McLean Feedyard Aligns Self With U.S. Certified Angus Program

The Certified Angus Beef (CAB) Program has been demand-driven and customer-focused for 22 years, but last year was the first year for the CAS feedlot Licensing Program. Among the first to sign with the demand-based program was McLean Feedyard, a custom cattle feeder located near McLean, Texas.

Now, through the CAB Program, McLean

Feedyard has aligned itself with Angus producers in an effort to satisfy the growing U.S. and international demand for CERTIFIED ANGUS BEEF (tm) product.

"We're excited about the new opportunities to work with Angus seedstock producers and the Certified Angus Beef Program," says assistant manager David McDonald. "Working together, we can create new marketing opportunities for cattle with superior Angus genetics."

McLean Feedyard specializes in individual

carcass data. Through the CAB Program, we have confidence in being able to provide individual carcass and performance data," stated McDonald.

The McLean Feedyard markets cattle to four major packers on cash and value based grids. "This allows us to place your cattle into a marketing program that best fits their generic potential," he says.

It may be the simplest "alliance-type" program you can find because the per head fee is set at the minimal level to merely cover actual costs of tag and information transfer, at \$2 for individual carcass data. The staff at the feedlot takes care of any paperwork and coordinates with CAB Program staff to help producers interpret feedlot and carcass data.

One of the opportunities McDonald looks forward to is working with Angus seedstock suppliers to build networks with their commercial customers, including retained

ownership partnering. "These cattle of known, superior genetic background have a lot of potential for added value," he said.

McDonald attends the CAB program "Commitment to Quality" seminars. Through continuing follow-up and national feedlot data analysis, the staff learned to tailor management to specific Angus genetics, health and ranch programs.

Program services are designed to foster the link between licensed feedlots and the cow-calf sector. "The program is greater consumer demand for beef is a more consistent quality product, made possible by the rancher having the knowledge and incentive to make adjustments in genetics and management," stated McDonald and CAB Program staffers.

day elections between current District Attorney John Mann and his challenger Robert's County Attorney Richard Roach of Miami.

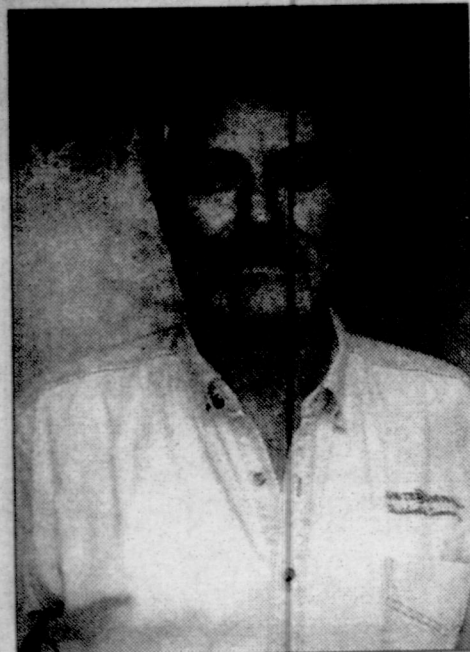
Mann is accusing Roach of having a criminal record. He asks people to call a certain phone number, if they





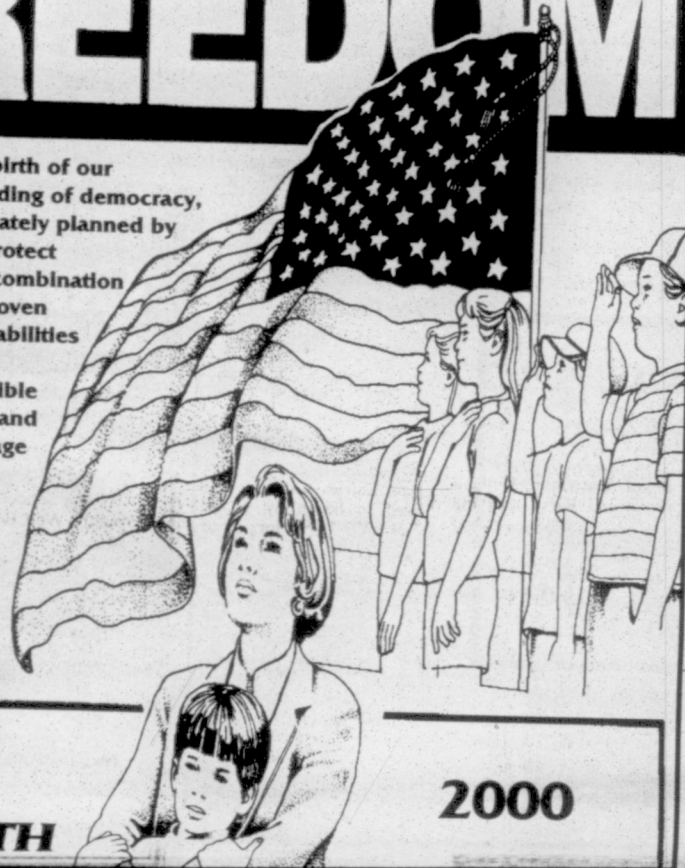

Groom Water Standing In Good Shape For Drinking

Groom residents recently received a quality assurance report about their city water system. The report is an annual notice that informs residents if any kind of contaminates have been found in their drinking water. The analysis was made by using the data from the most recently U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) required tests.

Groom's water comes from wells that tap into the Ogallala Aquifer. When drinking water meets federal standards there may not be any health based benefits to purchasing bottled water or point of use devices.

Drinking water, including bottled water may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water posed a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental

Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Of the listed contaminates, none came above the listed acceptable levels. Arsenic, barium, chromium, fluoride, nitrate, selenium, and copper are almost always found in water. They are not dangerous as long as they are monitored and levels do not rise over what the EPA considers safe levels. In Groom's water all fell well below this maximum contaminate level.

Coliform bacteria were also measured. Coliforms are microbial contamination. They are found in the digestive tract of warm blooded animal. While not disease producers themselves, they often are found in association with other microbes that are capable of causing disease. Coliform bacteria are more hardy than many disease-causing organisms; therefore their absence from water is a

 Fecal coliform (mostly E-Coli), is a portion of the coliform bacteria group originating in the intestinal tract of warm blooded animals that passes into the environment as feces. Fecal coliform is often used as an indicator of the fecal contamination of domestic water supply.
 The city of Groom water supply was also free of this type of contamination.

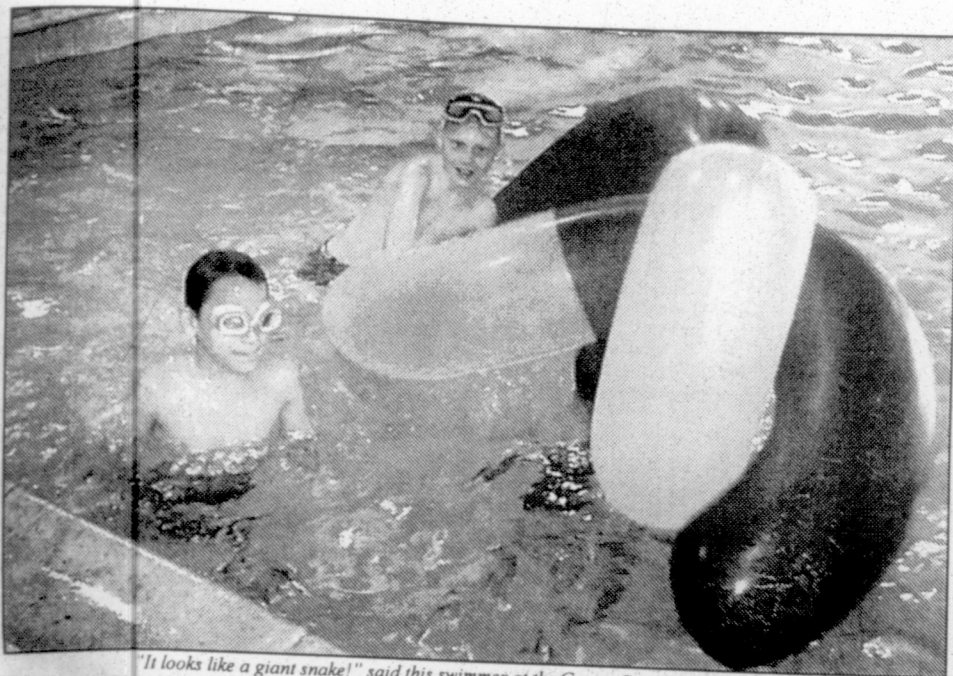

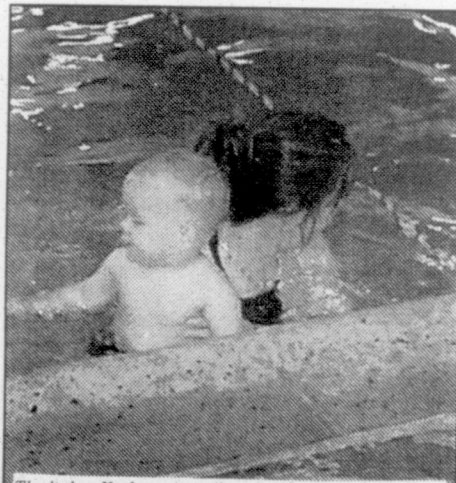

ArgriPartner Report

Heavy infestations of western corn rootworm larvae have been reported from some fields of continuous corn. Infestations of 2 to 10

larvae per plant may require a rescue rootworm insecticide application.

Adult western corn rootworm beetles have been reported both in the Dalhart and Dumas area.

Corn borer moth activity continues to decline. First generation infestations have generally been below economic threshold.

Corn earworm and fall armyworm moths continue to be caught in pheromone traps. Offspring from these moths will cause some

leaf and whorl damage, however, insecticide applications to control the worms seldom can be justified.

Heavy thrips infestations are reported in soybeans. Insecticide applications to control thrips in soybeans rarely can be justified.

Heavy thrips infestations in cotton continue to be reported. Thrips control may be justified when the average number of thrips per plant is equal to the number of true leaves at the time of the inspection.

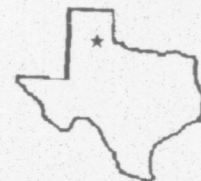
