DPS Wives 1, Bad Guys 0!

With an outstanding presence of mind, Groom's own Marcia Davis helped foil and capture a criminal on a cross country crime

Davis was returning from her job as a first grade school teacher with her children Carrie and Krisanne, when she noticed a pink and white van parked near the alley between Eastern and Shelton. Thinking that it must be someone visiting the John Koetting home, she continued on delivering one of her children's classmate, Allison Eatmon, home near 7th and Ware.

The trio decided to get a soft drink at Mighty's before returning home.

As Mrs. Davis was heading north down Eastern Street, she noticed the same van pull around the corner

entering the house she noticed the back door open.

This puzzled her because she was pretty sure it was shut when she left home. Looking down the hallway she noticed Gary's, her husband, watch lying on the floor. She also saw drawers that had been pulled out and riffled through.

Davis quickly got her children back out to the car. She knew that the perpetrator couldn't have gone far with only minutes passing since she had seen him turn the corner.

She went looking for him down Eastern Street. She got all the way to J & N Truck Stop, turned around and went back the way she had come. Davis spied the van at the Stop and Shop gas pumps. She pulled into the parking lot and quickly

wrote down the licence tag number.

She then returned home and contacted the Carson County Sheriff's Department. She was able to give them a good description of the van, the tag number and the man.

DPS Trooper and partner of the husband of Marcia Davis, Joe Longway stopped the van seconds after getting the call. He engaged the vehicle in a chase with speeds up to 105 miles per hour.

The pursuit went through the town of Panhandle at speeds of 80 miles an hour. Panhandle Police Department set up road blocking stop sticks. The fleeing bungler went around Finally, Carson County Sheriff's Department were able to get stringers (a device used to puncture

the tires of a fleeing vehicle) up in front of the van.

Trooper Longway and Sheriff Loren Brand made the arrest without further incident, although the man had a loaded automatic weapon on the seat next to him.

Later it was discovered that the burglar also attempted to break in to Ruby Denton's home. Luckily there was storm windows on her house and the attempt was unsuccessful.

The alleged bungler had stolen the van in Smyrma, Tennessee. He also robbed an 85 year old woman in Shamrock at gun point. He had broke into another unoccupied home in Wheeler County. Trooper Longway stated that there were four other loaded guns in the van. The man is also

My request is to restore service to the existing two inch water line and two inch meter that is in place, and has serviced these four lots for many years.

We have a 3/4 inch meter which services the house, and a two inch meter to service the sprinkler system and any subsequent buildings on our lots. The 3/4 inch line is not adequate to supply water to our house and maintain all four

United Methodist Church Breakfast





DPS Report. . . As The Interstate Turns

On April 16th Trooper Davis arrested an El Paso man for Possession of Hashish, less than 2 oz, on I-40, thirteen miles west of Groom. The man was taken to the Carson County Sheriff's Office until he posted bond.

On April 18th an elderly California man failed to yield right of way when attempting to take the large rest area exit on I-40, striking a Penske rental truck driven by an Indiana man. The Indiana man attempted to avoid the accident and ran into a sign. There was damage to both vehicles with no injuries reported. Two citations were issued.

On April 19th a '90 GMC Ryder rental truck skidded on its side for 393

feet after failing to drive in a single lane and into the north barditch. When the New York driver over corrected back onto I-40 it fell to its side and began skidding. The driver had minor injuries but refused treatment. One citation was issued.

In Hall County cause #2913, State vs. Doyle William Watson, the defendant pled "guilty" to Felony DWI and received 5 years, probated, and was fined \$1,000.00. The

The State was represented in each cause by District Attorney Randall C. Sims.


