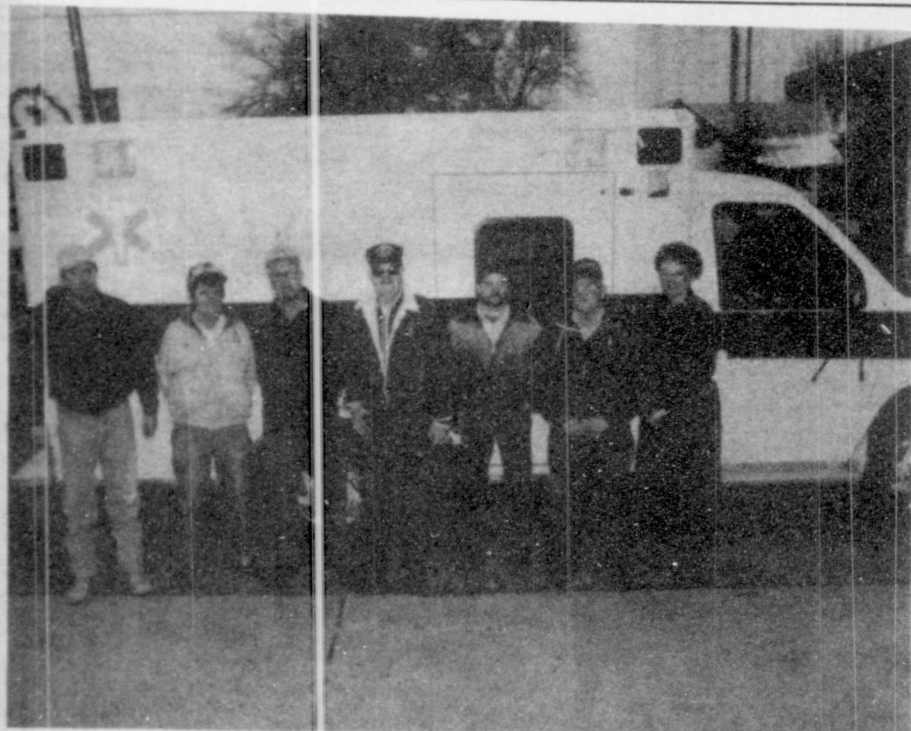

## Be Prepared . . . . Tornado Weather On The Horizon For Our Area

Although winter seems like it will never end, it will not be long before area residents will be looking toward the skies to watch for severe weather.

Tornados and intense thunder and lightning storms occur frequently in the Texas Panhandle. There are several safety tips that are good to know.

(1) Always keep flashlights, a portable radio and extra batteries on hand. When electricity goes off due to lightning strikes you can continue to monitor the weather conditions. The flashlight will help you see when the lights go out. There is no darker dark than when all the lights are off in town.

(2) During a lightning storm, stay inside away from windows and doors. Do not talk on the telephone. Unplug all unnecessary appliances to protect them from power surges if

lightning does strike nearby.

(3) Monitor a channel that gives the local weather. With cable T.V., many times the channel you happen to be watching is from another part of the country. On stormy days be sure you occasionally check the local stations for weather updates.

(4) A tornado watch means that weather conditions are favorable for tornadic activity.

(5) A tornado warning means that tornados are imminent or have been sighted in counties that are announced by the weather service.

(6) If you are in your car during heavy rains, be sure to turn on your lights. If you pull off the road to wait for the storm to pass, turn on your flashers and make sure you are well off the road. Heavy rains make

visibility low.

(7) In Groom, one long continuous blast of the sirens means that a tornado is in the area. Residents should take cover in a basement or cellar. It is good to have a plan with children in the home as to what to do if the parents are not home. Should a tornado alarm sound during school hours. Do not attempt to go to school to get children. They are much safer there than out on the road.

(8) If no basement or cellar is available, experts suggest getting in a small room with no windows, such as a closet or bathroom. Put a blanket over your head to protect your skin from flying debris.

(9) One short blast will sound when the weather has cleared enough for you to safely leave your shelter.

## Provider Of The Year Named

Groom Ambulance Service was presented the Volunteer Emergency Medical Services Provider of the Year for 1995 from Panhandle Emergency Medical Services System (PEMSS). This honor was presented to Groom EMS at the annual PEMSS Banquet held at the Grand Plaza Room at the Amarillo Civic Center on Saturday evening, January 6, 1996. Three hundred people with

an interest in prehospital care from the top twenty-six counties of the Texas Panhandle were in attendance. The PEMSS Special Recognition Award recipients were selected by a vote of the PEMSS Public Interaction Committee (PIC) based on nominations from the almost 2,000 prehospital providers in the Texas Panhandle.

The Groom Ambulance Service has served its

## Carson County I-40

### Bridges To Be Resurfaced

A dozen bridges on IH-40 in Gray and Carson counties are getting a minor facelift. Contractors for the Texas Department of Transportation have started work to resurface bridges on IH-40 in Groom and McLean.

The \$600,000 contract was awarded to SCR Construction Co., Inc. of

Richmond, Texas. Traffic on the bridges will be reduced to one lane of travel at times during construction. The project will result in a new surface and safer guardrail ends on eight bridges in Groom and four bridges in McLean.

The project is expected to be completed in about three months.

### New Farm Bill

WACO, TX. - The new farm bill overhauled by Congress last week, paves the way for a corporation-dominated American agricultural system in which farmers and ranchers will simply become employees, and the independent family farm way of life will perish, said Wes Sims, Texas Farmers Union president.

"To begin with," said Sims, "farming will get a big black eye by the general public because the majority in Congress rammed through the idea that payments will be made to farmers for the next seven years no matter how good or bad commodity prices are. At the end of the seven-year period, there won't be any federal food and agriculture safety net programs."

"This legislation marks the end of an era," Sims stated. "Both farmers and consumers are being abandoned by their government."

"It will only take a couple of bad years of drought or insects to drive practically every agricultural producer of food and fiber in the land into contracts with the multinational corporations, effectively making them serfs of the big corporate boardroom."



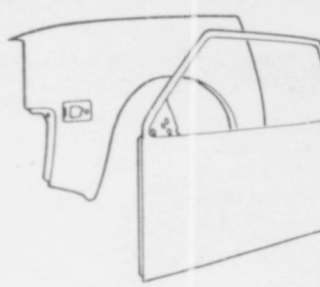

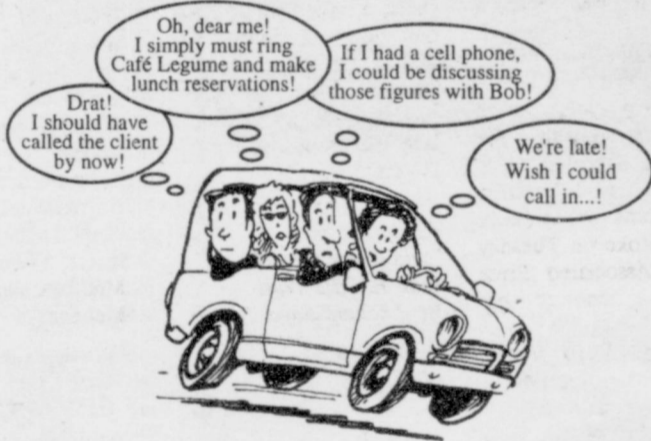

## City of McLean Votes To Cancel Local Election Under New Texas Law

In a special session on April 2, 1996, upon a motion by Jackson, second by Lands, all present voting in favor of the motion, the following was approved:

"By order of the City Council of McLean, Texas, the General Election for 3 positions of alderman is hereby cancelled due to no opposition for any of the

positions."

Under a new amendment, the Texas Election Code states all persons who wish to have their name placed on the Official Ballot must have applied by March 20, 1996 for the May 4th General Election. March 20 was the deadline to register as a write-in candidate.

With only three candidates filing for three positions and no propositions on the ballot, it will save taxpayers money to not hold an uncontested election.

Filing for the Alderman positions were incumbents Mary Dwyer, Sid Lands, and Wayne Bybee.

## Bogus Check Lands Saye In Jail; Locals Investigating Ties To Freeman Standoff

The Freeman standoff with the FBI in Montana has apparent ties to McLean, it was learned Tuesday.

According to Gray County District Attorney John Mann, a definite scam has appeared with the discovery of a bogus check issued to Lamb-Ferguson Funeral Home in McLean. The story broke on Tuesday when the Associated Press Wire Service reported that Leonard Saye, 70, was arrested in Las Vegas, Nevada by the FBI Metro Squad. Saye was charged according to Mann with Felony Theft. The check sent to Lamb-Ferguson Funeral Home was for the graveside burial services held in McLean for Ruth E. Saye, mother of Leonard Saye who passed away in Las Vegas, Nevada on November 1, 1995.

Mann explained that the funeral home charged \$7,100. for their services in transporting and burial of Mrs. Saye. Leonard Saye issued a check to the funeral home for \$14,600.00 in hopes of getting back \$7,000 for himself. The check was signed by LeRoy M. Schweitzer and Daniel Peterson. District Attorney Mann said, "This just happens to be the leaders of the Montana Freeman group".

Mann also explained other points of interests in

the case that caught his eye, one was the endorsement on the back of the bogus check. The check, made out to Leonard Saye, trustee, and Lamb-Ferguson Funeral Home had this on the back of the check in the area that is usually used for the endorsement.

Mann did say that he absolutely would bring Leonard Saye back to Gray County.

Leonard Saye has a brother, T.J. Saye of Casper, Wyoming and two sisters, Tincy Gideon and Mae Chilton both of McLean.

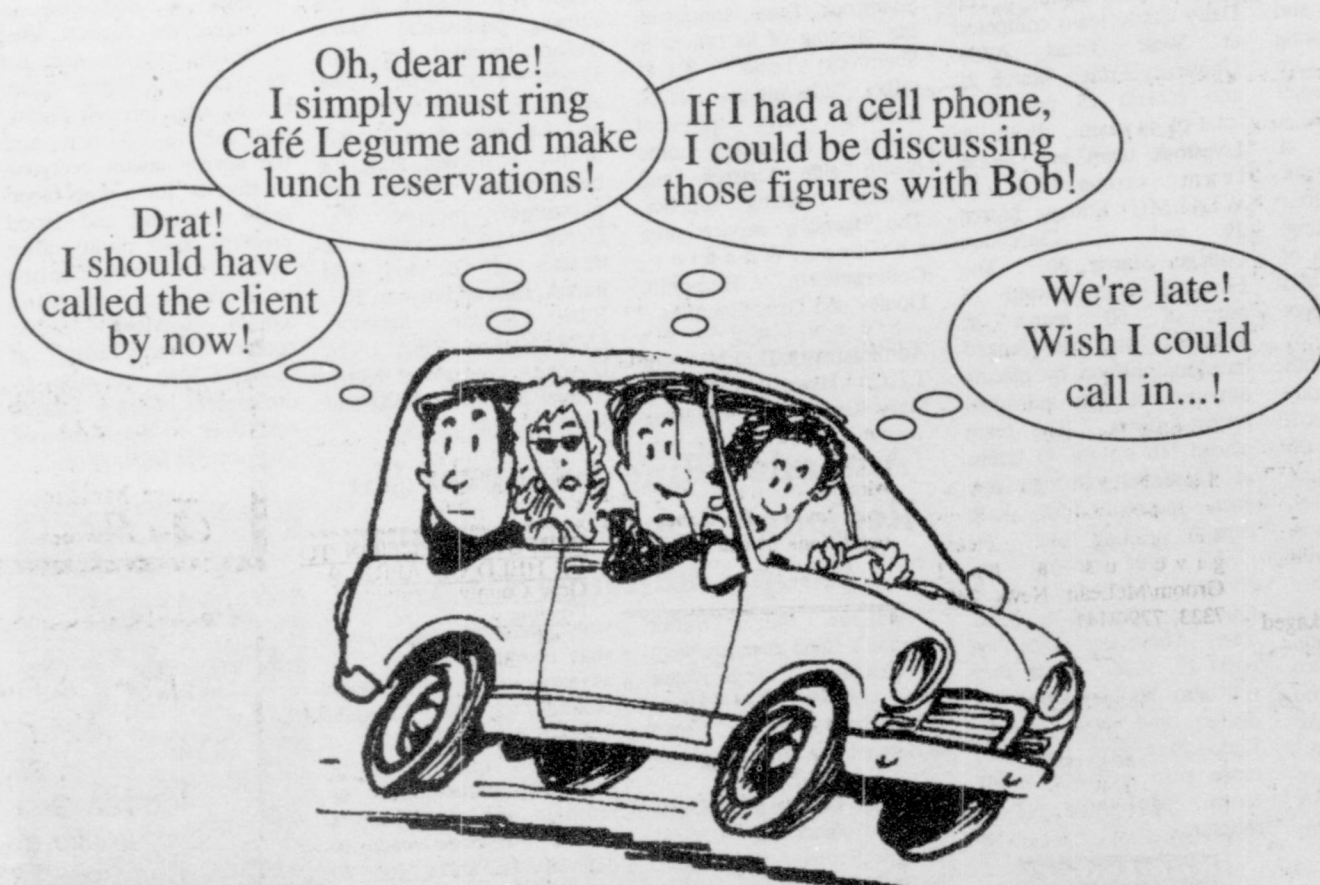

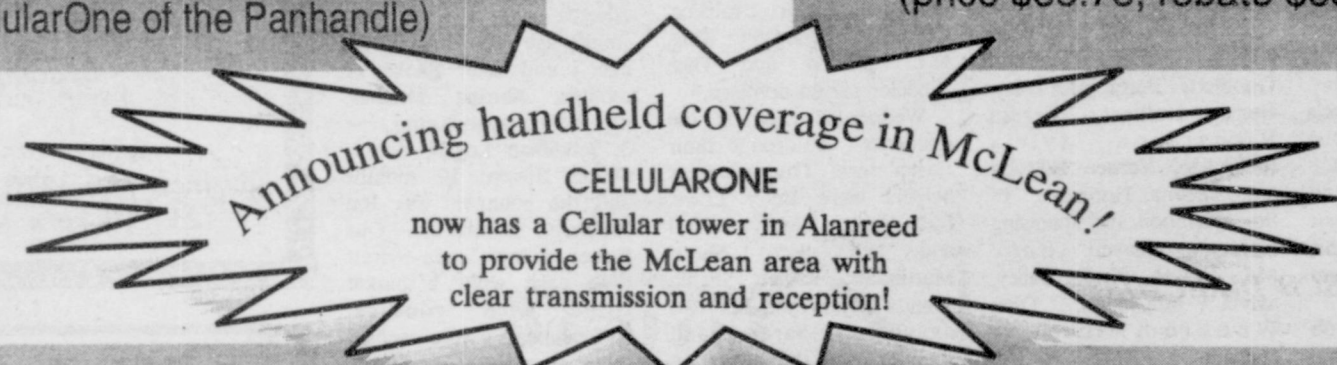
