The commercial was shot for Northwest Texas Healthcare Systems. Carey Mead, Marketing Communications Manager,

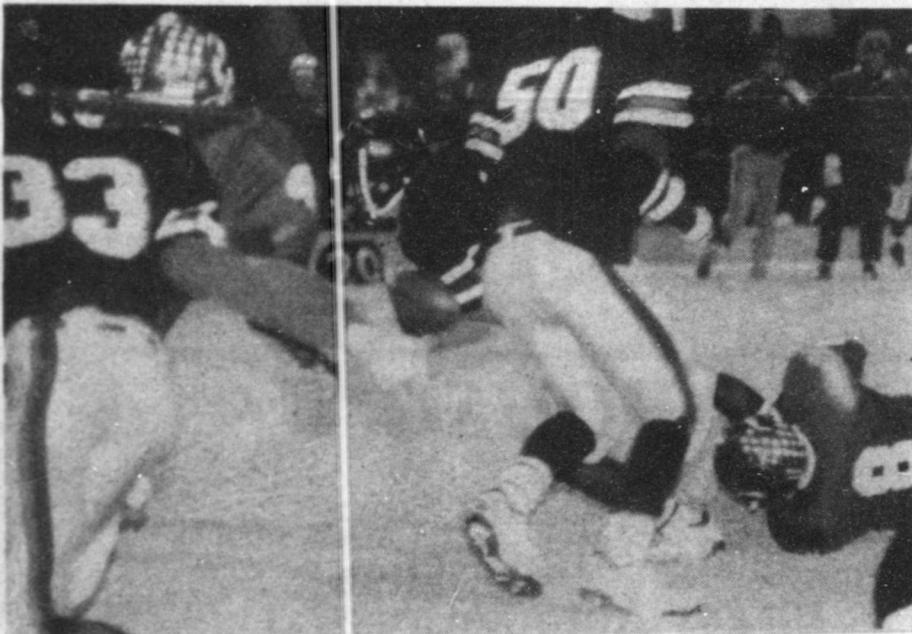
said this was an educational thirty second spot for the cardiac program.

Eagles End Tiger Season

Chillicothe Eagles were better prepared to play the Groom Tigers the second time around this season as they sent Groom to the gym Monday with a 46-26 victory and bi-district win. Chillicothe ended Groom's season last year in the bi-district game played in Chillicothe.

Once the Chillicothe Eagles found the school Friday night, by way of Groom's back alleys, it was all Eagles, in a football game that Groom contributed eleven turnovers to Chillicothe. Seven turnovers came on fumbles lost and four were on interceptions.

Chillicothe took the opening kick and drove the field for the first touchdown to go up 0-8. It was not until 4:43 left in the first quarter that Bo Burgin hit Wes Hall for 16 yards for a touchdown and tied the score 8-8. The first quarter ended as fumbles were traded and neither team being able to mount a drive to score. After the Eagles held Groom on downs they broke for a 42 yard TD run with 4:43 left in the first half. The Eagles seemed to be gaining a little momentum just prior to half time when Bart Britten fumbled on a first down and goal from the five yard line and Chillicothe recovered on the one yard line. But Groom nailed their fullback in the endzone for a safety, giving the Tigers two points, 10-16 with 3:20 left until half time.

Groom received the kickoff and Burgin hit Tom Lambert with two passes, one for a TD with 28 seconds to go until half giving Groom the lead for the first and last time at 18-

Carson County L.E.P.C. Hears Plan From Santa Fe Railroad

Carson County Local Emergency Planning Commission heard representatives from Santa Fe Railroad Monday at their regular meeting discuss their rail car accident response plan.

Blair Wallace and Toby Patterson were in Panhandle to give the program establishing an emergency relief plan of Santa Fe in case of a hazardous material spill endangering residents of Carson County. Santa Fe Railroad runs through Panhandle and White Deer. Wallace said, "We just don't have the hazardous material release problem when a wreck occurs, our tank cars are not easily ruptured."

Wallace stated the first step in an emergency due to a rail car accident is to find the engineer and conductor of the train. They will always have a list of materials the train is carrying and what the appropriate response should be to the particular chemical involved. Trains carrying hazardous materials are said to be running at a speed limit of 45-55 m.p.h. The Department of Transportation's Emergency Response Guidebook should be carried by all local fire departments describing hazardous materials and the response and care needed to contain the chemicals.

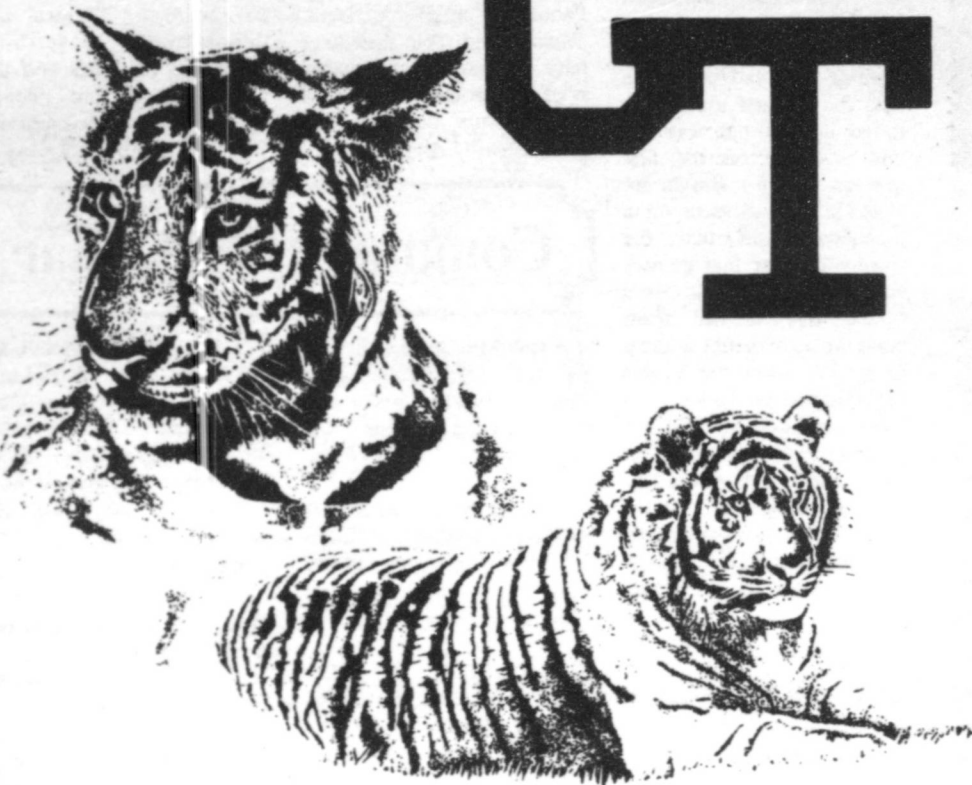

City Council Purchases Software

The Groom City Council met in regular session last week, with all members present. Also attending were Pat Ashford, Danny Ashford, Jr., Don and Mary Sue Lyles, Rick Wall and Jack Barnett.

Rick Wall, representing Mission Cable, met with the council to discuss the franchise that will expire in September 1995. Several concerned citizens took the opportunity to bring to Mr. Wall's attention that they were not receiving good reception on Channels 4 and 15. Wall promised to work on raising the tower to improve the pictures and these channels.

The City received a letter from the Texas Parks and Wildlife in regards to the grant for the park and tennis courts requesting that a overhead utility line be

put underground to meet requirements of the grant. After the City Secretary talked with SPS (Bob Henderson) they (SPS) are going to remove this pole and put the line underground for no charge to the city or school. The City will only be responsible for digging the ditch to lay the underground line. This will be done before December 1, 1993.

After a discussion concerning the city ordinance for water meters the council voted to resend the amendment and replace it with the original wording. The new revised version of the ordinance is published in this edition of the "Groom News". The motion was approved by Howard Britten, R.E. Cornett, Jerry Thornton and opposed by Bill Homer and Ronny Fields.

Rates on new "out of town" city water have been increased, by another 3-2 vote. They will be \$15.00 on the first 2,000 gallons and \$2.25 per 1,000 gallon there after.

Cornett, Thornton and Britten were again in favor while Homer and Fields were against.

The Council will once again sponsor the annual residential Christmas Decoration Contest. 1st prize is \$25.00, 2nd prize \$15.00, and 3rd prize \$10.00.

In other business: The Council changed their health insurance for dependents as covered by the Texas Municipal League.

The Council voted to accept a resolution to expand the calling scope of the Groom Telephone Exchange and authorize the employment of experts.

Software was purchased to increase the functions performed by the computer at city hall to include payroll, accounts payable, year end reports and budgets.

The Council went into executive session to discuss a pay raise for Jack Barnett. No action was taken.

The Carson County Jail housed sixty-one prisoners during the month of October, 1993. We are currently holding thirteen prisoners primarily on felony offenses.

We are still allowed only

one prisoner per month for transport to the Texas Department of Corrections due to overcrowding and we're currently holding three prisoners who are ready for transport.

The Carson County Sheriff's Department

assisted the Skellytown and White Deer Fire and EMS at the scene of a two-vehicle fatal traffic accident Thursday evening. One person was taken by Medivac to Amarillo while another was transported by conventional ambulance. A third person was

pronounced dead at the scene by Sharon Harper, Justice of the Peace from Skellytown. The accident was investigated by Texas Highway Patrol officers from Borger, Pampa and Groom. The Hutchinson County Sheriff's Department and Texas Highway Patrol

assisted with traffic control until the roadway could be cleared.

Our department is currently investigating an apparent forgery which victimized a business in White Deer. A check was forged using the account of an out-of-state subject who is deceased. Any person or business having had similar problems is asked to contact the Sheriff's Department. The matter is being investigated by Deputy Jeff Oldham of White Deer.

We are continuing to investigate the theft of cattle from the northern part of Carson County. Again, please contact our office if you are missing cattle and have not previously reported the loss to us or the Texas Southwestern Cattlemen's Association.

The Carson County Sheriff's Department has received leads in the Dallas area relating to a recent farm building burglary west of Panhandle. We are hoping to be able to determine if a suspect detained in that area might have also been responsible for thefts in Carson County.

"Stalking Now A Criminal Offense"

Governor Richards signed a bill into law on March 19, 1993 which makes "stalking" a criminal offense. This law makes it possible for law enforcement officers to deal with an offender before a victim has to suffer physical harm or injury.

The stalking law comes into play when: 1) An individual on more than one occasion engages in conduct directed specifically toward the other person, including following that person, that is reasonably likely to harass, annoy, alarm, abuse, torment or embarrass that person.

2) On at least one of those occasions by acts or words the suspect threatens to inflict bodily injury on that person or to commit an offense against that person, a member of that person's family, or that person's property. 3) On at least one of those occasions engages in the conduct after the person toward whom the conduct is specifically directed has reported to a law enforcement agency the conduct described above.

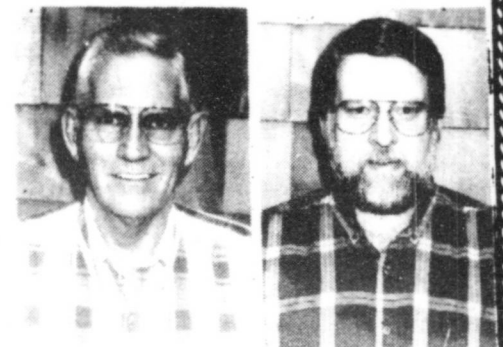

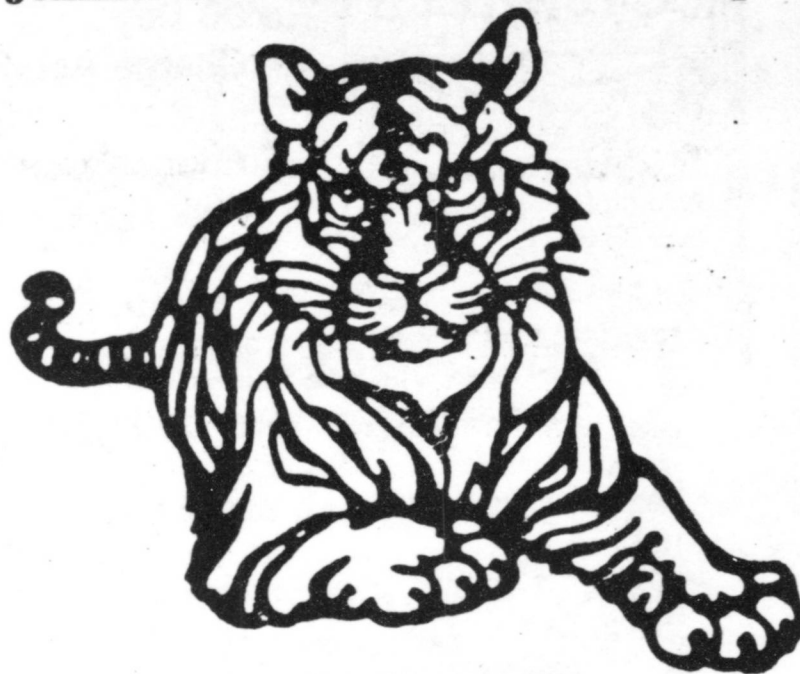

Maybell Nash presided and the group sang "Make Me a Channel of Blessing".

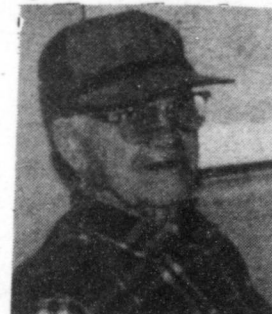
Loyce Murray led in prayer.

In the second half the Eagles dominated Groom scoring three more touchdowns. The third quarter ended with Chillicothe leading 18-32. The fourth quarter opened with the Eagles driving the field scoring to go up 18-40. They completed their scoring at 18-46 with 4:22 in the game.
