190 Foot Cross To Be Erected Near Groom

Groom will soon be known as the home of the second largest cross in the world.

Steve Thomas, a member of St. Vincent de Paul Church in Pampa, has announced plans to construct the Cross of Our Lord Jesus Christ on a 31 acre tract of land located 100 yards south of I-40 and 200 yards west of Farm to Market Road 295 on the west edge of Groom. The cross will be visible from White Deer.

Upon completion, the cross should be the second largest cross in the world, second only to a 500-foot high cross constructed 60 miles north of Madrid in the 1950's by Spanish dictator Francisco Franco.

"Several years ago, I knew there was a big problem in the world, as most people do, with the tangible, visible signs and symbols of Satan that we see each day driving to work or school, like the triple X sign we see on the silos east of Amarillo," said Thomas, who is the owner of Caprock Engineering, Inc., where he is a structural engineer. "The only visible sign that we Christians have to remind us of God is our church buildings and the

symbols within. Yet we've got all these visible signs from Satan through the media and through Hollywood with its sex and violence. Everyone is beginning to believe that God is so merciful that sin doesn't exist, so we're becoming desensitized, and that was bothering me."

Thomas said he was wondering what he could do to help alleviate this situation and he came across the idea of the cross, after seeing a picture of a cross built near Ballinger by Jim Studer.

"Studer had undergone a near-death experience," said Thomas, who said the experience had led him to build the cross for God. "I didn't have that easy of a direction; I had to use several years of prayer. But when I saw a picture of Jim's cross, it hit me like a ton of bricks, I knew that's exactly what I wanted to do."

After contacting Studer and seeing the cross, he heard the stories of how the cross had brought humility to the residents there and how the cross had an astounding effect on Christians, particularly lukewarm Christians.

"Jim told me that people

driving through there would see the cross, stop along the road and say a prayer. He also said that children there were going home to their parents with questions about Jesus Christ."

Thomas thought the idea of the cross was a wonderful way to bring Christ back in the lives of people, besides just the church buildings.

"When people see the cross, the true symbol of Christianity, if there's a blink of Christianity there, it will bring it out, even if it's in a hard core atheist," said Thomas.

"There are so many unchurched people today, primarily due to the breakup of the family unit, that need to be brought back to Christ. There are a lot of unchurched people that are not seeing the visible signs that Christ has given us, like the tabernacle, the crucifix, the Rosary and the Holy Eucharist that we have in the Catholic Church. I'm hoping people here will do what I did when I saw Jim Studer's cross and be touched by it and prompt them to build a cross of their own. With situations occurring like this, we could have five, ten,

Seth Ritter ran for 162 yards on eight carries, scoring the third quarter on a 78 yard run.

Tom Lambert also scored on a 5 yard pass from Burgin for the final T.D.

The Defensive team was led by Ty Lambert who had a total of 18 tackles. Harold Cave landed 7 tackles and 2 assists. Tom Lambert also had 7 tackles and 2 assists. And Collin Downs had 4 tackles and 2 assists.

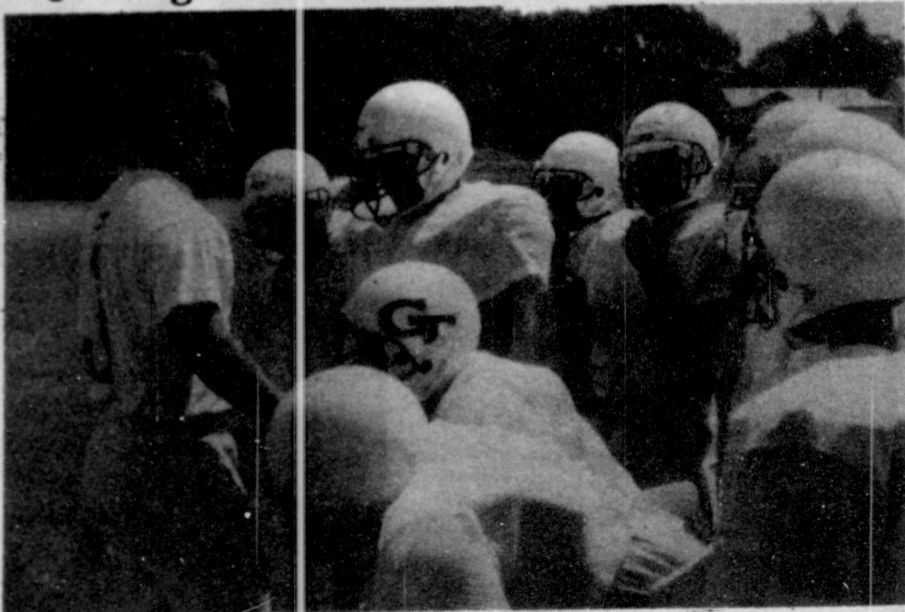
Groom had a total of 257 yards rushing and 99 yards passing, for a total of 356 yards gained. Groom had 4 fumbles and lost two.

PANHANDLE - The traditional Museum Day program will be of special interest to all Carson County residents this year. All graduates of high schools in the county will be honored, in addition to recognizing those classes participating in their class reunions.

The program's theme, "Roots in Carson County, Wings to the World," will be highlighted by guests who have graduated from county high schools and gone on to varied and successful careers.

Charles Miller, Panhandle H.S. Class of 1956, went on to earn a BS at Texas A&M and an ME degree from UCLA. He worked for Rockwell International in the development of nuclear power systems. He has been the president of Airline Services, a firm that supported company services around the world, and of Ocean Systems, a company involved in sonar systems for free-world navies. Currently he is the president of Commercial Avionics Systems, an organization of 4,000 employees with facilities in Kansas, Florida, Washington, Arizona, and Singapore.

Marti Hinson Kirk graduated from Groom H.S.

and then earned a degree in speech and drama at West Texas State University. She coached these subjects at Crockett Junior H.S. and Tascosa H.S. in Amarillo, as well as serving as Librarian at Amarillo H.S. In recognition of her efforts to bring equality for minorities to the forefront, the Classroom Teachers Association presented the Ed Henderson Humanitarian Award to her and her husband, Jay Kirk. The tax rate for 1994 was set at \$.0085 per \$100 valuation. This is the same tax rate the District has had for the last three years.

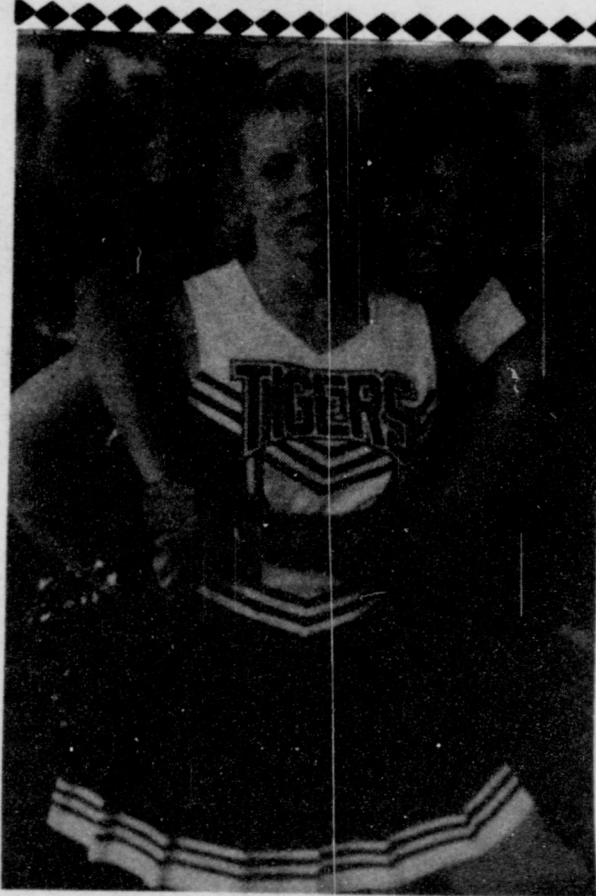

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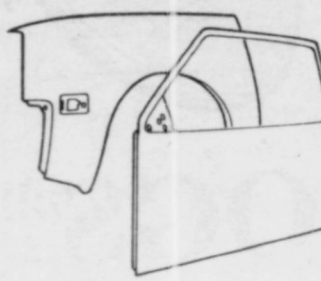
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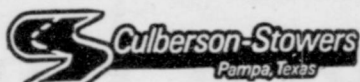
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Cubs Open 1994 Season

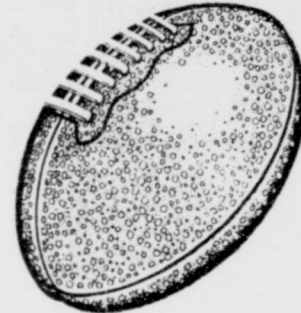

Fire Depart. Elects Officers

The Groom Volunteer Fire Department met in regular session on Monday, September 12 at 8:00 p.m. The schedule of this meeting was to nominate and elect new officers for the 1994-1995 fiscal year.

Our reliable Fire Chief, Tony Treadwell, was re-elected for the next year as was the infamous John Allen Homen for 1st Assistant Chief. Donald Burgin, a veteran of Groom Fire Department, was elected as 2nd Assistant Chief. Two new positions, Coordinator and Training Assistant were not elected at this time pending more information on the two positions from the Texas Fire Marshals Association. Kevin Kerlee was elected the position of President for the Fire Department. The Vice President position will now be filled by John Bohr.

The Secretary and Treasurer positions were combined as one and unanimously voted to Jay Lamb, who deserves a big "Thank You" for all the effort and long hours spent reorganizing both the Fire Department and the Ambulance Department. Lastly, the position of Reporter was elected to Randy Johnson.

A new face to the Groom area, Jack Spencer, was voted in as the newest member of the Groom Fire

twenty, maybe thirty crosses up. Something like this could have a drastic impact on our moral culture within the United States."

"Christ gave me all of my ability in total - everything I have, I know that he's directed me to build this cross since I was a child."

The cross will have excellent accessibility from I-40 west and east, according to Thomas, who said by talking to merchants in the area, the cross will be seen by many.

"Since we've been working in that area, a number of merchants have told me that 10 million travelers pass by that location in a year, 50,000 a day in the summer," said Thomas. "So you can imagine the witness power the cross would have at that location."

The 31 acre tract of land where the cross will be located was donated by Chris Britten of Groom and will be owned and maintained by the Diocese of Amarillo, according to Thomas, who said the land will have manicured, landscaped grounds that will allow all denominations to come in and witness to the Lord, such as sunrise services, etc. The cross will be visible for 20 miles on a clear day or night, according to Thomas.

The cross will be solid glossy white, to signify the Resurrection of the Lord.

according to Thomas. It will be a structural tube space frame, made out of high strength square tubing, wrapped with 26 gauge, highly reflective steel siding that has a 20-year warranty. The Cross will also be floodlit on both the east and west elevations.

Thomas said he wanted to break ground on the cross earlier this year, but due to the complexity of the cross's design, it has been an engineering challenge to him.

"We're in the process of drafting the final design of the cross, which will take several weeks," he said. "We still have to order parts for the foundation since the foundation itself will take up 700 tons of concrete."

The hole for the Cross will take up a 30'x30'x15' deep section, which will remove about 80 truckloads of dirt, according to Thomas.

"We don't want to leave that huge opening exposed very long, so we have to get all the parts together before we can start construction," he said.

Thomas said a projected groundbreaking date is early October, and he said he hopes to have the project finished by Christmas Day.

"There are several phases to building the cross," he said. "The first phase is the foundation, which will take several weeks to build. While the foundation is

under construction, the subcontractor doing the frame work to build the structural frame will be working.

"Hopefully by the time we get the foundation done, there won't be much delay to get the five sections of

framework delivered to the site."

The framework will be delivered to the location in 70 foot long sections, according to Thomas. After a week to ten days of applying the siding to the sections, two large cranes will come in and pin the sections down.

The lower section will be lifted and set into place and pinned with seven inch in diameter high strength steel pins that will pin it to the foundation. The second section will then be pinned to the lower section. Once the pinning begins on the sections, Thomas said the whole process should take four to five hours.

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County Sheriff's Report

The Carson County Jail is currently housing eight persons for the following offenses: 2 - DWI (Felony), 1 - DWI (Misdemeanor), 1 - Aggravated Assault with a Deadly Weapon, 1 - Violation of Probation, 1 - Assaulting an Officer, 1 - Possession of a Controlled Substance, and 1 - Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle.

Our officers responded to a 9-1-1 call in Fritch involving a man running down the street with an axe and striking vehicles. One person was arrested as a result of this call.

The Sheriff's Department is investigating allegations of one case of Physical Abuse to a Child and another matter dealing with allegations of Sexual Abuse. Both cases were reported to us by the Children's

Protective Services Office in Pampa.

He is currently enroute back to that state after waiving extradition. In an unrelated case, observant persons outside the courthouse alerted us to an attempt to smuggle contraband into the jail by securing it to a rope made of bedding materials which was lowered from a jail window. This matter is currently under investigation. One person was jailed as a result of this matter and person currently being held in our facility face the possibility of additional charges and other disciplinary action.

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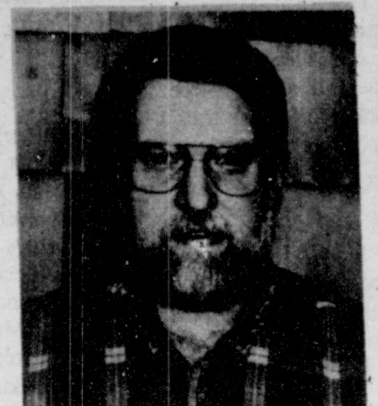
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Honor Society Holds Tourney

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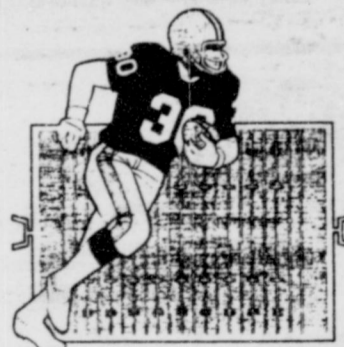

The Root Cellar

One of the hardships we have to endure at our house every so often, is our refrigerator refuses to circulate cold air properly, and we lose milk and ice cream. It gripes me to have this happen, but I try to compare this with hardships from the 'good ole days' before we had refrigeration and block ice boxes.

Grandma Trew once described in detail, how they went about preserving food in their root cellar. It was usually just a dirt walled dugout with a roof of tin, covered with dirt also. First, they located a fence row of blow-sand, which was hauled by wagon to the root cellar and piled just outside. Then a long board was staked to the floor of the cellar to hold back the sand. A layer of fine sand was placed behind the board and it was ready for storage.

The garden would yield potatoes, turnips, carrots, onions, and sweet potatoes. These were harvested, hauled to the root cellar and thickly placed, but not touching, into the layer of sand. More sand covered them and another layer of produce added, until all was in storage. Apples, pears, and sometimes nuts were added in the fall. Very little of this food spoiled before it was eaten during the winter. The rafters of the root cellar would be hung solid with onions, garlic, dill, and other herbs used for seasoning. If the hens were laying good, excess eggs were coated in lard and packed, pointed end down, into large crocks of salt, then covered with a lid. Most would last for months. At the back of the cellar, away from the door, were shelves holding canned produce. Jelly, marmalade, fruit juice, jam, preserves, meat chunks in gravy, sausages fried and packed in lard, beans, corn, tomatoes, and relish were just some of

the inventory.

The smokehouse, nearby, was hung with hams, and sides of bacon, and sometimes a string of fat sausages. Out in the windmill tower, on a rope and pulley, hung a beef, covered with an old wagon sheet. You just lowered it down to a barrel, then carved out what you needed for that day. I hate to think of all the work that went into raising, harvesting, storing, and processing of that food, and then I complain about having to thaw out a fan that keeps my refrigerator cold!!!

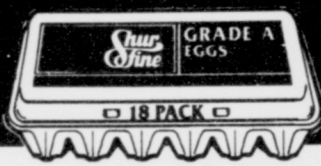

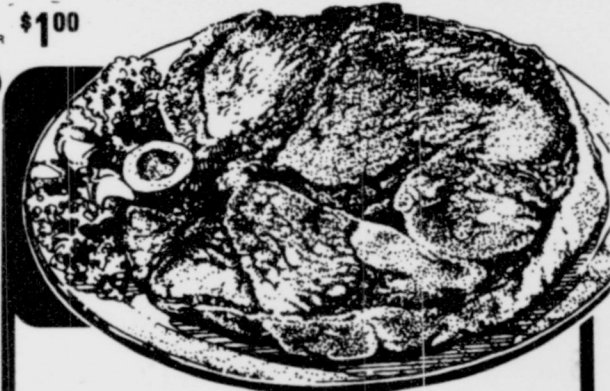
