Tigers Looking To 2nd Scrimmage

The Groom Tigers were off and running for 1992 with a scrimmage against Valley last Friday night.

"All in all," said second year coach Terry O'Dell, "they played much better than it might have appeared. We were up against one all-state middle linebacker and three all-state middle defensive players. Valley is rated 8th in the state at this time."

In the first series O'Dell felt that the Tigers appeared a little sluggish.

"We did not execute our plays the way we should

have. But that is what scrimmages are for... we had new boys playing new positions... it always takes a little time for them to get familiar with the position," stated O'Dell.

Valley caught them sleeping defensively on their first play. They scored again before the Tigers regrouped defensively and held them.

During the second session O'Dell felt that Groom dominated defensively. Paul McLaughlin scored on a 55 yard touchdown run.

O'Dell felt that Groom won

the second series of play.

The coaches said that they have not distinguished players as varsity and junior varsity as of yet. That decision will probably not be made until after the Benjamin game.

Coach Reid said, "There is a lot of raw talent in these younger boys, it just needs refining. The game ended on a positive note and the team had a very productive workout on Saturday."

NEW TUTORIAL PERIOD IMPLEMENTED

Groom School began its 1992-93 year Monday morning.

Principal Judy Babcock reported enrollment was at 225 but was expecting a couple more students to officially register before the week is out.

Last year Groom students numbered 227 on the first day. So not much change is expected in ADA.

A new feature in scheduling is the Tutorial Period. In previous years if a student needed help with a particular subject, that student came in early before classes began. Many times

distractions and interference caused problems for students and teachers who needed extra time together. By shortening the class schedule five minutes each, a 30 minute time slot has been created for tutorials. Students who need additional help will be required to see that teacher during this time frame.

The open period will also allow students to do some of their work at school as well as provide a time for activities such as class meetings and assemblies without disrupting other classes.

Principal Judy Babcock said, "We hope it will do what it was designed to do. Allow students who need extra help, the chance to get it."

Bob Bullock announced on July 2nd that schools could expect as much as \$1 billion in new state aid in the next legislative sessions. Governor Ann Richards warned shortly thereafter

that that figure may have been a bit premature, while Speaker of the House Gib Lewis said in June that "Texas Schools would see no new state money."

Obviously no one really seems sure if the money will be there or not. No one seems to have a workable plan for funding education in Texas. Two things are fairly certain, if the Texas

legislative body doesn't get moving the Federal Judicial System will close Texas

Schools down. If taxpayers revolt and refuse to pay an unconstitutional tax many school will be forced to close. The June 1, 1993 deadline to fix the system is only ten months away and the clock is ticking for Texas students.

Groom School Dress Code

As students head back to school this week it's time for a friendly reminder as to proper conduct for students concerning appropriate dress for school and related activities.

DRESS CODE:

The District's dress code is established to teach grooming and hygiene, instill discipline, prevent disruption, avoid safety hazards, and teach respect for authority.

It is our belief that proper dress for the occasion is conducive to good conduct. It exposes the students to the manner of dress acceptable to the community and for the occasion. We believe that school is not a place for the most casual attire. It is the wish of the school that students be dressed in such a way that they are ready to learn, not to be so relaxed in their style of dress that it detracts from the learning environment.

The manner of dress of students in the Groom schools has brought many compliments to the students and the Groom School. The students are to be commended for this accomplishment.

The following revision of the previous dress code will hopefully simplify and create an easier interpretation and understanding of what is expected and to keep current with some of the more acceptable styles and trends.

The following restrictions cannot cover every situation; therefore, students, when deciding how to dress for school, are expected to use good judgement in terms of community standards.

Boys' Hair and Dress Code:

The length of the hair shall not extend below the center of the ear; it may be blocked or tapered, but off the collar. It must be above the eyes (Revised July, 1988). No mustaches or beards may be worn.

Shirts tailored to be worn inside must be worn inside the pants.

No tank tops, moccasins, sleeveless shirts, or "cutoffs" may be worn. Shirts must be properly buttoned. No mesh shirts may be worn without another shirt underneath. No T-shirts with advertisements for alcohol or tobacco (ex. Corona, Coors, etc.) or distasteful slogans may be worn. Torn or cut jeans will not be allowed.

Boys may not wear ear jewelry at school or at school functions.

Shoes with black cleats that mark the floor will not be allowed. If boots are worn with pants, the pants must cover the tops.

Students may not wear the knit-type sweat pants.

Girls' Dress Code

Girls may dress in a manner to fit the occasion as long as they are neat and of proper taste. The following garments have specifically been determined to be unacceptable for girls:

tank tops, sun dresses,

shorts, T-shirts with advertisements for alcohol and tobacco (ex. Corona, Coors, etc.) or distasteful slogans, see-through blouses, apron tops without blouses, halter tops, crop tops, midriff styles of any kind, and unraveled hems on pants. Short skirts and dresses will be discouraged. No mini skirts will be allowed. Mini skirts are defined as mid-thigh and above. Torn or cut jeans will not be allowed.

Leggings and tight knit pants will be regarded the same as tights or panty hose and cannot be worn unless the other clothing worn by the student could be worn without the leggings or tight knit pants.

Shoes with black cleats that mark the floor will not be allowed. If boots are worn with pants, the pants must cover the tops.

General Statement:

Any other manner of dress chosen by the students should be of good taste and comply with the above listed provisions. Should poor taste of dress be chosen, the administration will administer disciplinary procedures.

The District has authority and control over its students during the regular school day and while going to and from school on District transportation. This jurisdiction includes any activity, regardless of time or location, and any school-

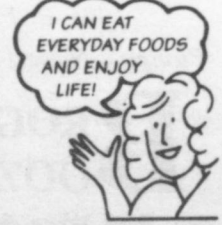

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

This is Mrs. Oldham's seventh year to teach. She enjoys teaching in the small school districts and is very proud to be involved in the McLean Community and school.

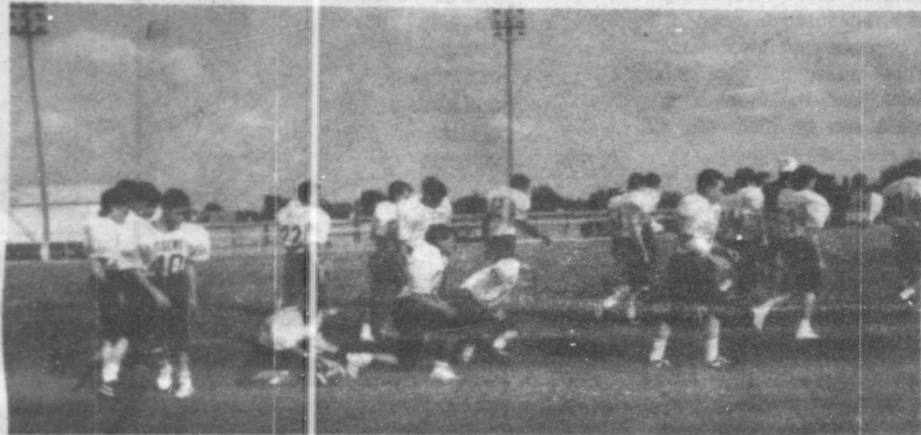
KRISTIE CROCKETT

From the Superintendent's Desk...

School is off and running, in fine condition, I might add. This is day number two of week number two and most all is well.

There is an area that I feel must be addressed. "Cafeteria"! Several parents have expressed concerns about the changes there. Believe it or not, I welcome your input. When you

make your views known, we have an opportunity to respond. Sometimes the parent is correct and sometimes the school is correct.

In order for me to adequately explain why the changes were made in the cafeteria program, I must address several areas of school business. 1. Last

year the school cafeteria spent \$33,000.00 more than they took in. 2. The State of Texas failed to provide \$71,000.00 to our district that was originally budgeted.

3. Even though we have one less teacher, one less cafeteria employee and one less classroom aide this year, the total school salaries increased. Why? Because salary increases are mandated by state law, but no funds were provided by the State for the increases.

4. The valuation of our school district fell this year by \$2,628,600. That reduced the school's income by another \$12,617.00.

5. Due to lower interest rates and less money to invest, there has been another reduction in income of \$26,500.00.

As you can imagine, our school can not continue to operate with those kinds of financial losses.

So, we have reduced employees and are trying to reduce losses in the cafeteria. Please be assured, we are serving a Class "A" Lunch as required by Uncle Sam. Under no circumstances is any student given less than what is

mandated by the USDA. I will admit that we have eliminated "seconds." But I'm sure that you understand the necessity for that.

The fact is, if we do not do everything locally that we can to preserve our school's financial status, then this school will be out of business in a few short years. Those are hard words, but true words. If you are up-to-date on school related finance, you know that the legislature has not lived up to their financial promises to the field of education. In fact, Judge McCowan has ruled that if the legislature fails to act by June 1, 1993, he will allow the schools of Texas to close.

If you would like to discuss these issues or any other issues, I welcome your telephone call or your visit. I believe we are all striving for the same thing, a better school.

Our school enrollment is as follows: K-10; 1st-9; 2nd-8; 3rd-14; 4th-17; 5th-24; 6th-16; for a total in the elementary of 98.
