

The main thing I remember is when a plane hit, the TV showed either people or just debris being shot out the top of That night building. That is almost all the hotels Amarillo and everywhere were full. They had grounded all planes. grounded planes. Amarillo had over 400 people staying there. Most hospitals are asking Most hospitals are asking to come give blood to send to other hospitals send it. Some that need it. Some churches were holding emergency prays and worship. George W. Bush said that, "We will find who is responsible for this," and I think we will. All of this happened in New York and Washington D.C. I would like to say a short prayer, "Dear God, it's amazing what can happen in 1 day. Please help everyone who lost a loved one that was in a building or on a plane. Please stay with them at all times. Hunter Education Class To Be Held

course in hunter education has been scheduled for October 2. been 8, and 16, from 6:00 to 9:30 p.m. each night in McLean according to Bill Layman, Hunter Education instructor.

Effective September 1, 1993, all hunters born on or after Sept. 2, 1971 must have successfully completed the course to hunt in Texas. However, any individual may take the course on a voluntary basis and is encouraged to attend regardless of requirements, according to Bill Layman.

The course is open to adults and youths and will include instructions in rifles, shotguns, and bow hunting, handling and safety; outdoor safety; responsibility and ethics; law and conservation; regulations; hunting traditions:

identifications; field care of game; wilderness first aid and survival, Bill Layman added.

Students 12 years of age or older successfully completing the course will be issued a hunter education certificate from the Texas Parks and Texas Parks
Department. Wildlife Those less than 12 years of age will receive a certificate of attendance, but must take the course again for proper certification.

More than 160,000 Texans have already completed the hunter education course which is mandatory in 39 states. For more information





Display The Flag Proudly & Correctly

With the terroristic actions of last week, many people are showing their patriotism by displaying flags

Old Glory has a long and proud history. She evolved from the Grand Umon Flag which depicted the British Umion Jack in the upper left hand corner bordered on two sides by the red and blue strips. Betsy Ross striched the first flag with a circle of thirteen stars on a field of blue. This flag was authorized by a Congressional Resolution in 1777, on June 14, which is when we celebrate Flag Day.

George Washington, our first president explained the symbolism of the colors

We take the stars and blue union from Heaven, the red from our Mother Country, separating it by white strips, thus showing we have separated from her, and the white strips shall do down to posterity representing liberty

Red stands for hardiness and courage, white stands for purity and innocence and blue stands for vigilance and justice

While our flag has undergone many changes over the years it still stands for the virtues mention above. The following are some rules and guidelines on the proper way to display the flag and proper behavior when it is displayed. If you are in doubt about what is proper just remember to always show respect when handling and displaying our Nations symbol of Freedom!

The flag may be displayed

from stationary poles and buildings out of doors during daylight hours from sunrise to sunset on any day when the weather is good or an all weather flag is used. The flag should be lowered or removed at riight unless it is illuminated properly.

When you are raising the flag on a pole, you should raise it quickly or briskly. We are always anxious to get the flag in it's rightful place. When flying the flag as a sign of mourning, it should first be hoisted to the top of the pole and then slowly lowered to half-masts.

The flag should always be lowered slowly and ceremoniously

No other flag should ever be positioned higher than the American flag, which the exception of the United Nations Flag In almost all instances, the American Flag when displayed before an audience of should be to the observers left or "the Flags Own Right" If it is grouped with other flags, it should be in the center or at the highest point. If you wish to hang a flag vertically over a street, the umon (blue & stars) hangs north on east-west streets, and east on northsouth streets

Any time the flag is in the process of being raised whether it is at a ball game or in front of the post office, one should stop, stand at attention with your hand over your heart and remain silent. When the National Anthem is played you should remove your hat and place.

your hand over your heart until the last note is played

If the flag is going past in a procession or parade it is appropriate to place your hand over your heart until the flag is passed

When a flag is no longer fit to fly, it should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning

"Old Glory" The Stars and Stripes' represent a living country and is considered to be a living thing emblematic of the respect and pride we have for our nation it should never be treated with anything but reverence and respect fly the flag with the same pride as you have for our country. Show that you honor the symbol of our nation which your actions when it is flown.

Under current law, when the peo-ple vote for a particular candidate for president, in reality they are voting for that candidate's electors who will meet to cast their votes for president. If the elec-tors are not determined by the certification date, no electoral votes may be cast for the state. The proposed amendment ensures that the state's electoral votes will be cast.

Under current law, a special election must be held to fill a vacancy in the legislature even if there is only one qualified candidate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the filling of a vacancy in the legislature without an election if a candidate is running unopposed in an election to fill a vacancy,"

PROPOSITION 10 (SJR 6)

on 10 would amend the consti tution to authorize the legislature to exempt certain items of personal propery from property taxation by political subdivisions of the state if the property is warehoused temporarily in a location in Texas to be assembled, stored, manufactured, tured, processed, fabricated, or repaired and then forwarded to another location inside or outside Texas. The proposed amendment would authorize a political subdivision that imposes ad valorem taxes, at its option, to tax this type of property after a local public hearing on

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote equal tax treat-ment for products produced, acquired, and distributed in the State of Texas by authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation tangible per sonal property held at certain locations only temporarily for assembling, manu-facturing, processing, or other commer-

Proposition 11 would amend the consti tution to allow a schoolteacher, a retired schoolteacher, or a retired school admin-istrator who serves as a member of a govistrator who serves as a member of a gov-erning body of a school, district, city, town, or other local governmental dis-trict, including a water district, to receive compensation for serving on such a gov-erning body. Currently, state employees or other individuals who are compensat-ed directly or indirectly from state funds are barred from receiving a salary for such service. such service.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to authorize taxing units other than school districts to exempt from ad valorem tax-ation travel trailers that are not held or used for the production of income."

PROPOSITION 15

Proposition 15 would amend the constitution to create the Texas Mobility Fund, which would be administered by the Texas Transportation Commission. The Fund would finance the construction, Fund would finance the construction, acquisition, and expansion of state high-ways and would pay a portion of the costs of public toll roads and other public transportation projects. The legislature may reserve specific sources of state revenue for the Fund and may authorize the Commission to guarantee the payment of any obligations or credit agreements with the full faith and credit of the state. The the full faith and credit of the state. The attorney general shall determine the legality of any such obligations or credit

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows "The constitutional amendment creating the Texas Mobility Fund and authorizing grants and loans of money and issuance of obligations for financing the construction, reconstruc-tion, acquisition, operation, and expansion of state highways, tumpikes, toll roads, toll bridges, and other mobility

PROPOSITION 16

Proposition 16 would amend the co reoposition is owned amend ne constitution to reduce the waiting period required for a valid home improvement lien on a homestead from 12 days to 5 days. Currently, a lien may not attach to a homestead for a home improvement loan if the homeowner executed a con-

uthorize the conversion and refinance of a personal property lien secured by a manufactured home to a lien on a home-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment prescribing requirements for imposing a lien for work and material used in the construction, repair, or renovation of improvements on residential homestead property and including the conversion and refinance of a personal property lien secured by a manufactured home to a lien on real property as a debt on homestead property protected from a forced sale."

PROPOSITION 17

Proposition 17 would amend the consti tution to allow the state to relinquish tution to allow the state to relinquish claim to certain state land and to clear title defects for persons who claim title to those lands. The proposed amendment would apply to land whose owners have disputed title to the land, but for which no patent from the state, giving clear title to the land, was ever issued. Among other requirements, all of the taxes due to the land must have been naid. Linder, on the land must have been paid. Under current law, there is no procedure allow-ing the state to settle title disputes with-out a constitutional amendment for each piece of land in dispute

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to settle land title disputes between the state and a private party

PROPOSITION 18

Proposition 18 would amend the consti-tution to authorize the legislature to cre-ate a program to consolidate and standardize the collection, deposit, reporting and payment of criminal and civil court fees. If the legislature creates such a pro-gram, any new fees imposed by the legis-lature may not take effect before January I of the following year, unless an earlier effective date is approved by a vote of two-thirds of the members of each house of the legislature

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote uniformity in the collection, deposit, reporting, and remit-ting of civil and criminal fees."
