Groom School Board Sets Policy For Drug and Alcohol Abuse By Athletes

The Board of Trustees of the Groom Independent School District met in a regular monthly session on November 10, 1994 at 7:00 p.m. in their usual meeting place in the school administrative offices with the following members present: Dennis Babcock, president; Ken Burger, vice-president; Adela Kotara, secretary; Joe Longway, Barry Fields, and Tony Treadwell.

Ben Ingham, Superintendent, Joyce Hutsell, Business Manager and Fred Lunsford, Principal were also present along with Curtis Downs, and Neta Childress, visitors and Debbie Addy, counselor.

(Unless otherwise noted, all votes on motions were unanimous).

The board visited the CEI lab where Mrs. Juanita Brown and several students gave a demonstration on its usage. No action was taken.

Each member of the Board of Trustees having read a transcript of the minutes of the regular meeting of October 11, 1994, and each member having at the table a copy

of said transcript of the minutes, Mr. Burger moved and Mr. Treadwell seconded to approve the minutes as presented. The motion passed.

Ms. Addy gave a counselor's report on scholarships and financial aid. No action was taken.

Mr. Ingham presented the Academic Excellence Indicator System (AEIS) report which had already been published in the Groom News. No action was taken.

Mr. Ingham presented a pamphlet "Groom ISD at a Glance". No action was taken.

Mr. Burger moved and Mr. Treadwell seconded a motion to approve the "Gun-Free School Policy of 1994". The motion carried.

As part of the "Gun-Free Schools Act of 1994," Groom ISD will expel from school, for a period prescribed by Texas law, any student who is determined to have brought a weapon to school. The term "weapon" means a firearm as such term is defined in section 921 of title 18, United States Code.

Mr. Fields moved and Mr. Longway seconded a

motion to approve the "Smoke-Free Campus Policy". The motion carried.

As part of the "Pro-Children Act of 1994", no person shall be permitted to smoke or use tobacco of any kind within any indoor facility owned or leased or contracted for and utilized by kindergarten, elementary, or secondary students at Groom ISD.

Mr. Treadwell moved and Mr. Longway seconded a motion to approve the "Protection of Pupil Rights" law. The motion carried.

As part of the "Protection of Pupil Rights," all instruction materials, . . . as part of any applicable program shall be available for inspection by the parents or guardians of the children of Groom ISD. No student shall be required as part of any applicable program, to submit to a survey, analysis, or evaluation that reveals information concerning:

political affiliations, mental and psychological problems potentially embarrassing the student or his family; sex behavior and attitudes; illegal, anti-social, self incriminating and demeaning behavior; critical

appraisals of other individuals with whom respondents have close family relationships; legally recognized privileged and analogous relationships; income (other than that required by law to determine eligibility for participation in a program or for receiving financial assistance under such program.)

The law does not allow the disclosure of secure statewide assessment instruments, nor does it allow a student to decline to participate in these statewide assessments. (TAAS).

Mr. Burger moved and Mr. Treadwell seconded a motion to approve the Athletic Policy on Drug/Alcohol Use and Involvement.

For the purpose of this policy, "athlete" refers to any student of Groom High School or Groom Junior High School who is enrolled in any athletic program.

"Athletic Program" refers to the athletic activities of the School (Sports) and to any off-season conditioning classes.

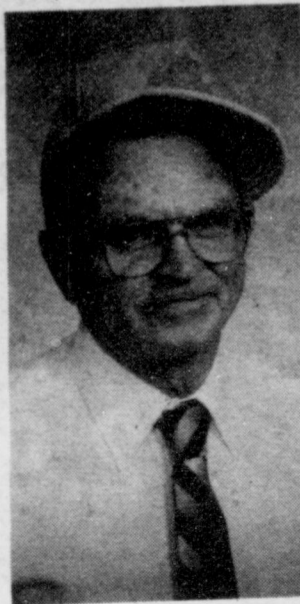
The Ettes wore them down with some outstanding defensive effort by Sheri Koetting, Kay Case and Stacy Fields.

Blackwell Supply To Celebrate 40th Anniversary

In 1954, Groom was a thriving town, growing, and filled with people and opportunity. Mr. O.P. Blackwell and his son, Page, purchased a building on Main Street, just a couple of doors down from The Groom News, and hung out their shingle as Blackwell Supply, a John Deere dealership.

Competition was fierce at that time. Groom had then not only the John Deere dealership that the Blackwells owned but also a Case, International and Massey Ferguson dealership. Serving only about a 30 mile radius, personal service, and giving the consumer the best deal possible was



extremely important to their survival.

And survive they did. In five years they had outgrown their original

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Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:
ENOUGH IS ENOUGH! I don't know about the rest of you, but I'm sick and tired of having our private property rights stolen from us. Everyone is probably aware of the red fox, the spotted owl and the kangaroo rat, but are you aware of the rape of the Texas oilfields? Do you realize that millions and millions of barrels of "drip gas" (the liquids stripped from the so-called dry gas from this area) are being stolen from the royalty owners?

thinking, "I feel sorry for the poor foxes, owls and rats, but those royalty owners are too rich anyway." As mistaken as this assumption is, it is faulty in that this theft of "drip gas" directly affects each and every citizen of Texas. This "drip gas" is being taken across state lines and sold at huge profits without a **PENNY** in taxes being paid in Texas. It is estimated that **\$6 BILLION** in taxes is lost by Texas each year! If these taxes were paid in Texas, we could have the best school system in the United States without

having to raise property taxes or allegedly use the lottery money (the misuse of lottery money is another matter that needs to be addressed.) If you are a royalty owner, you probably feel as I did a few months ago when Phillips Petroleum decided to do away with a key clause in our 65-year-old lease and prevent our use of free gas from our well. I thought that fighting for our legal rights would be costly and unproductive because Phillips has an army of lawyers on retainer. In visiting with friends and

neighbors who were finding themselves in the same situation, I found that we had an ally, a man named Mike Sullivan. Mike has been fighting the financial giants of industry and winning in California and now has oil interests here in Texas. He has been robbed in much the same way we have. He has taken up the torch and done much investigating, providing key information for law-suits against the Texas Railroad Commission for their part in allowing the oil companies to take our property without negotiating for it and giving us fair compensation.

A new organization called **TEXANS FOR PRIVATE PROPERTY RIGHTS** is holding a meeting and if you are as angry as I am, come to the M.K. Brown Civic Center in Pampa on November 21st at 8:00 pm to learn more about the granddaddy of all private property rip-offs and the litigation in progress. Questions and answers will follow the general information session.


Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (SWBT) has filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) to restructure the current PLEXAR I and II service offerings. This restructure will significantly change PLEXAR I and II services.

The restructuring of PLEXAR I will, among other things: (1) reduce the maximum line size from 30 to 9; (2) obsolete and grandfather certain optional features; (3) eliminate the requirement to subscribe to Feature Package Two in order to subscribe to certain optional features; (4) reduce the nonrecurring and monthly rates of certain features; and (5) increase the nonrecurring charges for the PLEXAR I System Charge (\$2.10 to \$3.00), Call Transfer Disconnect feature (\$3.00 to \$8.00), and Convenience Dialing I feature (\$6.35 to \$8.00). All current PLEXAR I customers will have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR I service, switching to the new restructured PLEXAR I service, or switching to PLEXAR II service with ten or more lines.

The proposed PLEXAR II restructure will, among other things: (1) change the tariffed offering to serve the market segment of 10-74 stations; (2) create two station pricing structures, one for customers with 10-29 stations, and one for customers with 30-74 stations; (3) reduce the sensitivity for the loop portion of the rate to two price bands: 0-2 miles, and beyond 2 miles; (4) offer a PLEXAR II basic station that can be flexibly configured, from a number of standard features, to meet the individual customer requirements; (5) change the way the termination liability is calculated so the customer is responsible for 65% rather than 56% of the present worth of the remaining monthly payments in the contract; (6) create an option that allows month-to-month customers to convert to long term contracts of at least three years and receive a credit or "contract signing bonus"; and (7) establish a System Subsequent Change Charge which applies per serving central office when changes are made that affect the entire system.

Current PLEXAR II customers will also have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR II service, or switching to the new restructured PLEXAR II service. PLEXAR II customers with at least 75 stations also have the option of switching to PLEXAR Custom service in certain situations.

Policy

To be considered enrolled in the athletic program, students must participate in at least one of the sports offered by the school or be planning to participate in at least one. Students are considered enrolled in the program from June of the sixth grade until May of their senior year, or until they are removed from the program or elect to drop out.

The Policy

Athletes shall not engage in the use of alcohol and/or illegal drugs, in any form, during any part of the calendar year, on campus or at school related events.

The Penalties

If an athlete is caught by a member of the school's professional staff...

First Offense:

The athlete will be

referred to the supervising coach of the in-season sport or the current off-season coach. Penalty should be reasonable and designed to deter further violations. Penalties may be in the form of extra duties*, and should be of sufficient duration to discourage repeat violations.

Second Offense:

The athlete will be assigned a penalty of one game suspension. If the offense occurs during off-season, the off-season coach will assign extra duties* to the athlete.

Third Offense:

The athlete will be suspended from the program for the duration of the year. If the offense occurs within the last 6 weeks of the school year, the suspension will include

the first 6 weeks of the next school year.

Additionally, if an athlete is caught by law enforcement and convicted of...

MIP, Minor In Possession, will result in a one-game suspension and extra duties* to be assigned by the athletic director or coach.

DWI, Driving While Intoxicated, will result in a two-week suspension (two football games, four basketball games, two track meets, two tennis matches.)

A SECOND offense will result in expulsion from the

athletic program for the year and up to 6 weeks of the next year.

* Extra duties include: Extra conditioning, clean-up of the Athletic areas, Making anti-alcohol/drug posters, Research and writing reports on alcohol/drug abuse, and Community Service.

Mr. Burger moved and Mr. Longway seconded a motion to approve and pay all bills. The motion carried.

Mr. Treadwell moved and Mr. Longway seconded to adjourn. The motion carried.

No executive session was required.

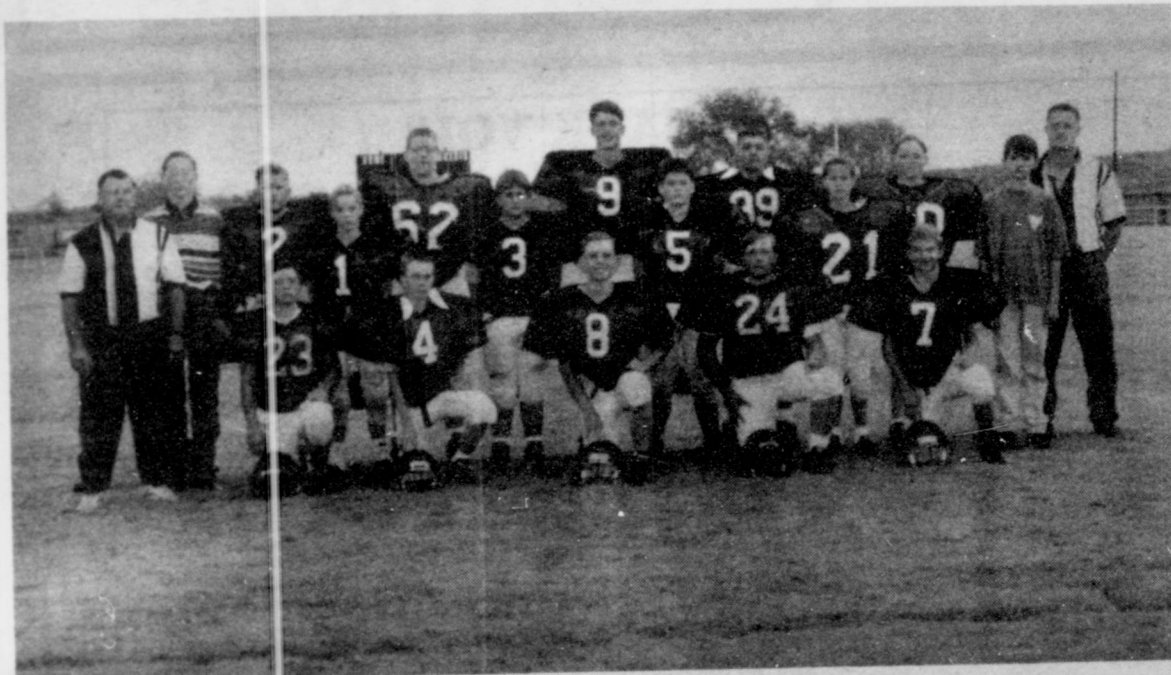
