McLean's Tigers celebrated homecoming by defeating Hedley 58-13 in non-district action on Friday night.

McLean scored four touchdowns to begin the game, two coming on runs by Gabriel Vega and one by Brad Sawyer. The duo of Brad

Sawyer and Gabriel Vega were all that was needed for the Tigers to come in with a big victory.

Vega had 201 yards rushing on 11 carries and came in with four touchdowns. Sawyer put up three scores for the Tigers and had 197 yards on 14 carries.

Chris Sparling tossed a 32 yard pass to Adam Johnston to add a touchdown with the run attempt failing.

McLean (1-3) had their first win of the season. The Tigers mustered 296 yards of offense and forcing three Hedley See Tigers, pg. 10

Survivors include a son, Ted Simmons of McLean; three

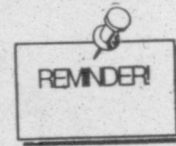
grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Lovett Library

State Partnership Program was begun in 1997 with a \$200 million commitment. It is reaching the halfway mark for providing grants to more than 11,000 libraries serving low-income communities with poverty rates of at least ten percent. Implementations in 18 states are complete and roughly average 200 libraries per state. An Accelerated Grant Program of \$14 million finished this past June and wired more than 1,080 libraries serving populations of 300,000 or more.

The need for increased digital access is worldwide, and the Foundation has instituted initiatives to meet it.

The most ambitious program to date is the Canadian Partnership Program, a project that mirrors stateside efforts with funding completed in 12 provinces and territories. Other initiatives include partnering with the UK Library and Information Commission (\$4.2 million) for training labs and public access workstations and an annual "Access to Learning Award" that recognizes international libraries for providing digital access in new and innovative ways. The first award recipient this July was the Helsinki City Library.

The Foundation is exploring additional opportunities and outlets beyond libraries to share the power and knowledge of digital information. The Community Access to Technology Program is a major initiative

designed to reach people caught in the "Digital Divide" - vulnerable children and their families, and people whose lives are in transition. This program provides technology-based solutions for information-disenfranchised communities. The Native American Access to Technology Program trains Native Americans in technology and gives them resources and tools they need to teach others in their communities in a manner designed to both preserve and enhance their cultural heritage.

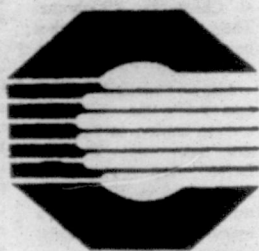

Free Art Contest Open To McLean Area Students

OWINGS MILLS, MD - Arts and Kids is pleased to announce that \$38,000.00 in prizes and scholarships will be awarded this year in it's

Annual Art Competition. Students from the McLean area, particularly beginners, are welcome to try to win their share of over 115 prizes. The deadline for the contest is December 31, 2000. The contest is open to everyone 17 years of age

and younger and entry is free.

"Everyone will enjoy an equal chance of winning the contest since entrants will be judged using age-appropriate standards," stated Deidra Hampt, Contest Director. "Many of the artists who enter this contest will gain national recognition through the publication of their artwork," continued Hampt.

Arts and Kids is an organization dedicated to bringing the work of young artists to the public's attention. In the last ten years, they have awarded over \$100,000 to talented artists, most of whom have never before entered, or expected to win, any type of artistic competition.

Extreme Wildfire Danger

Tips to protect your home and property.

Remove flammable vegetation within 30 feet of your home and outbuildings. Grass should be kept mown. Trees should be pruned and widely spaced.

Remove leaves and grass from beneath decks and enclose areas around the structure where blowing embers can catch.

Stockpile water reserves in barrels or tanks if possible.

Make sure your driveways are clear to provide access for fire apparatus and a quick departure should you need to evacuate.

Plan ahead for what you will do and/or take with you if wildfire threatens.

Light no open fires, including in burn barrels and campfires.

Comply with county burn bans.

Extinguish cigarettes in vehicle ashtrays.

Avoid driving and parking in tall dry grass, exhaust systems can start fires.

When welding select a clear area or wet down the work area. Keep a fire extinguisher handy.

Use caution when operating or repairing harvesting equipment.

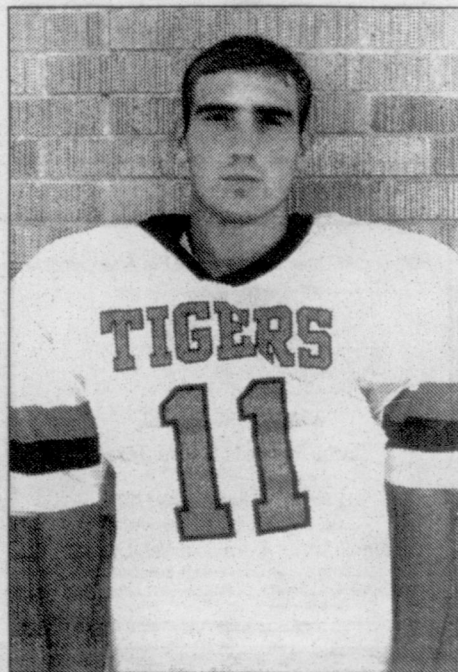
Groom will take its 4-0 schedule of victories into their homecoming game Friday night against McLean.

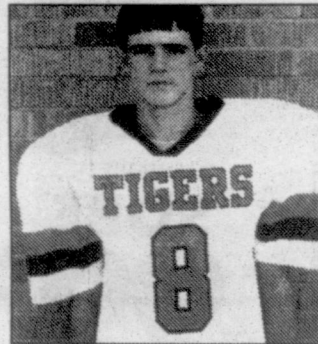

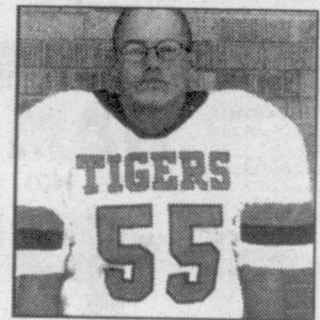

Taking Care Of CRP Land In Especially Hot Weather

Another week of unusually hot weather makes it difficult to remember what season of year we are in, even though we did have a brief reminder of the changing seasons recently when there was plenty of frost on Monday morning, September 25th. All Conservation Reserve Program participants in Carson County need to take a look at their CRP acres, especially those planted to grass in 1999 or 2000. If weeds are abundant there, mowing

should be done in the near future to knock those weeds down before they have a chance to blow away. These weeds have been valuable to a certain extent this summer and fall in that they at least provided some shade from the continuous heat for the young grass plants that sprouted this spring.

Once we get a killing frost, which on average comes pretty soon, those weeds will break off in the first strong wind and take out fences and sew grief for neighbor's cropland. It is the CRP landowner's responsibility to take care of the weed problems on their land, so don't wait for USDA folks to come tell you what weed control is needed. If you have questions about your particular situation, feel free to come by the NRCS office in Panhandle, and we will assist you. Weed control is a CRP contract responsibility and failure to take care of this responsibility will result in non-compliance.

as Trauma Service Area A) is "a strong, functioning regional trauma system." The Panhandle is the third of 22 designated trauma service areas in Texas to achieve recognized trauma system status.

The chances of surviving a motor vehicle accident are better in states that have implemented organized

Death rates from motor vehicle crashes fell by nearly a third between 1979 and 1995 with greater improvements in systems of trauma care.
