Council Votes To Install Sprinklers In City Park

The McLean City Council met April 11th in regular session. Present were Mayor Haynes, Wayne Bybee, Harold Smith, Martha Jo Bailey, Brad Dalton, Joe Billingsley, and visitors Rick Harris, Bob Glenn, Stella Lee, Allen Mixon, Dwight Brandt, June Suggs, Pat Guill, George Burrows and F. J. Hess.

The March minutes were read and amended as follows: Vote for bids on the water line to the Bybee

property is 4 voting in favor. Wayne Bybee abstaining due to conflict of interest.

The council voted to lease property from Charles Barnes for a billboard at a cost of \$100.00 per year.

Action was postponed on water line bids until the May 9th meeting. L. A. Fuller and Son bid \$18,915.00 to install water line to the Bybee property, and \$10,225.00 to bore under Railway Street.

A discussion was held as

to the need for a sprinkler system in the city park. The council voted to begin work on this project doing a section each year until finished.

In other business: The land-fill will continue to be free of charge until May 1st.

The Mayor will be discussing with SPS coordinator the need for a meat processing plant to locate in McLean.

A request will be sent to Gray County sheriff's

department requesting a full time deputy based in McLean.

The council filed a resolution supporting action of U.M.B. urging EPA to make adjustments in land-fill regulations.

The board will write a 2 year contract for land lease of the Charles Barnes property. Three councilmen voted for the motion, two were against.

[Editor's note: City secretary, Stella Lee stated

that it made no difference as to which members were in favor of the two year contract with Mr. Barnes and which were against. She refused several times to divulge the information, stating that she was "too busy".]

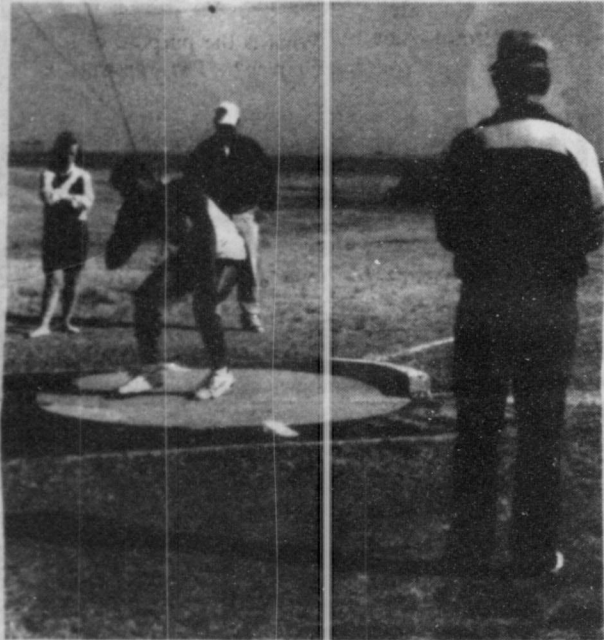

Minutes were approved of the following meetings: Feb. 26, March 12, March 19, March 26, and April 2nd.

The Board approved the lease-purchase of a 72 passenger bus. The following buses will be sold through the Region XIV Service Center on May 4th: 48 passenger '82 Ford, 65

passenger '81 Chevrolet, and a 56 passenger '74 International.

Bids were opened on tax lots up for sale: Lots 11-15 Block 53 and 11-12 Block 60. Joe Billingsley bid 40.50 per lot on Block 53, Avalee Crockett bid \$100.00 on Block 60, Leo Edmondson bid \$105.00 per lot on all lots.

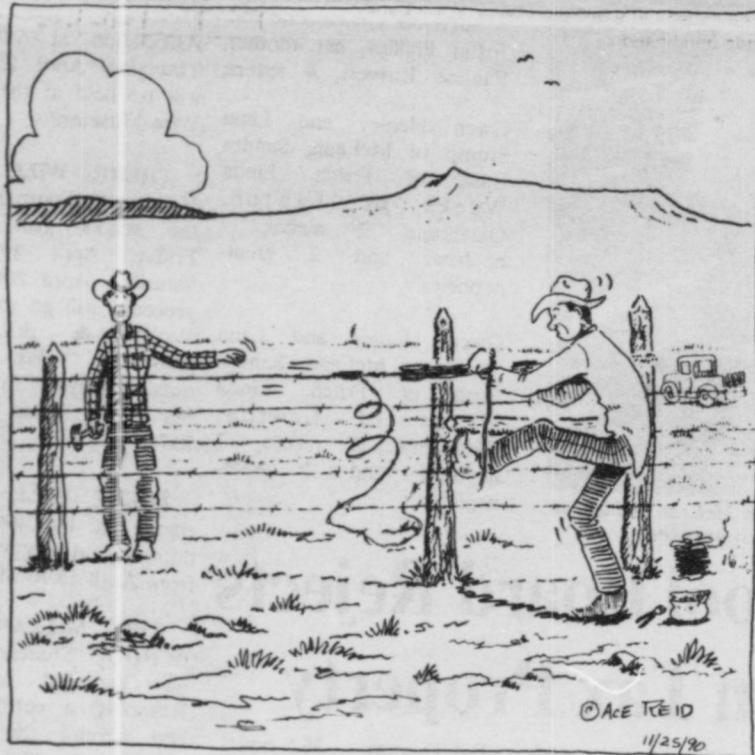
The memorial program set up for the Community Room of The Devil's Rope Museum is underway and we have begun furnishing the room with these funds.

Your School

"No more lessons, no more books," begins the old rhyme, but during the summer, it's important for children to keep on reading even if school's out. Reading is a skill, and like other skills, it improves with practice. When children read faster and understand what they read better. If children don't read for a month or two, they're likely to lose much of the progress they've made during the past school year. That means they'll have to spend part of next year just catching up to where they are now. It's like taking two steps forward, then one step back. Children who read during the summer start school ready to continue their progress. In fact, since summer reading can focus on things they are most interested in, some children will start reading better than when it ended. Make sure your children spend at least 15 minutes each day reading. Don't worry about what they read, but make sure they read. Check to see if your public library has a summer reading program and encourage your child to sign up. Summer is a great time to read just for fun, and kids can find books on nearly any subject that takes their fancy.

City Council Places 6 Month Deadline On Property Owner

Jon Sessions of Panhandle Regional Planning Commission gave a review of the project that was completed at a total cost of \$225,926.02 with the city's part being \$20,650.02. An audit of the project will be required September 30, 1991.

The water and sewer extension was discussed with engineer Dwight Brandt, PRPC representatives Perna Strickland and Jon Sessions, also John Holton, Developer; who is interested in building on the old Tower Truck Stop Site. A lift station with grinder

pumps will be required for the sewer. An eight or twelve inch line will be considered for the water line. Total cost of the project will be approximately \$200,000.00. Perna Strickland of Panhandle Regional Planning Commission will prepare a pre-application to the Texas Department of Commerce to fund the project.

A public hearing was held concerning the condemnation of house on Lot 6, Block 28. Also known as the old Assembly of God Church parsonage. Attorney Ed Hinshaw representing Leo Edmondson requested an extension of time for the house to be torn down. Greg Lamb moved to give Mr. Edmondson six months or by October 15, 1991 to have property cleared and church building secured or Mr. Edmondson will waive notice of thirty day option, and City will proceed as decreed in ordinance 135 of the city code of the City of Groom.

Donna Burton, animal control officer, lead a discussion with the board as to how ordinance #144 is enforced. It was agreed that it would continue as it had been in the past.

In other business, Flora G. Hammers was appointed Election Judge and Absentee Ballot Judge.

Roselius Discusses Bill To Change Judicial District

This article is written in order to inform Carson County residents of a move by one of our State Representatives to abolish the 100th Judicial District which is composed of Carson, Donley, Hall, Collingsworth and Childress Counties. House Bill 2160, authored by Senfronia Thompson of Houston, would do just that -- Abolish the 100th Judicial

District.

This bill, if passed by both Houses and signed by the Governor, would attach Carson County with the 84th Judicial District. That district would then be composed of Ochiltree, Hansford, Hutchinson, and Carson Counties. Collingsworth and Donley would be added to the 31st Judicial District. That district would then be composed of seven counties. Childress and Hall would be

added to the 110th Judicial District. That district would then be composed of six counties.

If this arrangement became a reality, we would lose our District Judge, John Forbis; District Attorney, David McCoy; Assistant District Attorney; Adult Probation Department; Juvenile Probation Department; and the office of Official Court Reporter. These duties would be

taken over by individuals completely un knowledgeable of the circumstances which exist within our District.

If the probation departments were abolished, 600-700 supervised cases would be transferred to other departments. These departments would not have the immediate knowledge to deal with the cases.

This condition could also cause a backlog of cases to

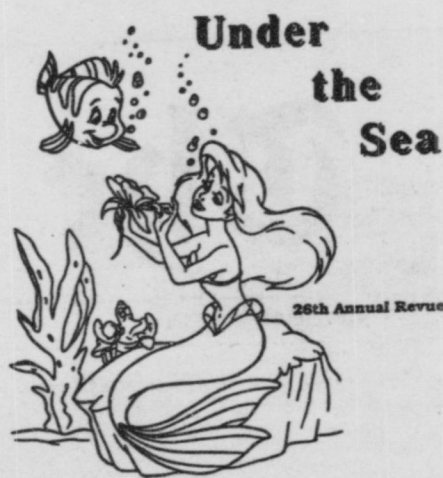

Established in 1874, Doan's was the last stop on the Western and Kansas Cattle Trail before the 300 mile push to Dodge City. In less than twenty years more than six million longhorn and thirty thousand cowboys crossed this portion of the "rawhide highway."





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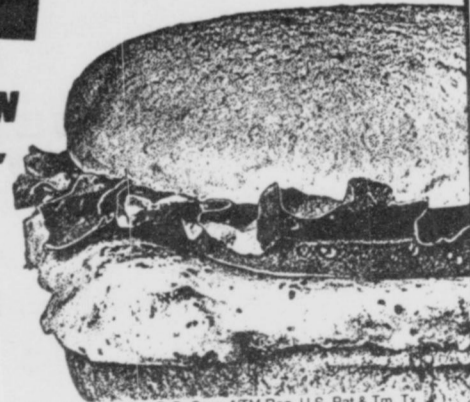


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4-H Shooting Team Competes
