## CED Election Saturday

The Aug. 10th election will be held at the Lovett Memorial Library in McLean from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Voters are being asked to vote on two constitutional amendments and three county education district issues.

Constitutional Amendment #1 is approved, will allow the voters of County Education Districts from the districts ad valorem taxation for residence homestead and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property.

Amendment #2, if approved, will provide for the issue of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to the students.

At the County Education District level, voters will decide whether to allow a 20% exemption on the market value of residence homesteads.

They also vote on whether to allow a \$10,000 exemption of the market value of residence homesteads for disabled individuals and an additional \$10,000 of the market value

of the residence homestead for the individuals age 65 or older.

The third item on the ballot is whether to allow County Education Districts to tax all tangible personal property, other than manufactured homes, not being held or used for the production of income.

Personal property includes automobiles, boats, trailers and recreational vehicles, but not household goods such as furniture and clothing.

Be sure to go out and vote.

Rebekah Winebrinner was selected for Miss Halftime U.S.A. runner-up.

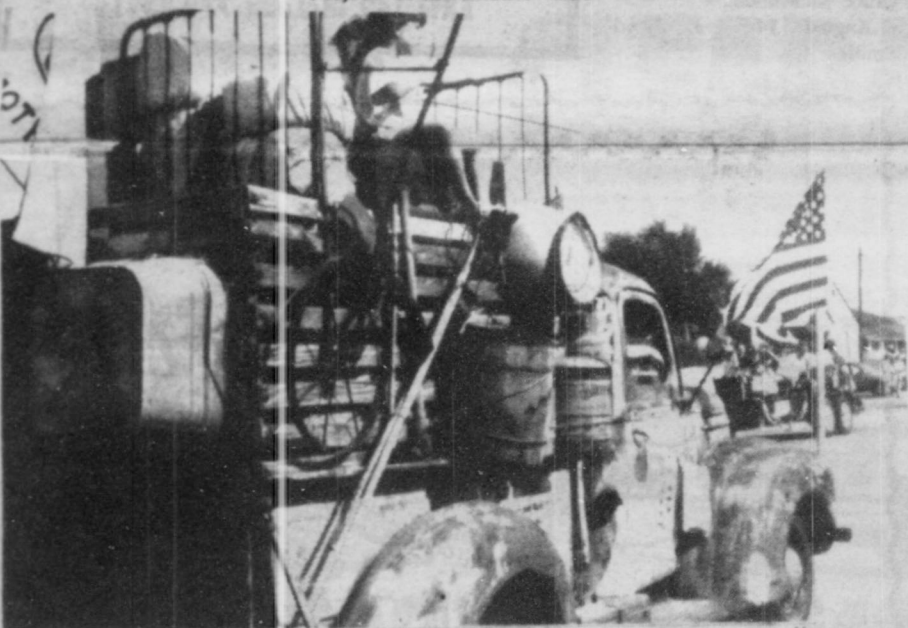
Selected for the Miss Halftime Honor Roll were Brandy Melton and Lee Erin Stubbs.

This is the letter we received from the Corvette Caravan the visited our Museum in June. We want to share this with all the people in our community.

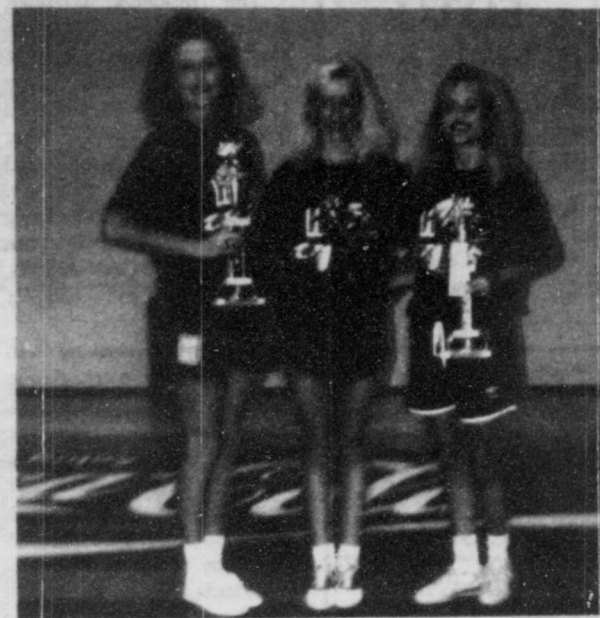
I finally arrived home and am enjoying the memories of the Route 66 Corvette Caravan (15-23 June). The best surprise on the trip was the reception put on by

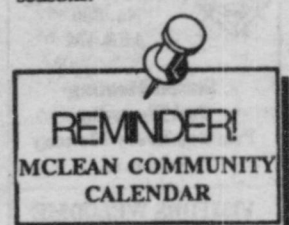

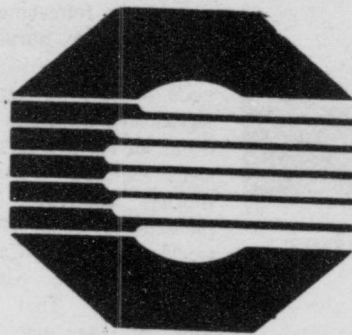

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
**City Of McLean**

**'Safe Drinking Water Act'**

The City of McLean has been notified by the Texas Department of Health that the water being supplied by our system exceed the following maximum constituent level for Nitrate specified by the Department "Drinking Water Standards" which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (U.S.). The limit is set at 10 milligrams of Nitrate (as nitrogen) per liter of water. The amount of Nitrate (as nitrogen) in the water to be 11.73 milligrams per liter. Adults and children over the age of 6 months need not be concerned about drinking water from the tap. An excess Nitrate intake by an infant under the age of 6 months may reduce its available oxygen supply and possible produce "blue baby" symptoms. parents are advised to find other sources of drinking water, such as bottled water, for their infants under 6 months of age. All doctors and hospitals in the area have been notified of this situation. The city will offer to provide bottled water of acceptable quality to pregnant women and to infants under 6 months of age for cooking and drinking purposes.

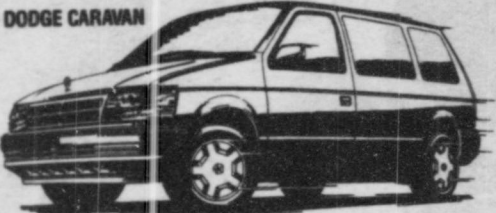

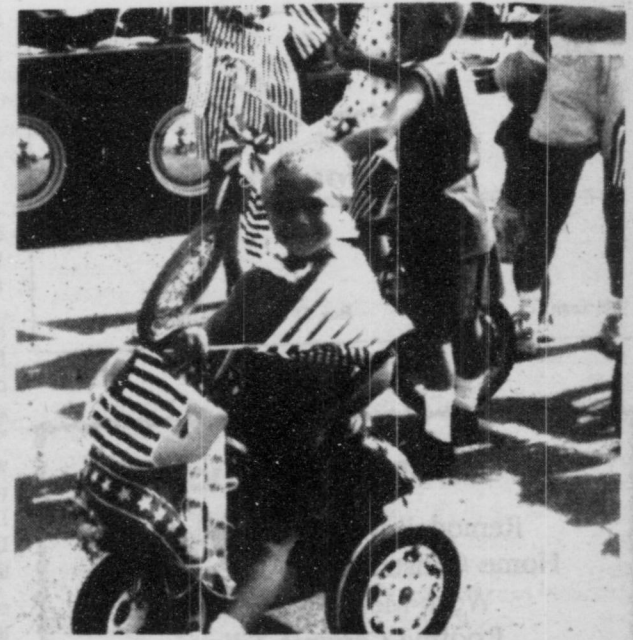

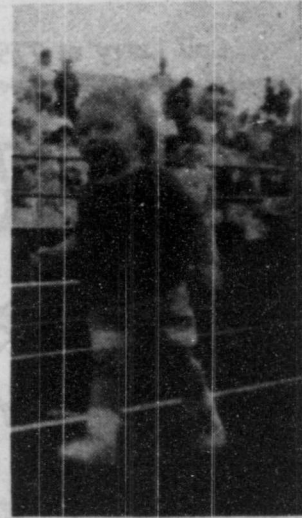

**Reduced Price Lunch Program**

The McLean School Cafeteria will serve nutritious meals every school day. Students in grades K-5 may buy lunch for \$1.00 and grades 6-12 for \$1.25. Breakfast is 50 cents for all grades. Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the income scale are eligible for either free or reduced price meals at 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast. Meals may be paid for in advance. Charges will not

be allowed without the consent of the parents and all charges must be paid weekly.

Household size and income criteria to be used in determining eligibility are included in the chart.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents and guardians. To apply for free or reduced meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school at the earliest date possible. Applications may be submitted at any

time during the year.

The complete schedule for the determination of benefits is available at the school and should there be any questions concerning the program, contact Sue Simmons at the McLean School Business Office at 779-2301. An income guideline is listed below.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national, origin, age, or handicap.

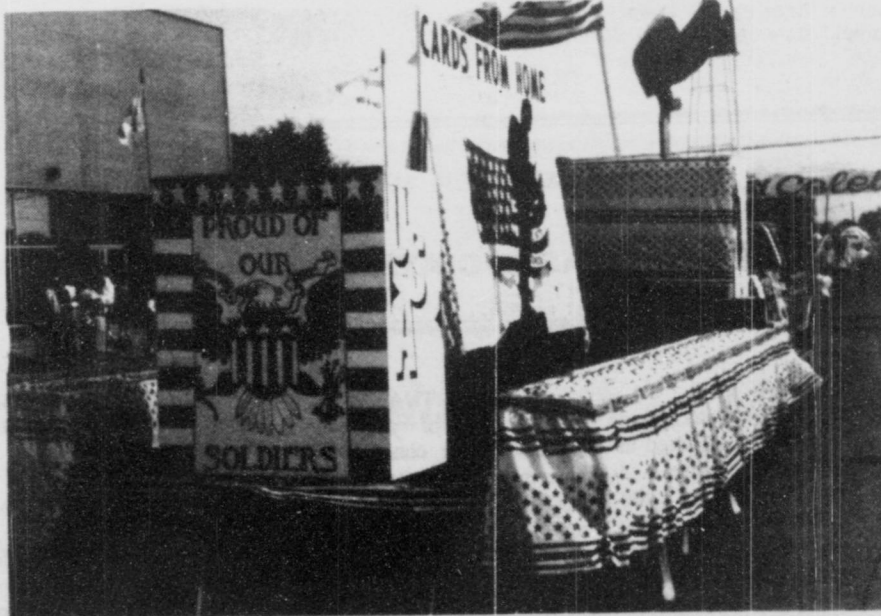

## "Taxation In Question" County Education District Election Set For Saturday

The constitutional amendment election and county education district proposal will be held on August 10th from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. at St. Mary's Hall.

This election will in essence, decide whether or not the newly formed County Education Districts are constitutional, and if so what exemptions they will allow.

County Education District ballots contain three propositions. No. 1 asks voters to decide the

question of a 20% exemption on homestead residences from ad valorem tax. No. 2 is a \$10,000 exemption for the disabled and over 65. No. 3 deals

with taxation of all personal property other than manufactured homes.

The other ballot voters will be seeing are constitutional amendments. No. 1 is the constitutional amendment that basically decides the fate of these newly formed C.E.D.s. A no vote would render the districts meaningless, while a yes vote would give the voters approval of the districts and gives them the power to adopt exemptions. Amendment No. 2 would allow obligation bonds to be issued for educational loans to students.

The issues are critical to school districts. Voters are reminded to do their civic duty and get out and vote.

**FEDERAL MEALS PROGRAM ANNOUNCED**

The Department of Agriculture has announced the income guidelines for determination of eligibility for participation in the Federal program administered at the Groom School, according to Joyce Hutsell, Administrator of the district's program.

These guidelines are published in this issue of the Groom News so that families can check for eligibility and apply to Joyce Hutsell, Business Manager of the School.

Nutritious meals are provided by the Groom School District in accordance with the districts participation in the Federal program. "Any families who think they may qualify for the program should check the advertisement in this week's paper. Check the number of persons in the household and follow that line across to check the minimum and maximum weekly, monthly, or yearly income which can be earned.

"Applications can be completed at the school business office. In addition, each family will be given an application at the time of student enrollment.

"The district takes part in the National School Lunch Program in order to provide this benefit to all district families who qualify," states Hutsell, "and it is also a benefit to the school as well as to the family who participates."

Hutsell explains that certain state programs are financed in proportion to the number of students who qualify for child nutrition assistance. The business manager submits monthly reports to the state, and the federal assistance to the district is channeled to the district from the State agency.

"The guidelines for assistance have been slightly increased this year," concludes Hutsell. For instance, last year a family of four qualified for assistance if the income was less than \$1959.00 per month. This year the family would qualify if the income falls below \$2,066 per month.

"Heads of households who are self-employed can determine an average monthly income by dividing the adjusted gross income from the 1990 Form 1040 submitted to the Internal Revenue Service by twelve. This will determine eligibility for those who do not have a monthly income."

Families are encouraged to consult the income guideline advertisement in this issue of the Groom News to estimate eligibility. The information will also be furnished in a future issue.

**Public Notice**  
On April 9, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to request that the optional feature "Call Transfer Disconnect" be available to all PLEXAR I customers by including the feature in Southwestern Bell's PLEXAR I tariff. Currently, this optional feature is available only on a customer requested basis.  
Call Transfer Disconnect (CTD) is an optional feature that allows PLEXAR I customers the ability to transfer a call to another telephone number within or outside their PLEXAR I system, hang up, and permit the two remaining parties to continue with the call. The PLEXAR I user is then free to place or accept another call. CTD is not intended to be used to avoid toll charges. Therefore, CTD will not be available to PLEXAR I customers subscribing to optional Extended Metropolitan Service or Extended Area Calling Service.  
If the company's application is approved, the monthly rate for CTD will be \$4.00 for each PLEXAR I station line. Prior to the June 19, 1991, interim rate approval, Southwestern Bell was billing customers who receive the service \$1.50 for each station line equipped with this feature. In addition, under Southwestern Bell's proposed tariff, every line within the PLEXAR I system must be equipped with this feature. The nonrecurring charge for the additional lines which must be equipped with CTD will be waived for existing CTD customers. The tariffed monthly rate will apply to all existing and future CTD customers.  
Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible. A request to intervene, participate, or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. 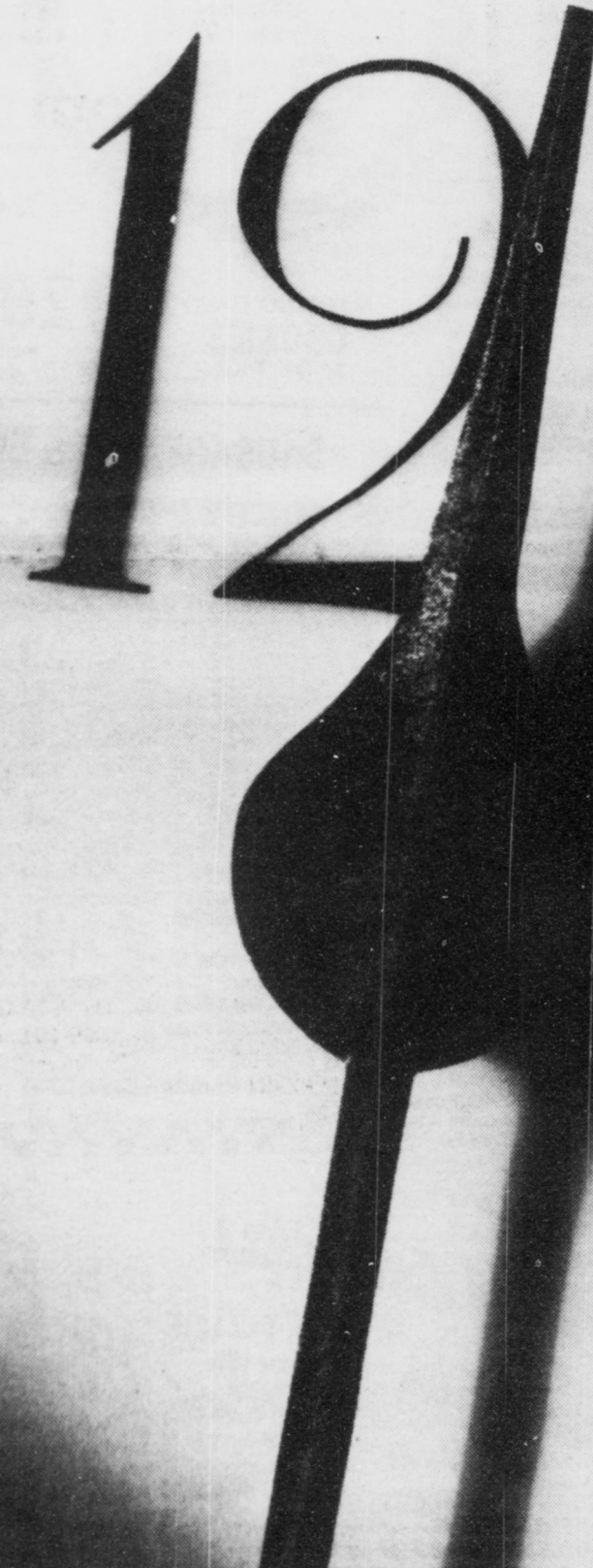

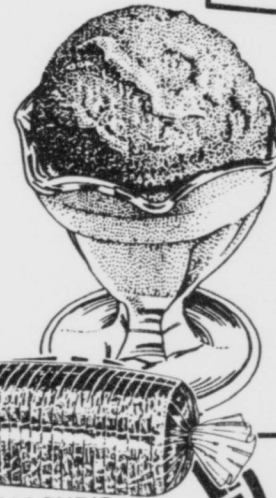
