McLean 2nd & 8th Graders Collaborate on Recycling Project

McLean second graders and eighth graders recently collaborated in an effort to recycle grass clippings into paper. This project addressed many of the state mandated TEKS objectives from both the science and writing curriculum. The joint venture allowed both grades to conduct classroom investigations and apply science and writing in a practical way. The eighth graders were also there to

provide assistance in the use of tools in scientific inquiry. Students had the opportunity to observe, measure, record, analyze data, and predict outcomes. They then were able to write about the experiment and share their newly found knowledge with others. The idea for this project originated with the participation of the second grade and eighth grade teachers in the Regional Collaborative for Excellence in Science

Teaching and The Biology Institute. Both of these programs provide teachers with tools and training to use with the students in the classroom. There is input from college teachers from West Texas A&M University and Amarillo College, as well as, from Region 16 Service Center personnel. As a result of the collaboration students have extended opportunities in the area of science.

Tigers End Season With "Walk Away" Victory Against Higgins

McLean's Brad Sawyer rushed for three touchdowns and passed for two more as the Tigers rolled to a 63-14 victory over Higgins in a six-man District 1-1A football contest here on Friday night.

The game was stopped in the third quarter because of the 45 point rule.

McLean finished the season 4-6 overall and 3-2 in district. Higgins falls to 2-7 and 0-5.

Sawyer, who rushed for 83 yards overall, scored on runs of 10, 18 and 22 yards. His two touchdown passes went to Randy Floyd (4 yards) and Adam Johnston (21 yards).

Gabriel Vega, who rushed for 55 yards on six carries, scored three touchdowns on runs of 16 and 5 yards from scrimmage. He returned a kick-off 73 yards for a touchdown.

Higgins' two touchdowns came on a 14 yard run by Jake Weiderstein and a 22 yard T.D. pass by Weiderstein.

The stats by quarter show McLean 14 in the first quarter, 29 in the second, and 20 in the third for a total of 63 points. Higgins scored 8 in the 1st quarter and 6 in the second for a total of 14 points.

McLean had 12 first downs to Higgins 6;

McLean 200 yards rushing, Higgins 67; McLean 59 yards passing, Higgins 98 yards. McLean gained a total of 259 yards compared to 165 for the Higgins Coyotes. There were 3 passes completed on nine attempts and two interceptions for the Tigers while Higgins had 5 completed passes on 18 tries and two interceptions. Higgins had 2 punts averaging 31 yards. The Tigers fumbled twice and lost both. Higgins had 4 fumbles and lost 2. There were 7 penalties for the Tigers for 70 yards. Higgins racked up 6 penalties for 40 yards.

Dennis Ward Appointed As Economic Development Director By City Council

The City Council of McLean met in regular session Monday, November 13, 2000, in the City Hall. The meeting was called to order by Mayor Pro-Tem and opened with an invocation by Joe Billingsley at 6:00 p.m. with the following members present: Joe Creed Lamb, Doyle Lee, Joe Billingsley, Jim McDonald and Bob Martin. Charles McClendon was absent. Others present were Fred Smith, Toni Bohlar,

Allen Mixon, Marvin Conners, Mindy Reeves, Don, Lonna and Wade Dorsey, and Jolene Weiss. The minutes of the October meetings were approved. All motions were unanimously approved unless otherwise stated. Work on the landfill will resume as soon as the clay dries out and they can begin hauling again. Street signs will be painted as soon as Butch

Warner can get to them and as soon as the weather permits. The council voted to appoint Christine Curtis and re-appoint Brenda Wallis, Mickey Jackson, Catherine Calcote and Linda Smith to the Housing Authority Board. Marvin Conners with the McLean EDC came before the council to ask the council to appoint Dennis Ward as a director of the McLean EDC board. The council agreed to this request.

Marvin also told the council that they were working on the 2001 budget and would try to have it to the council before their next meeting. He also brought before the council a proposal from Don Dorsey requesting funds from EDC in the amount of \$11,411.07 for building and renovation of their restaurant The Hop. Marvin explained that they met all the stipulations that the EDC requires. The EDC

approved their request at their last meeting and is requesting the councils approval also. The council agreed to this request. The council voted to put an ad in the paper for a bank depository and all submissions to be opened at the next council meeting. The council discussed sample propositions made up by our attorney concerning changing the Economic Development See Council, pg. 8

The class includes 9 hours of classroom instruction and 4 hours of hands on instruction in the care of cardiac and stroke patients. The students learned to recognize 25 different cardiac strips, cardiac emergency pharmacology, cardiac defibrillation and advanced airway

management.

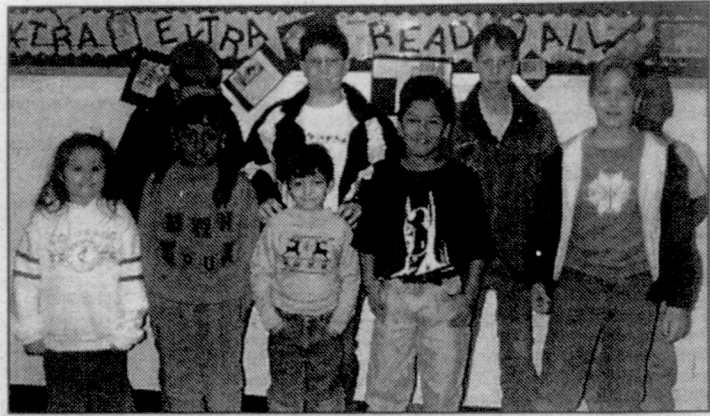

Do not combine St. John's Wort with other antidepressants. Caution: St. John's Wort may cause photosensitivity to sunlight and you may want to use a sunscreen or lotion when outdoors.

McClellan Creek Water District News

The CRP program in the District has remained very active with Signup #20 held in January and February resulting in an additional 39 contracts on approximately 7,200 acres of land. This brings the total CRP land in the District to 223 contracts on 60,479 acres, which is still below the maximum allowable by approximately 3,000 acres. There has been lots of speculation about when or if there will be another signup in 2001, but at this time, nothing definitive has been said. The 2000 growing season turned out to be really rough with no significant rainfall after the month of June. This did allow for good grass seed germination, along with plenty of weeds, on acres planted to grass in both 1999 and 2000. CRP participants need to take special care at this time of year to make certain that any weed problems have been taken care of by mowing or shredding. This will prevent damage to their fences and their neighbor's cropland from blowing weeds and weed seed. NRCS personnel are working hard to complete annual status reviews on all CRP contracts, making recommendations on weed control needs as these reviews are complete. It is, however, each CRP participant's responsibility to take care of any weed problems they have whether NRCS has been out to look at their CRP acreage or not. Failure to control weeds will result in non-compliance.

The District sponsored Soil Stewardship Week by distributing material to all the churches in March. Pastors and poster winners were honored at the annual Stewardship Banquet held in April.

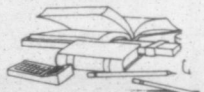

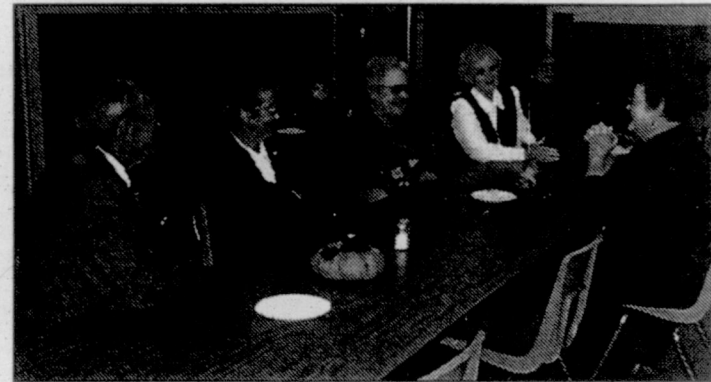

Judge Asked For "Disaster Area" Declaration

Carson County Commissioners Court met on November 13, 2000 with the following members and officers present: Judge Lewis Powers, Commissioners, Mike Britten, Kenneth Ware, Jerry Strawn and Kevin Howell.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The motion passed to pay all claims.

Judge Powers presented the court with a copy of a letter sent to Governor Bush requesting that the county be declared a disaster area as a result of drought and excessive temperatures.

The declaration would make available low-interest emergency loans to eligible farmers and ranchers.

County Tax Assessor-Collector Barbara Coper reported that 63.61% of the county's taxes have been collected as of October 31, 2000.

Judge Powers discussed the application for filing a one year waiver provision with the Texas Department of Health for the Bloodborne Pathogen Control Program. Counties are required to have an exposure control plan to address occupational exposure to bloodborne pathogens. The court approved the

motion to file for the extension.

A safekeeping pledge from State National Bank was released, #414001726 and replaced with #572682NC2.

The motion carried to release the \$100,000 pledge.

County Treasurer Jeannie Cunningham discussed with the court a request to sign a contract between Morgan Stanley Dean Witter and Carson County to secure money held in First Bank and Trust Company. Cunningham told the court that County Attorney Scott Sherwood has advised the contract to be signed between the two financial entities and not the county.

The court discussed the disbursement of insurance money that had been received for claims and placed into general reserve. The motion passed to move the following amounts: \$11,755.10, Carson County Museum claims; \$1,076.00 Precinct #2 claims; \$293.77, Precinct #3 claims.

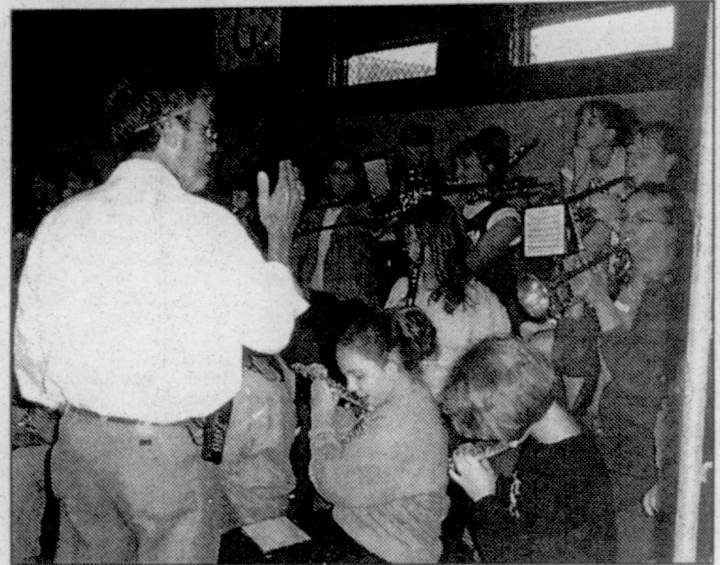

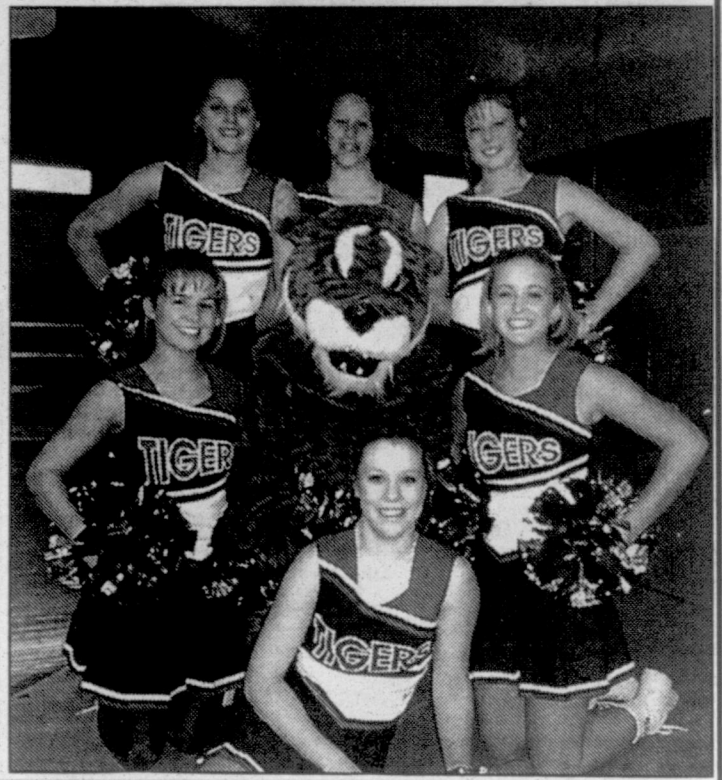

Carson County 9-1-1 to Receive Rural Addresses

The Panhandle Regional 9-1-1 Network will be notifying most rural Carson County residents of their 9-1-1, or physical address this week. The project involves assigning city type addresses consisting of street names and numbers to homes and businesses in rural areas. Citizens living within an incorporated area are not affected by this project. Carson County residents living near or receiving mail from the Fritch area will be notified of their address in early December.

The project is a combined effort of the Carson County Commissioners Court, Sheriff's Department, and the Regional 9-1-1 Network of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. These agencies share the common goal of providing the best 9-1-1 services for the citizens of Carson County.

The purpose of the rural addressing project is to provide emergency service personnel such as fire department, ambulance services, and law enforcement with a more efficient way of locating 9-1-1 callers. By assigning physical

addresses to homes and buildings, emergency personnel will no longer have to depend on "local knowledge" to find a person needing help. For example, when responding to a 9-1-1 call outside of town, having an address such as "3325 County Road E" can be much more useful to an ambulance driver than "two miles west of the old Smith place."

Several years ago, most Carson County residents were assigned what was called an "emergency number." The purpose of this number was to provide emergency service planners, primarily Pantex, with a comprehensive inventory of residents and structures to refer to in case of an emergency. This inventory was used to assign the new 9-1-1 physical addresses. In many cases, the new 9-1-1 number may be the same as the old "emergency number." However, most will be slightly different. Road and street names have not been changed. The primary difference between the "new" and the "old" is that the new numbers have been

assigned according to U.S. Postal Service standard, making it possible to convert IIC and RT Box type addresses into street name and number type deliveries.

The address being mailed should not be confused with a mailing address. At some date in the future, the U.S. Postal Service will be converting the physical addresses into mailing addresses that will replace IIC and RT type addresses. This, according to the USPS, will help with the automated processing and sorting of mail. The mailing address for those rural customers who receive mail by post office box will not change, however their homes and businesses will be assigned a "physical" address for 9-1-1 purposes.

A physical address has other benefits beyond 9-1-1. Utilities, such as electric, telephone, gas and cable companies are beginning to require a physical address to start a new account or service an existing one. Similarly, insurance companies often require such information about the property for which they are providing coverage.
