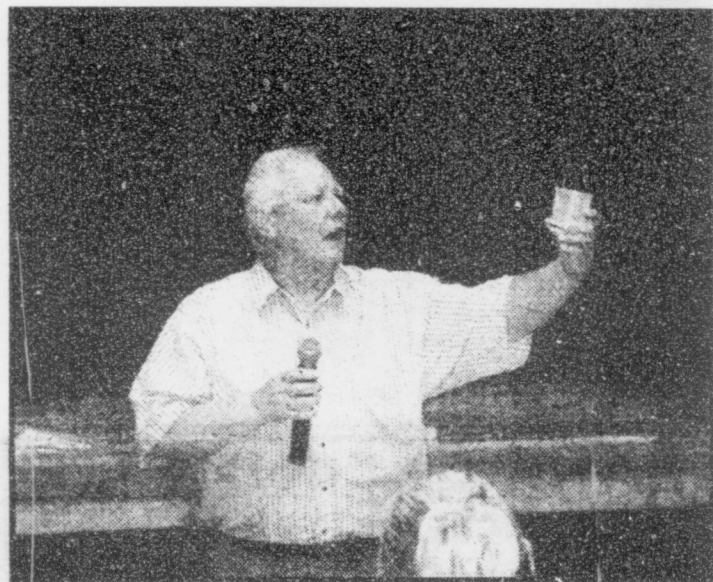
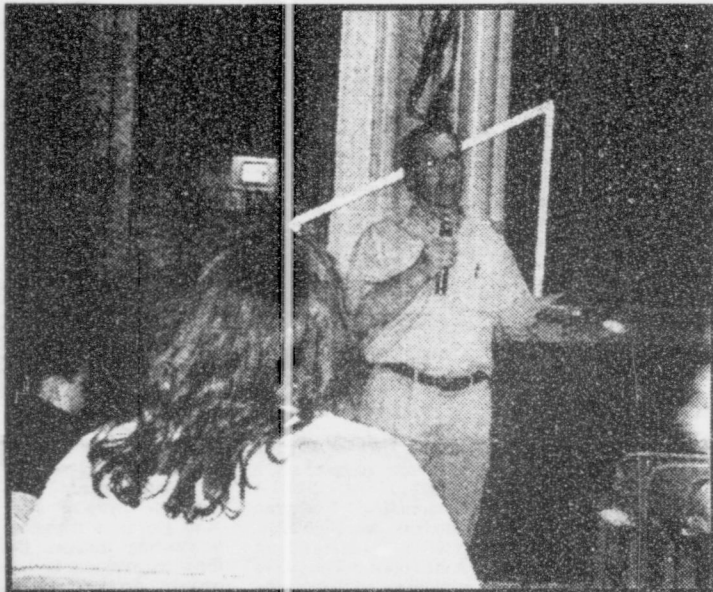

Ex-Curricular Students To Be Tested For Drugs

A large group of parents, students, teachers, and concerned citizens met Thursday, June 22 in the High School auditorium for a program on student drug testing.

Jimmy Hannon, superintendent, explained to the crowd that the board and administration were taking a pro-active stand for grades 6-12 in regard to Alcohol and drugs. They want the students to succeed. Mr. Hannon went on to explain that this testing program is not intended to be a "Gotcha" program. It may cause students to really think about what they do.

All students in grade 6-12 who participate in extra curricular activities will be tested by Aug. 1. (There will be an alternative testing date for anyone out of town). After that, the testing will be done randomly every six weeks.

No less than 5% and no more than 10% of the students participating in the program shall randomly be selected for each random test date according to the Texas Association of School Boards policy. This is the policy the school is using and a copy was given to anyone attending the meeting.

Representatives from Claims Administrative Services explained to the group the procedures of the urinalysis testing. They went over privacy, the testing procedure, and safeguards. If a student tests positive for drugs, the parents and school will be called.

Consequences for a first offense are suspension from any extra curricular activity for 30 calendar days following the date the student and parent are notified of the test results. During that period of suspension, the student shall not be permitted to participate in practices. If

the student wishes to return to participation in extracurricular activities, the student must be re-tested at the end of the period of suspension and have a negative test result; the student shall be retested on the next random test date.

If there is a second offense, the period of time will lengthen to 45 days and the District will again notify the parent and student of drug and alcohol abuse prevention resources available in the area.

McLean City Council Approves Hiring of New Director Of Public Works, Roby Lynn To Fill Vacancy

The City Council met in a special session Wednesday, June 21, 2006 in the City Hall. The meeting was called to order by the Mayor and opened with an invocation at 6 PM with the following members present: Bob Martin, Molly McDowell, Betty Taylor, LaVon Watson and George Shaw. Mizzy Reeves was absent. Others present were Toni Bohler, Allen Mixon, Gary

James, Bryan Johnson, Roby Lynn, Bill Anderson and James & Rosa Troy.

Alderman McDowell told the Council that she had received several complaints concerning trash. She explained that several citizens had called her and complained that they had put small bags of leaves, twigs, grapevine etc. in the dumpster and that they had been taken out of the dumpster and set

beside it. The citizens told her that they had no way of getting it to the landfill and they were very upset. Allen Mixon told the council that state regulations stated that no grass, tree limbs, leaves etc. are allowed in the dumpster. The Council discussed the different options that might be able to solve this problem. Motion by Alderman Watson, seconded by

Alderman Taylor to put a notice in the bills this month that will read as follows:

"Leaves, twigs and grass trimmings should be bagged and taken to the landfill if possible. If assistance to transport is necessary, call the City office and we will attempt to pick up in a timely manner. Tree limbs should be taken to the landfill. If

Test

If a third offense occurs, the student will be suspended from participating in any extra curricular activity for the remainder of the student's enrollment in junior or high school.

A student or parent may appeal a decision made under this policy in accordance with FNG (local). The student shall be ineligible for participation in extracurricular activities while the appeal is pending.

Drug testing will be done for alcohol and illegal drugs. Claims Administrative Services uses a federally certified lab in Kroll LA. Parents of students and students 18 or older must sign a consent form for testing or the student will not be

allowed to participate in extracurricular activities. You may contact Jimmy Hannon at the school business office for further information.

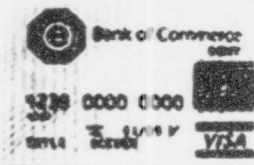

School Board Discuss Revenue Expectations For 2006-07

The McLean Independent School District Board of Education met for a Regular meeting at 6:00 p.m. on June 19, 2006. Board members present were Terri Adams, David Fuller, Joe Riley, Randy Eddleman, Carey Richardson and Toni Bohlar. Also present were Superintendent Jimmy Hannon, Dick Crockett, Leslie Darcey and Rhonda Patterson. Chet Bohlar was absent from the meeting.

All votes are unanimous unless otherwise stated.

Joe Riley called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m., and Carey Richardson gave the opening prayer. There were no visitors present.

Motion by Terri Adams, second by David Fuller to approve the Regular Meeting minutes of May 15, 2006. Motion carried. Motion by Toni Bohlar, second by Randy Eddleman to approve the monthly financial reports and to sign the corresponding checks. Motion carried.

Mr. Hannon began the Superintendent's Report by discussing the preliminary estimate of revenue to be received for 2006-2007. He explained the process used to calculate the revenue with a template released following House Bill 1. State aid will increase to \$431,078. Funding generated from local taxes will bring in approximately \$1,960,196, which will result in a total of \$2,391,274 in revenue. Mr. Hannon stated that the District should not have to send money back to the state as a Chapter 41 recapture payment, because we came under the threshold and were in a prime location financially for the next two years. He

also received the estimated taxable value from Gray County Chief Appraiser, Pat Bagley, in the amount of \$146,657,484. This figure was an increase of \$23 million in tax base compared to last year.

Mr. Hannon went over the proposed budget thoroughly and explained why he thought there should be an increase or a decrease in expenditures, and discussed any concerns. The preliminary estimates for budget were \$2,450,396 in revenue, and \$1,956,769.76 in expenditures.

The public meeting to adopt the budget will be held June 29, 2006, at 7:00 p.m.

Mr. Hannon informed the Board that Mrs. Patterson had filled out a grant application to submit to TEA in the amount of \$30,000 for the Texas High School Completion & Success Grant. This grant was possible due to the fact that the 10th grade TAKS scores in 2005-2006 as an overall campus received a passing rate of 30 percent or lower for all tests taken. Mr. Crockett presented TAKS results for the Elementary with over half the classes receiving 100% passing for grades 3-8.

Mr. Crockett commended the Elem. Teachers for a good job. Mrs. Patterson went over the TAKS results from the High School, and she was very pleased, as each class had shown improvement. Mrs. Patterson stated that the higher scores were from good teaching, and the remediation in Science and Math. Teachers stayed long hours to provide tutorials and Mrs. Patterson commended all the High School teachers, and stated they would continue to keep working hard as to

improve in all areas of TAKS.

Mr. Hannon expressed a need to clean out the old band hall. Items had been stored in there, and the computers needing work have all been wrapped and put on pallets to be sent to the prison for the prisoners to rebuild. The school will have the option to get them back after the repairs have been made. Mr. Hannon ask the Board for input on what to do with the band instruments and uniforms being stored. The general consensus of the Board was to keep what Ms. Hill would use in her Music classes and sell or auction off the remainder of the items. There has been an inventory taken and taking sealed bids was an option in which everyone seemed in favor.

Motion by Toni Bohlar, second by David Fuller to adopt the proposed salary schedule for 2006-2007. The schedule came from House Bill 1 and was derived from taking the teacher salary received last year, and adding the \$2500 increase from the state, in addition to the increment for the next pay step. The motion passed with

5 voting "FOR" and Joe Riley abstaining.

Motion by Terri Adams, second by Randy Eddleman to approve the budget amendments that would be necessary for the 2005-2006 year end clean up. Mr. Hannon informed the Board that there were only three functions that had gone over in the budget last year and the combined total was less than \$3000. The total expenditures for 05-06 will be well under the approved budget. Motion carried.

Upon Mr. Hannon's

recommendation a motion was made by Terri Adams, second by Randy Eddleman to designate \$150,000 of fund balance for technology improvements. Mr. Hannon and Tim Smith from Region 16 went through every building and explored all needs for technology. Mr. Hannon then compiled a list of all technology supplies needed and presented it to the Board. A computer lab will be set up in both the High School and the Elementary, and each classroom will have at least one or two new computers. The estimated cost for all the computer hardware is approximately \$100,200, which does not include installation labor or the cost of software. Installation will be done by district staff. The Board agreed that technology is very important and there was a great need to keep it updated. Mr. Riley inquired about security issues and was assured that it would be taken care of. Motion carried.

Mr. Hannon requested that MISD sign a Legal Services Retainer Agreement with Walsh Anderson, who specialize in school law, for an annual fee of \$1000. The agreement includes free phone consultation and a reduced fee when requiring their legal services. Mr. Hannon and the Principals had used Walsh Anderson on different occasions during the past year and were very satisfied. Motion was made by Toni Bohlar, second by David Fuller to put Walsh Anderson on a retainer for legal services. Motion carried.

The following property tax bids were accepted so that the property could be put back on

the tax roll: Motion by Terri Adams, second by Carey Richardson to accept a bid from James H. Stone in the amount of \$351.50 for the South 10 feet of Lot 8, All of Lots 9 & 10, Block 17, Original Town of McLean. Motion carried. Motion by Terri Adams, second by Toni Bohlar to accept George Shaw's bid for \$300 for the East 75 feet of Lots 18-20, Block 55, Original Town of McLean. Motion carried. Motion by Terri Adams, second by Billy Bybee's bid for \$1020 for the East 70 feet of Lots 16-20, Block 20, Original Town site, City of McLean. Motion carried. Motion by Toni Bohlar, second by Terri Adams to accept David Bolin's bid of \$100 for Lots 37 & 38, Block 3, Floral Addition to the town of McLean. Motion carried.

Under other business Mr. Hannon reminded the Board of the meeting set for Thursday, June 22, 2006 to inform the parents of students 6-12 about the drug testing that would be done on every student participating in Athletic, Co-Curricular or Extra-Curricular programs. It is mandatory for a parent to be there to sign the consent form or if they cannot attend for some reason then they must come to the school within 5 business days and sign the form or the student will not be able to participate until next year. This meeting will be held in the Auditorium and will be open to the community. The representative from Claims Administrative Services will be present that is responsible for the drug testing service and will be glad to answer any questions. A tentative date of

August 1st has been set for the actual day to perform the drug testing on students. A test will not be required of those students who do not participate in Extra-Curricular activities. Everyone on the Board, as well as, the Administration agreed that this proactive decision was a good thing and would help make everyone more accountable.

Mr. Eddleman inquired as to what some of the other undesignated fund balance could be spent on, and Mr. Hannon replied that it should be spent on facilities and informed him that the District is not at immediate risk of losing the money back to the state if it is not used. Once again the Board commended Principals and Staff for the good TAKS scores.

Motion by Toni Bohlar, second by Terri Adams to adjourn the meeting at 9:11 p.m. Motion carried.

also for builders, hunters, homeowners, gardeners and anybody that owns or uses land.

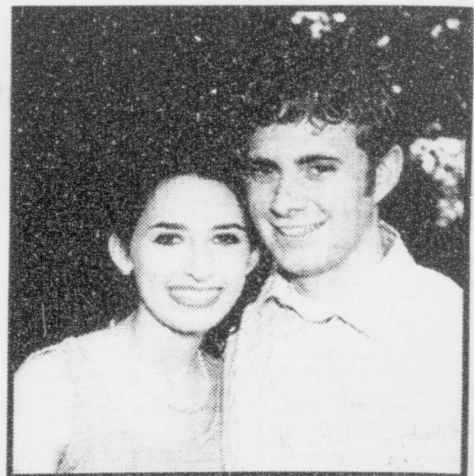




Bennett and Boer To Wed in Brenham July 22

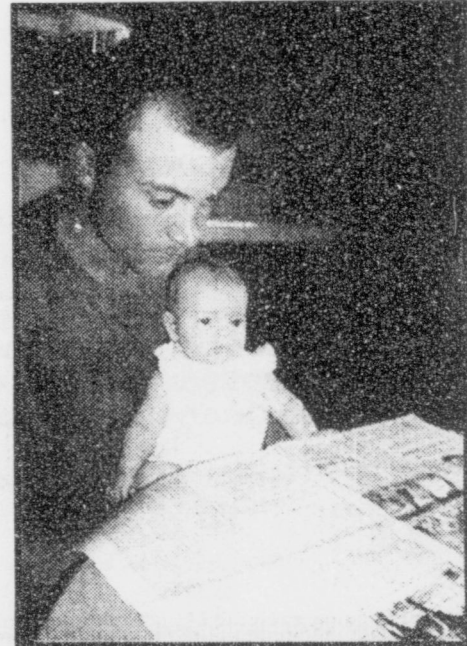



If all the land has ever been leased to someone outside the family, it will not qualify. If only a portion was leased and as much as 10 acres remained in the family, it will still qualify. Texas owners must be actively managing the every day operation of the farm or ranch.

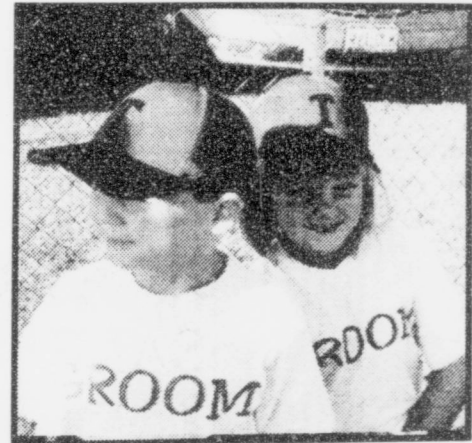

The Hay and Grazing Hotline is provided as a free service to help livestock producers locate available hay for sale and pastures for lease in Texas and out-of-state. The lists are updated on a daily basis. There is also a list of organic hay suppliers, hay transporters, livestock transporters, weekly Texas Hay Market Report and links to other hay sites and out-of-state hay directories.
