City To Advertise For Bids On Fire Station Repair

The City Council of McLean met in regular session Thursday, February 14, 1991 in the City Hall. The following members present; Wayne Bybee, Harold Smith, Martha Jo Bailey, Brad Dalton, Joe Billingsley and Sam A. Haynes.

Others present were Leon Wood, Dwight Brandt, Stella Lee, Ruth Magee, Bob Glenn, Mr. and Mrs. Garth Thomas, Rick Harris and Allen Mixon.

The meeting was opened with an invocation by the Mayor.

Minutes of January meeting were read and approved.

An estimate for replacing

ceiling tile and painting wall tile in the City Hall was received from Swanson Construction. Following a lengthy discussion as to

whether or not city employees could do work in city hall, a motion was made to get cost of materials and labor for employees to make repairs and present them at the next meeting.

One estimate for repairing Fire Station roof was received from Mike Bybee Construction in the amount of \$10,455.92. Due to the estimate cost it will be necessary to advertise for bids on this project.

Mr. Leon Wood from Texas Highway Department, met with council to explain the cost and requirements to get lighting along ramps on I-40 in and near McLean. Motion was made to write letter to Highway Department requesting lights be installed at all ramps for McLean.

Three bids for painting inside of 500 thousand gallon water tank were received from: Dean Jones Contracting \$21,177.00; R.D. Construction \$20,659.00 and Professional Sandblasting and Coating \$20,874.00. Motion by Bailey, second by Billingsley to accept lower bid from R. D. Construction.

Motion was made to allow McLean ISD to sell lots 11-12 of Block 60.

Motion by Bailey, second by Smith to adopt resolution for election:

"BE IT RESOLVED THAT the election for Mayor, and two aldermen positions be called for the first Saturday in May, being May 4, 1991, with balloting at the Lovett Memorial Library in McLean, Texas.

AND BE FURTHER RESOLVED, that filing for said positions shall be accepted up to and shall close as of 5:00 p.m. on March 20, 1991 and absentee balloting to be in the office of the City Secretary at the city Hall in McLean, Texas, and shall be supervised by the City Secretary

Motion was made to appoint Jeff Messer as election judge and allow two clerks for General election. Motion made to Proclaim February 22 thru February 28, 1991 as Armed Forces Support Week in McLean.

Motion made to appoint Wanda Lamb and Loyce Murry as Library Board members and to appoint Darlis Jonier as member subject to amending By-Laws of Library.

In 1873, in Dekalb, Illinois, at a small county fair, I. L. Ellwood, Jacob Haish, and Joseph Glidden, were standing, looking at a demonstration by Henry Rose, whereby he had driven nails through a one inch square piece of wood about 16 feet long. He had attached this piece of wood to a smooth wire on a fence, thereby creating a barbed effect to deter livestock from going through it. As they studied the demonstration, probably each one of them conceived the idea of attaching barbs somehow to a smooth wire.

Joseph Glidden went home and made small barbs out of smooth wire and strung them up on another smooth wire. The barbs revolved, and collected together in bunches and would not stay in position. In his own words, he told of

picking up some scrap wire, both smooth and barbed, and accidentally twisting them together, discovered that dual twisting separated the barbs and held them secure in the proper position to be effective. At that moment, he had perfected the answer to the fencing problems of the country. Although very crude and simple, his first sample was almost identical to the barbed wire of today. The two wires twisted had enough strength to stop any livestock, the barbs sharp enough to inflict pain, and the spiral twist expanded and contracted with the heat and cold, and still did not break.

Next week, we'll tell of the making of barbed wire. (Based on the book-The History of the Manufacture of Barbed Wire, by C. Boone McClure.)

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Fly Old Glory Correctly

For so proudly we hail- The American Flag. As war rages on in the Middle East, patriotism has reached a new high in America. For many, this is the first experience they have had in flying our nations color. The National Emblem is a symbol of our great country, our heritage and our place in the world. We owe respect and reverence to our flag. It represents the highest ideals of individual liberty, justice and equal opportunity for all.

The make-up of the flag has special meaning just as feeling it inspires. It has 13 alternating red and white stripes that represent the 13 original colonies. It has 50 stars, representing each state in the union. No state lays claim to any particular star. Every star stands for every state. The star is the ancient symbol of Dominion or Sovereignty. The colors, too, have special meaning. Red stands for hardiness and courage. White represents purity and innocence. Blue symbolizes vigilance and justice. George Washington explained the flag's symbolism by saying "We take the stars and blue union from Heaven; the red from our Mother Country, separating it by white stripes thus showing we have separated from her; the white stripes shall go down to posterity, representing liberty."

When one displays the flag there are many things to consider in order to be respectful. During daytime it is correct to display the flag from sunrise to sunset when the weather is good unless an all weather flag is used. Flags should be lowered at night unless properly illuminated. As the flag is raised on a staff it should be hoisted briskly or quickly. As it is lowered it should be brought down slowly and with ceremony. It should be folded as it is lowered before completely detaching it from the lanyard. It should never be allowed to touch the ground. When a flag is to be flown at half-mast it should be first raised to the top of the pole and then slowly lowered to half mast.

Here are some guidelines to follow when displaying the flag.

When crossed with another flag on the wall, the

U.S. Flag should be on the outside and on the observers left.

Flat against a wall, the Union (blue part) should always be on top or to the observers left.

When flown with another flag on the same staff it should always be above other flags.

Grouped with other flags it should be either in the front, center, or placed higher than other flags.

When flown vertical over a street the Union should face north (on east-west streets) or east (on north-south streets).

When used on a speakers platform it should be on the speakers right.

The U. S. Flag should never be used as decoration. When the colors, red, white and blue are used in bunting; blue always goes on top.

When the flag is being raised on a pole or being carried in a procession; Americans should use the appropriate salute. Members of the Armed Forces should use the appropriate military salute. All other Americans should stand at attention and place their right hand over their heart.

When the flag has reached its resting place, or passes in front of the observer, the hand is then removed.

When the National Anthem is being played or sung all present should stand at attention with their hand over their heart. If the flag is not displayed, those present should face toward the music and act in the same manner as if the flag was present. This is also

true when the Pledge of Allegiance is recited.

To fold the flag always do so in a ceremonious way. First fold it lengthwise, bringing the stripped half up over the blue field. Then repeat, with the blue field on the outside. Beginning at the lower right, make a series of triangular folds until the flag resembles a cocked hat with only the blue field showing.

When a flag becomes old and frayed it should be destroyed in a respectful way, preferably burned. Local Girl Scouts will hold a Flag Burning Ceremony at some point in the future. If you have flags that are no longer fit for display contact a Girl Scout Leader for

more information.

The National Flag represents the living country and is considered to be a living thing emblematic of the respect and pride we have for our nation. Our flag is a precious possession. Display it proudly.





Local Artist Displays

Work At Square House Museum

An art exhibit by Rodney Nichols will be displayed in the Opal R. Weatherly Purvines Annex of the Square House Museum through February and March.

Rodney Nichols was born in Amarillo and grew up in Borger. He, his wife Barbara, and their three boys moved to Panhandle a year ago.

Rodney aspired to be an artist as a boy, and studied art at Amarillo College and Texas Tech University. Later, while in the Navy aboard the carrier USS Forrestal, he found himself somewhat in demand as a painter of cartoon characters and pin-up girls on the sides of fighter planes.

He currently draws and paints mostly as a hobby while working for an insurance company in Houston. He claims that his best art work is found in the margins of notes taken during business meetings and seminars, and on cocktail napkins and telephone scratch pads.

Rodney's recent paintings

of portraits and sports scenes were influenced by the vibrating color treatments of Wayne Thiebaud and by the action painting techniques of the Abstract Expressionists. The resulting paintings, especially the recent works of local and area football and basketball scenes, are reminiscent of the work of Leroy Neiman.

In stark contrast to the vibrant colors and splashy technique of the oil and acrylic paintings, other works by the artist include pen and ink drawings done in a precise and delicately

detailed style. Rodney feels that the time consuming, meticulously executed pen and ink drawings help establish his credibility as a draftsman, but usually prefers to paint with rapid fluid strokes, often resulting in as much paint on his face and clothes as on the canvas.

The public is invited to a reception honoring Mr. Nichols and his family to be held in the annex on Sunday, February 24th from 2 to 4 p.m.

PUBLIC NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 169

An ordinance restricting location and height of fences, structures, and other obstructions abutting city streets and rights-of way.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Groom, Texas:

That no fence, structure or other obstruction that is located on property abutting a city street or right-of-way shall obstruct the view of traffic. It is presumed that any fence, structure, or other obstruction that is located 10' or nearer from any property line that abuts any city street intersection and is more than 42" in height will obstruct the view of traffic. Therefore, any fence, structure, or other obstruction that is located 10' or nearer from any property line that abuts any city street intersection shall be 42" or less in height.

Any person violating this Ordinance or any portion hereof shall, upon conviction, be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined any sum not exceeding \$200.00, and each day that such violation continues shall be considered

a separate offense and punishable accordingly.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage, and it is so ordained.

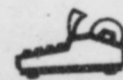

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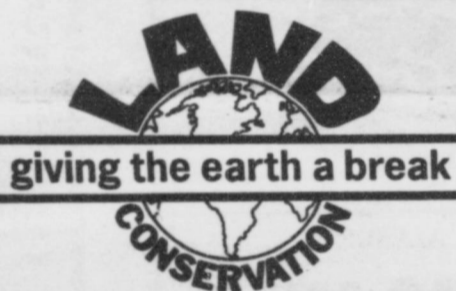
