Parents Voice Concerns Over The Need For On Site Counselor

The McLean Independent School District Board of Education met for a regular meeting at 7:00 p.m. on July 17, 2000. Board members present were Mike Darsey, Billie Ward, Neal Odom, T. D. Simmons, Don Dorsey, John Holland, and Bob Glass. Others present were John Griffin, Superintendent, Leslie Darsey, Secretary, Dick Crockett, Elementary Principal, Blaze Herring, High School Principal, Coach Chad Walker, Toni Bohlar, Shandee Tolleson, Rose Steel and Lynn Swanson.

All votes were unanimous unless otherwise stated.

The meeting was called to order at 7:07 by Bob Glass, President. Opening prayer was led by T. D. Simmons.

The regular meeting minutes of June 19, 2000 and Special meeting minutes of July 10, 2000 were approved.

Rose Steel had a visitor comment, inquiring if there would be a counselor. Her concern was that parents and students need to be informed of test dates for ACT & SAT, that the students need a guide to take the necessary classes needed, and also to help with scholarships. Lynn Swanson made the

comment that it is so important to have ready availability of the information needed by students upon nearing completion of High School. The students need the guidance and communication between the school, kids and parents is an important factor. The general consensus from the Board was that the counselor duties were being handled by several personnel on staff, and that the budget would not allow a salary required for a full-time counselor. Mr. Griffin is to contract other surrounding schools to see if there would be a possibility of a part-time counselor, where we could enter into a co-op agreement.

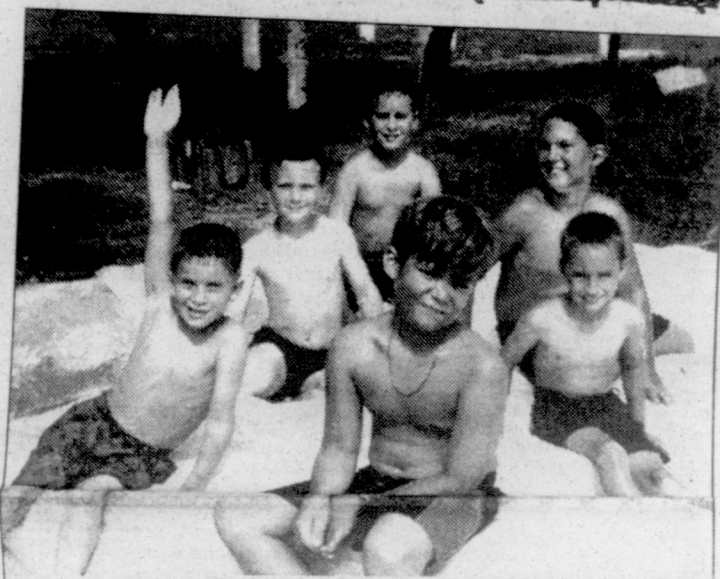
Shandee Tolleson inquired about the schedule of classes assigned for science teachers, to see if enough time would be allowed to maybe have some students work on a project for the Regional Science Fair. Discussion also made mention of a local community type Health/Science Fair, or free classes being offered by the community for parents to participate in learning about first aid, or health services. The Board agreed these ideas were good, and that lots of positive support is

needed in the area of educating our children properly.

Milton Best was to be on the agenda, but was unable to attend the meeting due to being away on his job. Mr. Best was concerned about student athletic insurance. Mr. Griffin informs that the school covers all students at school or related activities, but the coverage is only a secondary insurance, with the primary coverage being the responsibility of the parent. The school cannot legally or financially cover coverage on students.

The athletic insurance will provide sufficient coverage, but only in a catastrophic accident. Parents need to be aware and understand the kind of coverage provided at the time that they sign the form giving their child permission to compete in UIL sports. Mr. Griffin will be checking into other student accident insurance plans to see if there is one available with better coverage.

Another concern of Mr. Best was the criteria for hiring summer help at See School, pg. 9

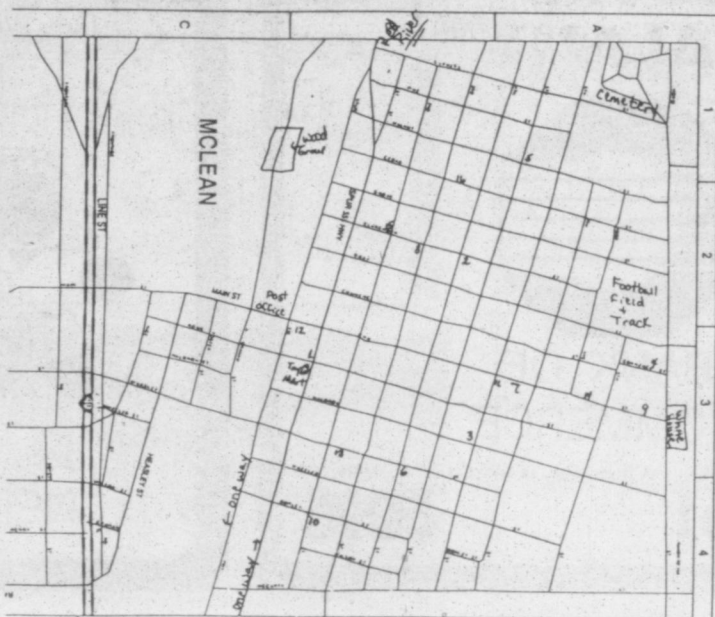

This plan works as a supplementary insurance, and as the forms are sent home with the students, it is very important to read and understand all the information provided before making a decision to let your athlete compete. It is also very important to communicate with the Coaches and Business Office in order to make sure injury reports are correctly filled out and filed in a timely manner. Federal Lunch Program Assistance Available At McLean ISD

Federal meals assistance programs have been announced for the 2000-2001 school year. The McLean School District participates in both the breakfast and the lunch programs. The entire range of income eligibility guidelines will be published in the Groom-McLean News, reporting weekly, monthly, or annual income figures.

An example of eligibility would be a family of four with total monthly income less than \$2,575.00. Last year's maximum in this category would have been \$2,537.00 monthly.

These income figures qualify McLean School students in the family to receive reduced-price meals. Those prices are breakfast -30¢ and lunch for 40¢.

Nutritious meals are served on each school day. The 2000-01 calendar for students begins on August 16, 2000, and ends on May 24, 2001. Children may buy lunch for \$1.75 (K-5) and \$2.00 (6-12) and breakfast for \$0.50. These meals are to be paid in advance.

Any family now receiving TANF or food stamps can receive

breakfast and lunch free for its McLean School students. Persons qualifying under the published income eligibility guidelines may also receive free meals. According to the new criteria, a family of four with a total monthly income less than \$1,810.00 gross earnings would qualify for free meals.

Parents are encouraged to consult the published guidelines to determine if the household is eligible to participate in the Federal program, according to the Federal letter.

Special situations, such as foster children or handicapped students, are also covered under policy rules.

Once an application has been completed, households have an obligation to advise the school of any change in household size or income. Applications are under the direction of Margaret Milam, Business Manager of the School, and any questions should be directed to her at 806-779-2571. Families should also be advised that the application can be made, or changed, at any

time during the school year. Families will be advised on the status of the application on file.

The information used to determine eligibility for the meals program is confidential, and the confidentiality is protected by the application and meal record process. The information may be subject to release only to other means-tested programs conducted by Federal or State government, but no other circumstances.

The operation of this program guarantees that no discrimination because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap will take place.

Application forms are available throughout the summer at the school business office at 4th & Rowe in McLean as well as by mail if requested at the above telephone number. In addition, students will be given these applications at the time of enrollment for the school year.

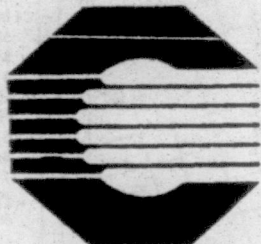

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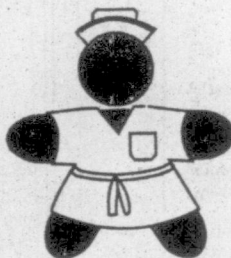

McLean ISD. The applicants must be over 16, in order to operate a riding mower, or climb to excessive heights on ladders. The three individuals hired have been properly trained by the JTPA during previous summers employed here.

There was little discussion regarding the 2000-01 Budget. The question arose as to the cost of education in a public school compared to that of a private school. Another question was posed as to whether to budget money needed to improve facilities in the near future. The Budget must be adopted by August 31st. No action was taken.

Mr. Griffin had contacted the Amarillo Area Foundation to find out what types of grants and funding were available that might be of some assistance to the school. Their reply was to get a grant writer, research what we have, and see if we can implement any of this funding in different areas of the school.

There were no new developments on the new gym. A letter listing concerns about the sub-floor was sent to CIB, but there has been no response. The floor is at a stand still until the maple hardwood surveyor arrives to inspect the sub-floor.

Items D, E, and F were tabled until a later date, as the policies will not become effective until the year 2001.

Cafeteria policy on bad debts was discussed, and the idea of having to possibly go to a prepaid meal ticket. Other options are being looked into.

Mr. Griffin and several other staff members have attended two meetings on health insurance. This has become necessary due to the fact of increasing premiums with less benefits being offered by Unicare, the current provider. The meeting was conducted by Charlie Waite, an independent insurance agent, that would form a fully funded consortium consisting of about 20 school districts, and approximately 1800 employees. The large number of participants would allow health coverage to be purchased at a lower premium, with better benefits. The new group is in the process of forming bylaw and guidelines, and McLean ISD will continue to seek the best possible health insurance for the employees.

Plans were made to hold an employee appreciation night on August 17th, at 6:00 p.m.

A special board meeting was set for July 27th at 7:00 p.m. in order to open bids received for the roofing of the High School building. Lynn Ramsey will be present to discuss the specifications.

Financial reports A & B were approved.

The Board approved to pay the June bills as presented.

Adjournment came at 9:55 p.m.

Groom Is Holding Its Own In Scrap Rubber Campaign

The rubber salvage campaign in Groom was in high the first of this week. After a survey of the local service stations, there was some where in the neighbor of 10,000 to 5,000 pounds of old rubber collected and the prospects for more were bright.

Monday was the biggest collection day, with the stations with weighing facilities averaging around 2,000 pounds each.

Sanford Johnson and Frank Dove were leading in the group, with the Texaco and Gulf Stations close behind.

There seemed to be very little donations in the collections. Most every one was receiving his 1c per pound.

With Groom's population of 400 to 600 people, the average was around 6 pounds per man woman and child, which is not bad. But Groom has the help of the farmers of this area and they are the ones that produce the scrap rubber.

If very one of the 130,000,000 people in the U.S. produced 15 pounds each that would produce 1,950,000,000,000 pounds of scrap rubber for defense, boy, he's got a lot of rubber.

Yes, that's lots of rubber, but it takes lots to equip an army like the one that Uncle Sam is building. Just one little scout car, nosing out the terrain, uses 333 pounds of it. A 35,000-ton battleship pointing

its guns at Tokyo uses 75 tons of rubber.

Our air force needs rubber. One of those pneumatic rafts which have already saved so many of our flyers requires 29 pounds of it.

Japan now controls over 90 percent of the world's rubber plantations.

So it is up to the 130,000,000 American people to gather up the old hot water bags, galoshes, gloves, and everything that is rubber.

Remember Dixon and Aldrich and Pastula. Do you? ... The three navy fliers whose plane went down in mid-Pacific, who existed thirty-four days and journeyed a thousand miles and lived through a typhoon, on a rubber life-raft eight feet long and four feet wide. ... Now do you remember?

The men who, barely alive, came shores standing up because they did not want any Japs to find them crawling. Yes, you remember Dixon and Aldrich and Pastula.

Remember—anything that is made of rubber—bring it to your service station.—Take the family walking on Sundays.

Groom will go to Hedley Sunday for first round playoff game starting at 3 P.M.

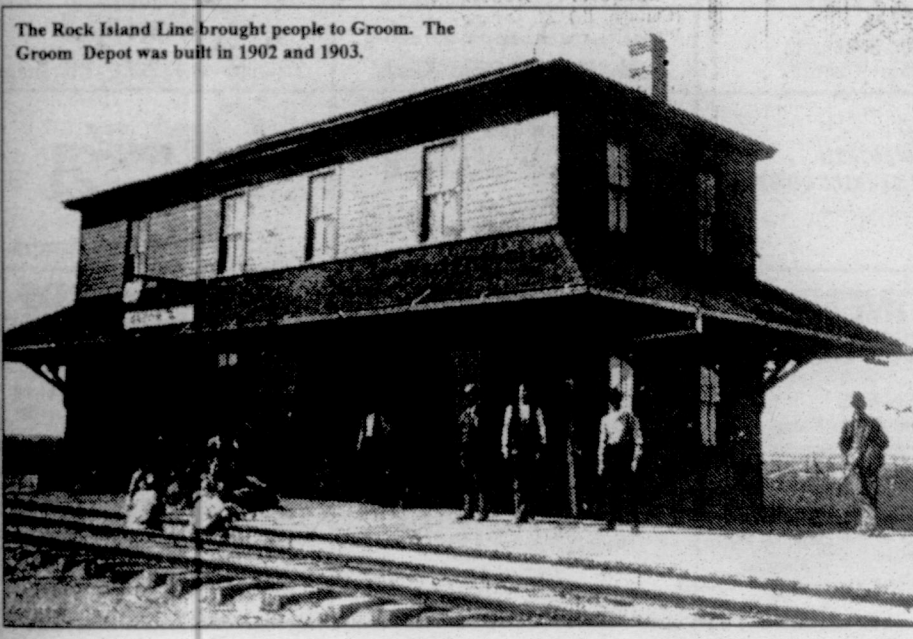
Groom FFA and 4-H Pig Sale To Be Held Saturday

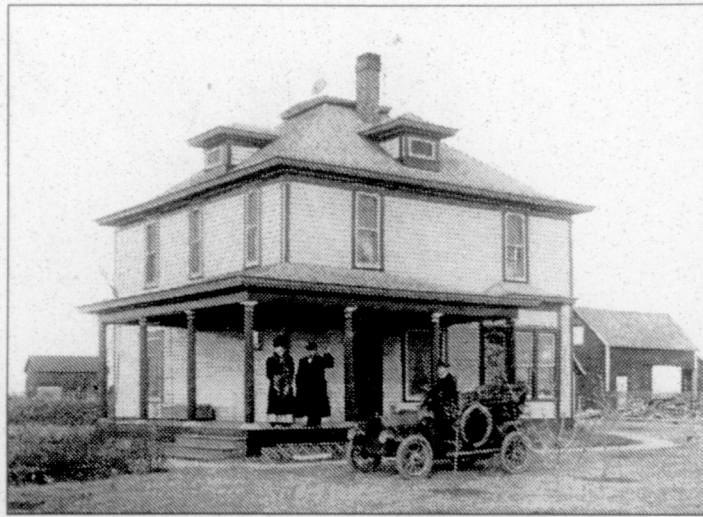

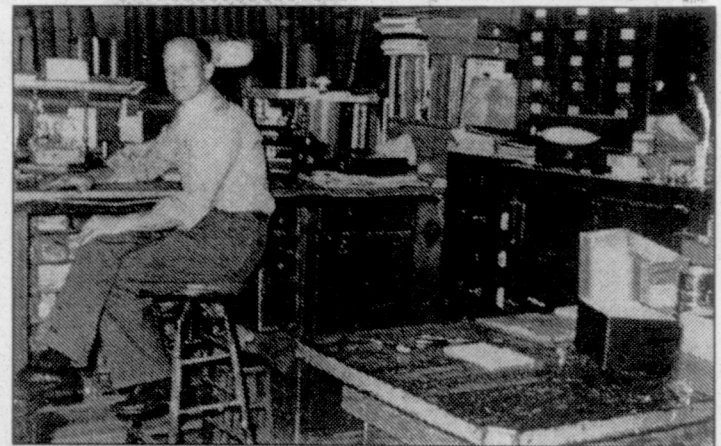
