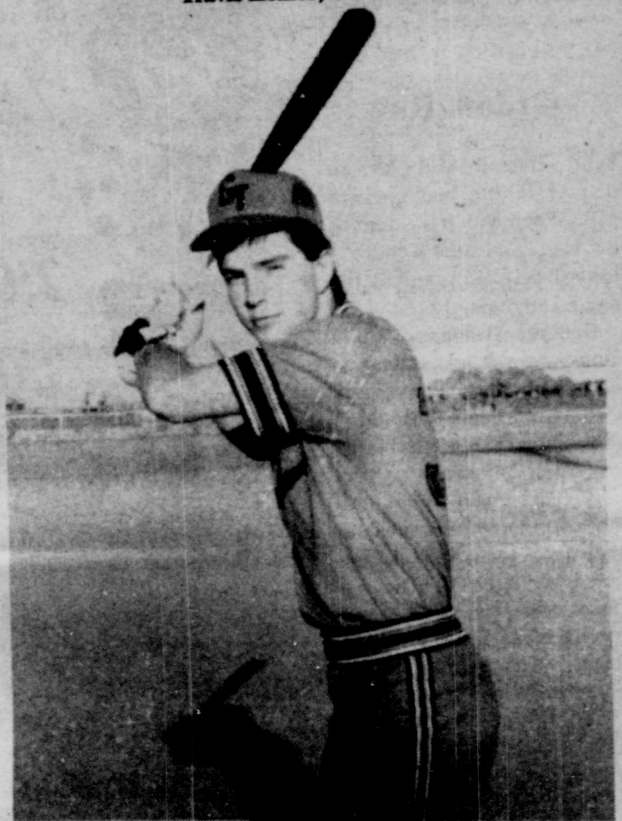

Better Planning Needed By Farmers To Secure Nonperforming Loans

More nonperforming loans, loans classified as high risk by external examiners and increases in loan losses have changed the lending practices and policies significantly of many agricultural lenders, according to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Most of the changes relate to the following areas:

1. Need for more and better information for loan decision making.
2. More analysis and verification of information obtained from the borrower.
3. Greater emphasis on projected cash flow and demonstrated repayment ability.
4. Increased monitoring of the business performance after the loan is made.
5. Stricter adherence to loan policy guidelines.

"This means that to be successful in the loan application process, farmers and ranchers will be required to do more preparation and better planning. While many farmers and ranchers may view the additional documentation as more red tape, the information needed by a lender concerning financial, marketing and production information is even more important for the borrower.

Before visiting a lender, borrowers should learn how the lender decides whether the loan will be made and for what amount. Generally, borrowers should be prepared to answer these questions:

1. How much will you need to borrow during the year?
2. When will the money be needed?
3. What is it going to be used for?
4. How will the loan affect your financial position?
5. How will the loan be secured?
6. How will the loan be repaid?
7. How will alternative possible outcomes affect repayment ability?
9. And, how will the loan be repaid if the first repayment plan fails?

In one of the major items of business, the board hired two new teachers for McLean. Kathleen Kamphaus will teach science in grades 7-12 and Cynthia Ewing will teach business.

Mrs. Kamphaus is originally from Council Bluffs, Iowa but was raised in Burns Flats, Okla. She attended Burns Flat High School and went to college at Central State in Edmond, Okla. and Southwestern State University in Weatherford, Okla. She has a B.A. degree in

Natural Sciences and is currently working on her masters degree. She has taught school in Cordell.

She and her husband Richard have been married for four years. He is the manager of a ladies shoe store and a men's clothing store in Elk City.

Ms. Ewing comes to us from Hollis, Okla. No other information about her was available at press time.

In other business the board:

-Heard a presentation from Mr. Rutherford who read a letter to the McLean ISD from the Texas Education Association. It concerned the transfer of students from the Wheeler ISD and students below grade 8 from the Alanreed ISD. The letter stated that in order for the McLean ISD to remain in

compliance with the court order concerning the ethnic balance of students, those transfers have been refused. The letter went on to state that there were certain hardship conditions which constituted viable reasons for transfer and that under such circumstances, those applications would be individually reviewed and approved or disapproved by the TEA. After a discussion, it was agreed that Mr. Rutherford would contact the parents of the students involved immediately and give them directions for applying for hardship transfers. Some of the students who transfers were refused are currently attending McLean schools.

-Approved the following resolution: "We the trustees of the McLean ISD, do hereby desire to proclaim that the science laboratory be named the "Carl Dwyer" science lab in appreciation to Mr. Dwyer for the services rendered to our school district and students and for his dedication in the field of education." The board also discussed the purchase of a plaque to name the science room in honor of Mr. Dwyer.

-Heard a presentation from Jane Herndon on the building insurance policy for 1987-88. The premium of \$2,277 is cheaper than last year due to a decrease on certain commercial rates.

-Approved a motion to place Jacquelyn Riley and Evelyn Sanders on level 2 of the career ladder.

-Split the depository bid between the McLean Bank of Commerce and First Bank and Trust of Memphis with the stipulation that the district reserves the right to invest its own funds.

-Hired Gordon Maddox as CPA for the 1986-87 audit.

City Council Discusses Special Use of Landfill

The McLean City Council met last Tuesday night in its regular monthly session.

Members in attendance were Mayor George Green and Aldermen Dr. H.F. Fabian, Jerry Cook, Dale Glass, Martha Jo Bailey and Mike Harkins.

In one of the major items of business, the council approved the writing of an ordinance to pass special rates for contractors wanting to use the land-fill during non-regular hours. Normal hours for dumping are 4-6 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday and 1-6 p.m. Saturday. Anyone wishing to use the landfill at times other than regular hours would be required to pay the following costs: \$50.00 for 18 wheeler semi truck; \$20.00 for double axle truck; \$15.00 for single axle truck; \$10.00 for pick-up truck.

In addition, anyone wishing to use the landfill during non-regular hours would be required to give 24 hours notice at City Hall and could use the dump only during regular City working hours. A deposit of \$20.00 per hour or \$100, whichever is greater, would have to be paid in advance.

The council also agreed to take up all landfill keys. Only city employees will be allowed to have keys.

The motion, which passed unanimously, would not change the rates for using the landfill during regular hours. Rates will continue to be \$2.00 for all pick-ups under three-quarter ton and all two-wheel trailers and \$5.00 for all pick-ups over three-quarter ton.

In one other major item of business, the council agreed to the disposal of some old City records. According to City Secretary Stella Lee, "We would only be getting rid of old invoices, carbon copies of old gas and water receipts and extra copies of documents. All council minutes, city budgets, copies of checks, cemetery records and copies of audits will be kept."

Also, records would have

to be more than seven years old before they would be discarded.

In other business, the council:

-Accepted a bid of \$58,000 from Chief Fire and Safety for the purchase of a 1985 pumper fire truck. This was the only bid received.

To purchase the truck, the city passed the following resolution to obtain a loan from the Bank of Commerce:

"BE IT RESOLVED, that the Mayor of the City of McLean, Texas, be and is hereby authorized to borrow from the Bank of Commerce of McLean, Texas, a sum not to exceed \$48,000 on such terms and interest rates as may be negotiated relating to such loans."

The loan will be paid back at a rate of \$600 per month. Local residents are helping to pay for the truck through the addition of \$1.00 per month to their water meter charge;

-Heard a presentation from a resident requesting that she be provided with city sewer service in Block B, original town of McLean. After a lengthy discussion, the council agreed that city sewer service at this location is not feasible;

-Met with Kay Foshee, Executive Director of the Housing Authority concerning the possible remodeling of two units of the HUD project at 6th and Wheeler Streets. The council agreed to support the project within reason. If city funds are required, the need will be reviewed at that time;

-Approved a motion to get cost estimates to get carpeting for the floor of the council room and tile for the entrance lobby of City Hall. The cost will be figured into the 1987-88 budget;

-Agreed to advertise for the purchase of a newer backhoe-loader. Bids will be opened August 11, 1987 at 7:00 p.m.;

-Agreed to spray the grass in all city paved streets with round-up spray;

-Heard a report from Superintendent Bob Glenn that the first spraying of mosquitos has been completed.

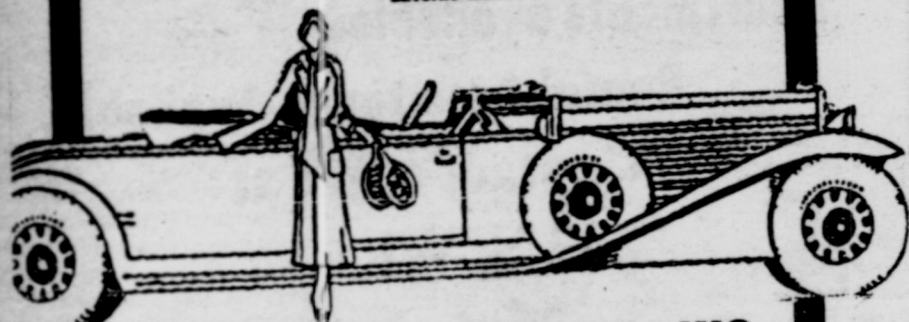

Drugs: What Parents Can Do For Their Kids

Teach standards of right a wrong and demonstrate these through personal example.

Children who are brought up to value individual responsibility and self discipline and to have a clear sense of right a wrong are less likely to try drugs than those who are not. Parents can help to instill these ideals by:
*Setting a good example for children and not using

drugs themselves.
*Explaining to their children at an early age that drug use is wrong, harmful, and unlawful, and reinforcing this teaching throughout adolescence.
*Encouraging self-discipline through giving children everyday duties and holding them accountable for their

actions.
*Establishing standards of behavior concerning drugs, drinking, dating curfews and unsupervised activities and enforcing them fairly.
*Encouraging their children to stand by their convictions when pressured to use drugs.

Help children to resist peer pressure to use drugs by supervising their activities, know who their friends are and talking with them about their interests and problems.
When parents take an active interest in their children's behavior, they provide the guidance and support

children need to resist drugs. Parents can do this by:
*Knowing their children's activities, whereabouts and friends.

*Working to maintain and improve family communications and listening to their children.

*Being able to discuss drugs knowledgeably. It is better for a child to obtain information from parents than from peers or on the street.

*Being selective about their child's viewing of TV and movies that portray drugs in a glamorous way.

*Communicate with parents of children's friends and with the school regarding activities and behavior.

Know about drugs and recognize the signs of their use. When symptoms are observed, respond promptly.

Parents are in the best position to recognize early signs of drug use by their children. Parents should:

*Learn about the extent of drug and alcohol problems in their community.

*Be able to recognize signs of drug use a devise a plan of action.

*Discuss suspicions with their child in a calm, objective measure.

*Impose disciplinary measures that help remove the child from the circumstances where drug use might occur.

*Seek professional help.

School Board
Eyes 1987-88 Budget

Groom School Board members were informed last Tuesday night that they could save taxpayers money and still be able to fund the budget from the \$56,688,000 on the tax rolls.

The Board heard more good news in that the school currently has \$600,000 in surplus funds which have netted over \$30,000 in interest this year. And the school will finish the current fiscal year with an additional \$24,000 to up the surplus fund total. The school will also pay the final payment on bonds this year which will mean a savings of at least eight cents per hundred dollars of valuation to each taxpayer.

Business Manager Joyce Hutsell gave board members a line by line evaluation of the preliminary 1987-88 budget. At the onset she reminded board members they had realized a \$46,000 savings in personnel costs along by cutting the maintenance staff by one employee and the teaching staff by one.

She estimates the district will spend \$1,036,364 next year to educate its youth. The district will receive \$382,900 in state funds and \$50,275 in federal funds. Other local sources will yield \$88,800 so taxpayers will fund the additional \$514,388.

Mr. Rex Peebles told board members that the budget proposal was "prudent while providing funds to maintain programs for the children."

Members expressed their concern over cutting the maintenance budget some \$58,000 less than last year, the difference being the resurfacing of the track paid from the budget a year ago. After a lengthy discussion on the condition of the school facilities Board President Pat Weinheimer suggested that at the August meeting school officials have

a priority list available for study in regard to future maintenance projects at the school. Items discussed included the swimming pool, replacement of several doors, condition of the parking area and resodding the football field.

Board member Hop Britten suggested reducing the \$1.09 tax rate of a year ago by 15 cents which will allow \$30,000 for contingencies.

Mrs. Hutsell was instructed to add funds into the maintenance function for next year. The budget must be approved by August 21.

Mrs. Hutsell also pointed out that it appears mandated changes in school finance are working while Groom ISD is able to lower its tax rate as other schools in the area are raising their taxes.

Judy Babeck met with the board to discuss the annual review of the dress code. She chaired a committee which met earlier to submit changes in the dress code to the board.

She reviewed items changed in the code which added that girl students may not wear mini skirts or pant lengths above the ankles. The proposed code outlawed t-shirts with advertisements for alcohol and tobacco or distasteful slogans for both boys and girls. Pant length

for the boys was also set at the ankle. Mesh shirts must be worn with another shirt underneath and boys may not wear ear jewelry at school or to school functions. Both boys and girls must lace their shoes and tie them and black cleats that mark the floor may not be worn.

The only change proposed by the committee refused by the board was the matter of socks for boys. Bill England began the discussion saying the board had stood before unanimously on that issue and he would like to see the requirement stand. The board voted to approve the dress code with the changes and required that socks be worn by boys.

Superintendent Peoples advised the board to make final payment on the track to Vibra Whirl of \$3,740. The payment had been withheld until the west end of the track was levelled. Vibra Whirl spent several days in Groom completing the re-

pairs. The board approved the payment.

Also the 'Writing to Read' program stands in limbo as IBM computers used in the program have jumped in price considerably from the initial estimate. The board gave their approval to order the new personal computer to be released by IBM in August with an option to cancel the order if the computer prices are not comparable.

Nancy Patterson was hired as a food service clerk. The board met in executive session to examine the more than 20 applications filed for the job.

In other action the use of the school facilities were approved for Groom Day, Principal Ken Sweatt reviewed the TEAMS test results of first graders and an insurance plan was approved to be offered to school employees that will supplement their medical insurance.
