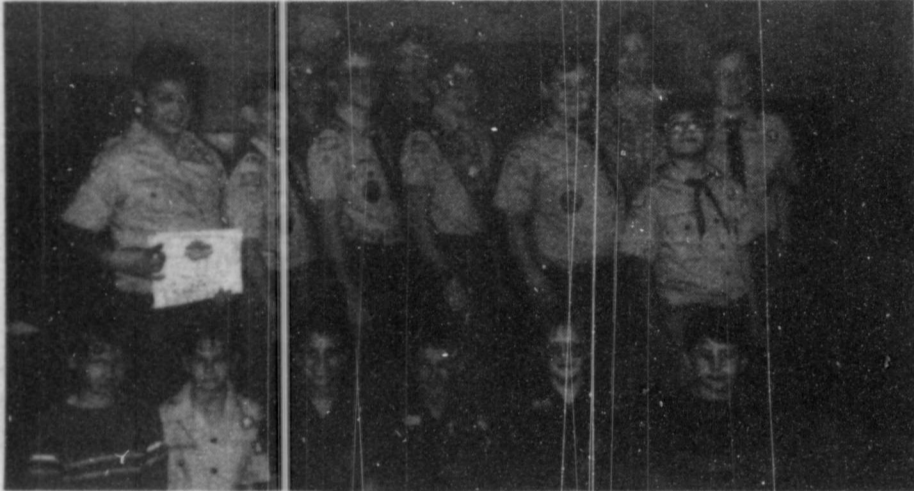

Weekend Freezing Rain, Icy Roads Keeps Local DPS Busy

Icy roads and freezing drizzle caused cancellations in Groom and the ice on roadways kept many people at home in front of the TV.

Pampa reported the freezing drizzle contributed to six traffic accidents through 6 p.m. Saturday keeping law enforcement and hospital emergency room personnel busy throughout the day.

At 12:30 a.m. Saturday, a 1985 Jeep driven by Benjamin Weinheimer of Groom rolled over on 23rd Street in Pampa.

Coronado Hospital emergency room personnel said late Saturday that 11 persons had been treated and released for weather-related injuries.

Amarillo officials reported that through 8 p.m.

Saturday, law enforcement officers had received reports of more than 100 motor vehicle accidents.

Locally Trooper Gary Davis reported working four accidents on Saturday, March 24. The first was reported at 2:45 a.m. and the last at 1:10 p.m.

At 2:45 a.m. a car driven by Jimmy Slavens of Montrose, Colorado was towing a horse trailer when it rolled over east of Groom on I-40. The roads were covered with ice at the time of the accident. Slavens was cited for Fail to Control Speed.

Davis was called again at 4:30 a.m. to East of Conway, Clay Roberson of Tulsa, Oklahoma was driving the vehicle that overturned on the icy road.

Roberson was taken to Northwest Texas Hospital by the Panhandle Ambulance with neck and back injuries.

The passenger, Randy Campbell, of Centerville, Arizona was asleep in the sleeper of the truck when he

was awakened by the truck overturning in the center median. Roberson was cited for unsafe speed.

A Ford pickup driven by Charles Wiggins of Oklahoma City was struck by TTST truck, when the truck passed Wiggins. The truck started sliding on the ice. The back duels of the trailer struck the pickup knocking it off the road. The TTST truck continued on and was

reported as a hit and run. The accident occurred at 11:15 a.m. west of Conway on I-40.

At 1:10 p.m. a Ford van driven by Floyd Smith, Jr. of Angier, N.C. was eastbound on I-40 at the 124 Exit at Jericho. Smith lost control of the van on the icy roads and started swerving. A TTST driven by Luis Marquez hit his brakes to avoid hitting

Tax Deferral Available For Elderly

Texans aged 65 or older can postpone delinquent and current property taxes on their homesteads by taking advantage of a tax option called over-65 deferral. The elderly homeowner simply signs a deferral affidavit at the Carson County Appraisal District office.

This special form of tax relief can also halt a lawsuit already filed to collect delinquent property taxes on an older Texan's homestead, according to Dianne Lavake, chief appraiser of the Carson County Appraisal District. To stop a delinquent tax suit, Lavake said, the over-65 homeowner files the deferral affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending.

"This law means that, if the proper affidavit is on file, an older homeowner cannot lose a homestead because of delinquent taxes," Lavake said.

Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can initiate or pursue a suit for see Tax Deferral, Page 6.

City Officials Hear About Grain Elevator Explosions

Groom Fire Dept. sponsored a fire safety meeting Monday night for their volunteer members, city officials, area grain elevator workers and local business owners. The good crowd of approximately sixty on hand were treated to a barbecue dinner.

The topic of the meeting focused on grain elevator explosions and petroleum fires. Fire Dept. Official Tony Treadwell introduced Ken Howard, a safety specialist, from Farmland Industries, who spoke to the crowd and showed a video

presentation. Howard said an average of twenty grain elevator explosions occur over a ten year period. He advised grain elevator operators to maintain good housekeeping procedures due to the high danger of explosiveness of grain dust.

Also Howard recommended to the Fire Dept. and Emergency medical teams to prepare an Action Plan in case of an emergency. The Action Plan includes personnel, phone numbers and special procedures on a fire, gas or chemical spill.

Grandview Hopkins Students Score High On TEAMS

Officials with the Grandview-Hopkins public schools have been notified by the Texas Education Agency that for the third year in a row their students have been among the best in the state on the TEAMS tests, which evaluate basic skills.

In a letter from TEA Deputy Commissioner Victoria Bergin, Chuck Steele, Grandview-Hopkins superintendent, was told:

"It is a pleasure to offer my congratulations to you for having demonstrated this meritorious accomplishment on being among the ranks of the 103 prestigious schools honored for academic excellence."

Bergin noted that Grandview-Hopkins is known for "good, solid teaching of basics, development of excellent campus plans and the promotion of comprehensive staff

development."

She said that those foundations provided a basis for continued excellence in the district that is "not something out of the ordinary or temporary."

Students at Grandview-Hopkins, which only has an elementary school program, have the opportunity to attend Lefors, Pampa or Groom schools for their secondary schooling.

Gray Co. SWCD Poster Contest Winners

Three Grandview-Hopkins Elementary School students took top honors in the 1990 Gray County Soil and Water Conservation District Poster Contest recently.

Approximately 450 Gray Co. elementary school students from Pampa and Grandview-Hopkins participated in the Contest. Ribbons for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place and 2 Honorable Mentions were presented to students in each of the 23 classrooms. Also as part of the Contest, an Eastern Red Cedar tree seedling was presented to each of the 450 students and 21 teachers who participated. Each school that participated was given 5 trees.

Placing 1st overall, out of all 450 entries, was Justin Ritter, a 5th grade student at Grandview-Hopkins. Ken Weinheimer, a 6th grade student at Grandview-Hopkins, placed 2nd, and Mark Stone, also a 6th grade student at Grandview-Hopkins, was selected as the 3rd

place winner. These students' posters have been sent to the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board in Temple for judging on the Regional level.

Classroom Awards were also presented to the three classrooms judged best overall. These winners were presented with a certificate and a cash award to be used to purchase a teaching aid for the classroom. The first place award went to Mrs. Ragsdale's 6th grade at Grandview-Hopkins. Mrs. Ragsdale's 5th grade at Grandview-Hopkins was awarded 2nd place, and 3rd place was received by Mrs. Hoover's 4th grade at Horace Mann Elementary School, Pampa.

NOTICE OF TARIFF CHANGE TO CENTRANET® SERVICE

GTE Southwest Incorporated gives notice of its proposed tariff changes to CentraNet® service, which is a Central Office-based service that provides PBX-type features to multi-line business customers and is currently being offered in all company wire centers where such facilities exist to provide the service.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved a generic tariff for CentraNet® service up to 100 lines in Docket No. 7652. The proposed tariff revision would establish specific rates for CentraNet® service involving 101 to 400 lines. Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

The names of the three CentraNet® packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet® 1000, CentraNet® 2000, and CentraNet® 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet® packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet® 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet® 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. The deadline to intervene in this docket is 3:00 p.m., April 9, 1990.

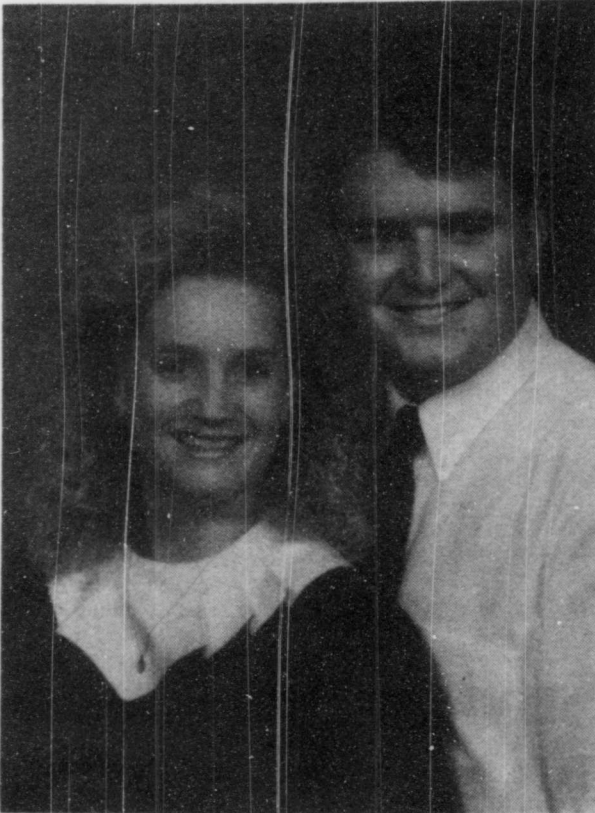

Swimming Classes To Begin At Groom

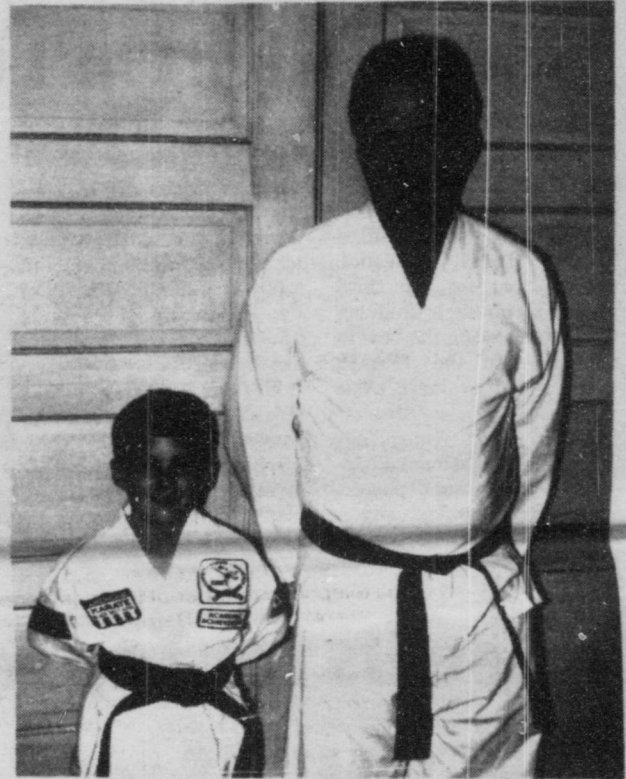

"Impacting A Region: Native Americans, English, And Polish" Theme Of Series

"Impacting a Region: Native Americans, English, Germans and Polish" will be the theme of a series of four lectures to be held at the Carson County Square House Museum in Panhandle on four Sunday afternoons in April.

The lectures will be held at 3:00 p.m. in the Senator Grady and Andrine Hazlewood Education Center of the Museum. The series is made possible, in part, by a grant from the Texas Committee for the Humanities, a division of The National Endowment for the Humanities. The Museum has applied for the authority to

grant Continuing Education Credit for teachers through Amarillo College.

Dr. Frederick W. Rathjen, Professor of History at West Texas State University is the Humanities Advisor for the program. Dr. Rathjen has worked with Don Markham, Museum Director and John Greene, the Director of Education for the Museum, in securing the speakers for the series. The final lecture will conclude with a brief overview of the series by Dr. Rathjen, highlighting the interrelationships and cross-cultural influences of the ethnic groups featured in the four lectures.

Bill Brown, Curator of History at the Panhandle Plains Museum in Canyon and former executive Director of the Center of the American Indian in Oklahoma City, will speak on the Plains Indians at the first lecture on April 1.

April 8, Mr. Bill Waters of Pampa, Chairman of the M.K. Brown Foundation, will speak on the influence of the English settlers in the region. Mr. Waters has served as the Gray County Attorney and the District Attorney for the 31st Judicial District. The English impact on this region is a topic that Mr. Waters can

speak on with authority.

The third lecture will be on April 22, when Dr. Billy Weaver, Assistant Director of the Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City, will present a lecture and slide show entitled "German Folk Islands in Northwest Tex."

The final program, on April 29, will concentrate on the Polish settlers. Mrs. Proxie Warminski and Mrs. Carolyn Rapstine of White Deer will present this session. Mrs. Warminski and Mrs. Rapstine have researched Polish settlement of the region from the time the Polish settled at Panna Maria and their subsequent movement to Carson County in the early 1900's. The research led to the writing and producing of a Polish Pageant for the Texas Sesquicentennial. Mrs. Rapstine edited the book, "Roots of Faith - The Story of the Sacred Heart Parish, White Deer, Texas" on the occasion of the 75th anniversary of the church. The book tells of the many Polish families who came to White Deer and was the recipient of the T. R. Fehrenbach Award for organizational history, given by the Texas Historical Commission in 1988.

A special presentation featuring the Museum collection of Kiowa art, accompanied by three dimensional exhibits and interpretive text, will be on display during the month of April.

This lecture series has been planned in response to requests to continue the series on the Native Americans that was given in 1988. The Panhandle has been a cultural crossroads and these ethnic groups are among those who have left their marks on the region. The initial service areas will be Laredo, McAllen and Austin. Expansion into other service areas will be based on availability. Customers in other areas will be notified when these services become available.

Call Control Options include six new services - Call Blocker, Call Cue, Call Return, Priority Call, Call Trace and Selective Call Forwarding. The features will be available to single-line residence and business customers.

Call Blocker - enables the customer to block incoming calls from a maximum of three specified telephone numbers and/or to block the last incoming call.

Call Cue - enables the customer to automatically redial the last outgoing telephone number dialed. If the recalled number is busy, equipment will monitor the line for a maximum of 30 minutes and will let the customer know when the call can go through.

Call Return - enables the customer to automatically redial the telephone number of the most recent incoming call. If the number is busy, Call Return will continue to dial the number for up to 30 minutes, or until it completes the call.

Priority Call - provides the customer with a distinctive alerting signal, ring or Call Waiting Tone (if the customer has subscribed to Call Waiting), when the customer is called from a maximum of three preselected telephone numbers.*

Call Trace - enables the customer to initiate a trace of the last incoming call received. The number, date and time will be recorded by Southwestern Bell Telephone so that the call's origin can be identified.

Selective Call Forwarding - enables the customer to forward incoming calls from specified telephone numbers (maximum of three) to another telephone number.

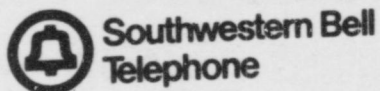

delinquent taxes as long as that person owns and lives in that homestead.

Lavake stressed, though, that tax deferral for the elderly only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the homestead; it does not cancel them. During the deferral period, taxes and delinquent interest continue to add up, she said. "When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns or lives in the home, those accrued amounts become due. Taxing units can then sue to collect all the deferred tax and interest."

While a penalty may not be imposed on the delinquent taxes during the deferral period, the filing of the deferral affidavit will not forgive penalties which were already due. Also, an additional penalty associated with referring the account to a delinquent tax attorney may be charged if taxes remain delinquent more than 90 days after the deferral ends.

Forms for filing a tax deferral affidavit are available at the appraisal district office. "The homeowner should fill out the form and have the signature witnessed by a notary public," Lavake said. Farmers Invited To Participate In Heritage Program

Pointing to the importance of recognizing and remembering the pioneer farm and ranch families in Texas, long-time farming families are invited to participate in the Texas Department of Agriculture's Family Land Heritage Program.

Registration for the program, which recognizes families who have had land in agricultural production for 100 years or more, is now open and will extend through July 15.

To date no properties in Carson County have qualified for the Family Land Program. Since Carson County has celebrated its 100th Anniversary, some farmers and ranchers could be eligible. Since the program was established in 1974 to honor pioneering families, 2,090 such families have been recognized.

The basic requirements of the program include continuous agricultural production on the farm or

ranch for 100 years, land ownership within the family, complete operation or supervision of the farm/ranch production by family members who are Texas

residents, and a size of at least 10 acres with a minimum income of \$50 from farm or ranch products. If the farm or ranch is smaller than 10 acres, sales must total \$250 per year.

This year's certified registrants will be honored at a state ceremony to be held in Austin in November. Honorees will receive a certificate with an official sign/marker to be placed on the recipients gate or home designating their property as a "Century Farm" or "Century Ranch." A family Land Heritage Registry will be published later and distributed to all honorees.

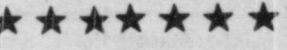

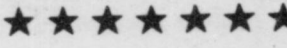

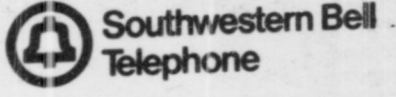

**Texas Promotes
Cleaner America**

Now that the Lone Star State has cleaned up its act, it's issuing a Texas-sized challenge to the rest of the nation.

The state takes its successful "Great Texas Trash-Off" a giant step further with the "Great American Trash-Off" March 31.

The event, promoted by the highway department, encourages Americans to get out that spring day to pick up litter with their Adopt-a-Highway, Adopt-a-Beach, and local Keep America Beautiful organizations across the country.

"We're excited about the potential impact this could have on antilitter efforts nationwide," said J. Don Clark, director of the highway department's Travel and Information Division. "Imagine first the visual effect of hundreds of thousands of volunteers out cleaning roadways that day. Then think of the

tremendous gains in changed attitudes and the long-range benefits to the environment. The public interest will be well served by an undertaking of this nature."

Last year, Adopt-a-Highway groups throughout the state collected 1.2 million gallons of roadside trash during the Great Texas Trash-Off.

The annual cleanup is part of the highway department's antilitter efforts which, through the "Don't Mess with Texas" campaign and the Adopt-a-Highway program, have reduced visible roadside litter by 64 percent in just five years.

The Adopt-a-Highway program, started in Texas in 1985, has served as a model for 40 other states. Thirty-two states are following Texas' lead with programs of their own and eight others are planning them.

This year's national clean sweep is concentrated in the warmer states.

California was the first state to declare its intention to join Texas in the Great American Trash-Off. Arkansas, Arizona, Florida, Kansas, Kentucky,

Louisiana, Mississippi and New Mexico have all announced plans to clean their states the last day of March.

States outside the Sunbelt have expressed interest in being part of the American clean team, but this year's date may be too chilly for them. But as the snow disappears, the litter reappears, and so will the volunteers.

Fourteen states have planned statewide cleanups in April or May. They are all interested in joining an expanded Great American Trash-Off next year.

Also participating in this year's Trash-Off are the

combined cleaning forces of the General Land Office's Adopt-a-Beach and Texas Lakeshore Cleanup volunteers.

Adding international flavor to the Great American Trash-Off, the Children's Alliance for the Protection of the Environment (CAPE) is sponsoring cleanup events on March 31 in Costa Rica, Honduras and Massachusetts.
