Couple Indicted On Puckett's Robbery

The Pampa couple that allegedly attempted to rob Pucketts Grocery were indicted on robbery charges last week by a Gray County grand jury.

Thomas Peterson, 36, was indicted on two counts of aggravated robbery, two counts of robbery and two counts of attempted robbery. Valerie Peterson, 41, was indicted for aggravated robbery.

Both are still in custody at the Gray County Jail, though Justice of the Peace Kurt Curfman set two bonds of \$250,000 for Thomas Peterson and a \$100,000 bond for Valerie Peterson back in March. They are suspected of a string of robberies in Carson and Gray counties during March.

They were arrested on March 20 after a robbery of McLean's Puckett's Grocery. Thomas Peterson

is alleged to have entered the store around noon that day. He put a knife to the throat of the clerk and demanded money. The thief took an undetermined amount of cash and fled the scene. He then engaged in a high speed chase with DPS Troopers and finally stopped by a roadblock on northbound State Highway 273.

The couple are still being investigated to see if there is a link between them and several other crimes that occurred around the same time. These thefts occurred at the Bell Mart Convenience Store in Pampa, The Family Dollar Store and a convenience store in White Deer. They are also suspect in an attempted purse snatching in the Wal-Mart parking lot in Pampa.

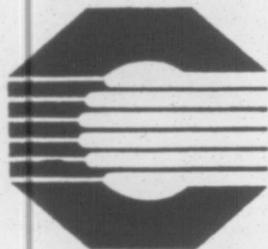

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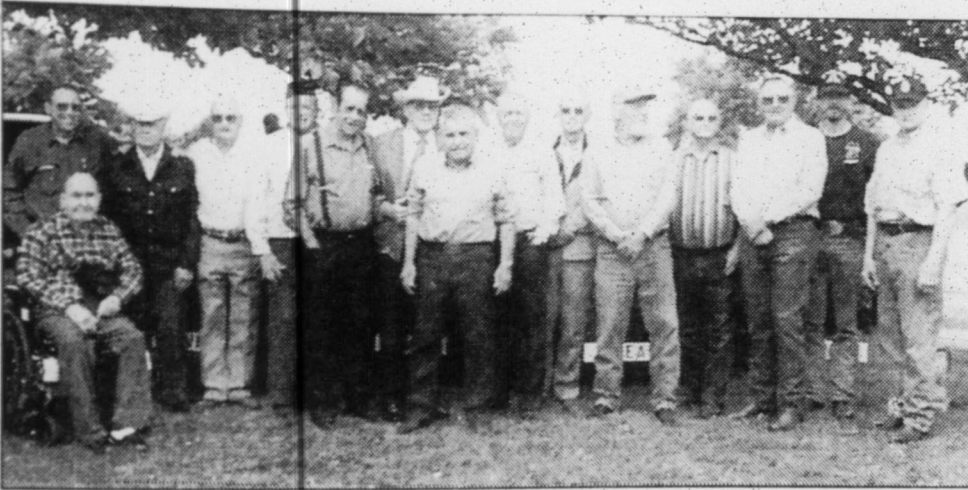

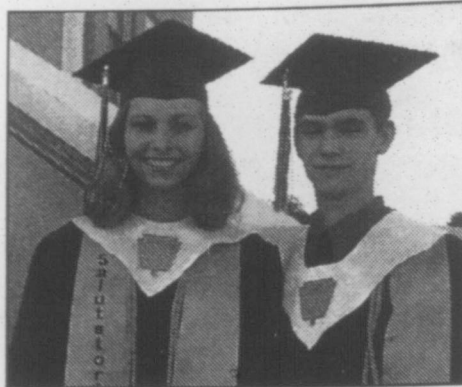

Man Jumps From Bus

On May 22, 2001 at approximately 8:00 pm the Carson County Sheriff's Department received initial reports that there had been a male struck by a bus on Interstate 40 at about the 105 mile marker. A Deputy and two DPS Highway Troopers went to investigate and discovered that a male, Rory Collins, age 20 of California was injured, but had not been struck by a bus.

Mr. Collins, from account of witnesses at the scene, had been an occupant of a commercial transport bus when he requested that the driver stop the bus and allow Mr. Collins to get off. When the driver refused, state that Mr. Collins could not be allowed off until the bus reached Groom, Texas. Mr. Collins proceeded to the rear of the bus and jumped through an emergency exit window.

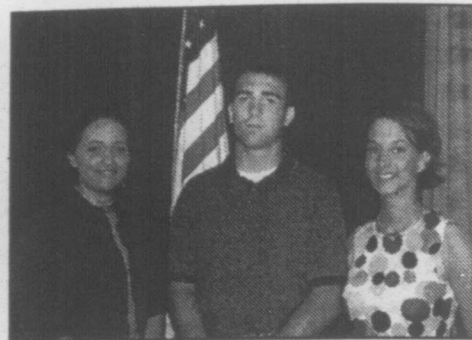
GROOM- Theresa Homer Hermesmeyer, 88, died Saturday, May 26, 2001, in Amarillo.

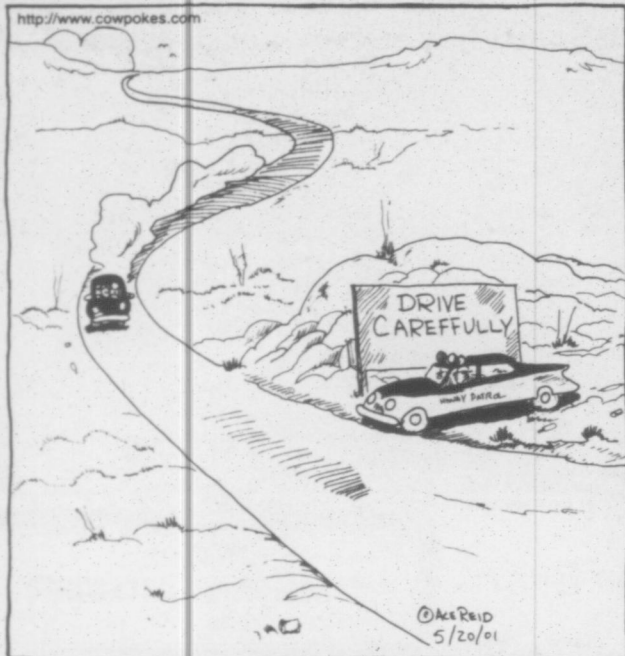

It was later reported that the male had confessed that he had been under the influence of methamphetamine at the time of the incident.

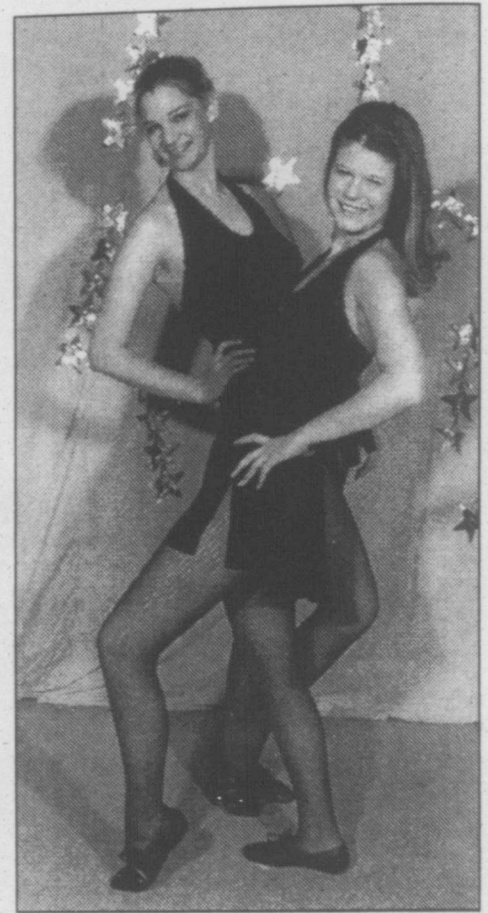
Collins suffered lacerations, contusions and a broken jaw, however, it was reported that none of the injuries were life threatening.

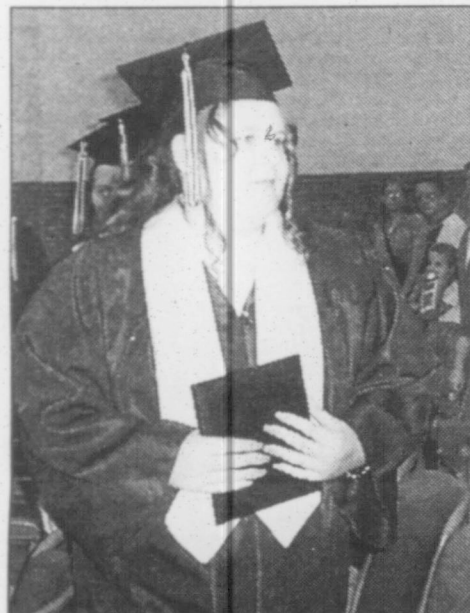
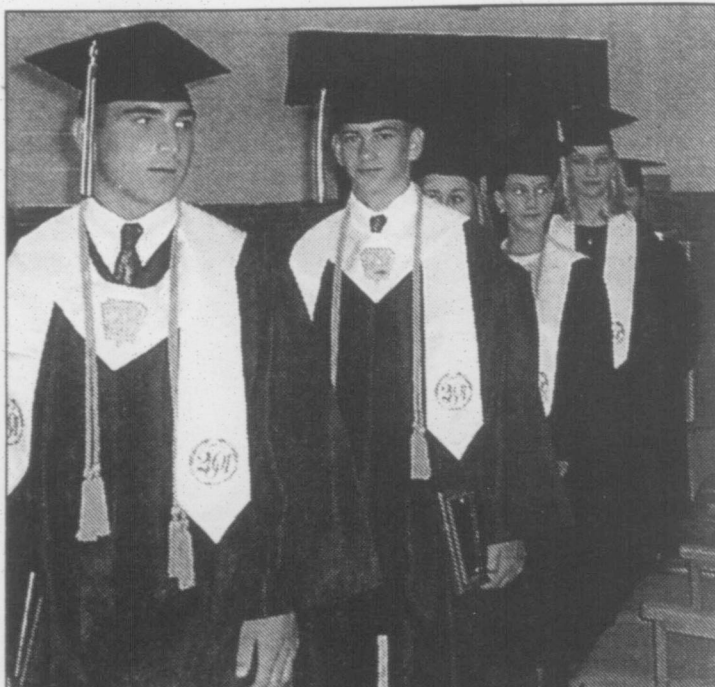
