## Gary Davis Slightly Injured In I-40 High Speed Chase

Gary Davis was injured Saturday night after a high speed chase resulted in a crash as trooper Davis attempted to run a rolling road block on an alleged thief who was refusing to stop. Officers from the Wheeler Co. Sheriff's Dept. and troopers from Shamrock, McLean, and

## Sweatt Says August Election Will Decide Legality Of C.E.D.

The legislature created county education districts throughout the state and now voters will vote August 10 on a constitutional amendment to make the districts legal or to reject the legislation as a new state property tax.

"The last regular session of the legislature set up the county education districts to be in full operation on July 31," reports Joyce Hutsell, Business Manager of Groom I.S.D., "but the voters will not vote until August 10 on whether or not the state's twenty new school districts are legal or not."

Kenneth Sweatt, Superintendent of Groom Schools, reminds voters that the county portion of the election will decide the legality of the new county education districts at the same time school districts are voting on some of the ways the three county district should tax if it does become legal.

"A 'no' vote at the county election on Amendment #1 would render the school district elections meaningless," Sweatt pointed out.

School district voters are being asked to decide questions pertaining to the

county education district composed of the three districts in Carson County--Panhandle, White Deer, and Groom--Claude school in Armstrong County and Canyon schools in Randall County. These three counties are the component districts of C.E.D. #3.

"Each school district," says Sweatt, "owes this C.E.D. #3 an amount equal to its 1990 values as set by the State Property Tax Board in Austin times 72 cents. Groom I.S.D. will levy this amount and send it to the C.E.D. if the voters make the C.E.D.'s legal. In

## Absentee Voting Underway For August 10 Election

Absentee voting is now underway for the August 10th election. Voters are being asked to vote on two constitutional amendment and three county education district issues.

Constitutional Amendment No. 1, if approved, will allow the

voters of county education districts to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property.

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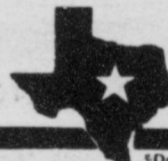

### SALT WAR ...

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## Public Notice

On April 9, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to request that the optional feature "Call Transfer Disconnect" be available to all PLEXAR I customers by including the feature in Southwestern Bell's PLEXAR I tariff. Currently, this optional feature is available only on a customer requested basis.

Call Transfer Disconnect (CTD) is an optional feature that allows PLEXAR I customers the ability to transfer a call to another telephone number within or outside their PLEXAR I system, hang up, and permit the two remaining parties to continue with the call. The PLEXAR I user is then free to place or accept another call. CTD is not intended to be used to avoid toll charges. Therefore, CTD will not be available to PLEXAR I customers subscribing to optional Extended Metropolitan Service or Extended Area Calling Service.

If the company's application is approved, the monthly rate for CTD will be \$4.00 for each PLEXAR I station line. Prior to the June 19, 1991, interim rate approval, Southwestern Bell was billing customers who receive the service \$1.50 for each station line equipped with this feature. In addition, under Southwestern Bell's proposed tariff, every line within the PLEXAR I system must be equipped with this feature. The nonrecurring charge for the additional lines which must be equipped with CTD will be waived for existing CTD customers. The tariffed monthly rate will apply to all existing and future CTD customers.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible. approved, will provide for the issue of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students.

At the county education district level, voters will decide whether to allow a 20 percent exemption on the market value of residence homesteads.

They also will vote on whether to allow a \$10,000 exemption of the market value of residence homesteads for disabled individuals and an additional \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead for individuals age 65 or older.

The third item on the ballot is whether to allow county education districts to tax all tangible personal property, other than manufactured homes, not being held or used for the production of income.

Personal property includes automobiles, boats, trailers and recreational vehicles, but not household goods such as furniture and clothing.

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**EXTENSION AGENT  
ANNOUNCES AG  
PROGRAMS**

There will be a pair of excellent programs on August 2, 1991, according to Danny Nusser, Carson County Extension Agent. These programs will be held in Panhandle at the Carson County Agriculture Building.

The first program will be conducted by Tony Pardo, Extension Agent-Pesticide Safety for this district. Topics to be discussed include Laws and Regulation, the Right to Know Law, Pesticide Safety, and Chemicals and the Environment. The program will last from 2-5 p.m. and will be worth 2.5 CEU's for private, commercial and non-commercial applicators.

At 6:00 p.m. Dr. Carl Patrick-Area Entomologist will hold an Insect Clinic for farmers and insect scouts. After about a 30-45 minute program, the group will go to the field for identification of beneficials and pest, along with demonstrations of proper scouting techniques. Primary crops will be corn, sorghum, and wheat but any questions or concerns about other crops are welcome.

All persons are invited to attend either or both meetings.

**SUMMER EARNINGS  
MAY REQUIRE SPECIAL  
REPORTING**

Young people who take summer jobs such as farm work, service jobs involving tips, and sales jobs involving commissions should note that there are special rules designed to ensure that their wages are reported for Social Security purposes.

Unlike regular wages, which are reported by employers for Social Security credit, persons earning tips and sales commissions must report their own earnings to Social Security.

If you are a farm worker, be sure to keep a record of your wages. That is because your employer only needs to report your wages if he or she paid you at least \$150 in cash. You also should ask Social Security for a free statement of your earnings every 3 years to verify that your wages have been properly reported.

If you work at a job where you earn tips, you must report them if they exceed \$20 or more a month from one employer. The tips must be reported within 10 days after the month ends. The report is given to the employer in writing and should include your name, address, Social Security number, employer's name and address, total tips, and the period earned. The employer is then required to report those tips to Social Security along with other wages you received.

Kay Burk ran across these recipes the other day. She got the barbecue sauce recipe from Ludene Weiberg. Charles Burk and his FFA boys prepared the meat which was donated by Kotara Feed Yard and Eschle Feed Yard.

They wanted to express their thanks to the Groom Community for their help in the Ag program; so they had the first Groom Community Barbecue.

The Home Ec. girls cooked the beans. Kay made all the barbecue sauce. Someone else made the potato salad and apricots. They fed 810 people.

Kay kept a record of the food they had left because they prepared the meal again the next year and fed close to 1,000 people.

They only did it two years and then the Lions Club sponsored it for a while until the Groom Day Committee was organized and took over.

The Ag boys got J. L. Case to dig the pits in the ground and they lined the pits with sheetiron and used old Army cot frames as grills to cook the meat on.

The second year, a 40-50 mile wind blew from the North about the time to light the fire. Buses were parked on the north side of the pits for a wind break and the barbecue went on.

order to raise the amount of money, the district will use the amount set as taxable value by the Carson County Appraisal District for 1991, not 1990, however. Then the local school district can tax for local enrichment above the 72 cent C.E.D. base.

Proposition #1 would, if

passed by all the voters in C.E.D. #3, exempt up to 20% of the value of a residence homestead. Groom I.S.D. currently exempts a \$5,000.00 flat rate on all homesteads.

Superintendent Sweatt continues, "These additional exemptions would in effect shift the amounts owing to

the C.E.D. from residence homesteads to other types of property: farmlands, minerals, and income property, for instance.

"In addition, since more valuable homesteads would be the beneficiary of the 20% exemption, this would See C.E.D., pg. 12

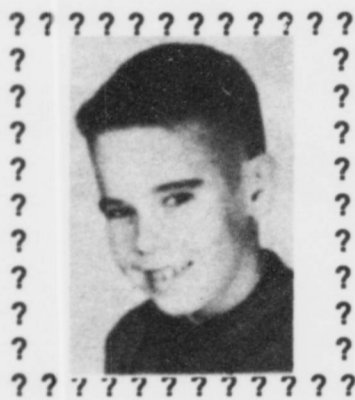

## McLean Voters To Decide State, Local Amendments

Voters throughout the state of Texas will be asked on August 10 to vote on a constitutional amendment to make newly appointed County Education Districts legal. Absentee voting has already started on what may change the face of taxing districts across the state.

At the last regular session of the legislature, county education districts were set up, to be in full operations by July 31st. Voters, however, will not have their say as to whether or not these districts are legal until this upcoming election on August 10th.

A no vote on constitutional amendment the states twenty new school districts meaningless. While a yes vote would allow the districts voters to adopt certain exemptions from the new districts ad valorem

taxation of certain tangible personal property.

Each school district will owe to the C.E.D. an amount equal to its 1990 values as set by the State Property Board in Austin times 72 cents, if voters say it's legal.

In Proposition 1 is passed it would allow voters in C.E.D.'s to exempt up to 20% of the value of their homestead residence. Most counties in this area allow a flat rate for that exemption. This would, in effect, shift the amounts owing the C.E.D. from the resident homestead to other types of property such as farmland, property.

Proposition #2 would exempt \$10,000.00 of the value of a residence of a disabled taxpayer and an additional \$10,000.00 from the value of a homestead

that belongs to a taxpayer 65 or older.

Proposition #3 would allow the C.E.D. to tax personal property, other than mobil homes or property used in income production, such as boats, auto, or recreational vehicles.

Amendment 2 would provide the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students, if passed.

Absentee voting has already begun as of Monday morning. McLean voters can cast their ballot at the McLean School Business office, open Monday 4:00 p.m. beginning July 22nd and ending on August 6th.

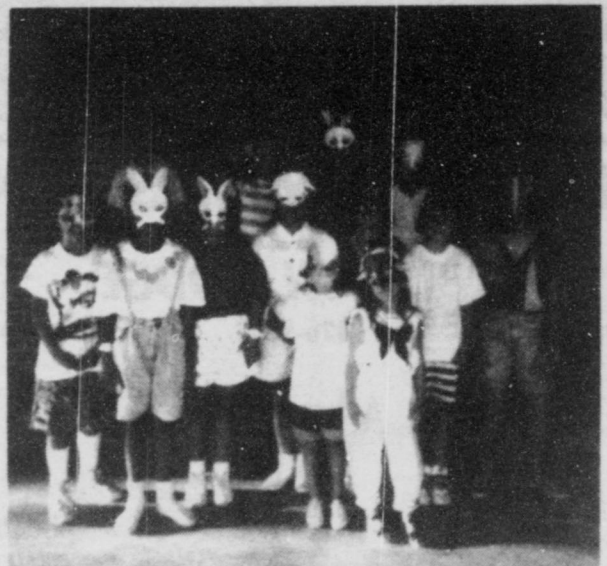
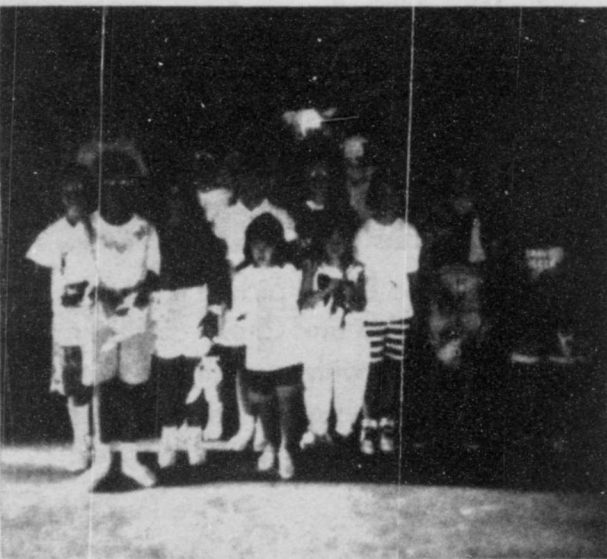

The newly-expanded services include full-time availability of pain-relieving epidurals during labor and delivery, pain management for patients during and after surgery, and ancillary help for the orthopedists and primary care physicians whose patients need epidural steroid injections.

"Because recent clinical studies document safer, more comfortable recovery from surgery when there is improvement in pain relief after surgery, physicians at Coronado Hospital are beginning to use more pain management techniques," Dr. Kendall said.

Most of the new techniques center around the use of "epidurals", Kendall said. "An epidural later on the succeeding post-operative days," he said. "Although the epidural has been around for over ninety years, until recently only local anesthetics were used. Now, with the discovery of 'opiate receptors' in the epidural area, narcotics can be administered. The advantage is that the patient required less drug than he would under the old method of pain shots. In

block is simply the insertion of a catheter into the space between the spinal cord and the vertebrae. A needle is employed in the introduction of the catheter and once the catheter is in place, the needle is removed. The drug is administered through the catheter," he said.

Dr. Kendall said that most people have heard of the use of epidurals for labor and delivery. "The use of the epidural in childbirth has been a God-send for women," Dr. Kendall said. "While the epidural provides relief from most of the pain of childbirth, the woman is still conscious, awake, and able to participate in the birth of her child." The anesthesiologist administers a very low-dose anesthetic agent combined with a quick acting, safe, non-nausea producing narcotic. "The respiratory distress in the new baby that occurred in the old days when the mother received heavy doses of narcotic during labor is virtually non-existent when epidural analgesia is used," he said.

A less known use of epidurals, Dr. Kendall said, is their use in the operating room. "The use of epidurals in the operating room reduces blood flow in the area operated upon. This permits many surgeries the administration of blood to be performed without having to resort to blood transfusions," he said.

On selected surgical patients, the epidural catheter is left in place so that pain medications can be administered during the recovery time. "Anesthesia department personnel administers the epidurals and direct the management of the devices that provide continuous pain relief after surgery. Nurses who have special training in management of epidurals help to provide the care

addition the drug in administered continuously, so the patient doesn't experience the peaks and valleys of pain relief," he said.

Another use of the epidural is to assist the orthopedists and primary care physicians in the treatment of chronic, intractable lower back pain. If the physician feels that the patient is a good

candidate, he may refer the patient to Dr. Kendall for epidural steroid injections.

"Many patients with abdominal or lower extremity pain can benefit from some form of pain management, whether it is an epidural, a spinal block with the addition of a narcotic or an anti-inflammatory agent," Dr. Kendall said. "But pain management is not for everyone. The patient's physician must decide what is best for the over-all health and safety of the patient."

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

### Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. Asymptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

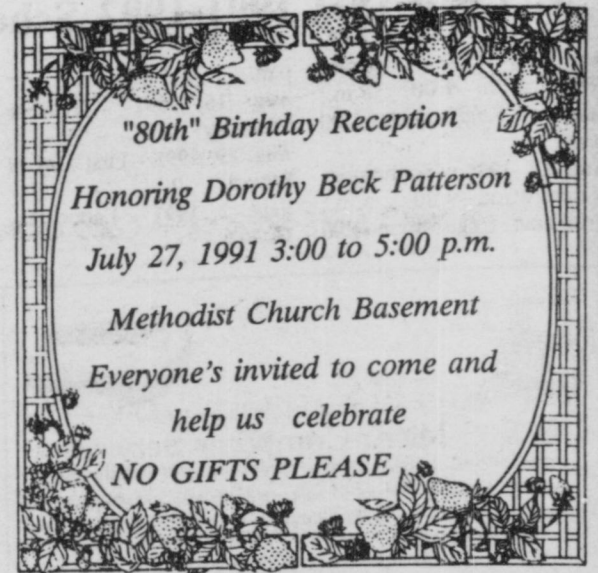
Proposition #2 would exempt \$10,000.00 of the value of a residence homestead of a disabled taxpayer, and an additional \$10,000.00 from the value of a homestead belonging to a taxpayer 65 or older.

Proposition #3 would allow the C.E.D. to tax personal property, other than mobile homes or property used in income production. Examples of taxable properties would be boats, autos, and RV's. Groom I.S.D. does not currently tax any personal properties.

"If the taxpayers vote 'No' on constitutional Amendment No. One at the county election, the school election held the same day will be rendered meaningless," adds Sweatt.

"The taxpayers in this part of Texas may be too independent to want to vote to create these large county school districts. They may just vote against another taxing entity and vote 'No' on Amendment One."

If the county elections provide a 'No' on #1, then the legislature will be forced back to work on some system of equitable school finance for the state.



## Weight Loss Surprises Researchers

WASHINGTON - A nutrition organization was hopeful that a nutritionally complete "hi-tech" food tablet would help erase world hunger problems, until a study revealed that one of the ingredients could cause significant weight loss.

Researchers in Europe found that an ingredient in the aptly named product Food Source One actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious *British Journal of Nutrition*. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories.

While the development of Food Source One, a project of National Dietary Research, would not be used to successfully fulfill its original goal, the discovery has

been a windfall for overweight people. A Daytona Beach, Florida woman fighting a weight battle for 12 years used the product on the recommendation of her physician and lost 30 pounds. She stated, "Not only have I lost 30 pounds but my cholesterol has dropped from 232 to 143. I have two closets full of clothes which have not fit me in two years that I can now wear." In a separate report, a telephone interview revealed that a Wilmington, North Carolina pharmacist lost 14 pounds in 15 days on the product and was never hungry.

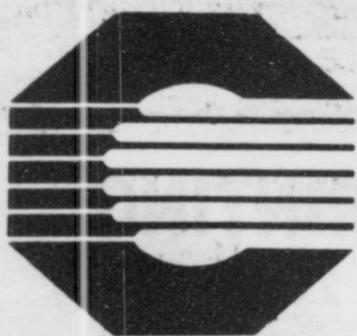

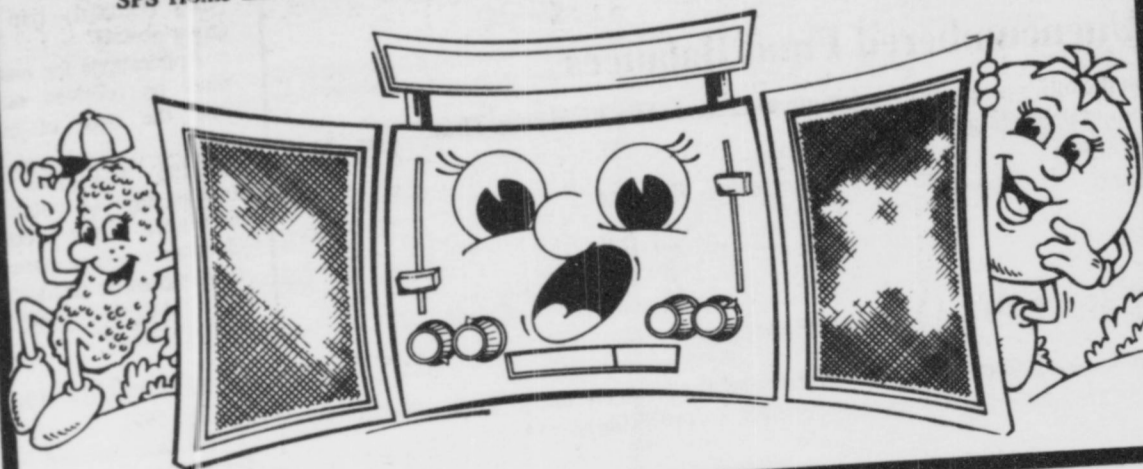
