The City Council of McLean met in regular session Monday, September 11, 2006 in the City Hall. The meeting was called to order by the Mayor and opened with an invocation at 6:00 p.m. with the following members present: Beb Martin, Molly McDowell, Betty Taylor, George Shaw and James Troy. Mindy

Others present: Toni Bohlar, Roby Lynn, Marjorie Fish, Duwain & Peggy Baer, and Lynn Recve

The minutes of the August meetings were approved.

By unanimous consent the Council agreed to pay the bills.

McLean EDC Alderman Taylor informed
the Council that the EDC's
sign had been put on the
partition and that tiger

the tidewalk. She also said
that David Haynes had
approached them about
red bing the tennis courts
and that the estimate that

he had brought them was for \$11,000.00 with a 6 year guarantee, but that they had asked him to get other estimates.



New Wind Farm Abatement Revenue Will Include

The Carson County Commissioners approved a Tax Abatement with High Plains Power, LP during their regular meeting date of September 11, 2006. 'The abatement consists of 87% abatement and the county will receive 13% the first year on a 10 year agreement," said Judge Lewis Powers. He further explained the construction of a minimum of 8 mega watts capacity total market estimated initial market value of 8 million dollars. The wind farm will have at least 7 wind turbines and towers. It will be located on the Glenn Hodges' northeast corner of Pantex. The legal description location will be at the intersection of FM 2373 and FM 293 better known as the west half section 19, Block 19, Block M-4, JH Gibson Survey, Carson County, Texas.

"A county cannot abate taxes for more than a 10 year period," said Judge

There was no action taken at this meeting on items of right of ways and easements, indigent care roads, labor and machinery. Also, no action was taken after the discussion with Gregg Cook of First Care Health Insurance. The insurance company was represented by Cook at the meeting discussing the changes affecting county employees' health benefits.

No action was taken on the item of the Department of State Health Services contract until the next meeting of September 25th.

Sheriff Tam Terry was given the ok to set up a Buffer Zone Plan. The plan consists of individual air pacs used by emergency personnel in case of an emergency around the Pantex area. The grant totaled \$44,950.00 for 10 pacs. The air pacs are rechargeable. This particular grant came about due to Homeland Securities.

The court approved a proposal from Carpet World on the amount of \$9,258.25 to carpet the Carson County Library, Panhandle Branch. Bids were also received from Ingrams for \$18,605.00 Rick Lovelady for \$14,191.00.

Discussion was held over the installation and placement of a new generator donated by Pantex. A new electrical system was discussed to operate the new generator. The installation and location of a diesel fuel tank to operate the generator is still being studied.

Judge Powers said. "The current generator was donated by and maintained by Pantex." But it is only single phase and it is not big enough to operate, such as the elevator. It would not be big enough to evacuate the jail except through the stairways. The new 3-phase power \$19,000.00 generator was made available through Judge Powers and negotiations through the Agreement In Principal {AIP} with the Dept. of Energy, State Energy Office and Carson County.

The court reviewed and approved all claims including a newly submitted claim to the City of Panhandle in the amount of \$127.13.

A proposal from Classic Ornamental Iron Company to make improvements on the outside and inside hand rails for the Courthouse. The Court discussed the improvements and the proposal in the amount of \$9,623.00.

The court discussed Sheriff's personnel because Sheriff Terry asked the court to allow two employees of the County to be certified as Jailers and utilize the law enforcement, 171 hour pay schedule.

The Court discussed and approved with Sheriff Terry Courthouse security. The sheriff asked the Court to allow him to purchase a new DVR and two monitors from Panhandle Computer Services in the amount of \$5059.00, for the security cameras now in the Courthouse.

No action was taken on the progress on sealing the floor in the jail.

All items were by unanimous vote unless otherwise stated.
