Red Ribbon Week Prompts Dramatic Demonstration

Students at Groom ISD participated in Red Ribbon (Drug & Alcohol Awareness

Week) in a very dramatic way. Friday afternoon, after a

week-long awareness program, a drunk driving accident was staged. The one car roll-over depicted two of their fellow students and one possible result. . .

"After drinking a quantity of beer, two Groom students were involved in a one car roll-over. The 17 year old passenger, not wearing a seat belt, was thrown from the car and killed, instantly. The driver of the car, an 18 year old senior at GHS, sustained head and neck injuries and is still in a coma at presstime. It took rescue personnel some time to free the victim. The jaws of life were used to free the victim. . ."

"While the very thought of losing a young person is horrible to even consider, the message to the students should be loud and clear, "Drinking and Driving" don't mix," stated Principal Fred Lunsford.

Groom's Volunteer Fire Department and Ambulance Service participated in the staged event. Tony Treadwell, Randy Johnson, Glenn Smith, Kevin Kurlee, David Britten and John Bohr were among the volunteers on hand. The two student actors were Jeremy Chavado and Adam Odor. The car was provided by Keith Barkley Automotive.

can do limited lab work, female exams, allergy shots, minor laserations and much more.

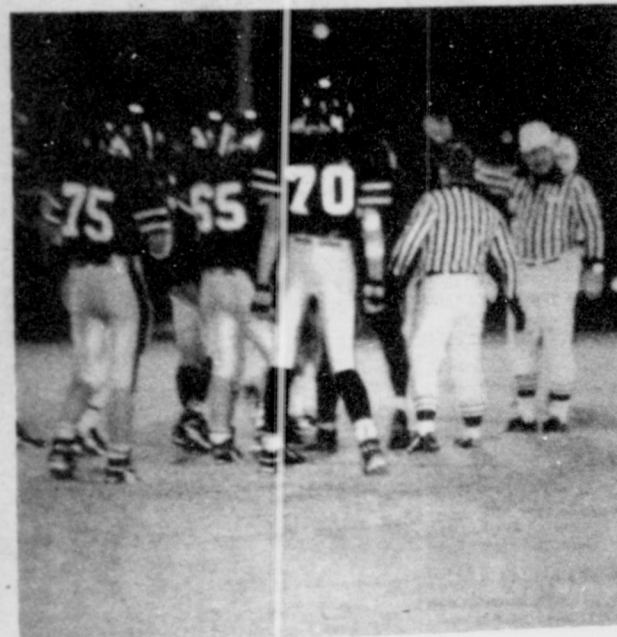
The clinic also offers free blood pressure checks anytime during office hours.

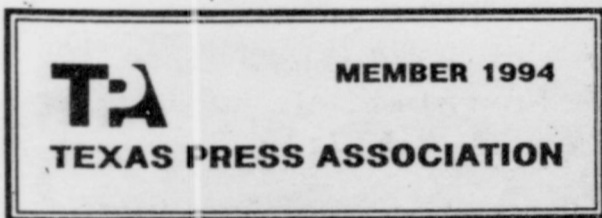

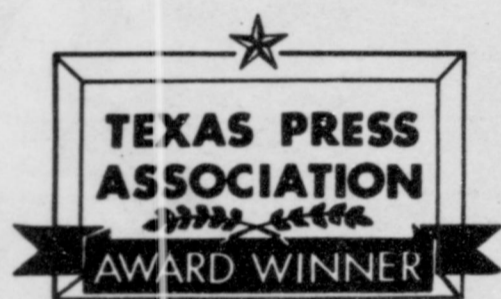

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Local Obituaries

Irl Smith Dies

Irl Marvin Smith, 89, a longtime Panhandle area photographer whose career began by photographing buffalo hunts on the Charles Goodnight ranch, died Tuesday, October 25, 1994.

Mr. Smith was born January 6, 1905 on the Shoe Bar Ranch near Lakeview, Texas. He attended schools in Hollis and Duke, Oklahoma, and graduated from Clarendon High School. He attended Clarendon College on voice and football scholarships. He joined the National Guard in 1927.

His photography career began in the 1920s when he occasionally photographed buffalo hunts. It was a

career that began in the days of flash-powder photography and ended recently with the closing of his Pampa studio, which was equipped with the most modern photographic technology.

Mr. Smith came to Pampa in 1933 and worked for Fred's Studio. On June 16, 1935, he married Irene Franklin at Claude, and a year later they bought Fred's Studio and changed the name to Smith's Studio.

He was in the first group of graduates from the advanced portrait classes of the Professional Photographers Association's Winona School of Photography. His exhibition prints received numerous merits toward his master photographer degree from

the PPA.

He was a member of First United Methodist Church, where he formerly sang in the choir. He was a 25-year member of the Pampa Lions Club.

Survivors include his wife, Irene, of the home; a son, Dwayne Smith of Spearman; a daughter and son-in-law, Rochelle and Calvin Lacy of Pampa; a sister, Elma

Naylor of Panhandle; a sister-in-law, Cleo Nix, of Groom; three grandchildren, Gail Threet and Greg Wilkins, both of Lubbock; and Glenna Hastings of Austin; and five great-grandchildren.

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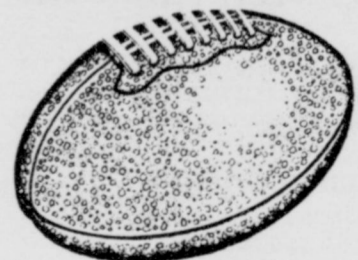

Commissioners Accepting Bids For Insurance

The Carson County Commissioner's Court is taking bids on the following: Multi-Peril insurance coverage on various county buildings and the County general liability insurance coverage. The Court shall award the contract to the responsible bidder who submits the lowest and best bid, or reject all bids and publish a new notice or take such other action as is authorized by said Local Government Code. Additionally, the award of the contract, if at all, shall be made to the responsible offeror whose proposal is determined to be the lowest evaluated offer resulting from negotiation, taking into consideration the relative importance of price and other evaluation factors in accordance with Section 262.030 of said Code.

Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (SWBT) has filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) to restructure the current PLEXAR I and II service offerings. This restructure will significantly change PLEXAR I and II services.

The restructuring of PLEXAR I will, among other things: (1) reduce the maximum line size from 30 to 9; (2) obsolete and grandfather certain optional features; (3) eliminate the requirement to subscribe to Feature Package Two in order to subscribe to certain optional features; (4) reduce the nonrecurring and monthly rates of certain features; and (5) increase the nonrecurring charges for the PLEXAR I System Charge (\$2.10 to \$8.00), Call Transfer Disconnect feature (\$3.00 to \$8.00), and Convenience Dialing I feature (\$6.35 to \$8.00). All current PLEXAR I customers will have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR I service, switching to the new restructured PLEXAR I service, or switching to PLEXAR II service with ten or more lines.

The proposed PLEXAR II restructure will, among other things: (1) change the tariffed offering to serve the market segment of 10-74 stations; (2) create two station pricing structures, one for customers with 10-29 stations, and one for customers with 30-74 stations; (3) reduce the sensitivity for the loop portion of the rate to two price bands: 0-2 miles, and beyond 2 miles; (4) offer a PLEXAR II basic station that can be flexibly configured, from a number of standard features, to meet the individual customer requirements; (5) change the way the termination liability is calculated so the customer is responsible for 65% rather than 56% of the present worth of the remaining monthly payments in the contract; (6) create an option that allows month-to-month customers to convert to long term contracts of at least three years and receive a credit or "contract signing bonus"; and (7) establish a System Subsequent Change Charge which applies per serving central office when changes are made that affect the entire system.

Current PLEXAR II customers will also have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR II service, or switching to the new restructured PLEXAR II service. PLEXAR II customers with at least 75 stations also have the option of switching to PLEXAR Custom service in certain situations.

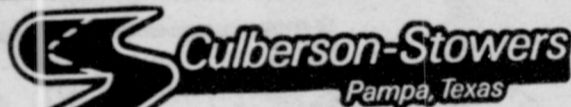

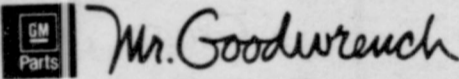
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Carson County Sheriff's Report

Texas Highway Patrol Trooper Gary Davis located a stolen vehicle from Huntington, Texas and took three adults and one juvenile into custody for the theft of the vehicle. After the suspects were in custody, the Sheriff's Department discovered several items of stolen property taken from vehicles in Arkansas, Oklahoma and Texas. The Huntington Police Department returned the suspects to their jurisdiction for prosecution. The Carson County Sheriff's

Department is currently attempting to locate owners of the stolen property and return the property to them.

Deputy Jeff Oldham was patrolling U.S. 60 when he observed two vehicles travelling in the same direction, apparently trying to ram each other. Texas Highway Patrol Trooper Chris Ray and Deputy Oldham were able to stop the vehicles and two suspects were placed in custody for Assault with a Deadly Weapon (motor vehicle).

A 9-1-1 call from a motorist who stopped in

Conway alerted our department to a person driving a truck in a dangerous manner on Interstate 40 as it went eastbound. THP Trooper Chris Ray first encountered the vehicle and avoided attempts by the suspect to ram the patrol car. Trooper Ray was joined by Deputy Jeff Oldham and then Deputy Sgt. Ray Davis and Trooper Gary Davis of Groom. The suspect continued to drive in a dangerous manner and

made numerous attempts to ram the law enforcement vehicle. Additional Carson County Sheriff's Department personnel joined the pursuit which finally ended inside Gray County after the suspect's vehicle was disabled by shots fired into the tires by the officers. The suspect was taken into custody by Gray County deputies and arraigned in Pampa before being returned to Carson County. The vehicle driven by the suspect was found to have been stolen from Amarillo. The suspect remains in custody in Panhandle on charges of Aggravated Assault with a Deadly Weapon and Unauthorized

Use of Motor Vehicle.

This is the second vehicle to be disabled by law enforcement weapons in the past few weeks. Our agencies involved do not take this use of firearms or our vehicles lightly and all cases involving gunfire are investigated to verify that this measure was necessary. In these particular cases, the officers involved had exhausted all other means of bringing the chase to an end. Our primary obligation over taking a suspect into custody is safety - for the public, the officer and even the suspect. When a suspect continues to endanger the life of the officers and becomes a threat to the lives of unsuspecting motorists and pedestrians, it is necessary to consider the use of the weapons.

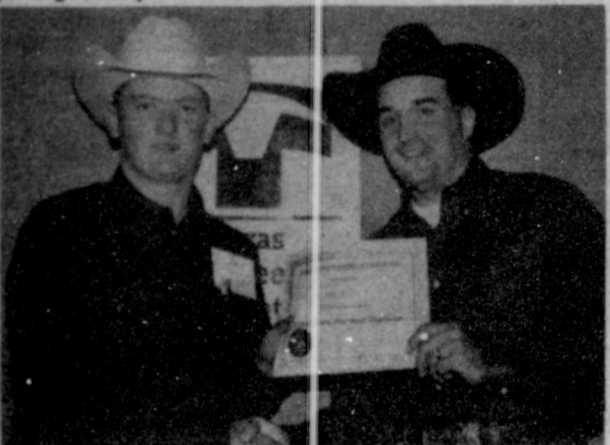

**Legal Notice To
The Citizens Of
McLean Junk
Vehicles Unlawful**

McLean City Ordinance Number 160 makes it unlawful to leave or to permit to remain upon any private or public property in the city of McLean any junked vehicle for a period of time exceeding 10 days. The ordinance provides that the leaving or permitting of a junked vehicle to remain upon a part or portion of public or private property in the city of McLean is unlawful and provides for a definition of and procedures for removal of the junked vehicle.

Ordinance Number 160 provides for sale or disposal of the vehicle by the Superintendent of Public Works of the city of McLean, Texas.

The City Council of the City of McLean shall serve notice on persons believed to be in violation of Ordinance Number 160 that any junked vehicle must be removed within 10 days of the receipt of the Ordinance Notice Letter. Persons receiving notice pursuant to the ordinance may request a hearing pursuant to section 5 of the ordinance.

A copy of Ordinance Number 160 is available for review and inspection upon request from the office of the City Secretary in McLean, Texas.
