Tigers Face McLean-Friday

Groom dropped to 1-6 in season play and 0-2 in loop play Friday night with a loss against Silverton.

Groom managed to roll up 216 total yards on offense, with 36 of them rushing. Quarterback Michael Rose completed 16 of 24 passes for 177 yards, five to Stoney Crump for 64 yards and five to Kevin Kerlee for 73 yards.

Silverton's Henderson led all rushers with 94 yards on 18 carries. The Owl's ground game, combined with three Groom turnovers and four interceptions, spelled doom for the

Tigers.
"We can't come out and times against a good ball club and expect to do well." Groom Coach Jimmy Branch said. "We were playing pretty good ball, but those three fumbles killed us."

Silverton put a quick 12 points on the board in the first period when Kendal Minyard hit Jamie Frizzell on a 17 -yard touchdown pass and Neal Edwards sprinted into the end zone from the one.

Stoney Crump responded with what would prove to be the Tigers' lone touchdown of the night, a 21-yard dash. Robert Miller's conversion pass to Richard Jenkins

brought Groom within five points of the Owls.

Groom had a chance to go ahead 13-12 before a fumble turned the ball back over to Silverton. With two minutes remaining in the half, the Owls posted back to back touchdowns, a 32 -yard pass from Minyard to Edwards and a 13-yard run by Denny Hill, to carry a 26-7 lead into the locker room.

Groom lost a fumble on the opening kickoff of the second half, which led to Bradley Brunson's 3-yard scoring run. On the very

next kickoff, Silverton again recovered the ball when the Groom return failed to cover the kick. And again Brunson took it in for the score from the three yard line. Groom trailed 42-7 as the fourth period began.

"Some nights we play with our heads," Branch said, "and some nights we play with our hearts. The night that we come out and play with both is the night we're going to win."

Groom continues district play in Mclean Friday night, beginning at 7:30.

Race Is On For Commissioner-Precinct 1

The race is on for Carson County Commissioner of Precinct 1 as the local candidates make their visits around to local voters passing out campaign literature. Voters not only in Precinct 1 have decisions to make as to their selection of candidates but voters from coast to coast must choose from President to Sheriff in the November general election.

After the death of Commissioner R.J. Britten, the democratic vacancy of commissioner was filled by the Commissioners Court by Britten's son Mike. Since then the Carson County Democratic Executive Committee met their policy requirement of selecting a candidate to be placed on the ballot. From a group of several the committee chose Art Britten. But since that selection was made three others have successfully qualified to be write-in candidate for Carson County Commissioner, Mike Britten

was the first person to announce his candidacy as a write-in followed by C.L. Wieberg and Don Smith.

The salary of commissioner pays \$21,857.04 per year with an additional \$200.00 per month car allowance and 100 percent hospitalization insurance for the commissioner. The commissioner's court meets every second and fourth Monday of the month for the responsibility of handling all of the countys' business, including paying county bills. The con missioners court is the presiding government body for the county passing all orders of the court. Other responsibilities of the commissioners include approv-ing the county's annual budget and setting all salaries of county employees and elected officials.

Precinct 1 now has two full time employees Don Smith and Eddie England with others being added on a part-time basis as needed.

In the early 1970's Mr. Arthur Britten requested that our firm represent the town of Groom. A decision had been made in Washington, D.C. concerning the construction of I-40 through the Panhandle of Texas which would bypass Groom, with the nearest planned accesses to be a mile east and a mile and a half west of Groom.

Mr. Britten saw that the plans would isolate Groom, and he initiated the fight for the welfare of the town. He was a primary force in organizing the local citizens and public officials. Everyone got behind him. Civic groups, the mayor, and the City Council all passed resolutions in support of our effort, which was fought at every level of government, up to and including Washington, D.C. Mr. Arthur Britten paid our fee himself.

As you know, the fight for interstate access was successful. We were able to obtain access to and exits from both FM 295 and FM 2300 on the north side of Groom. To my knowledge no other town of Groom's size in the United States has comparable access to the interstate highway system. The citizens of Groom and the surrounding area can be proud of the accomplishment.

Soon after construction started the contractors came to Mr. Britten and asked to get the fill dirt from his property on the north side of the highway. The highway beautification law stated that no fill dirt could be taken within 1,000 feet of the interstate highway. Mr. Britten saw an opportunity to solve a critical flood problem for the City of Groom if he could bypass the 1,000 foot law and take the fill dirt from the lake bottom on the south side of I-40. He also realized that it would eliminate the noxious sewer oder from the drainage ditch that came into Groom when the wind came from the north. Again he employed my services.

After getting the citizens of Groom behind us, we got the contractor to agree to remove about 20,000 yards of black wash dirt from the lake bottom to get down to suitable soil for the overpass fills. After appealing to the Texas Department of Public Highways in Austin, and then to the Bureau of Public Roads in Washington, D.C., we were able to accomplish this. Mr. Britten again paid for my services. For the City of Groom to solve the flood and sewer problem it would have cost them many hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Mr. Arthur Britten saw the opportunity for the town and did not let it get away. Every time I drive through Groom I am proud of having been a part of it and of what was accomplished for your town.
